James W. Alexander, 73, a prominent citizen of Burkburnett died Thursday afternoon in a Wichita Falls hospital after a



VOTE - Don't Just Talk

Commenting editorially the Ontario, Oregon, Argus-Observer, said in part, "Louise Humphrey, Portland tax expert, hit the nail on the head in her speech before the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation when she blamed taxpayers apathy as one of the big reasons for ever encreasing expenditures, some necessary, some unnecssary.

"Everyone gripes, but only a small handful care enough to try to do something. Major decisions involving large expenditures of money or just policy, are passed every day without a lift of an eyebrow or comment from

the average citizen.

'Too often the comment is 'what can I do? How I feel doesn't make any difference.' How wrong is this attitude. Each and everyone of us has a weaponJour vote. If only we could be bothered to take the time to mark a ballot when it is presented to us, we could do something. Too often, only a few take the time to vote-exposing us not to the rule by majority, but to rule by minority."

Mrs. Humphrey told the Farm Bureau convention that expenditures should be challenged as to necessity and, and that elimination of some items would not necessarily "unlock jail doors and close school doors."

Anti Trust Laws For Unions

The following editorial is reprinted from The Ameri-

During the next few months there will undoubtedly be a flood of suggestions for dealing with managementlabor relations. The tremendous losses to workers, manufacturers, government and the public resulting from the steel strike cannot help but lead to fervent demands for

legislation to prevent repetition. "In the editorials of the newspapers of the country, we have read many proposals for dealing with the situation. But we have read none that make more sense than the seemingly simple answer of making anti-trust laws appplicable to labor as well as to management.

'The anti-trust laws were enacted in the first place to prevent industry from ganging up on labor and the public and taking unfair advantage of the power which

could be wielded by building monopolies.

"Now the shoe seems to be on the other foot. Business and the public now need similar protection against labor. For it seems just as dangerous for labor to form tremendous, industry-wide unions, which are in a position to break the back of industry and inflict hardship on the public, as it would be to permit industries to form

When bigness reaches monopoly proportions, history has taught us that it must be broken up.'

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

Here for instance, is what Admiral Arleigh A. Burke, Chief of Naval Operations, has to say: "Seapower is not just men-of-war. It includes cargo ships, passenger lines, tankers and the many other craft and auxiliaries that make up the Merchant Marine. Our experiences in World War I and II demonstrated beyond question our dependence upon our merchant arm, our "Fourth Arm of Defense,' and we must strive always to keep our merchant fleet virile and strong."
