City Council Minutes

March 5, 1987

Stratford City Council met in regular session Thursday, March 5, 1987 at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Leland Lewis presiding and the following Council Members present: Wanda Riffe, Bill Roberts, R.J. Hill, Kirk McWilliams and Ronnie Pickens.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Sherri Butler and Chief Dennis Davis met with Council to request \$500.00 from the Motel Occupancy Tax Fund. The money would be used to help defray costs of the 5-State Police Officers Convention to be held in April. A motion was made by R. J. and second by Wanda to grant the request. Motion carried.

Johnny Pulliam, Fire Marshall, met with Council to discuss several fire hazards around town. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting.

Ronnie updated the Council on the well in Sherman Addition. The Bank wants \$15,000.00 and they keep the pump. This includes all

easements for utilities and 100 x 100 ft. all around the well. R.J. made a motion and Bill second that we offer the Bank \$15,000.00 and leave the pump in the hole. Motion carried. Council agreed to authorize Ronnie to go as high as \$17,000.00.

City water rates were discussed. Ronnie gave a report of a meeting with Kevin last week. Kevin did a rate study and after comparing Stratford's rates with that of towns such as Dumas-\$5.00/3,000 gal. min 1.35/1,000 gal.

Sunray-\$2.50/2,000 gal. min .75/1,000 gal.

Dalhart-¾" meter-\$3.85/2,000 gal. min. 1 inch meter-4.40/2,000, 1.10/1,000

Channing-\$20.00/2,000 gal. min. 2.00/1,000 Gal. Kevin recommended that Council change the City water rates to \$7.00 residential, \$8.00 commercial for 2,000 gal. min and a

flat rate of 95 cents per 1,000. These rates will mainly affect large users. With the rates as they are now the City is losing money on large users of water. A motion was made by Ronnie and second by Bill to change the City's water rates to:

Residential-\$7.00/2,000 gal. min., .95/1,000 gal.

Commercial-\$8.00/2,000 gal min. .95/1,000 gal.

Motion carried with Wanda, Bill, R.J. and Ronnie for, Kirk against.

City bills were reviewed for payment. A motion was made by Wanda and second by R.J. to pay all city bills and the County bill from Dr. Harlow. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn, motion carried, meeting adjourned.

However, City Attorney Kyle Lewis said tickets issued prior to the new ordinance would remain valid.

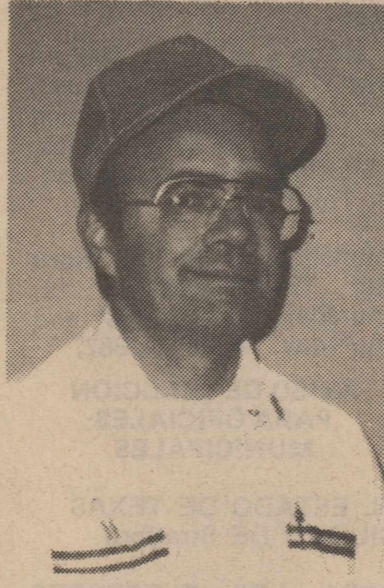
Davis said he and current councilment were not in office in 1974 and the time the current administration took office.

will place all flashing signs within 300 to 400 feet of the intersection.

"The fact is, if I had gotten a ticket (in the area), I wouldn't pay it because the signs were not where they belonged," said Bill Deutchendorf, THD foreman in Stratford.

"If anybody who has gotten a ticket wanted to fight it, and knew where the specifications say the signs should have been, they could win."

In 1974, THD offered to maintain traffic zone signs in all Texas cities with a population at the time of 1,500 or less, including paying for monthly electricity bills required for flashing signs.

Most towns responded positively, Wood said.

Stratford City Commissioners, led by then-mayor Annel Wall, acted legally in 1974 when they took no action on THD's offer, Wood added, because cities are allowed to maintain their own signs and are not required by law to comply with the Uniform Traffic Act.

Current city officials could not explain the city's 1974 action.

"I'd say that more than likely, the city in 1974 passed an ordinance saying you couldn't travel through there over 20 miles an hour when the lights were flashing," City Attorney Lewis said.

"Since a motorist would have violated a city ordinance, Stratford would be entitled to enforce that ordinance...so a motorist would not be entitled to reimbursement from the city."

Wood estimated it will now cost about \$6,000 to move the signs and install new underground electrical wiring.

Stratford City Council Accepts 1974 Traffic Zone Offer From Highway Department

City Commissioners have decided to accept a 12%-year-old offer from the Texas Highway Department to maintain the city's school zone traffic signs and shorten the length of the zone.

The zone, near U.S. Highways 287 and 54 near Stratford High School, is between one-half to two blocks longer than necessary, according to THD guidelines.

The department studied the zone in 1974 and wrote a letter to the city volunteering to oversee relocation and pay expenses for the signs, according to Leon Wood, THD District 4 traffic safety specialist in Amarillo.

Police in Stratford, a town of about 1,900, have issued an average of 40 tickets per month in the zone over the last two years at a minimum

fine of \$30 per ticket, according to city records.

The figure compares to an average of two tickets per month in school zones in Stinnett, a town of about 2,200; three tickets per month in Panhandle, with 2,400 residents; and 10 tickets per month in Spearman, with 3,400 residents, police in those towns said.

"We haven't tried to generate revenue on our school zone," Police Chief Dennis Davis said in a phone interview. "We've been trying to protect our kids, because some folks think they can zoom through town, and there have been several close calls."

Davis said the town receives about 30 percent more traffic than other area towns because of the two major highways.

He added, however, that the department has recently stopped issuing tickets until the traffic zone comes into

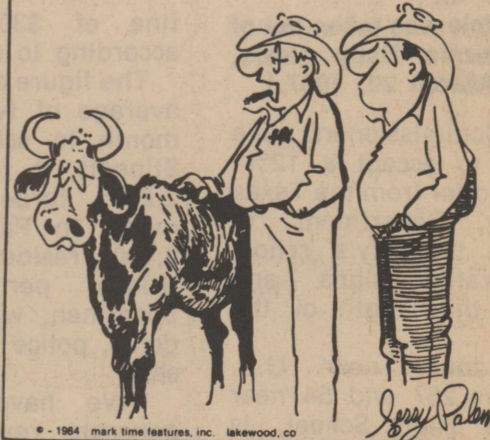

Our preschool visitation day and Easter egg hunt for next year's kindergarten class will be held on April 16.

The kindergarten class is making preparation for receiving their quests and are preparing their personal invitation to a preschooler which will be mailed during a field trip to the post office on April 7. A subsequent letter will be sent to parents regarding the times and activities of the day.

For a child to receive the invitation, however, we must have them pre-registered at Mary Allen Elementary School.

Parents need to pre-register their 87-88 kindergarten students as soon as possible. In order for your child to be eligible, he or she must be five years old on or before September 1, 1987. A copy of the birth certificate is required to be on file for each student. (THE HOSPITAL SOUVENIR CERTIFICATE IS NOT ACCEPTABLE)

Before entering school, the child's shot record must be on file. The required immunizations are as follows:

DTP/DT A minimum of three doses of DTP and /or DT is required, with a least one dose having been received on or after the 4th birthday and with the last dose within the past ten years.

ORAL POLIO 3 required, with one on or after 4th birthday. Required to age 18 years.

MEASLES All students through the twelfth grade will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday, and after January 1, 1968, or to provide a physician-validated history of measles illness.

RUBELLA One dose required up to age 12 years. History of the disease is not

acceptable in lieu of the vaccine.

MUMPS Mumps vaccine is required for students through ten years of age, or in the fourth grade.

TB TEST Every student in this school district is required to have a TB Test.

We would ask that parents please come and pre-register their children even if the shot record is incomplete at this time.

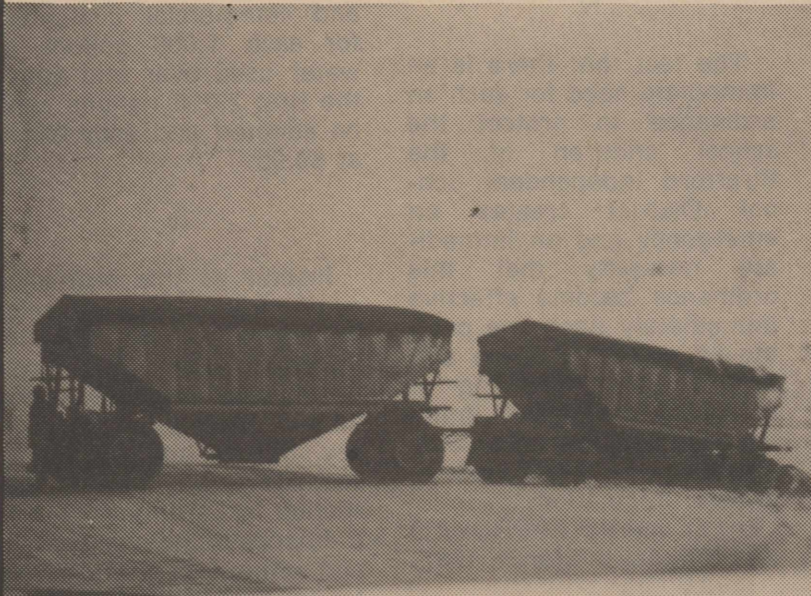

Texas Panhandle Sorghum Producers Will Discuss Farm Program

Sorghum producers in the Dumas area will meet on Monday, March 30, to discuss their options under the current farm program and compare it to the Market Oriented Production Plan proposed by the National Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

The NGSPA plan, based on production goals set at the amount the market will absorb, would maintain exports, reduce government cost on sorghum production by 40% and more than triple the sorghum producer's net cash income. The plan was developed by sorghum leaders from six states who make up the board of the national association.

National Grain Sorghum Producers Association is sponsoring the meeting. Robert Green, NGSPA Regional Director, will be in charge. Other officers in the region are: George Reeves, Dallam County Director; Larry Kemp, Hartley County Director; Betty Keith and Jim Dowty, Moore County Co-directors and Wesley Spurlock, Sherman County Director. National GSPA executive staff will be present to review the association's work in export and domestic market development, utilization research and the National Grain Sorghum Yield and Management Contest.

The meeting will be held in Dumas at the Plaza Restaurant at 12:00 noon. A Dutch Treat luncheon is planned.

citizens of the City and in particular the school children of the Stratford Independent School District to impose certain speed restrictions for the health and safety of the school children; **WHEREAS**, such speed restrictions are necessary for U.S. Highways 54 and 287 to insure the safe passage to and from school of the school children; and **WHEREAS**, such restrictions are necessary to be imposed immediately; **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD, TEXAS:**

1. During any time when flashing signals are lighted indicating a twenty (20) mile per hour speed limit in the area described below, no person shall drive any motor vehicle in excess of twenty (20) miles per hour over the following described streets:

A. On U. S. Highway 287 from a point one hundred seventy (170) feet northwest of the intersection of the center line of U.S. Highway 287 and the center line of Eighth Street to a point one hundred eighty-five (185) feet southeast of the intersection of the center line of U.S. Highway 287 and the center line of Eighth Street.
B. On U.S. Highway 54 from a point eleven (11) feet southwest of the intersection of the center line of U.S. Highway 54 with the center line of Pearl Street to a point twenty-five (25) feet northeast of the intersection of the center line of U.S. Highway 54 with the center line of Chestnut Street.

11. The term motor vehicle shall be defined as any self-propelled vehicle including, but not limited to, automobiles, trucks, pickups, vans, trailers, motorcycles, motorbikes, motorscooters and buses.

ORDINANCE NO. 255

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND RAISING MINIMUM RATES FOR WATER USE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Stratford, Texas, finds it necessary to amend prior ordinances regulating rates for the use of water; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interest of the City to increase water rates; and

WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD, TEXAS:

1. The monthly rate and charge for the first 2,000 gallons of water used by residential customers is hereby adopted and established at \$7.00.

11 The monthly rate and charge for the first 2,000 gallons of water used by commercial customers is hereby adopted and established at \$8.00.

11 The monthly rate and charge for both residential and commercial customers for each 1,000 gallons of water used over and above the first 2,000 gallons shall be adopted and established at \$0.95.

iv Insofar as this ordinance overlaps or amends any prior ordinances of the City of Stratford, then this ordinance shall supersede and amend such prior ordinances. Should any section or sections or any part of any section or sections of this ordinance be held to be void and without force and effect for any reason whatsoever by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions of the ordinance shall not be thereby affected, but they shall remain in full force and effect as though the void and unenforceable portion thereof, if any, had not been incorporated.

v An emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective May 1, 1987.

A memorial service for Chester V. Johnson, 76, a retired make-up editor of the St. Louis Post Dispatch, was held at 4:30 p.m., March 7, 1987 at the Worley Funeral Home Chapel in Grove, Okla.

The body was donated to the University of Oklahoma Medical School.

Mr. Johnson, a native of Texhoma, was the eldest son of Clifford and Sarah Johnson. He died following a long illness in the Grove Memorial Hospital. He never lost his Oklahoma drawl although he spent many years in the St. Louis area. He and his wife, Nilola (Billie), retired in 1974 to the Grand Lake o' the Chero-

Chub was a 1927 graduate from Texhoma High School and attended Panhandle A & M College. He was a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism in Columbia, Mo. He began his newspaper career in Guymon, Okla. in the 1930's. His first job in St. Louis was with the Associated Press.

He later became a copy editor at the Globe Democrat and moved to the Post-Dispatch in 1938. He worked briefly for the Sports section and the outstate edition. He was a cable desk editor during World War II and a copy editor.

Mr. Johnson left the Post-Dispatch in 1947 to run his own weekly, The Texhoma Times in his home town and returned to the Post-Dispatch in 1952.

He served a five month stint as editor of the old Society section where, in his words, he was the "headenunch" while the section's format was being changed from an emphasis on weddings and social register parties to women's issues. He spent his last 14 years with the newspaper as a makeup editor, overseeing the placement of stories for each edition.

Cheap Hybrids

Discouraged

It's a mistake to buy a corn hybrid only because it's cheap.

"Cost of seed corn ranks last of the things you should consider when selecting a hybrid," said Dale Hicks, an agronomist with the University of Minnesota Cooperative Extension Service.

Hicks said he's had bankers and farmers ask whether planting low-priced hybrids saves money. "First, select high-yielding hybrids of the maturity you need. Then, consider moisture at harvest because of drying cost. Standability, disease and insect resistance are other factors, and they're all more important than seed cost," Hicks noted.

He cites research that compared yields of 72 110-day hybrids. There was an 87-bushel yield difference between the lowest and highest yielding hybrids.

"High-priced" seed doesn't need to boost yields much to more than pay for itself. For example, with a bag price difference of \$25, you need only 4.25 bushels per acre to return the seed cost difference. Putting it another way, only 0.17 bushels per acre are necessary to pay for each additional dollar per bag of seed cost.

Once you've selected hybrids based on performance, small sized seed is a good buy if bag cost for the same number of viable kernels is lower. Yield potential of small sized seed corn is equal to large sized seed.
