Area Developers Held Industrial Clinic May 19th

Robert McWhirter, Attorney at law from Paris, Tex., and president of the Paris Industrial Foundation spoke before the monthly meeting of the North Texas Southern Okla., Area Development association on May 19th.

Mr. McWhirter told the Industrial Team plans for handling prospects within your city. The plan included a five to eight man committee, static in membership, whose sole responsibility would be to meet and discuss possible location of factories with industrial prospects.

Under the plan each man would strive toward being an expert in his given field. The man responsible for taxes would need to be well acquainted with the cities tax structure both now and in the future. Other members would study other phases of the Business Climate.

Texas' Official Hi-way Travel Map Now Ready

Texas Official Highway Travel Map, 1960-style is now available to general public. Free copies of the big colorful map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, or at the highway district offices and travel bureau. County Tax officers have map cards on hand for requesting copies of the map.

The map reflects 1,933 miles of multilane-divided highway now completed, and includes the finished sections of the seven National Systems of Interstate and Defense Highways located in the state. More than 1,500 farm-to-market road miles have been added to this years map. Approximately 20,000 miles of the state's 30,000 mile Farm to Market Road System are shown on the map. All of the 26,378 miles of State and U. S. highways are shown.

The map is used by all state and governmental agencies in the state for determining official distances, mileages, zones, and like information.

Industry And The Boy Scouts

One of the most urgent problems this country must deal with is the growth of juvenile delinquency. And that means the Boy Scout movement, more than ever before, deserves the active, down-to-earth support of everyone. The boy who is inculcated with Scout training and ideals isn't going to develop into a juvenile gangster.

A leaflet issued by the organization reports that thousands of business organizations are now making Scouting cooperation a part of their community relations program. And what is needed is more, much more of that kind of help.

The help can be provided in a number of ways. Industry can sponsor Scout units. Men can serve as Scoutmasters, advisors, and in other capacities. A business can adopt a Scout project and help provide more and better facilities. Financial support is always required. Scouting exists entirely on volunteer funds. And many industries can offer valuable technical assistance.

The future of American business, like the future of all other institutions, will depend on the people who are youngsters today. An investment in that future is one of the best that any enterprise or individual can make.

Sunday School—A Force For Faith

This year marks the twentieth anniversary of the founding of the Laymen's National Committee, Inc., an interfaith organization dedicated to the proposition that "America was founded on man's consciousness of God, man's daily labor and the fruits therefrom." The Committee sponsors National Sunday School Week, April 11-17th. The theme for the week this year was, "Sunday School — A Force For Faith."

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has said, "The sixteenth annual observance of National Sunday School Week should serve as a signal re-emphasizing to all responsible citizens the need for a return to religion in our standards of living."

"The Sunday Schools of our Nation can make a tremendous contribution to the necessary realignment of our guide for daily activity. The importance of religion as the major factor in the conduct of our lives must be instilled in our young men and women, and from there, it will assume its rightful place in the lives of every citizen, every community and every nation."

Slowing Growth

The excise tax rate on gasoline is almost five times that for mink coats or diamonds—two commodities that, desirable as they may be, hardly come under the heading of absolute necessities. The excessive gasoline tax is slowing growth of gasoline demand, according to a statement from one of the nation's leading oil companies. Motorists resent what they consider the high price of gasoline, which is actually the high price of taxes.

The federal gasoline tax was increased from three to four cents a gallon on Oct. 1, 1959. At that time it was said that this was just a "temporary" boost which would expire in mid-1961. Now it is proposed to extend the "temporary" cent-a-gallon increase until June 30, 1964, and impose a further tax of half a cent a gallon.

This is urged because of the multi-billion dollar interstate highway program. But, as all manner of authorities have pointed out, that program could be financed completely by existing highway user taxes if none were diverted to other uses. Moreover, it is manifestly unreasonable that motorists alone pay all the costs for highways that serve all the people. As an example, the highway program is, in large part, a national defense program, and national defense costs of every kind should be shared by everyone. The gasoline tax has gotten clear out of hand, and motorists should demand relief.

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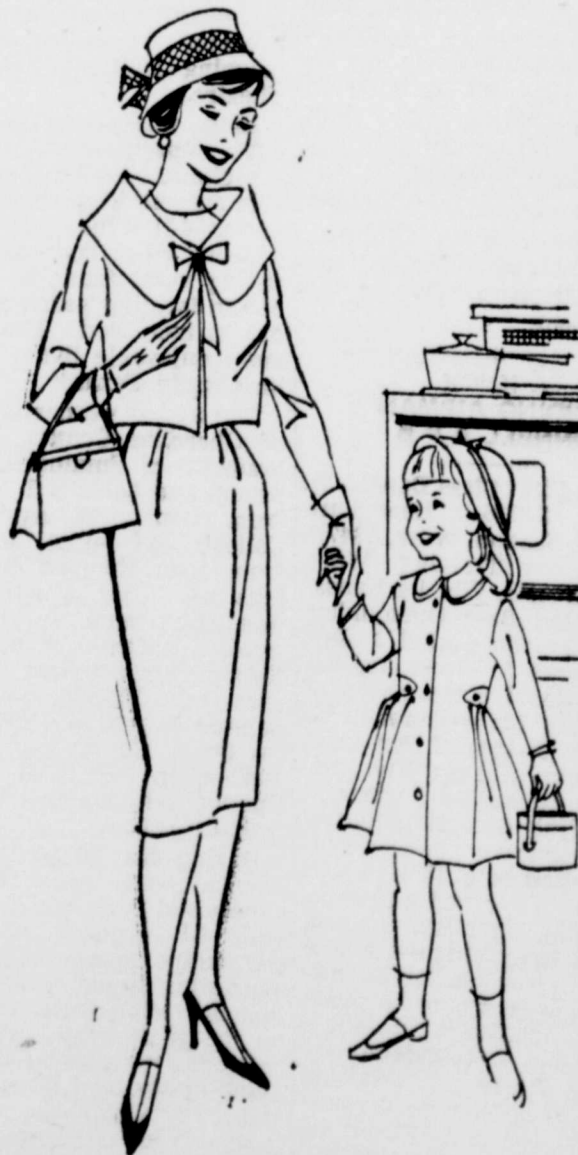

ORDINANCE NO. 242

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF ANIMALS AND FOWLS IN THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT; SETTING FORTH SANITARY REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING THAT ANY PERSON WHO VIOLATES ANY PROVISION OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE FINED NOT MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS.

SECTION 1. (a) It shall at any time be unlawful to keep a hog or hogs, a pig or pigs, within the city limits of Burkburnett, Texas.

(b) Dogs and cats shall be excepted from the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. Regulations and Sanitation Requirements for the keeping of any Poultry, Fowl, or Fowls. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to violate any of the following:

(a) Keep, harbor, maintain or permit the presence on any lot or parcel of land within the City of Burkburnett any poultry or fowl of any kind, sex or description, other than not more than one for each ten square feet of floor or ground area, pigeons excepted.

(b) Keep any poultry, fowl or fowls within any structure in the City of Burkburnett without scraping the floor of the room, coop, box or compartment and thoroughly cleaning the area within which such fowl or fowls are kept at least once every forty-eight (48) hours and so maintaining such structure or enclosure that no offensive odors are emitted therefrom.

(c) Keep any chickens or turkeys within any structure the interior of which is not white-washed at least once every six months and without spraying crude oil or some disinfectant on the roosting places at least once in each calendar month to discourage insects, fleas, mites and flies.

SECTION 3. REGULATIONS AND SANITATION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE KEEPING OF COW OR COWS, GOAT OR GOATS, HORSE OR HORSES, SHEEP OR ANY OTHER ANIMAL OF SIMILAR SPECIES. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to violate any of the following:

(a) To feed, breed, stable, pasture, or keep any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species in or on any lot, pen, building, parcel of land, stable or other enclosure, in the City of Burkburnett, Texas any part of which lot, pen, building, stable, parcel of land or other enclosure, is nearer than 100 feet to any building occupied by any person or persons any part of the day or night. A minimum of 400 square feet of area shall be required for each animal, and not more than two (2) animals shall be in any lot, pen, building, stable, enclosure or parcel of land.

(b) The place of feeding, breeding, stabling, pasturing or the keeping of any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species shall be kept free of offensive odors, flies, rodents or other pests.

SECTION 4. Hereafter, each and every lot, pen, building, stable or other enclosure in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, in or on any which of the above named animals or other species are kept, fed, bred, stabled, pastured or housed, shall have a suitable manure box or container in which all manure and droppings shall be placed daily

ORDINANCE NO. 241

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING PARKING OF TRUCKS AND MOTOR VEHICLES USED IN THE TRANSPORTATION OF GASOLINE OR LIQUIFIED PETROLEUM GASES OF ALL KINDS FROM THE STREETS, ALLEYS OR OTHER PUBLIC PLACE OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS.

SECTION 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to park or to permit to be parked upon any street, alley or other public place of the City of Burkburnett, any truck or other motor vehicle used in transporting gasoline or liquified petroleum gases, except where such trucks or motor vehicles are actually engaged in unloading gasoline or liquified petroleum gases at a filling station or other place where such gasoline or liquified petroleum gases is sold at retail or at a place where same is being lawfully used for domestic or Commercial purposes.

SECTION 2. That any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction in a court of competent jurisdiction, be fined in any sum not less than Twenty-Five Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred Dollars.

SECTION 3. The fact that many trucks used in transporting gasoline and liquified petroleum gases are now being parked upon the streets and other public places within the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, and that the presence of said parked trucks and motor vehicles jeopardise the peace and health of the citizens of said City creates an emergency and this ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need for the preservation of peace, health and safety of property; and the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three several days is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and after same has been published one time in the official newspaper of the City of Burkburnett, Texas.

PASSED AND APPROVED THIS 23 day of May, A. D. 1960.

Each such box or container shall be securely screened on otherwise protected from flies, vermin and rodents, and shall be cleaned out and disinfected at least once a week. Manure from such boxes or containers shall not be left in open stacks but removed or buried.

SECTION 5. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars at discretion of the court having jurisdiction. Each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 6. Repeal and Date of Effect. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed and from and after thirty (30) days from the date of passage of this ordinance all person or persons, firm or corporation or association desiring to keep fowls or animals within the city limits of Burkburnett, Texas, must conform with the requirements of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. Unconstitutionality Clause. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 8. Emergency. The fact that there are no adequate regulations governing the keeping of animals and fowls in the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, creates an urgency and emergency for the immediate preservation of the public peace; health, safety and general welfare, and requires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately thirty days from its passage and is accordingly so ordained.

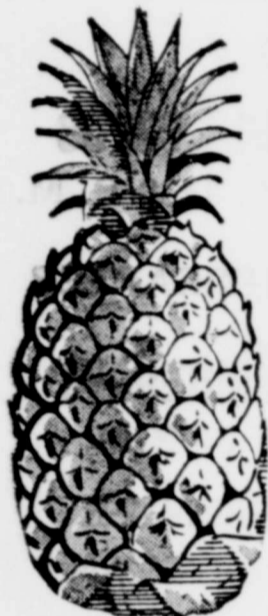

already too much heated argument. I am going to try and give you a history of my stewardship very wealthy. These two statements don't make sense. I have a certificate from the District Clerks office and Wichita Co. Abstract Co. showing there are no outstanding judgments against me. Also one from the city tax office and my chief deputy here in the court house. I do not owe any taxes at all and you know that if I was wealthy and owed any taxes I would pay them. Another thing if I had any judgments against me, my bonding company would cancel my bond and I would automatically be put out of office.

They tell you I have land in Andrews County. My daughters and I have some land down there and I am not realizing enough out of it to pay the taxes much less the interest to Texas. I have a letter in my hand from Ralph McWhorter who says that my land has suffered all during the 1950's. It's practically worthless. It has been dry for

the last several years, nothing but worthless needle grass, ter-pentine weeds, and shinners. I have had to sell all my cattle because there is nothing for them to feed on. I have made two trips out to see this land and I have never been able to find it. It is in the middle of a pasture and a dry hole is off setting it. They could buy it for a whole lot less than what is being spent to defeat me in this election.

They tell you I never stay in my office. I don't know how they would know, if they stay at their office. Do they?

They say I don't know anything about my office. My office force will tell you that when they can not take care of applications for car titles they send them to me. I have never failed to fix one up yet if they had all the necessary papers. I have discussed this matter with the highway department and they have told me how to handle same.

My opponent says he doesn't anticipate any changes in the personnel. He might have different anticipations if he is elected. Again he says he does not expect any drastic changes. It would sure be drastic for the ones he let out and it could be one of your best friends and one of my best deputies. At one time he said he would keep them all but he did not say how long. I have never seen an election like this where a newly elected official didn't have persons working for him who are expecting a job. They certainly can't give them a job without disposing of the efficient deputies I have in my office. The records of my personnel shows they are second to none in Texas in courtesy, efficiency and economy. I have only added four new deputies to my office force in twenty-four years I have been in office, and we are doing extra work. Three of them coming down at 7:00 in the morning, we have been able to absorb the extra work and save the county money. For efficiency, will say Pat Lambert Company audited my books for fifteen years. We handle some four million dollars a year. The worse year I had was 1956 and we were fifteen cents over. That will be hard to beat because it is better than perfect. After operation of my offices are over at the end of the year I have turned over to the county over \$44,000 above the expenses of my office for their use for the last five years. Several months ago the county was short on money and said maybe they should invest the collection of the Tax Assessor. I took them the municipal report from Austin which said 90% is a good collection for the budget. This report shows that I have not had a delinquent tax collector since Carl Cowles passed away and the County Attorney has only helped me two or three months in the last ten years.

My opponent says he will cut out the special numbers you all are getting. He says it is too much a waste of time. Now I understand he says he didn't say that. He doesn't say what he will do though he says he is well acquainted with all the workings of the Tax Collectors office. He doesn't know that we write 90% of these up before the busy time and have them ready to deliver before the rush starts. If we didn't do this you would have to stand in line much longer. I don't know of anyone who has stood in line over thirty minutes. I have never refused to hold anyone's check till pay day so they could register their cars.

I have never refused to come to the office day or night, rain or shine to help anybody in trouble with their car papers.

I have been awarded a lifetime membership in the West Texas County Judges Association and it wasn't awarded on my good looks. They said I worked harder and done more to help the tax payers of all counties in Texas than any other one person. Judge Arthur Tipps will verify this.

I want to thank all of you who voted for me in the first primary enough to defeat me. I would and those who did not work hard certainly appreciate your vote and support on June 4th run-off.

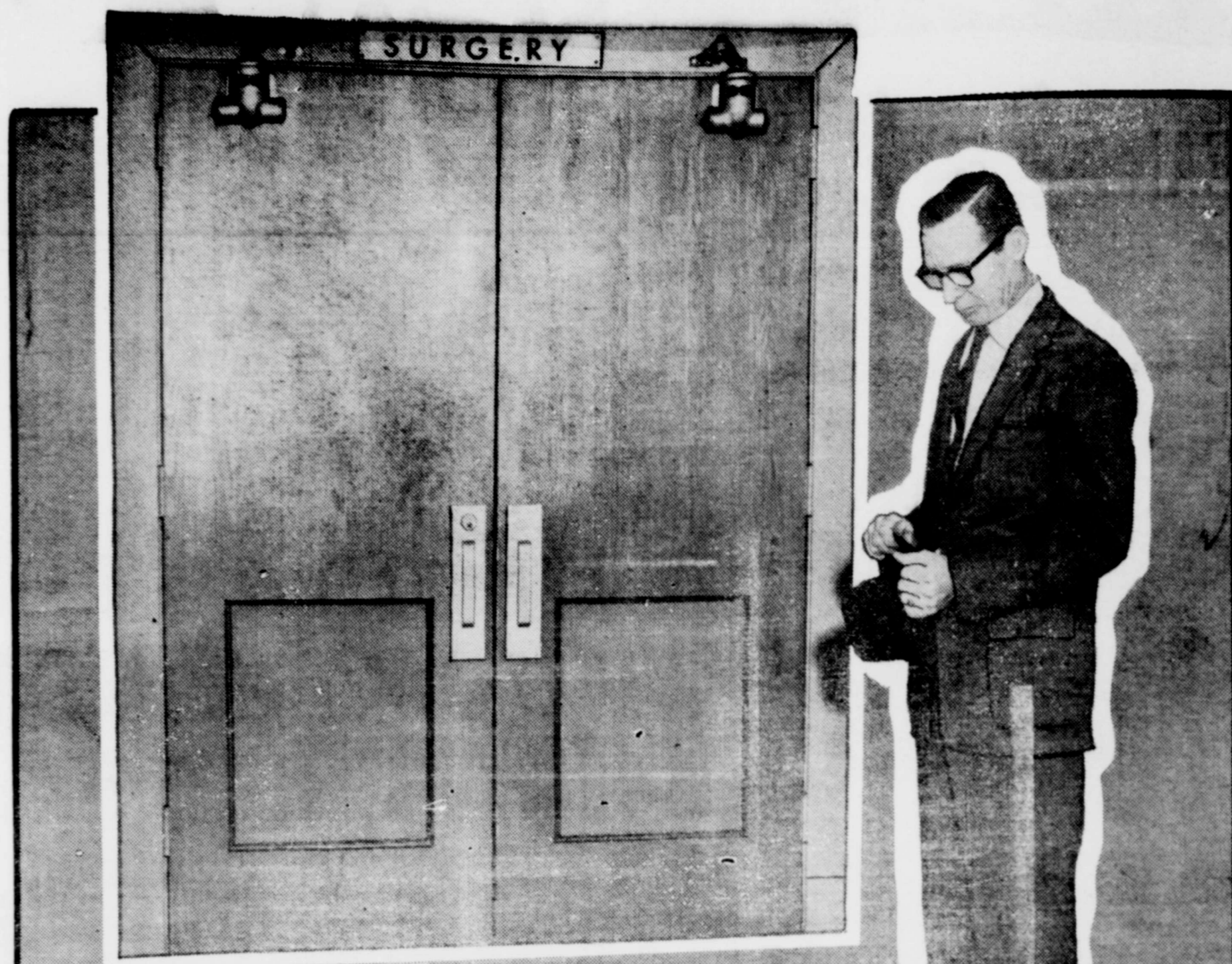

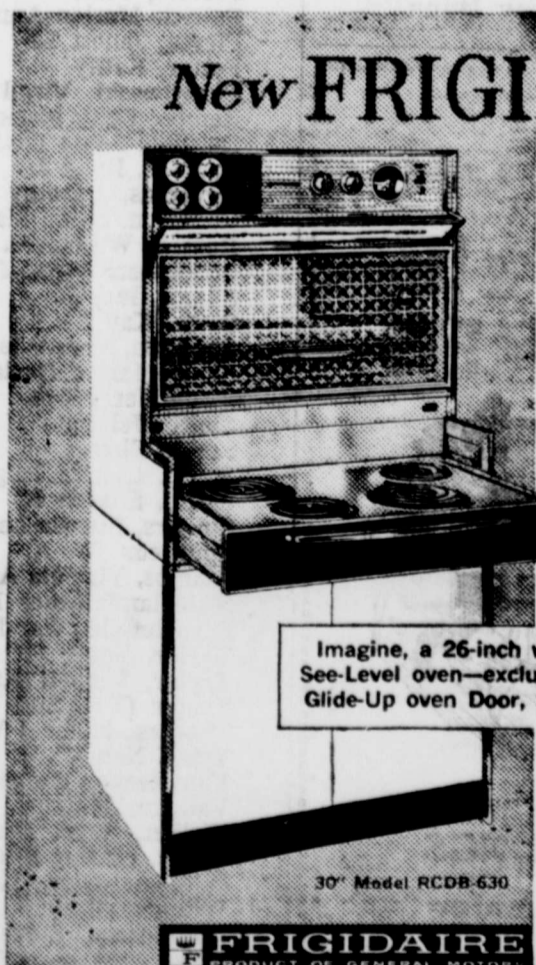

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT to require applicants for registration of vehicles subject to registration by law to present to the County Tax Collector to whom application for registration is made a statement showing the county, school district, city or town, and other taxing districts by which such vehicles were taxable for the preceding year, and to exhibit to such tax collector receipts, certificates or sworn statement showing payment of all ad valorem taxes for such preceding year, for which such vehicle was taxable, requiring a seller of a motor vehicle to furnish the purchaser tax receipts or affidavit showing that such taxes have been paid; making it unlawful for the Highway Department or any tax collector to issue or cause to be issued registration receipt or license plate, or for any applicant to receive same without compliance with the provisions of this Act; and declaring an emergency.

This bill requires auto owners to bring six tax receipts showing taxes paid or sworn statement for city, school, water improvement and junior college and state and county for each car you want to register. We already have too much red tape and for you to have six tax receipts or sworn statements attached to your title and license receipt you can imagine what a mess it would be. Also Jim Robinson has made over 40 trips to Austin and put out over a thousand letters in protecting your interest and keeping this bill from becoming law.

Burk Farmer Sells First Load Wheat

Sixty-seven bushels of what may be the first load of wheat in the United States this year was sold to Mills Grain Company in Burkburnett at 3:45 p. m. Friday by Stanley Williamson from his farm west of Wichita Falls.

Williamson's load of 67 bushels tested 61 pounds to the bushel with a moisture content of 14% and represents the first load of wheat that promises to be better than the big 22 bushel crop of 1958.

Mills Grain Company paid \$1.81 per bushel for the load, while Williamson, who is also chairman of the Wichita County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, will receive a \$25 bonus from the Burk-Chamber of Commerce and an additional \$25 bonus from the grain company.

Owning one combine, Williamson cut the wheat himself Thursday afternoon on a 75 acre field, which is part of his 214 acre allotment for this year, several miles west of Wichita Falls.

The 67 bushels sold Friday came from about three and one half acres of the field, which is producing about 20 bushels to the acre and "could have been cut a couple days ago, but the rain held me up," Williamson said.

Bob Crocker, office manager of the Wichita County ASC office, said Friday that the wheat crop over Wichita County generally looks better than the 1958 crop and will produce an average yield of about 10 to 20 bushels.

So far Williamson's crop is producing about 20 bushels to the acre.

"We have a county allotment this year of 57,194 acres," Crocker noted, "and about 53,000 acres of that is planted. I estimate it will average about \$30 to the acre."

Crocker noted that the 14 per cent moisture content was good for this time of year in this area, which normally gets the wheat harvest started about May 25th and in full operation by June 1, setting the pace for the annual harvest trip across the United States and Canada.

Across the state, Texas farmers are expected to harvest 3,830,000 acres of wheat in 1960, based on a May 1 survey by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

With an estimate of 20 bushels giving a production of 76.6 million bushels, only the huge wheat crops of 1944, 1947 and 1949 exceed this estimate.

The 1958 yield per acre of 22 bushels was the record high yield, but because of less acreage, production that year was only 73 million bushels.

Estimated yield this year of 20 bushels per acre, which is what Williamson's first harvest is producing is second only to the record year of 1958.

Several area elevators have tested 1960 wheat and some have already received other grains, but Williamson has apparently beat other farmers across the nation in selling the first load.
