Hannsz wins in Shooting Sports competitions

Felicity Hannsz, the fourteen year old daughter of Keith and Derinda Hannsz of Haskell, has had a very busy summer, as she added to her list of accomplishments in Shooting Sports competition.

Hannsz, one of eighteen Haskell County 4-H Shooting Club participants, earlier won the title of Junior Female Champion for the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Ranching and Wildlife Young Guns Sporting Clays Shoot.

Since shooting in her first competition in May 2013, her interest and skill have multiplied many times over. With just over a year's experience in shooting sports, she has competed against shooters that have been in the sport for as long as eight years. In addition to trap shooting, she also competes in 5-stand whiz bang, sporting clays, and international wobble trap and skeet.

In April, Hannsz competed in the McCulloch County Whiz-Bang Shoot. She came out on top in the intermediate open division after hitting 48 of 50 to win the medal. She also placed third in the intermediate open division, as well as the High Overall (HOA) intermediate ladies.

Two different weeks in June, she traveled to the Callahan County Whiz-Bang Shoot, where, after hitting 25 straight, she placed third in trap shooting and second in ladies HOA. Then on to the Bandera County Whiz-Bang Shoot adding two second place awards in trap and sporting clays, as well as third place wins in skeet and 5-stand.

July 10-12, Hannsz competed in the West Texas Shoot-out in San Angelo. She received plaques for first place in the open division trap and third place ladies HOA.

The highlight of the summer was the State 4-H Shoot held in San Antonio the middle of July. She placed in the top ten in eight different events. Competing in the intermediate ladies age group, she placed first in trap, sixth in open division trap, third in whiz-bang,

second in shotgun shoot-out, third in top gun, fourth in international modified trap, fifth in sporting clays and seventh in international skeet.

Hannsz was in a shoot-off for first place HOA in the American Games, where she missed the top spot by

one clay. She did however hit twenty-five straight shots in the skeet shoot. She was also the only girl to qualify for the open division trap event.

For her efforts, she received an engraved belt buckle, a medal and plaques.

Hannsz will be a freshman at Paint Creek ISD this fall.

She is an honor student, cheerleader, active in UIL, One Act Play, FCCLA in fashion design and FFA team judging.

Concerning her successes this year, Hannsz remarked, "I am really happy with the results of this year of shooting and I expect next year to be even better."

Sales tax holiday is Aug. 8-10

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers the annual sales tax holiday is scheduled for this Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 8-10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$82.7 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday.

Texas deals with border as Congress departs
AUSTIN—Congress left Washington, D.C., Aug. 1 for a month-long recess, without having passed an immigration bill addressing the porous U.S.-Mexico border and humanitarian crisis.

Figures compiled by the federal Department of Homeland Security's U.S. Customs and Border Protection division show 57,500 "unaccompanied alien children" have been apprehended and processed since October 2013, the majority in the Rio Grande Valley. While President Obama's request to Congress for \$3.7 billion in emergency funding remains pending, the governor's office said the state of Texas will tap available funds to pay the cost of deploying 1,000 national guard troops along the border to assist in law enforcement operations. The cost to do that is estimated at \$12 million a month.

Volunteer organizations are delivering support to help care for mothers with small children and unaccompanied minors from Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador who have crossed the border to escape gang violence and poverty. Aid comes in the form of food, clothing, medical supplies, school supplies and legal assistance.

On July 25, U.S. Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-McAllen, sent letters to House Appropriations Chairman Hal Rogers, R-Kentucky, and Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Craig Fugate requesting financial assistance and reimbursement for communities affected by the current border humanitarian crisis. Included in Cuellar's correspondence to both officials were letters from the City of McAllen, City of Laredo and Webb County Sheriff's Office detailing costs incurred by each entity.

"Since the border humanitarian crisis began, local governments, non-profit organizations, law enforcement and community partners have been shouldering a large and unexpected cost," Cuellar said, adding, "These communities have expended hard-earned taxpayer dollars in support of law enforcement and community efforts to address the surge of unaccompanied minors crossing the border. These communities along the border, which I represent, have taken it upon themselves to provide support where they can. They understand these children are coming to the U.S. border and need care. Our local governments and non-profits understand our federal law enforcement are stretched thin during this surge and they have stepped up to provide resources and assist where they can."

Joint lottery panel is named
Texas House Speaker Joe Straus on July 24 made appointments to the Legislative Committee to Review the Texas Lottery and Texas Lottery Commission, a joint House-Senate panel created by the Legislature in 2013 to study charitable bingo and the distribution of the revenue that such bingo generates. The panel also will study the potential impact of eliminating the state lottery.

Straus named Rep. John Kuempel, R-Seguin, as co-chair, and committee members, Reps. Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake; Garnet Coleman, D-Houston; Rick Miller, R-Sugar Land; and Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Texas Senate, on Aug. 1 named Sen. Charles Schwertner, R-Georgetown, as co-chair, and as committee members, Sens. Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills; Eddie Lucio Jr., D-Brownsville; Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood; and John Whitmire, D-Houston.

Health agency investigates
Reports of an intestinal illness that may be attributable to the parasite cyclospora have prompted the Texas Department of State Health Services to investigate, in collaboration with local health departments, to gather information and identify the cause.

On July 23 the agency reported it has received reports of 77 cyclosporiasis cases from around Texas this year, including 69 in the last month. The major symptom is watery diarrhea lasting a few days to a few months.

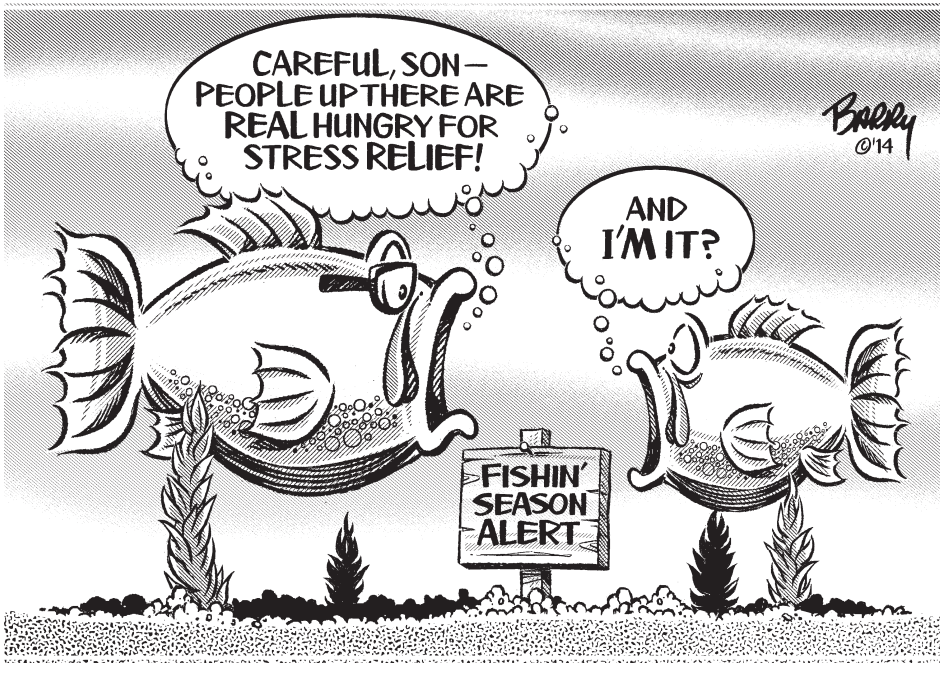
Thorough washing of fresh produce is recommended, but that may not entirely eliminate the risk because cyclospora can be difficult to wash off. Cooking will kill the parasite.

Drought emergency continues

Gov. Rick Perry on Aug. 1 renewed the emergency disaster proclamation he originally made on July 5, 2011, certifying that exceptional drought conditions posed a threat of imminent disaster in specified counties in Texas. The renewed proclamation applies to 108 of Texas' 254 counties and specifies "rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat are suspended for the duration of the state of disaster."

UT names McRaven chancellor

The University of Texas System board of regents on July 29 named U.S. Navy Adm. William McRaven as chancellor, to succeed Francisco Cigarroa at the post in January. McRaven, 58, will retire from the Navy this month. The San Antonio native is a 1977 graduate of the University of Texas at Austin.



Drive sober or get pulled over during Labor Day

It's almost the end of summer. Labor Day is regarded as the unofficial end of summer, and many people make it a big party weekend. Unfortunately, it is also a deadly holiday when it comes to impaired driving.

It's time to get serious about enforcement of impaired driving. This year's Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over impaired-driving enforcement crackdown will be conducted from Aug. 15 through Labor Day, Sept. 1. Hundreds of law enforcement officers across the state will be aggressively looking for impaired drivers. There will be no excuses. If you are impaired, you will be arrested.

It is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher in all 50 states, yet one in three traffic fatalities are alcohol-related. Nighttime is especially dangerous.

More than three-fourths of all drunken driving fatalities over Labor Day weekend 2012 occurred between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.

"This isn't just about making arrests," said County Extension Agent, DaLinda Black. "These high-profile crackdowns save lives and prevent injuries at the hands of impaired drivers. We want all residents of Haskell County to be safe this Labor Day holiday."

"Some simple tips to help folks stay safe this Labor Day—and all year long—are to plan a safe way home before you start festivities, and if you know someone is about to drive drunk, be a friend and take their keys," said Black.

USDA to send data to help producers select coverage options that fit their needs

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced that farmers should start receiving notices updating them on their current base acres, yields and 2009-2012 planting history. The written updates are an important part of preparing agricultural producers for the new safety net programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill.

"We're sending these reports to make sure that farmers and ranchers have key information as they make critical decisions about programs that impact their livelihood," said Garcia. "It's important that producers take a few minutes to cross check the information they receive with their own farm records. If the information is correct, no further action is needed at this time. But if our letter is incomplete or incorrect, producers need to contact their local FSA county office as soon as possible."

Verifying the accuracy of data on a farm's acreage history is an important step for producers enrolling in the upcoming Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) program and the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program. Later this summer, farmers and ranchers will have an opportunity to update their crop yield information and reallocate base acres.

"We're working hard to prepare and educate farmers on the new programs created by the 2014 Farm Bill," added Garcia. "I encourage producers to bring their USDA notice to any scheduled appointments with the local FSA county office. This will help ensure they have the information they need with them to discuss the available program options."

By mid-winter all producers on a farm will be required to make a one-time, unanimous and irrevocable election between price protection and county revenue protection or individual revenue protection for

2014-2018 crop years. Producers can expect to sign contracts for ARC or PLC for the 2014 and 2015 crop years in early 2015.

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (includes short grain rice and temperate japonica rice), safflower seed, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed, and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.

August 2014: Producers receive letters notifying them of current bases and yields and 2009 to 2012 planting history.

Late Summer 2014: ARC and PLC online tools become available. Owners have opportunity to update yields and reallocate bases for ARC/PLC purposes.

Winter 2014: ARC/PLC one-time elections occur.

Early 2015: ARC/PLC sign-up for 2014 and 2015 starts.

Visit www.fsa.usda.gov or the local FSA office for information about FSA and the 2014 Farm Bill programs.

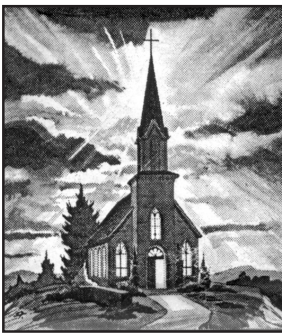

USDA extends deadline for emergency assistance

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced that the enrollment deadline for the 2012 and 2013 Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP) has been extended to Aug. 15, 2014. Originally, program sign-up was scheduled to end Aug. 1.

The new deadline gives livestock, honeybee, and farm-raised fish producers who experienced losses because of disease, adverse weather, wildfires or colony collapse disorder between Oct. 1, 2011 and Sept. 30, 2013, an additional two

weeks to enroll in ELAP. "Because ELAP is an important safety net for key sectors of American agriculture, we've provided this two week extension so that producers can submit required documentation and apply for program benefits," said Garcia.

Producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA service center or visit FSA's website at www.fsa.usda.gov for additional information regarding ELAP.

ELAP was authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past five years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in

savings for taxpayers. Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America.
