A good workshop project any time of the year, but especially good in the colder months when you can get equipment ready for the next outdoor season, is the contruction of a picnic table and benches-and if you're really ambitious, a couple of lawn

Such equipment should be built so it is easy to store during cold weather-or so it can be easily carried into basement or recreation room for use in such plans (available without charge) for easy construction of a picnie on to Avenue D. table with X-frame support which can be quickly unbolted from the table top.



Picnic tables and lawn chairs good winter projects.

The picnic table and benches can be made from a combination of pine or fir lumber and tempered hardboard, with the latter being utilized for table top and bench seats. Legs, ties and supports, and top underpieces of lumber can be cut with the power saw and countersunk screw holes quickly drilled with the portable electric drill. The one-piece hardboard table top, 3 by 6 feet in size, and bench seats, two of them 1 by 4 feet and two 1 by 6 feet, need simply to be mounted on the frames.

If you want lawn chairs of comparable construction, hardboard can be used for the chair seats and backs with %-inch pine, cedar, or cypress for the legs, arms, and framework. Your portable electric jig saw will come in handy to round the chair arms, backs, and legs. Finish yard furniture in exterior grade enamel or stain for longer

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

Haws advises growers to start planning preventive measures immediately for the 1961 cotton crop. Deep plowing, 10 to 14 in. deep, with a mold board or disc type plow is recommended. In few areas, because of the type of sub-soil, this will not be possible. However, deep plowing to as great a depth as possible will be helpful in reducing root rot. the following year he says.






