Baird City Council Hears Reprimand Byirate Citizen

On September 8, Monday evening, at 7:00 P.M. the Baird City Council met for their regularly scheduled meeting, with all members of the council present.

The Mayor called the meeting to order and the city Secretary, Kenneth Neel read the minutes.

The first order of business was the presentation of a bill for \$800.00 by Royce Waldrop to the city for damages he feel is owed to hem when his electricity service was disconnected.

Mr. Waldrop's reasoning for his actions were that the letter that was mailed to him stating that his account should be settled on service was to be disconnected, had no date on it, he also stated that the Supreme court had alledgedly ruled that before service can

be disconnected the person or persons involved must be contacted in person and that the reason that the bill had not been paid, was because he had been working out of town and all of his mail had been going to his mother's house.

Mr. Waldrop stated that the \$50.00 deposit he paid when his service was first enacted was an ample amount to cover his electric bill alone, since the city cut only his electricity off and not his water. Waldrop reminded the council that in the past he had not been more than a day or so late on his bill, therefore that should have been sufficient evidence to the city of his intent to pay his bill. Although he admitted that he had been late on occasion, he said it coincided with his pay days. Another of Waldrops

County Hay Show Set For Wednesday

The Callahan County Hay Show will be held Wednesday, October 1. This year's show will include entries from Shackelford County. The show will be held at the Baird Fire Station and producers are asked to have their entries in by September 15. There will be classes for all types of hay including hay baled in large bales.

The show is being sponsored by various businesses in Callahan County so there will be no charge to the producer for the protein testing. Producers who want to enter small square bales in the show are asked to drop them off at the County

Extension office in Baird or Glenn Rockey's barn near Baird or Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply in Cross Plains.

Producers who have large round bales are asked to notify the County Extension office at 854-1518 prior to the 15th and we will come out to sample the large round bales.

The program will start at 2:00 p.m. on October 1 at the Baird Fire Station. Don Dorsett, State Forage Specialist from Texas A&M University, will be present to judge the entries and awards will be presented at that time. The show is open to all producers and all is invited to attend the program.

Baird Phone System To Switch To Computer Sept. 16th

Dial tone for Baird telephone users will sound different on Wednesday, Sept. 16th. That's the day that Continental Telephone places its new computer based switching center into service. Ringing and busy signals will also change to a different pitched tones.

Alan Armstrong, Customer Services Manager for Continental Telephone's Baird area, reports that all circuits in the new switch have been undergoing final testing for the past two weeks. "Everything has checked out fine," he said. "We're confident that the change over early Tuesday morning will go without a hitch."

The digital switching system being placed into service is more compact and more reliable than previous electro-

mechanical systems. Solid-state design means that there are no moving parts to wear out. The entire system is made up of printed circuit packs utilizing large-scale integrated circuits.

Procedures for dialing numbers on the same party line will change with the new system. No special dialing code is needed. Just dial the regular seven-digit phone number.

When dialing either a "1 puls" or an "0 plus" long distance call from a party line phone, an operator will come on the line to obtain the caller's telephone number for billing purposes. The new equipment automatically identifies the calling number on calls from individual line phones.

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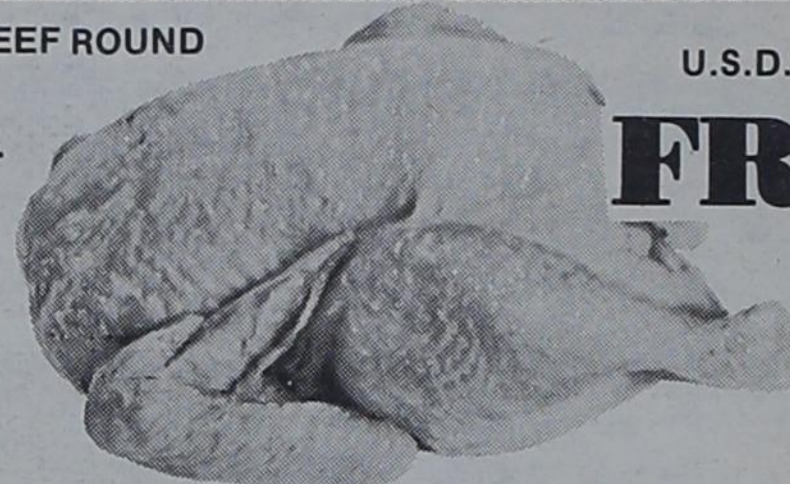

Ricky James Robertson, 17, of 211 Pecan, Clyde, was indicted for possession of methamphetamine ("speed") as result of an Aug. 27 arrest.

Felony theft indictments were returned against five persons in connection with

the Aug. 19 theft of five Abilene Reporter-News vending racks from in front of five Clyde business firms.

Named in those indictments were James E. Gebhardt, 18; Adam Wayne Roden, 17; Deanna Denise Field, 20; and James Lee Stroope, 17, all of Clyde; and Jody Baker, 18, of Rt. 1, Clyde.

Ignacio Inez Padillo, 22, of 2902 Hickory, Abilene, was indicted for the July 29 burglary of Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply in Cross Plains. Padillo faces a similar indictment in Taylor

County after being arrested in Abilene the same night.

main concerns was the fact that there are several people in town whose bills are much more delinquent than his, yet they still have service, therefore he felt he was dealt with unjustly and the \$800 in damages (\$500 for his refrigerator, \$200 for wages missed to attend meeting, and \$100 for fish, pork and beef which ruined) should be paid him by the city for their unjust treatment. He also stated that the \$800 did not cover all of his losses and that if the City didn't take action he would itemize each item lost and the total cost if the refrigerator as well as other wages that could be missed, court cost, and lawyers fees, during a law suit against the city, if restitution for the damages is not met. Waldrop in his last statement asked for the resignation of the Mayor Pro-Tem, Robert Martin. He claimed that Martin was contacted by phone and asked to come to his house to view the damage. Waldrop claims that Martin stated that there was nothing he could do, that the council would have to take action, not he alone, and that he had made prior arrangements to be somewhere else, therefore he couldn't be at Waldrop's house. Waldrop felt the resignation of Martin as Mayor pro-tem was justified because Martin allowed family business to be put ahead of the city's business of which Martin, at that time was responsible for.

The official authorization to disconnect Waldrop's service came from Mayor Brame who has been cracking down on delinquent bills to clear up the city's financial difficulties. His reasoning being that the city has to pay for the electrical current the citizens use one time and they have every right to expect the citizens to reimburse the city on time. Mayor Brame also stated that the Public Commission of Texas states that the post masters mark by mail is sufficient to enact an interruption of service. Mayor Brame went over Mr. Waldrop's past month's bills for the Council's benefit.

Jan. bill was paid Feb. 11th, Feb.'s, March 11th, March's bill, April 16th, April's bill, May 19th, May's bill in July, and June, July and August's bill paid Sept. 2nd. Waldrop's service as well as approximately 10 other persons service was disconnected because of delinquent bills. The fact that the electricity and not the water was interrupted was an oversight. Waldrop's June & July bill for electricity alone was \$38.80. The letter sent to Mrs. Waldrop read: If satisfactory settlement is not made for your account by August 22nd your service will be disconnected and \$25 will be charged for reconnection of your water & electricity where same has been disconnected for non-payment. By order of the City Council. Mayor Brame also said that Mr. Waldrop left no word as to his whereabouts nor did he notify the City he would be late because of his out-of-town job. The Mayor felt that Waldrop has known that his bill is due the 10th of each month and that Waldrop should have contacted the City to make arrangements to pay his bill later, but since he didn't the City cannot be responsible for his losses. The City did disregard the \$25 reconnection fee when Waldrop paid his June, July & August bill on Sept. 2nd. The service to Waldrop was not disconnected until the evening of the 26th, 4 days after the plea for arrangements to be made by the 22nd in Waldrop's letter. The City will hold their ruling on the Waldrop matter until they meet with the city attorney, at which time the Mayor will contact Mr. Waldrop by mail or in person.

The second order of business was the matter of delinquent water bills. Some were as old as 1974. The council agreed to re-bill these and take further action if billing gained no response.

The council also discussed the problems of the NCR billing machine. Because of problems with the machine the commercial billing didn't go out

until after the 1st of the month. The NCR Co. by which the machine was purchased has not been holding up to their maintenance agreement of 10 yrs. The NCR machine owned by the city is near obsolete. It is an interim machine and was only made for 1½ years. The problem lies in the fact that in this area there is only 1 man who can work on these machines and his is book solid for the next three months. Before any final action will be taken on this matter the mayor will carry the problem through the chain of command to force NCR to hold to their maintenance agreement.

The council approved an ordinance granting W.T.U. the privilege to operate within the city, but not to the exemption of others. WTU will pay the City \$6500 per yr. for this privilege.

The council also approved the rate of schedule for WTU, which for residential areas is 28% less than the current city rate. WTU's fuel adjustment is less than the city gets power wholesale. It was stressed that the City has no control over the fuel adjustment. This is decided by the PUC committee. The Railroad commission sets the fuel adjustment allowance which is the 65A on the gas bills. The approval of WTU's rates is

more a formality, there Brooker made the motion to approve Mitchell 2nd and all were in favor.

The council accepted the resignation of Jim Tollett of the Housing Authority board, who is resigning due to conflicting interests. The city has accepted Tollett's bid for work on city lines to the Pioneer Lodge.

The suggestion was made by Virginia Shanks that city employees be within contactable reach during all working hours in case of emergencies such as the school experienced during a power shortages during the noon hour. The school children received a cold meal because 2 city employees were unable to be contacted, and their whereabouts were unknown by city personnel. The situation was unable to be corrected until approximately 3:00 P.M.

It was made known that the Traffic and Safety Department will be maintaining a traffic count at Rogers Food Store before the district office of that department will make the final decision on the removal of some of the city's caution lights.

The next council meeting will be held September 22nd, at 7:00 P.M. in the City Hall.

Local Student Makes Spring 1980 Dean's List

Preston C. Clark of Baird was among the 3,606 students whose spring semester, 1980, grades earned them places on Southwest Texas State University's Dean's List.

To make the regular Dean's List, a student must be enrolled for a minimum of 12 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and achieve at least an overall "B" average.

Making the Superior Honors List requires grades of "A" in at least 12 of the required 15 semester hours of coursework, excluding physical education activities, and no lower than a "B" in the other three-hour course. This translates into a 3.8 grade point average or better on a 4.0 scale.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."



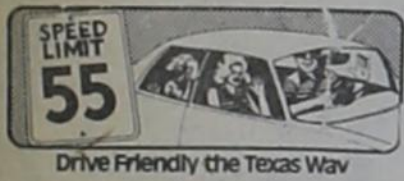

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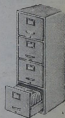
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
