D. 1911, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 5th day of October, A. D. 1911, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 1050, wherein I. N. Adams is plaintiff and the unknown heirs of Joseph Dowling, deceased are defendants. The nature of the plaintiff's demand being as follows to-wit:

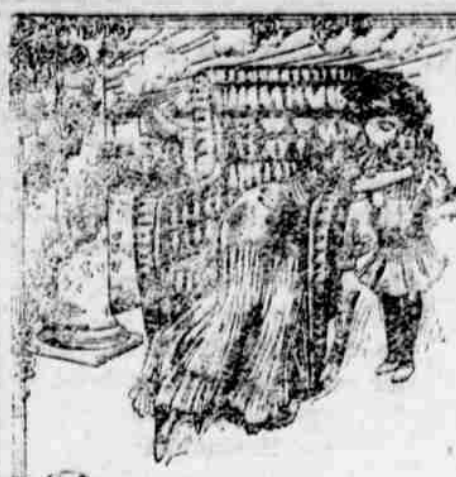

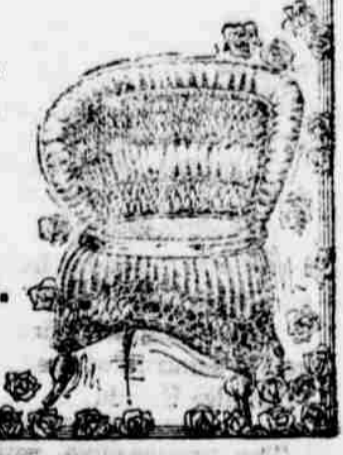

The editors and owners of the two Haskell papers have displayed some mighty good sense by consolidating and hereafter Haskell is assured of one good paper. —Hamlin Herald.

The progressive republicans held a convention at Chicago this week, and adopted a platform and named La Follette of Wisconsin as a candidate for republic nomination against president Taft.

If the owners of the mineral wells in this city will back Mr. Miller up in his efforts, and allow him some money for advertising purposes, he will bring these wells to the front. The analysis shows the waters are as good as any in the state.

Consolidation and elimination seems to be the order of the day in Texas since publishers and others have begun to realize the folly of trying to maintain two or more newspapers in a town that is barely able to support one. Within the past year or so a great many weekly papers have been started, not "establish-

The latest consolidation is that of the Haskell Free Press and the Herald, the name of the former being retained, without any silly hiphenating, and the promise is that Haskell will now have a much better paper than it has ever had before, with considerably less tax upon the advertisers and considerably more profit to the publishers. —San Antonio Express.

The Haskell Free Press and the Haskell Herald have consolidated and will be published by both owners under the name of the former paper. Oscar Martin and James A. Greer are veteran newspaper men and will make a team. They have a good field for one paper and with ordinary business prosperity they can get out a paper that will be a credit to themselves and Haskell county. Congratulations. —Seymour Banner.

The Supreme Court has ordered Comptroller Lane to issue the salary warrants for the officers in the Attorney Generals department. This puts the controversy up to Treasurer Sam Sparks. The court held that a decision of Gov. Colquitt's veto was not necessary to the disposition of the case.



TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES

During 1910 321,000 bales of cotton went through Texas City to foreign ports. The increase of traffic has been from \$998,428 in 1904 to \$47,213,753 in 1910.

A proclamation has been issued by the governor calling a Good Roads congress to be held at Dallas October 26. A permanent organization will be formed.

The San Antonio, Rockport & Mexican Railway company has been chartered to build a railroad between San Antonio and the Mexican border, with a branch extending from some point on the line to Harbor Island on the gulf coast. The road will have a total length of 350 miles and will extend through the counties of Bexar, Atascosa, McMullen, Live Oak, Bee, San Patricio, Refugio, Aransas, Duval, Brooks, Starr and Hidalgo.

It is reported from Fort Davis, Texas, that the Southern Pacific is planning to build a branch line from Marfa through that city to Pecos.

The board of trustees of the Texas-Mexican Industrial institute has decided to begin the clearing of land and the erection of the first building—a home for the president—in the near future. One of the purposes of this school is to train Mexican young men for the position of foremen, etc.

Contract liens for bonuses that are pledged for the extension of the San Bonito Interurban to Santa Mria have been filed in the office of the county of Brown county. Under the terms the preliminary work on the extension is to begin within forty-five days and to be in operation in fifteen months.

Asphalt from the Uvalde mines has been declared by experts to be superior paving material. Streets paved with this material ten years ago are said to be in first-class condition.

The citizens of Lexington, Texas, are planning to hold an election for voting a bond issue of \$100,000 for good roads in that section.

The Exporters Realty Company of Dallas has filed an amendment to its charter increasing its capital stock to \$125,000.

The El Paso Chamber of Commerce has held its first trade excursion trip and anticipates good results from the trip.

Swartschild & Sulzberger of New York City will establish a cold storage plant at El Paso to cost \$40,000.

Hardin county has voted a bond issue of \$160,000 for building good roads in that county.

Grayson county is considering a \$300,000 bond issue for road construction. The election will be probably be held Oct. 30.

Considerable track improvements will be made by the Gould lines in Texas, including the laying of new and heavier steel.

The commercial club of El Campo is endeavoring to establish a peanut factory at that place and now have from 800 to 1000 acres of peanuts promised by local farm-

ers, in case the mill is erected.

The Rice Institute at Houston will make improvements of that institution costing \$190,000.

The Young Men's Business league of Palestine will erect a bungalow club house.

The College of Industrial Arts at Denton is planning improvements for that school that will cost approximately \$75,000.

A hotel to cost \$450,000 is to be built in El Paso.

The St. Louis, Brownsville & Mexico Railway will begin the erection of an office building at Kingsville at a cost of \$50,000.

The contract has been let for the construction of a pleasure pier at Port Arthur. The work calls for a retaining wall for island in lake 600 feet square and causeway 3000 feet long. Work will begin at once.

On Oct. 21st Chambers county will vote on organization of Trinity River Irrigation district to comprise about 73,000.

The capitol grounds at Austin are to be paved with bitulithic, the cost to be \$25,000.

"Ten Commandments"

For the Tiller of the Soil.

The late Dr. Knapp, originator and founder of farm demonstration work, did more than any other man of the century to bring home, by his practical methods of demonstration to impress our farm population with the fact that better farming is the great American need. He left us ten scientific "commandments," which, if obeyed, will usher in prosperity. Note them down and follow them:

1. Prepare a deep and thoroughly pulverized seed bed, well drained; break in the fall to the depth of eight, ten or twelve inches, according to the soil, with implement that will not bring too much of the subsoil to the surface (the foregoing depth should be reached gradually).
2. Use seed of the best variety intelligently selected and carefully stored.
3. In cultivated crops give the rows and the plants in the rows a space suited to the plant, the soil and climate.
4. Use intensive tillage during the growing of the crop.
5. Secure a high content of humus in the soil by the use of legums, barnyard manure, farm refuse and commercial fertilizers.
6. Carry out a systematic crop rotation with the winter cover crop on southern farms.
7. Accomplish more work in a day by using more horse power and better implements.
8. Increase the farm stock to the extent of utilizing all the waste products and idle land of the farm.
9. Produce all the food required for the men and animals on the farm.
10. Keep an account of each farm product, in order to know from which the gain or loss arises.

SPECIMENS COMING IN

We learn from those in charge of the work of getting up a collection of the products of our county to be exhibited at the Cotton Palace at Waco that several good specimens have been secured, but not nearly so many as it was thought the farmers would have brought in by this time. However, quite a number have promised to bring in specimens and it is believed that a good collection will be gotten together by the time it will be necessary to ship it, which will be about the 27 or 28 of this month. The business men who have subscribed liberally to the fund for paying the expenses of making this exhibit believed that the farmers throughout the county, who are equally interested with them in awakening interest abroad in our county and bringing in new people and new enterprise to aid in its greater development, would respond promptly and freely with specimens of their products and thus do their part in the good work. And we will remark here that the Free Press thinks they will do so. As Secretary Poole remarked to the writer, one principal reason why no more have yet come forward with specimens is that they have not thought about the very short time they have in which to get the exhibit together and prepare it for shipment and have not realized the importance of promptness in the matter, and another probable reason is that many think that because the things they have are not the very best or finest of their kind they are not worthy to be placed in an exhibit. Thus, he says, they overlook the fact that this has been a drouthy year all over the state and it is not expected that specimens will be of the very highest quality, but that they will be proportionately as good as those of any other section and better than can be shown by many.

We suspect that our Secretary has about hit the nail on the head in his conclusions and that when the people think a moment they will see the situation as he states it and specimens will begin to pour in, in a hurry. The Free Press hopes so at least, because we have a just pride in wanting to see our county represented at the Cotton Palace by the best exhibit it is possible to get together. Remember that the exhibit must start to Waco by the 28th and bring the best you can—anything from a blackeyed pea up. Judge Poole or Mr. S. W. Scott or Mr. T. C. Cahill will receive specimens.

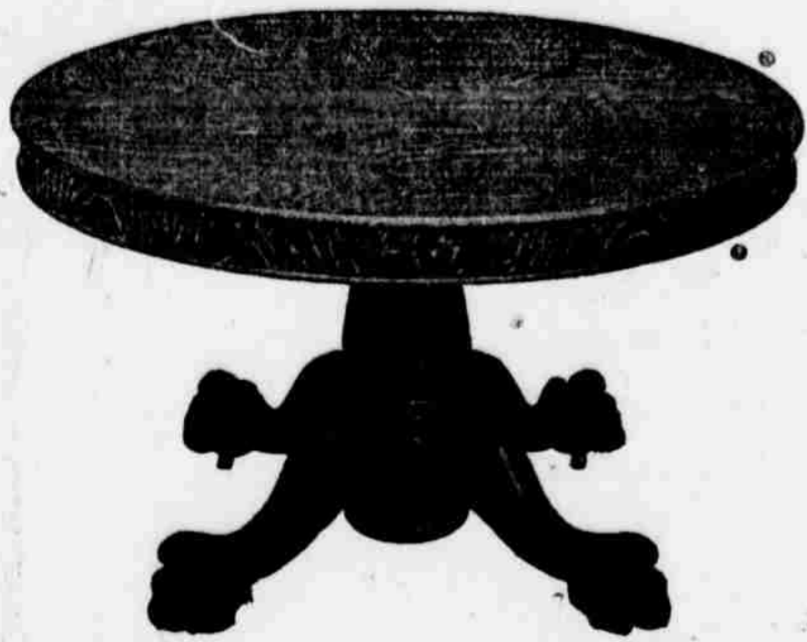
