Four Towns in Callahan County Received 142,743.76 In Refunds

Towns in Callahan County have received \$142,743.76 in refund checks from Comptrollers office in Austin for the first half of 1982, of these funds Cross Plains had the biggest refund for the six month with 60,671.68. Clyde was next with \$51,253.55, Baird received *21,022.52 and Putnam received *9,-796.01.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent the biggest check ever for a single month's tax collections-*49.2 million-to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for September.

The statewide total is up 20 percent over last September's payment of '41 million. The payment reflects taxable sales made in July and reported to the state by the end of August.

"Sales in several major South Texas cities declines in July, even before the lastest Peso devaluation. But as a whole, out state economy keeps growing strong," Bullock said.

Bullock predicted further South Texas declines when merchants report their taxable sales for August, the month of the latest devaluation, and pointed out the border economy has bounced back within three months after past deval-

Houston received the biggest share of the one-cent local sales tax with a check for '11.6 million. So far in 1982 Houston's payments are up 15.3 percent over 1981.

Dallas got *5.3 million, up 30 percent from last September's check.

The City of San Antonio received a check for \$2.5 million, up 17 percent from last September's payment of \$2.2 million.

Fort Worth received a check for *1.6 million, up 34 percent over last Sept-

El Paso received a *1.1 million check for a total of *12.6 million so far in 1982

Bullock also forwarded September rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$12.4 million, bringing the total received this year to *127.5 million, up 12 percent over last year. The San Antonio MTA got a check for *1.4 million, bringing the 1982 total to \$15.7 million.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Baird at Albany: Baird spoils Albany's Callahan County Man Receives Life-Term In Prison

Bobby Williams of Dudley diagnosed as having terminal cancer plead guilty to the murder of a 9-year old girl in exchange for the state dropping a charge alleging he also murdered the girl's

42nd District Judge Don Lane gave Willimas a life sentence for the nurder of Nicky Young, who was shot to death with a .22-cailiber rifle at her Dudley home August 17.

In exchange for Williams guilty plea to the murder of the girl, the state agreed not to prosecute Williams on a murder charge stemming from the shooting death of 32-year-old Linda King. Ms. King was killed during the shooting incident in which her daughter was shot to death.

The state also waived an indictment for attempted murder accusing Williams of shooting Ms. King's 17-year-old nephew, Michael Haynie, also of Dudley.

Shanks said Williams agreed to the plea bargain because "Whatever the sentence, it's going to be a life sentence for him." Williams claimed to have only three weeks to live when deputies arrested him driving past his home within hours after the shooting.

Callahan County Bill Skinner said Williams' medical records failed to substantiate the claim of having only weeks to live. However, Skinner said, the man has been diagnosed as having terminal cancer.

Signup will end March 31, 1983, for the program which has provisions in the Omibus Reconciliation Act. The legislation allows a combination 15 percent acreage reduction and five percent paid land diversion. A new provision replaced the 20 percent acreage reduction program announced on July 14.

Odom said that at the time producers sign up for the program, they may receive an advance of 50 percent of the diversion payment and of any projected deficiency payment. The advance deficiency

time, according to Scott payment rate will be 32.5 Odom, County Executive cents per bushel.

The new wheat program encourages converting highly erosive cropland to permanent conservation acreage. He said, "Costshare payments for carrying out conservation measures are available through the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This provision will permit farmers more management flexibility and assist their future program participation."

The land diversion payment is based on *2.70 per bushel times the farm yield times the acres diverted. Acres planted for harvest must be no more

than 80 percent of a farm's wheat base, and the bases will be the same as established for the 1982 program. Farmers must also devote to conservation uses an acreage equal to both the acreage reduction and land diversion requirements.

The target price for wheat will be *4.30 per bushel. The loan rate will be *3.65 per bushel under regular loan. Reserve provisions will be announced later.

Strake Talk

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While

he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgracefur. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

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
