Sales tax holiday to be held Aug. 8-10

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Fri., Sat. and Sun., Aug. 8-10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the back-to-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax free can be found on the Comptroller's website at www.TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$82.7 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday. The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

Wheat conference to be held Aug. 14 in Abilene

Farm bill decision making will headline this year's Big Country Wheat Conference, organizers said. The conference, conducted biennially by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, will be held Aug. 14 in the Big Country Hall located on the Taylor County Exposition Center grounds, 1982 Lytle Way in Abilene. On-site registration will start at 8:30 a.m. The conference will start at 9 a.m. and end at 4:15 p.m.

"The current farm bill has undergone a considerable overhaul from previous legislation, which has caused no small amount of confusion among many producers," said Robert Pritz, AgriLife Extension agent in Taylor County. "We have heard a lot

of speculation concerning how the newest version is to be interpreted, so our goal for this year's Big Country Wheat Conference will be to help wheat growers determine fact from fiction while offering them the best possible decision-making tools to better equip them for making the tough choices they will face in the coming months."

Farm bill interpretations will headline the biennial event. Along with the emphasis on the farm bill, Pritz said this year's conference will include the following topics and presenters:

- World Wheat Outlook, Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension grain marketing economist, College Station.

- Future of Texas Wheat Production, Steele Fischbacher, director of policy

and marketing, Texas Wheat Producers Board, Amarillo.

- 2014 Farm Bill Update and Decision Making, Dr. Joe Outlaw, AgriLife Extension economist, College Station.

- Data Requirements for Sign Up/Decision Aid and the Supplemental Agricultural Disaster Program, Bill Thompson, AgriLife Extension economist, San Angelo.

- Wheat Variety Performance, Dr. Clark Neely, AgriLife Extension small grains specialist, College Station.

- Weed Control Recommendation in Wheat, Dr. David Drake, AgriLife Extension agronomist, San Angelo.

- Soil Fertility Management for Wheat Production, Dr. Mark McFarland, AgriLife Extension soil fertility specialist, College Station.

- Short-Term and Long-Term Weather Forecasts, National Weather Service, San Angelo.

Farmers Market week proclaimed

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has declared Aug. 3-9, "National Farmers Market Week." Throughout the week, USDA will celebrate our nation's thousands of farmers markets, farmers who make them possible and the communities that host them.

The declaration was made via an official proclamation signed by Secretary Vilsack. This year marks the 15th Annual National Farmers Market Week recognizing the important role that farmers markets play in the agricultural and food economy. The U.S. Department of Agriculture began declaring National Farmers Market Week in 2000.

"National Farmers Market Week is a great opportunity for farmers markets across the country to host special events to showcase all the tremendous services they provide," said Secretary Vilsack. "Farmers markets play a key role in developing local and regional food systems that support family farms, and help grow rural economies. They bring communities together, connecting cities with the farms that support them and provide Americans across the country with fresh, healthy food."

In honor of National Farmers Market Week, USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) Administrator Anne Alonzo will be at the Dane

County Farmers Market located on the grounds of the State Capitol building in Madison, Wisconsin Sat., Aug. 2. The Madison farmers market is the largest producer-only farmers market in the U.S. On Aug. 8, the USDA Farmers Market, located at USDA headquarters in Washington, DC, will host a Healthy Back-To-School Challenge to show kids and their families how to cook simple, healthy, and delicious snacks with seasonal ingredients. Other USDA officials will be at other farmers market locations across the country throughout the week.

Thousands of farmers markets across the country offer consumers fresh, affordable, convenient, and healthful products sold directly from the farm. They also offer additional market opportunities for local producers, especially smaller or newer operations. Farmers markets increasingly offer electronic benefits transfer technology that can be used by recipients of USDA's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program—as well as low-income women, infants, and children and seniors participating in the WIC and Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Programs—to get fresh, seasonal ingredients.

Farmers market development is a cornerstone of the USDA's Know Your Farmer, Know Your Food Initiative,

which coordinates the Department's policy, resources, and outreach efforts related to local and regional food systems. Secretary Vilsack has identified strengthening local food systems as one of the four pillars of USDA's commitment to rural

economic development, along with production agriculture (including expanding export markets and improving research), promoting conservation and outdoor recreation opportunities, and growing the biobased economy.

Cut the line on scammers posing as IRS employees

If there's an issue with your federal taxes, you'll initially receive a letter or notice in the mail from the IRS. Don't fall for scam artists on the internet or over the telephone. Real IRS employees have badge numbers. Ask the caller for his or her badge number, and then call 1-800-829-1040 to confirm it. Sometimes the caller may brazenly volunteer a fake badge number before you even ask for one.

In many cases, the caller becomes aggressive and insulting. Victims may be told they owe money to the IRS. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they may be threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license.

"These crooks make detailed efforts to try and scam you out of divulging personal information—including checking account numbers and other types of bank account information," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas. "Don't fall victim to these misleading attempts to steal your identity and hard-earned cash."

Other characteristics of this scam include:

- Scammers may be able to recite the last four digits of a victim's Social Security number.

- Scammers spoof the IRS toll-free number on caller ID to make it appear that it's the IRS calling.

- Scammers sometimes send bogus IRS emails to some victims to support their bogus calls.

- Victims hear background noise of other calls being conducted to mimic a call site.

- After threatening victims with jail time or driver's license revocation, scammers hang up and others soon call back pretending to be from the local police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS, here's what you should do:

- If you know you owe taxes or you think you might owe taxes, call the IRS at 1-800-829-1040. The IRS employees on that line can help you with a payment issue—if there really is such an issue.

- If you know you don't owe taxes or have no reason to think that you owe any taxes (for example, you've never received a bill or the caller made some bogus threats as described above), then call and report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-366-4484.

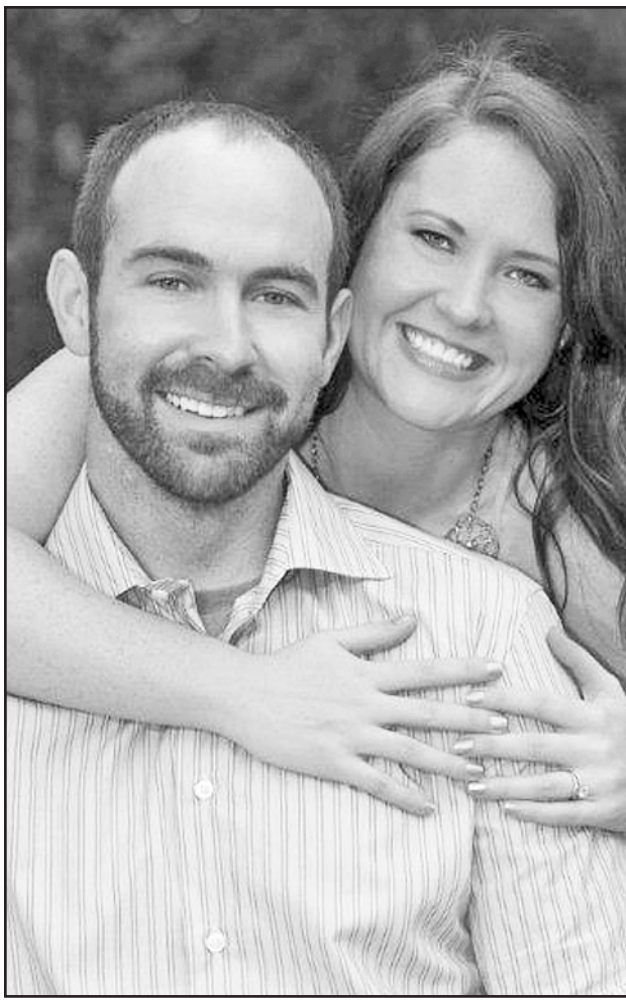
- If you've been targeted by this scam, you should also contact the Federal Trade Commission and use their "FTC Complaint Assistant" at FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your complaint.

Taxpayers should be aware that there are other unrelated scams (such as a lottery sweepstakes) and solicitations (such as debt relief) that fraudulently claim to be from the IRS.

"It doesn't have to be tax season to fall prey to one of these scams—unfortunately, they happen during other times of year as well," Sanford added. "To be safe—always be alert to phone and email scams that use the IRS as a lure."

The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels. The IRS also does not ask for PINs, passwords or similar confidential access information for credit card, bank or other financial accounts. Recipients should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in the message. Instead, forward the e-mail to phishing@irs.gov.

Heart Disease:
Does it affect women as well as men?
Are there differences in how it affects women versus men?

Many people think of heart disease as a man's disease, it is the number one cause of death for women as well. According to the American Heart Association (AHA), heart disease kills more women than the next five causes of death put together.

Just as with men, women can experience crushing chest pain or severe shortness of breath when a heart attack occurs. However, according to the AHA, common symptoms for women also include:

- Sudden tiredness or lack of energy (this is the most common symptom and it's easy to ignore)
- Difficulty in breathing (this may be your only symptom)
- Nausea, vomiting or indigestion, especially in combination with other symptoms
- Pressure and squeezing sensations in the chest, and heartburn-like feelings
- Pain in the back, neck or jaw
- Unexplained or excessive sweating
- Dizziness or lightheadedness

If you experience these symptoms, and they last for more than five minutes, you may be having a heart attack. Call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room.

In the meantime, here are some things you can do to help protect your heart and prevent heart disease:

- See your doctor regularly for heart checkups
- Eat a healthy diet
- Don't smoke
- Get active
- Control stress

Illness prompts investigation

A recent surge in reports of illnesses due to the parasite Cyclospora has prompted the Texas Department of State Health Services to begin an investigation into the infections in hopes of determining a common source. DSHS has received reports of 77 Cyclosporiasis cases from around Texas this year, including 69 in the last month. The department is collaborating with local health departments to gather information and identify the cause.

Last year, Texas had 351 cases, more than any other state. In most previous years, the number of cases reported was in the single or low double digits.

Cyclosporiasis is an intestinal illness caused by consuming food or water contaminated with the Cyclospora parasite. The major symptom is watery diarrhea lasting a few days to a few months. Additional symptoms may include loss of appetite, fatigue, weight loss, abdominal cramps, bloating, increased gas, nausea, vomiting and a low fever. Symptoms may come and go multiple times over a period of weeks.

People who think they may have a Cyclospora infection should contact their health care provider. DSHS encourages health care providers to test patients for Cyclospora if they have diarrheal illness lasting more than a few days or diarrhea accompanied by a severe loss of appetite or fatigue. Cases should be reported promptly.

DSHS recommends thoroughly washing fresh produce, but that may not entirely eliminate the risk because Cyclospora can be difficult to wash off. Cooking will kill the parasite.

Although no common exposure source has been identified yet, past outbreaks in the United States have been associated with imported fresh produce, including pre-packaged salad mix, raspberries, basil, snow peas and mesclun greens. A 2013 outbreak in Texas was linked, at least in part, to fresh cilantro from Puebla, Mexico.

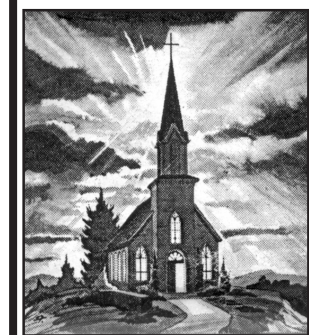

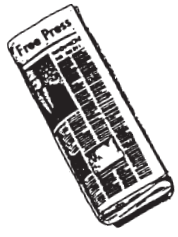

Farmers reminded of 2014 Farm Bill Conservation compliance changes by USDA

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack reminds producers that changes mandated through the 2014 Farm Bill require them to have on file a Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification (AD-1026). The Farm Bill relinked highly erodible land conservation and wetland conservation compliance with eligibility for premium support paid under the federal crop insurance program.

"It's important that farmers and ranchers taking the right steps to conserve valuable farm and natural resources have completed AD-1026 forms on file at their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office," said Vilsack. "This will ensure they remain eligible for crop insurance support."

For farmers to be eligible for premium support on their federal crop insurance, a completed and signed AD-1026 form must be on file with the FSA. Since many FSA and Natural Resource Conservation (NRCS) programs have this requirement, most producers should already have an AD-1026 on file. If producers have not filed, they must do so by June 1, 2015.

When a farmer completes the AD-1026, FSA and NRCS staff will outline any additional actions that may be required for compliance with the provisions. The Risk Management Agency, through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), manages the federal crop insurance program that provides the modern farm safety net for American farmers and ranchers.

Since enactment of the 1985 Farm Bill, eligibility for most commodity, disaster and conservation programs has been linked to compliance with the highly erodible land conservation and wetland conservation

provisions. The 2014 Farm Bill continues the requirement that producers adhere to conservation compliance guidelines to be eligible for most programs administered by FSA and NRCS. This includes the new price and revenue protection programs, the Conservation Reserve Program, the Livestock Disaster Assistance programs and Marketing Assistance Loans implemented by FSA. It also includes the Environmental Quality Incentives Program, the Conservation Stewardship Program and other conservation programs.

FSA recently released a revised form AD-1026, which is available at USDA Service Centers and online at: www.fsa.usda.gov. USDA will publish a rule later this year that will provide details outlining the connection of conservation compliance with crop insurance premium support. Producers can also contact their local USDA Service Center for information. A listing of service center

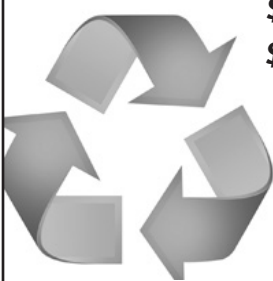
