

On that date, Sergeant Spinks was serving as the artillery reconnaissance sergeant attached to Company C. 4th Battalion, 12 Infantry on a small task force sent to link-up with a long-range reconnais-sance team that had sighted a large Viet Cong force moving

toward the brigade's base camp. As the task force moved northward to join the reconnaissance team, it encountered reinforced battalion of the 275th Viet Cong Regiment. A raging battle ensued and the task force was unable to reach the beleagued reconnaissance team. Reinforcements were dispatched and together the combined friendly force renewed its

assault. Set, Spinks and two comrades had just crossed a cemetery when enemy elements attacked from open graves. Disregarding his personal safety, Sergeant Spinks and two comrades assaulted the insurgent force. Undaunted by the withering fire striking around him, Sergeant Spinks aggressively and systematically moved through the cemetery and routed the enemy soldiers from their positions. Braving a hail of enemy fire, he personnally assisted in killing eight Viet Cong. His fearless actions were instrumental in overwhelming the insurgents and forcing them



VA Questions

Editor's Note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative quer-ies. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q-May I borrow on my G. I. Insurance to help pay college expenses for my son and daugh-

A-If you have a permanent plan G. I. insurance policy, you may borrow up to 94 per cent of the cash value of the policy. The interest charge is 4 per

Q-Last year I attended college under the G. I. Bill. I plan to return to school this fall, but desire to enter a different college. Must I notify the VA in advance?

A-Yes. This will allow VA to process your payments much quicker and will permit them to issue you a new Certificate of Eligibility for the school of your

Q-I am a service-connected disabled veteran rated 50 per cent disabled. My son is 22 years of age, is a Post-Korean veteran, and is enrolled in school under the new G. I. Bill. Am I still eligible for additional

compensation? A-Yes, you may be eligible for additional compensation (until your son reaches age 23) although he is receiving educational benefits as a veteran.

Q-My husband, who served in the Army just before World War II, is now very ill. If he dies, is he eligible for the VA burial allowance and the flag for his casket?

A-Since he is not a wartime veteran, he would not qualify for the \$250 burial allowance unless he receives compensation for a service-connected injury or was discharged for disabilities received in line of duty. However, if he served at least one enlistment and was honorably discharged during peacetime he is eligible for a burial flag to drape his casket.

Q-When does the time expire for seriously disabled vet-erans to apply for an allowance for an automobile?

A-There is no longer any time limit; the previous limitation has been removed. Your nearest VA office can provide the proper form to apply for the VA payment (not to exceed \$1,-600) for veterans who have lost —or permanently lost the use of -one or both hands or feet, or suffered severe permanent im-But one word of caution: Do not agree to the purchase of any automobile before you have re-

ceived VA's written approval. Q-I understand that the guaranteed portion of G. I. home loans has been raised. Is this

A-Yes. It has been increased



Albert Thane, a registered Angus cattle breeder from near Haskell, has enrolled his herd in the American Angus Association's beef improvement program. The herd is scheduled to be classified in October by an official representative of the American Angus Association.

The program, called Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) is designed to help cattlemen do a more professional job of breeding by measuring and recording the type, production and careass producing qualities of his herd. #### Medicare Hosp. Deduction Goes Up In Jan. '69

Beginning in January, an older person who goes to the hospital under Medicare will be responsible for the first \$44.00 of his hospital bill-now running about \$600.00 for the average hospital stay by a Medicare beneficiary, R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene Social Security District Manager, said. The \$4.00 increase (from the present \$40.00 deductible) results from a provision in the law requiring an annual review of the deductible amount. The first such review the law provided, was to be made in 1968.

The law specifies that if this annual review shows that hospital costs have changed significantly, the hospital deductible amount must be adjusted for the following year. Necessary increases in the deductible amount are to be made in \$4.00 steps to avoid small annual changes.

Following the formula in the law, and figuring the ratio of inpatient hospital costs under Medicare in 1966 with those in 1967, the deductible amount for 1969 worked out to \$45.36. Rounded to the nearest multiple of \$4.00, this will make the deductible \$44.00 for 1969.

The results of the annual review of the inpatient hospital deductible also apply to the dollar amounts a Medicare beneficiary pays toward a hospital stay of more than 60 days, or a post - hospital extended care stay of more than 20 days.

These amounts therefore will also increase by 10 percent, effective January 1 - to \$11.00 a day for the 61st through the 90th day of a hospital stay: to \$5.50 for the 20th to the 100th day of a stay in a post-hospital extended care facility; and to \$22.00 a day for each day of the lifetime reserve of 60 days, the reserve account a beneficiary can draw upon if he ever needs more than 90 days of hospital care in the same benefit period. The changes in these amounts apply only to the hospital insurance part of medicare and do not affect the financing of the supplementary medical insurancethe voluntary program which covers doctor bills and a wide variety of other medical serv-





The American rifleman is a living legend in competitive target matches, in the rangeland of the West, in the lore of hunters and in the defense of our homes.







The state's 20 new driver education supervisors are certi-fied driver education teachers in good standing. Most have been teaching driver education courses in the state's public schools. The new supervisors have been receiving instruction similar to that given the teaching assistants at A&M, with additional courses in supervisory training, program development and administration.

The summer study program for teaching assistants and teacher supervisors has been described as the most comprehensive driver education program ever presented, It was designed not only to provide the additional personnel so greatly-needed to make driver education courses available to all Texas teens, but also to serve as a medium for upgrading the quality of the courses present-

The use of teaching assistants. plus new teaching aids, such as the driving simulator, is expected to double the number of students receiving driver educa-tion in the public schools in the

next two years. Changes in the Texas driver education curriculum came about with the enactment last year of the Texas Traffic Safety Act, which made the Governor responsible for administering a driver education and training program for all eligible Texas youths. The Governor's new program for driver ed-ucation, including the use of assistants, was ed by the State Board of Education last November.

The new Texas driver educa-tion plan brings the state into close conformance with the Federal standards for driver education programs. A number of other states are now looking closely at the Texas plan, which is unique in many of its areas of instruction and in the use of teaching assistants, as a means of solving their driver educa-

tion program requirements. Under the recently revised driver licensing law in Texas, teens must be at least age 18 to get an operator's license if they have not completed an approved course in driver educa-tion. With a course in driver education, they may obtain an operator's license at age 16.



Yes, duck hunting has chang-But that doesn't mean it isn't sporty anymore. There's a new kind of duck hunting available today that you can enov at a fraction of the cost and with little preparation...yet you can still kill just as many ducks, duck "plain - vanilla" hunting is done on stock tanks. Basically, there are two ways you can go about it. One is conventional duck hunting, with decovs. The other is stalking ducks and jump-shootin- them.

Both have their merits. The former is for the hunter who enjoys seeing a flock of ducks coming in to a stool of imitations, watching them circle warily and then finally lock their wings and drop in unsus-

Since puddler ducks, like mal-Several factors have contrib-ted to this change. One is an ually travel and feed in small bunches, you won't need many decoys. A dozen is more than sufficient,

Just place your decoys about five yards out from shore and space them widely. A tight-knit bunch of decoys indicates to wary ducks overhead that it is an uneasy, unsettled gathering.

Ducks, when they first alight, tend to remain tightly bunched, until they've had time to look things over. Later they'll disperse to feed. Present an lution also has contributed to overall picture of serenity, one of ducks feeding. This will bring others unsuspectingly to the

Just remember to put out fresh decoys each trip. Don't make the mistake of leaving them in the water indefinitely. When ducks visit a pond in the afternoon, they will detect that their "brethern" are fakes and they'll have little appeal later.

Put the decoys out early, around daybreak, before the first contingent arrives (legal shooting time is sunrise). No call is necessary. When ducks fly over and see the decoys, they're going to come on in. That is, if you're hidden effectively and if they see nothing that makes them suspicious.

Stalk shooting can be complished throughout the day. A windy day is best, one when ducks have been driven off the more open waters and onto the

protected tanks. Park your vehicle far enough away so you won't alarm the ducks. Then walk quietly to the pond. Best have at least two or three hunters in the party since one fast salvo of shooting is usually all you can expect.

An earthen levee affords a spot where you can creep close without revealing your pres-

When all hunters get ready, jump up and start bombarding. Needless to say, the ducks kick off the water and speed away toward a quieter place quickly and with amazing suddenness. Seldom will they return immediately

There will be just enough time as they lift frantically off the water to get in two or three licks with your favorite scatter-

gun...if you hurry. This kind of duck hunting lack the glamour of old methods. But it's just as effective. And in this day and time, the outdoorsman must learn to make do with what he's got. Try duck hunting once and you will admit it's fun.



## Stitching And Stewing

Necessary preparations vary according to the severity of fall in the area, but some work should be done almost everywhere. The home handyman will be able to carry out many of the jobs but others require the skills of trained servicemen. Have a qualified serviceman

check heating systems thoroughly. Although a heating system usually lasts about 20 years without major repairs, annual check-ups are necessary to assure efficient operation.

A dirty, worn-out heating system produces higher fuel bills, it can endanger lives of family members and valuable should include the chimney or flue, the central heating plant, thermostats and the heating distributors in each room,

The American Gas Association calls insulation "the most important single item in fuel savings." If a house is not properly insulated, particularly its ceilings, floors and walls, the owner would be well advised to consider having this work done.
