Mayor Pro Tem Makes First Call On New Burkburnett Extended Area Telephone

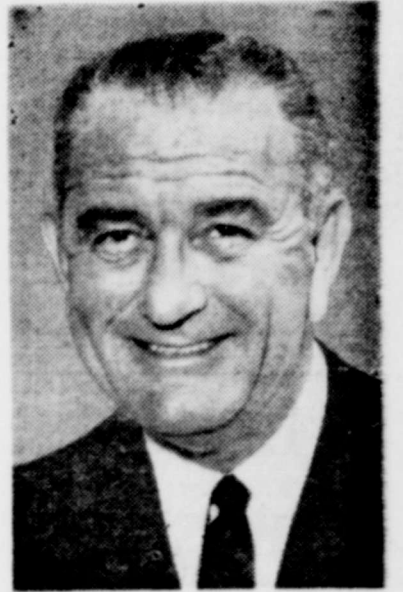

This call marked the official start of direct dialing with Wichita Falls customers Saturday, April 16th, and added 45,000 telephones to Burkburnett customers on a local call basis. The cutover to extended area service with Wichita Falls at 10:00 P. M., Saturday night marked another step in enlargement and development of Burkburnett telephone service and climaxed a number of months planning, engineering and installation of the necessary equipment and facilities to bring this extended area telephone service to Burkburnett customers.

Joe Janeke Elected Ch'man Red Cross In Burkburnett

Elected chairman of the Red Cross committee in Burkburnett Tuesday was Joe Janeke, city attorney.

Janeke is a member of the board of directors of the Wichita County Chapter, American Red Cross, and in 1958 served as fund drive chairman for Burkburnett.

He replaces A. H. Lohofener who resigned after serving as chairman for five years. Lohofener is postmaster of Burkburnett and a vice-president of the county Red Cross board. He will continue active in Red Cross work in both Burkburnett and the county.

A native of Marlin, Janeke served four years in World War II in the Air Force with most of his service in North Africa and Italy. He flew 45 combat missions in B-26 bombers and led his unit on the first bombing mission over Rome. He was discharged a captain in 1945.

Janeke attended Texas University and was graduated in 1946 with a degree in business administration followed by a degree in law in 1947. He was admitted to the bar that same year.

For four years Janeke was chief attorney for the State Hospital Board at Austin. After serving as business manager for the Wichita Falls State Hospital in 1954 he moved to Burkburnett in 1955 to establish his law practice.

With his wife, Mary Helen, and their three children, Joseph Jr., 16, Margaret Jane 11, and Teresa 3, he lives at 124 Rose. They attend the Catholic church.

Janeke is an active supporter of the American Legion and belongs to Legion Post 264. He is also a member of the board of directors of the USO.

McDaniel, Wichita attorney, issued the following statement today: I am asking the voters of this County to return me to office as their legislator. I am serving as counsel for the Congressional investigating committee in Washington, D. C. I suffered a heart attack during a very difficult hearing while hospitalized at the Naval Hospital and the recuperative period that followed has taken me time to decide my future activities. I have now recovered from this attack and have re-opened my law office. I am also taking an active part in Wichita County politics.

I am asking for the job of Representative, 31st District, Place 1, hoping that time will permit me to visit with all of you. But, if I fail to see any way to take this opportunity to ask for the help of each elector, I will be but one of the many who only promise to represent the district to the best of their ability. However, my experience as a congressional investigator and as a state official and as a member of the Winters' contribution committee should help me to do what is done in Austin in every county.

In early 1920s McDaniel as a member of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce at the corner of 10th and Ohio. Later he was elected to the Wichita Falls first Scout Patrol, head-Scoutmaster Bill McClure. McDaniel played on Ted Jafferis 1932 football team. The play-off year began the actual construction of the Cashion Baptist Church on Burkburnett Highway.

While in the United States Army on Sept. 11, 1942, McDaniel served as private, Corporal and staff sergeant before being assigned to duty as a field commission as a lieutenant while on duty in the Pacific.

While serving as a member of the Wichita County, McDaniel was author of HB 35 which secured its passage giving financial aid to Hardin College (Midwestern). McDaniel was a last member from Wichita to serve on the power-plant committee.

McDaniel was graduated from University law school and practiced law in practice in 1940. He was deputy assessor of agriculture in 1940 before becoming counsel for the investigating committee in 1940. Paid for by Vernon (Bill).

Let's Emphasize Our Strength

It's one thing to keep a close watch on what the Soviets are doing, and to carefully evaluate their achievements on the basis of the best available data.

It's an entirely different thing to go from this to the belief that, if we are to stay ahead of Russia, we must imitate her systems and her ways.

That warning, in effect, was recently given by Vice President Nixon. The Washington Post quoted him as saying that the Russians have made some of their biggest strides using American forms of individual competition. "At a time when they are moving our way, the greatest mistake we can make is to move their way," he went on. "There is a tendency today to say the way to get things done is to have the Government step in and do more, the way it is done in the Soviet Union. I would say we could not make any greater mistake than to follow the philosophy in the United States.

"The Communists have a monopoly on bureaucracy. We should emphasize our strength—creative private enterprise."

It would be a great thing for this country if more political figures, of both the parties, spoke out in similarly forthright words instead of flirting with the left wingers.

Competition And Gasoline Prices

A good many people seem to believe that gasoline prices are practically the same everywhere in the country—and that in one way or another the oil companies, and especially the larger companies, are able to control prices.

This belief would be more accurately termed a myth, as two studies recently published by Harvard University show.

The studies are the work of top authorities. Although they approach the matter of gasoline pricing from different angles, they reach many of the same conclusions. The main conclusion are two: First, there is much more variation in gasoline prices than consumers seem to believe; second, size alone does not give a leading supplier control of prices either throughout a market, or at the service stations carrying his product.

One of the studies, made in the typical Mid-west market, goes into detail as to the causes of differences in retail gasoline prices. Four points stand out: The attractiveness of the station and its facilities; its location in relation to traffic intensity; the use of trading stamps and other premiums, and the marketing "strategy" of the individual dealer. To take an example of the workings of one of these points, the less attractive stations tend to offer lower prices than the better appointed ones, for obvious competitive reasons.

Any motorist, of course, can see how gas competition operates by just making a casual survey of the service stations in his community. This competition is found in service as well as in price. The station operator is a businessman—and, like all businessmen, he seeks to attract the trade his way by offering whatever inducement he feels will be most effective.

Know What You're Voting For

Newsweek, in urging all citizens to vote says: "If you can spend a few minutes each day using hair tonic to save your hair, can't you spend a few minutes each year at the polls to save your scalp."

Every vote is important. Many elections have been decided by a mere handful of votes. And, in instance after instance, this has amounted to election by minority—for the reason that only half the qualified voters or less troubled to go to the polls.

Another thing needs to be added. An ignorant vote is as bad or worse than no vote at all. Study the candidates and their platforms. Consider their integrity, character, sincerity. Measure their ideas in terms of freedom, opportunity and the traditions and principals on which the American system of government has been built.

Yes, vote—in every election, minor or major, that is open to you. And make sure it is an informed vote.

We often read about a car going out of control. A traffic safety authority says that this is a misstatement—a car doesn't and can't go out of control unless its driver allows it to do so.

 Takes Reelection**

Robinson takes this opportunity to thank the citizens of Wichita County for their support and confidence shown in the past. I think a serenade should be worthy of his and now I am giving an amount of my stewardship of these years as your Tax Collector and Assessor, in order that old timers and new residents can decide whether I have an asset or a liability. It is customary to tell family history, connections, etc. However, I will not do mine.

In Jacksboro, Jack and I lived there those days were a pair of shoes and when I lost one I would have to buy one on one foot the other one got sore and I'd change back and forth. I'd go to Ft. Worth where I had my high school education. I remember I cut lots of wood for \$1.00 a cord in Barton Heights Bottoms west of Ft. Worth. I then went to Lubbock and drove the mail back and I dug more mesquite roots off of Lubbock Co. any other two men in Texas unchained cattle and did some things. I came to this good

city in 1918, which has been my residence ever since. I belong to the Lions Club, Odd Fellows, Burlington Veterans, Northwest Texas Field and Stream, and the Soroptomist Club. However, I don't think all of this or my children and grandchildren would have any bearing on my ability as Assessor and Collector of Taxes. I am also a member of the First Baptist Church. I don't know whether I should tell this on the church or not, but I will explain how it happened. About thirty-five years ago, they told me they were going to make me a Deacon. I was astonished and told them they must be very short of material. They agreed with me that they were for this special kind of work. When I asked what it was they said it was to represent the rough element. I asked them how they happened to pick me and they said "Birds of a Feather Flock together."

The first year I served as Tax Assessor my office was connected with the Tax Collectors' office with just a hall between. I saw what an awful burden it was to handle payment of collecting taxes and selling car tags at the same date. It was a sight I will always remember. It was a burden on the deputies, a burden on everyone's purse, and the long lines waiting to be served. I made up my mind to try and do something about this.

I called Senator Ben G. O'Neal at Austin, whose office is now in the First National Bank, in Wichita Falls, Texas, and explained the situation and pleaded with him to do something about it. I have a letter on my desk giving an account of his efforts and my many phone calls in which he says he had started home from Austin and about forty miles out of town he saw many trucks lined up on the highway which could not operate because they were not financially able to register their trucks and pay their taxes. He said he remembered my telephone calls and plea for him to do something about this kind of situation. He told his wife, who was with him, that we are going back to Austin right now and write a bill that would relieve the situation. He went back and spent Saturday and Sunday writing the bill which was passed on the following Monday.

This bill provided the registration of motor vehicles to be from April 1st to March 31st of the next year and THAT IS STILL THE LAW. This bill affected every county in the State of Texas and every automobile owner was given three months extension and those that had paid for those months were given a refund. I don't see how the larger counties had handled the situation and why someone had not done something about it instead of leaving it up to a youngster like

The law certainly relieves all automobile owners of the double burden of paying taxes and registering their cars on the 1st day of January.

A year or two later the Legislature placed a 1.1% sales tax on automobiles and allowed all counties 2% of 1.1%. The State received 98%. Bob Dean, then Tax Collector of Sherman and Grayson County, talked it over with me and we started out to get a fair distribution of this tax. The result, after a lot of hard work and through three sessions of the Legislature, we were finally allowed 5% and during this time I put out some five letters to every Assessor and Collector requesting their support in this effort. I also corresponded personally with each Senator and Representative at Austin and I tell you it was a long hard fight. Now this last Legislature raised the sales tax from 1.1% to 1.5% and was taking 4% of our 5% with which to pay it. I think this was very unfair and at that rate the next session they would be charging us for the privilege of collecting it. We immediately went to work and was successful in having the bill changed allowing the counties 3 1/2% of the 1.5% which was one quarter cent less than we were getting before. I have the names of the twenty-one Representatives who introduced this bill and at the convention which convenes at Abilene May 8, 9, and 10, I intend to bring the matter up and secure the support of all Tax Assessors and Collectors. I have already made request of the Commissioners Court to make a fight for 5% of the 1.5% to which I think we are justly entitled. This sales tax bill, in connection with other bills that I helped the Legislature pass, brings in more money for Tax Assessing-Collecting and Car License Sales in one year than it will take to pay my salary in two years. The County Auditor will verify this statement.

I was awarded a life time membership in the County Judges of Texas for having made the hardest fight to get more money from the state to help the financial situation in all the Counties in Texas.

My books have been audited for fourteen years under the Pat Lambert Auditing Company and Berry Brown, who assisted in this auditing, will tell you the worst year I had was 1956 and I was fifteen cents over.

I have never failed to come to the office night or day the year round to help anyone in connection with taxes or matters in connection with the automobile department. When anyone came to me with troubles I did not try to get rid of them but on the other hand, set out to do something to help them. This office affords many opportunities to make friends and help someone, which I enjoy. I have always felt that a man would not have too many friends if everybody was his friend.
