the broader aspects of the nation's welfare In his March 1st letter "to all law enforcement officials," Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation says: "It is an uncontestable fact that our country, the symbol of the free world, is ultimate, priceless goal of international communism. This can't be until the Red Flag is flown over the US.

"If for a moment," the FBI Chief continues," the grandiose Red plan is scoffed at as being fantastic, consider that one-fourth of the land surface of the world and one-third of the peoples of the earth are now controlled by the world-wide communist bloc.

"It is indeed appalling that some members of our society continue to deplore and criticize those who stress the communist danger. What these misguided authorities' fail to realize is that the Communist Party. USA is an integral part of international communism. As the world wide menace becomes more powerful the various Communist Parties assume a more dangerous and sinister role in the countries in which they are entrenched. Public ndifference to this threat is tantamount to national suicide.

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

Issue has had Austinites in a stew for months. It was originally announced after the election in December that urban renewal had carried by a 52-vote margin. Eight property owners contested the election results on grounds that ballots were cast by persons not qualified to vote. After 9 of 18 contested boxes had been opened. District Judge James K. Evetts of Belton declared the election void. He said there were so many disqualified voters and improperly marked ballots that it was impossible to determine the election outcome.

Austin's city attorney petitioned the Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus to compel Judge Evetts to open and examine all the ballot boxes. He contended the qualified voters had a right to have their votes counted. Having lost out on a direct plea to the Supreme Court, City Attorney Doren Eskew said he would go through the usual appeal route, going first to the 3rd Court of Civil Appeals.

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

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
