Police Make **Quick Stop** Of Con Man

At 9:10 p.m. Wednesday night, Muleshoe City Police Department Dispatcher Martina Valdez received a telephone call that a quick-change artist was working in Muleshoe and had already been to two businesses.

She notified MPD Richard Bonham, who was on routine patrol at the time. As she described the man's vehicle, he passed in front of the patrol car eastbound on High-

Sgt. Bonham had to turn around and pursued the vehicle to the area adjacent to the Muleshoe Livestock Auction on Highway 84 where the vehicle was stopped. As the man started to get out of his car, Sgt. Bonham said the man had something in his hand, and he immediately asked for a 'back-

Taken into custody was 35year old Walter R. Deal, a black male who gave a Garland address.

Investigating officers also found a small amount of marijuana in his vehicle, so he faced additional charges.

According to the manager of the Pizza Hut, the man had attempted a 'quick-change' in the Pizza Hut. Failing in his attempt there, he drove to the Shafer Bell Station, where he allegedly successfully pulled off 'quick-change' on the high school station attendant.

However, the Pizza Hut manager had followed him, and officers were called as he left the station.

By 9:13 p.m., the man was in custody, and charged with Class 'C' theft and with Class 'B' possession of marijuana. Further checking also showed he had outstanding warrants at Clarksville for dangerous drug

He was locked up in the Bailey County jail and had two arraignments on Thursday morning. The first arraignment was before Municipal Judge Lynda Huckaby on the Class 'C' theft. Bond on that charge was set at \$200. Deal was then taken before Justice of the Peace Jack Bates who ordered him held under \$500 bond on the possession of Marijuana charge, a Class 'B' charge.

The Clarksville Police Department also placed a 'hold' on the man when he is through with the local charges.
