

### Congerss Must Not Acquiesce In Surrender Of Canal Zone

There are a few spots on the globe that possess extraordinary strategic significance. Such are the straits of the Dardanelles and the Bosporus, between Europe and Asia Minor. Another such is

the Suez Canal. A third is the Panamal Canal. This nation has held complete control over the Panama Canal ever since that waterway linking the Atlantic and Pacific oceans was dug and before. Ever since 1903 when a treaty between this country and the Republic of Panama specified that the Panama Canal Zone, the 10-mile wide strip which the canal traverses, is under the exclusive sovereignty of the United States

in perpetuity President Eisenhower now has authorized the flying of the Panamanian flag in the Canal Zone as "visual evidence" of Panama's "titular sovereignty" over the zone.

By a stroke of the pen the President thereby created Panama's ""titular sovereignty" and surrendered ours.

Once again an American administration has surrendered on Storage for out of season something that is ours-and this time something vital to American clothing.

It took this action in defiance of and in contempt of the expressed will of the House of Representatives. Anticipating this give-away of American rights, the House Feb. 2nd passed a resolution expressing the sense of Congress that the "traditional interpretation" of treaties with Panama should not be changed except by treaty procedure. The vote was overwhelming 381 to 12.

This needless surrender of our exclusive sovereignty over one of the most strategic spots on the globe would be bad enough if it had come about in a time of peace with no predatory power on the prowl throughout the world. Even under such circumstances it would be a serious mistake, for all history is studded with the rise of aggressive nations and no one can foretell what will occur a few years or a century hence.

What happens now if communism obtains control of Panama, either through internal subversion or through invasion from Cuba? Does anyone doubt that a communist government of Panama would attempt to exercise actual sovereignty over the Canal Zone. That it would overwhelm the few companies of soldiers we maintain there and that we then would have to invade to get our rights back, and be accused of "aggression"?

Rep. Daniel J. Flood, (D., Pa.) calls the President's action a major victory for international communism and states, correctly that impeachment of American Presidents has been urged for less than this. Flood several weeks ago warned Secretary of State Herter that if the Panamanian flag were flown over the zone with the acquiescence of the State Department he would press for Herter's impeachment.

## Passing The Torch

The ancient Greeks had a ceremonial foot race called "Passing the Torch." Their swiftest runners carried a lighted torch and passed it, burning, into the hands of the next relay of runpers, sometimes from city to city, until it reached its goal.

In our nation, we have an annual event carrying a similar idea-a path of light toward a goal. However, in this event, no physical exertion is involved—only faith. The occasion is National

The first observance of Bible Week began on December 7th, 1941, a date that shall endure in our history. Today, we are again confronted with an international crisis. Full participation by our people in National Bible Week will help us to keep the faith handed down by our Founding Fathers.

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

Sheppard AFB also conducts training for instructors. Nonresident courses in all of the resident course areas are also prepared at Sheppard. This includes on the job training packages, extension courses and such. The training aids shop at Sheppard makes some trainers for courses and maintains others. These training aids vary from the simplest chart to air-

During fiscal year 1960 Shep-pard graduated 17,554 students and has a projected 18,000 stu-dents for 1960.

In order to make maxium use of all training facilities here some classes must be conducted on three shifts of six hour sessions each.

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

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

weather data, assemble the information, and make this available to each pilot prior to his departure on flight. Presently, flight clearance is based on a four-hour normal flight from the base, or 4245th with its long-range jets, the forcasts will extend to 24-hour periods from the time of flight.

The specialized weather forecasts demanded by airflight stress ceiling, visibility, turbulance (degree of bumpiness), possibility of ice formation on the aircraft, winds aloft, tops of clouds and gustiness of the surface.

Pilots in this space age go aloft with minute data for flight at 5,000, 10,000, 20,000, and 30,000 ft. levels. The charts resemble tangled spider webs to the layman; the pilot, however, reads the temperature in isotherms, the pressure distribution in isobars and interprets the coded symbols which indicate wind direction.

The Weather Detachment depends in part on a vast network of 700 reporting bases which make reports every four hours round the clock and upon their own laboratory which receives this coded data for the local group. They also work closely with the United States Weather Bureau located at Kell Field.

Two teletype machines chatter with coded weather information from both civilian and military bases. Another important source of information is the chart with long-range forecasts which comes weekly from Wash-

ington, D. C.
