Time To Mail Christmas Items

In purpose, if not appearance, Postmaster Lohoefener recalls the officers on those dramatic World War II recruiting posters that reminded passers by, "Uncle

Sam Needs You." The battle, in this case, is against time. Christmas cards and gift packages are arriving at Post Office headquarters far too slowly. As a result, immediate cooperation from the public must be enlisted.

"The big danger is that commercial and incoming Christmas mail may slow-up the outgoing operation. Poorly-wrapped packages have also complicated our work a great deal, the Postmaster said today.

"Mail your Christmas presents for distance states immediately. Christmas cards for out of town delivery should be posted before Dec. 15 and those with local addresses at least a week

But first be sure that each gift is carefully wrapped and tied. Print the complete address, and return address, if your handwriting is at all shacky. We have already been forced to return many Christmas gifts as "undeliverable' for those two reasons.

At present, parcel post is considerebly behind schedule. Only Christmas cards are being mailed with some consistency. Gratifying as this is, the Postmaster anticipates still another rush when unexpected greetings breeze in from forgotten friends. He suggests, "Better pick up a few air mail and special delivery stamps today. It always hap-



BUILDING A COMMUNITY

The men who run retail stores are almost always community builders and all-around good citizens. The reason for this can be found in the constructive business attitude which is an integral part of successful retail management. J. C. Penney, one of the country's leading merchants and head of the great chain store system which bears his name, recently made some remarks which illustrated this attitude. Cut-throat competition is out of date and has been for 50 years, says Mr. Penney. "If a man does a good job his competitor needn't worry him. "There is no better friend to any merchant than a fair competitor, who profits most because he serves best. It is in service that the real competition occurs.

With this kind of thinking being voiced by leaders in retailing, it's no wonder that local merchants generally are good people to have around. And it provides the best kind of guarantee that the consumer is going to get the utmost in courtesy, service, convenience and quality at the lowest possible price.

MORE JOBS AND BETTER GOODS

Anyone who thinks there is too much spread between what farmers get for their produce and what the housewife pays for food at retail would do well to read an article by Phillip W. Porter which appeared in the Cleveland

His family was away, so he had to do his own grocery shopping. It was his first experience of that kind in many years. He went to a supermarket, and, to put it midly, he

The pleasant surprises were many, from cellophane wrapped meats thru the attractive vegetable displays to the efficient system or handling, Charging for, and wrapping the purchases. After a full account of his adventure, Mr. Porter wrote: "What a far cry from the small, dark grocery store of your youth, where you used to swipe pickles out of a big barrel, a cat slept on the counter, and flies swarmed around the sugar bin. You bought stuff in bulk then, at a lower price. Do you want to go back to that I don't think many would answer yes.

"The fact is that all the way along the line, in packing, in freezing, in shipping, in trucking, in selling, more labor is required all the time to deliver more food to more consumers. The new era has made more jobs and produced better goods at about the same price as last year.'

That tells the story accurately and it's true of retailing in all its branches, the public demands more service, more variety and luxury items.

TIMES HAVE CHANGED

If you are a typical family man who earns \$4500 a year and works the usual eight-hour day, the Tax Foundation has some news for you.

Two hours and thirty-five minutes of that day go to earn the money needed to pay your taxes, direct and indirect. That's much longer than you need work to buy your food, almost twice as long as it takes to pay your housing costs, and four times as long as for your clothing or trans-

It used to be argued that only wealthy people had any particular interest in the tax question, and that the way to meet government costs was to soak the rich. How times have changed. There aren't enough rich people if you took their total income. Today everybody is soaked to the limit. It is the masses of people who have the greatest interest in cutting government spending and tax bite.

Price Of Poultry Leaves No Profit

Poultry producers are having a hard time making a profit at the present price of eggs in comparison with the price of feed "I realize the poultry producers cannot do anything about the price of feed, but maybe they can do something about management. Laying hens need plenty of resh air but chilling drafts can spell trouble. Never close the house entirely," says B. T. Haws, county agent. Open the windows from the top and leave 8 to 10 inches of ventilation even when the temperature drops be-

Air drafts are caused by cross ventilation. Check to see that back and end windows-which are opened during hot weather, are closed tightly.

Start the birds now on three to four inches of litter and add more as needed. With "biult-up litter, the house stays dry in wet weather and saves time and la-

Check for leaking water fountains and make sure the birds 't wasting too much feed. Less waste results if the feeders are only about one half full.

Tip to Farmers

A farmer can save money on a brooder house by taking the long view. Expense should be figured on the basis of the cost per year for the life of the unit, not simply as a lump sum. A well-built brooder house costing \$200 that gives 15 to 20 years of service is more economical than a cheaply constructed house that gives 6 years of service at an initial cost of \$100.

Sound economy calls for a structure that adequately protects the poultry investment it houses. Proper insulation is a "must" for minimum fuel bills.

If a rounded arch roof is planned, bend sheathing material over laminated wood arches and cover it with heavy fire-resistant mineral-surfaced asphalt roll roofing. The same material serves equally well in maintenance of existing



house needs durable watertight roof to protect sensi-tive chicks and to keep maintenance cost on the structure low.

houses. Roll roofing looks best and gives greatest protection from rain and wind if it is applied by the "blind," or concealed, nailing

method.

If the house has a gable roof, asphalt shingles will give long-term protection with minimum maintenance. For color uniformity that enhances the appearance of the entire farmstead, shingles often are chosen in a color to match the color of the roofs on

other farm buildings.

The moisture that collects from evaporation and droppings is best disposed of by ventilation. Ventilation can be systematically con-trolled through damper-controlled louver openings in front and rear walls. Stock wood utility sash is recommended for windows.

A portable brooder house can double as a range house. For safe moving, it should be built on two 4-by-6 skids, under 2-by-4 joists spaced 24 inches on center. The braces should be screwed to each
