The Haskell Garden Club met February 8 and one topic of discussion was the culture of Day Lilies (Hemerocallis). were several questions we did not have time to discuss. After much research, I have come up with some of the answers . Day Lilies can be planted almost any time the ground is not frozen. The roots are fleshy and grow in clusters ... it is from these roots that many plants are propogated: planting of seed is another way of propogation.

Day lilies are self pollinating and often the plants produce several seed pods a season. Plants grown from seed will bloom in nine months.

The best method is to plant the seed as quick as they have matured and the seed will still be soft and will sprout almost at once. Once the seeds are permitted to dry, the shell becomes very hard, soaking overnight in warm water will hasten sprouting. Roots should be planted so the crown is just below the soil surface.

Mrs. Harold Cooke of Abilene, a very dear friend, has several hundred Day Lily plants, many of which she has grown from seed. She hand - pollinated a plant and a Day Lily grown from the seed was a deep red that she named Ruby, because of the calor, and because my name is Ruby, Mrs. Cooke pre-sented me with the plant; it is still in production even though

it is six years old. Day Lilies come in many different shades and colors, They bloom mostly in July and August when other flowers are struggling to survive. They require very little care once established and will grow almost any type of soil except swampy undrained areas.

Several years ago when we went back East, we saw Day Lilies in many states. We only saw orange and red varieties wild. They are a sun-loving

Mrs. R. C. Couch, Sr. gave a very interesting discussion on the care of Iris. She stated that many people cut their Iris back each year and that this is a bad practice, as next year's flowers get their strength from the blades. She also said to gently remove the old blades from the rizomes by hand, being very careful not to damage the fleshy part of the root.

Mrs. Couch said the best time to move fris was just after the blossoms begin to fade.

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

### Your New Social Security By R. R. Tuley, Jr. District Manager

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one in a series of articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security,

the disabled.

a new change in the disability benefit provisions is a boon.

For benefits to be paid to a disabled worker and his dependents under the old law he needed social security credits or at least 5 out of the 10 years becore becoming disabled. Now, if disabled between 24 and 31, credits are needed for only half the time between age 21 and the time of inability to work. If disabled before age 24, only 11/2 years of work under social security is needed out of a 3-year period ending when your disability began.

Benefits under this new provision are first payable for the month of February 1968, About 100,000 people—disabled workers and their dependents-are eligible. An estimated \$70 million in additional benefits will be paid out in the first 12 months.

The new law could mean benefits even for some people who have recovered from their disabling condition, or if they were denied benefits previously because they lacked enough work credits. Seek more information at the Abilene Social Security District Office if you or someone in your family might qualify. Or, see a representative of that office when he is in your community, A schedule of visits is posted in all post
