Procurement Workshop April 14

Small businesses in the Texas Panhandle can be major trading partners with Uncle Sam. The Federal Contract Procurement Workshop scheduled for April 14 in Amarillo's Sheraton Inn will show how those partnerships can be formed.

Every year, the federal government buys millions of dollars in goods and services from small businesses; every thing from paper clips to power tools. Representatives of the SBA and the U.S. General Services Administration will go into detail about what it takes to get a piece of the federal pie.

Contract opportunities with Pantex, the Department of Energy, and Reese Air Force Base will also be explored, along with the intricacies of bonding for those who wish to sell both goods and services to the government.

Congressman Beau Boulter, one of the sponsors of the event, will make the luncheon address. His presentation will deal with the importance of the small business in the federal

GTE Bracing For Spring Assault

General Telephone technicians are bracing for the annual spring assault on underground cables as construction activity increases across the state", according to Bob Meyers, Operations Manager.

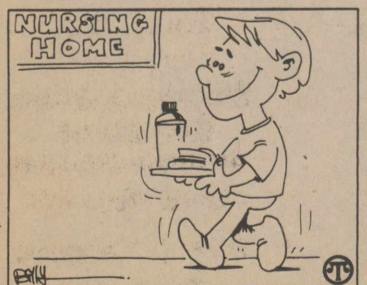
"Every year about this time, gardeners and construction contractors start digging holes and ditches that play havoc with buried facilities, which can cause service outages for large numbers of customers," said Meyers.

"Much of this can be avoided by simply calling the buried cable information number listed on page 2 of your directory to have the cable marked.

"The most frequent repairs to buried lines result from the placement of a shrub or tree or digging post holes for fence construction

and severing a buried service wire. Should this happen, it is best to call Repair for connect/repair work.

"Please, before picking up the shovel, think about what wires you may cut," said Meyers.

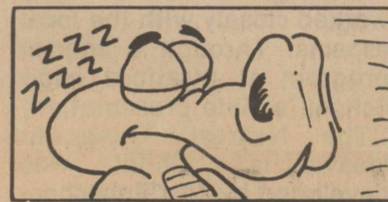

share in it and see what all this wonderful lady has done.]

LeRayne's most consuming project in 1986 has been CASA 69, Inc. This is a distinct and separate endeavor apart from the rest of the ongoing work in which she is involved. Some time ago Judge Bill Sheehan of the 69th Judicial District contacted LeRayne and asked her to investigate possible solutions to the need for a special advocate for the child in the court system. LeRayne, along with Paula Graham of Sunray, was persuaded by Judge Sheehan to look into the problem. They not only studied the subject but were the movers in a pilot program. This is the first special advocate program for rural areas in the State of Texas. CASA, or Court Appointed Special Advocates, now has a four county steering committee consisting of Judges, Commissioners, and other representatives from each county in the 69th District. Included among other activities during the creation of CASA 69, she attended the Family Court Judges Conference to attain greater understanding and depth concerning the needs of the child. The CASA program is now in place and prepared to hire a paid worker. The Victim Assistance Program, a part of the State Judicial Branch, funded \$5,000 for this purpose. Attaining this funding required the expertise of LeRayne and others. LeRayne helped coordinate training for the current 39 volunteers. Their training was given by lawyers, judges, and other qualified persons. At this time the 39 trained volunteers have assisted 45 young people in the four county area. The hard work has now been done and the people of the four counties have begun to benefit from this effort. The results have been so outstanding that another group of counties, from the Tyler area, are establishing their own program, based on CASA 69.

Of special interest to young children is the "Courthouse Coloring Book" This presents in an attractive and interesting manner the court process in the local rural counties. This was a project in which LeRayne was deeply involved.

In visiting with LeRayne about how she became involved, she could only say, when her daughters grew up and left home, there was an empty place in her life. She had always built around kids, not only her own, but all others. Because of this void, she volunteered to serve on the Sherman County Welfare Board when it was created. She soon saw the need for care for those who could not help themselves.

At the present time LeRayne is Vice-President of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards. She has served as chairman of the Truant and Runaway Advisory Committee to the Council. That committee drafted and set standards for distribution of nearly two million dollars in funds provided by the State of Texas for the truant and runaway program. This committee consisted of about 18 people, who included representative of Texas Juvenile Probation, Mental Health Rehabilitation, Texas Juvenile Justice Center, Department of Human Resources, The Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards, as well as Senator Ray

Farabee and Representative Anita Hill. These funds are now in place which are available in the form of grants.

LeRayne has been on the steering committee for the "Bunk House", the foster care home facility located in Dalhart, which serves Dallam, Hartley and Sherman counties. The home is licensed for twelve children. When she became a member of the Child Welfare Board of Sherman County, LeRayne, along with others, saw the need for a foster home in the area. She was highly instrumental in the three county joint effort which resulted in raising over \$100,000. Funds were used to purchase a building suitable for renovation. An endowment fund has been established to generate revenue for maintenance and operating expense. Mr. J. Eddie Jones of Dalhart, president of the steering committee for the "Bunk House" said, "LeRayne Donelson is dedicated to helping those who cannot help themselves. She is one of those most responsible for the very being of the Bunk House."

After being appointed to the Sherman County Welfare Board in 1979, LeRayne served not only as member but as president. Each county welfare board sends two representatives to the regional board. Region One consists of the North 22 panhandle counties, which LeRayne has also served as president. Each region in turn sends two representatives to the Texas Council of Welfare Boards, which meets about five times yearly. It is through her work on the state level, that she was chosen to present the Council on the Advisory Committee for Truancy and Runaways. This committee has now fulfilled and met its goals and obligations.

During this time LeRayne worked closely with the local aspects. Through a special program at Stratford High School, a slide presentation, "The Nearest Thing to Heaven is a Child", was developed by the highschool television class. The slide show presents information on child abuse, while dealing with the positive side of childhood. The presentation has been so well received that it has been shown to numerous organizations. LeRayne has been responsible, not only for much of the leadership in creation of the film, but has carried and shown it in Midland, El Paso, Ft. Worth, Austin, Corpus and other cities.

Sherman County Older Texans, fondly known as SCOT, was formed in 1974. LeRayne was a charter member. Not because she had attained the required age for membership, but because of her interest and concern. While a member of the steering committee, her main projects have been for special events. A few of the events she has organized and participated in include trips to TEXAS* Raton to the horse races, the circus in Amarillo, a play in Guymon, and Amarillo to see the Living Christmas tree and to view the Christmas lights. One person, Marilyn Albert writer of this letter will attest: "I had the pleasure of attending TEXAS with the SCOT group in 1980, when we had bus trouble. LeRayne worked just as hard at seeing that each one there was comfortable and secure, as she had worked at seeing they were entertained and having an enjoyable time".

Waterfield Files Grain Elevator Legislation

Representative Dick Waterfield, R-Canadian, has filed three bills, HB 1721, HB 1722 and HB 1723, dealing with easing the bonding requirements for grain elevator operators.

The legislation is the result of two months in investigation by a task force composed of men in the grain business. Waterfield said that because the legislation was put together by businessmen, it addresses their concerns, not those of the government.

"HB 1722 would make bonding of public grain elevators more affordable by reducing the rate per bushel, Waterfield said. "The rate was reduced from 20 cents to seven cents for the first million bushels of storage capacity, from 15 cents to

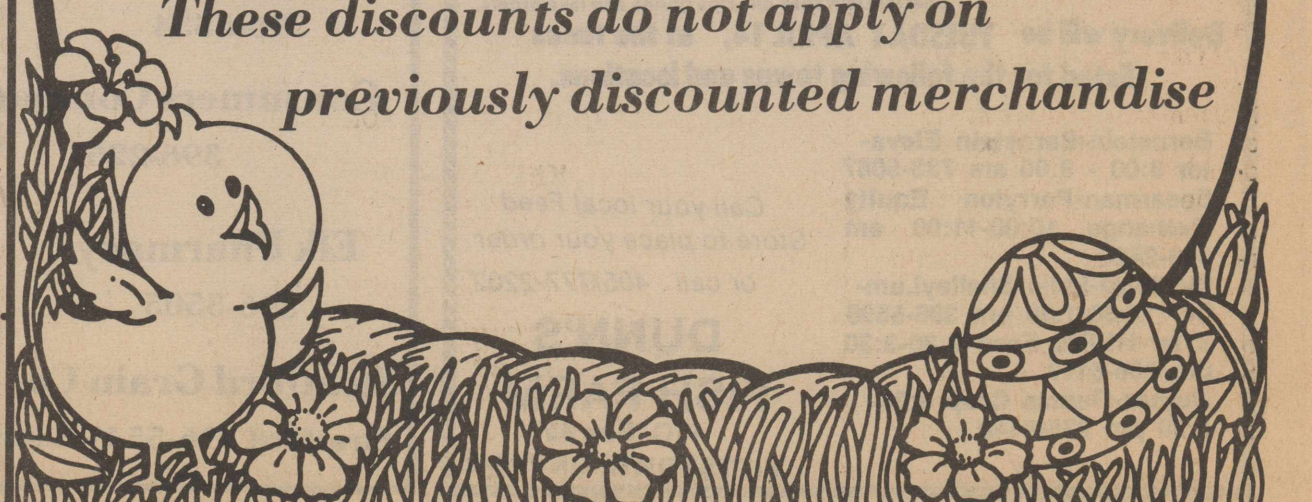

Land Bank Announces Rate Reduction

The Federal Land Bank will reduce its interest rates for long-term mortgages on June 1, according to Randy C. Breitling, president of Federal Land Bank Association of Dalhart. Don Rogge, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas, announced the rate change at the bank's annual meeting.

Breitling and other officials of the Federal Land Bank Association of Dalhart were among the more than 500 Federal Land Bank Association stockholders who met in Austin recently. Local association officials attending the annual meeting with Breitling were directors Roy Browder of Sunray, Jim McCleskey of Dalhart and Wendell Stacy of Stratford.

The Land Bank's new variable rates will be 10.25 percent on farm and ranch loans and 10.50 percent on farm related business loans and rural residence loans. The decrease represents a one-half of one percent reduction on farm and ranch loans and a three-quarters of one percent reduction of farm related business loans and rural residence loans.

"In some ways, our situation looks a little better today than it did last year at this time," says Breitling.

Federal judges in both Texas and Massachusetts ruled earlier this year that at least one of the regulations which required stronger banks like Texas to transfer funds to troubled banks in the system was invalid.

Rogge also announced a new loan program he said

the FLB plans to initiate within the next 60 days. The program carries an even lower interest rate for loans to buy rural real estate.

The Federal Land Bank makes loans for a term of 35 years. This program will provide a fixed rate for the first 10 years of the loan. Rogge said he anticipates the rate will be set at approximately 8 7/8 percent. He added that the lower interest rate will be available only for a limited time.

Aimed at stimulating the state's sagging real estate market, Rogge said the plan possibly would encourage other real estate lenders to initiate similar programs, further enhancing land price stabilization efforts. He said details of the plan will be available soon.

The Federal Land Bank and 44 Federal Land Bank Associations make farm and ranch loans and long-term real estate loans. As of December 31, 1986, the bank and associations had \$2.38 billion in loans outstanding on 37,000 loans to approximately 100,000 Texas farmers and ranchers. The bank and associations have a combined net worth of \$216 million. Reserves for loan losses stood at \$103 million on December 31.

Federal Land Bank Association of Dalhart has almost \$40 million in loans outstanding to approximately 400 area farmers and ranchers who are Land Bank members in a four-county region including Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties.

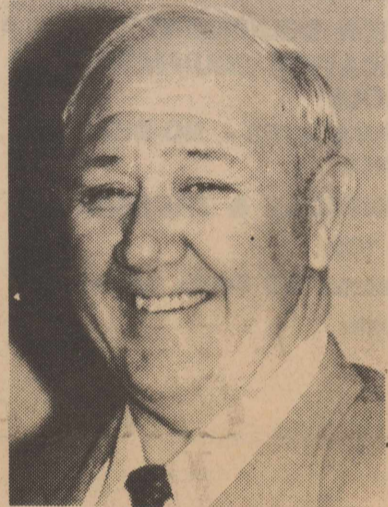

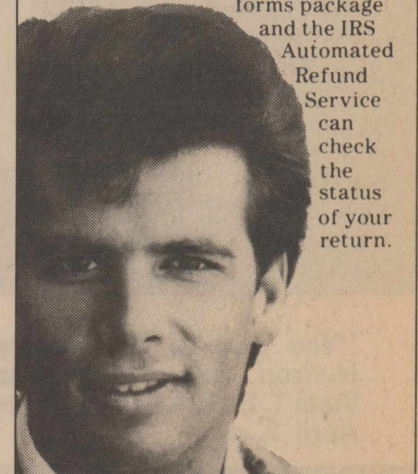

Waterfield Cont. from page 6 five cents for the second million, and from 10 cents to three cents for all bushels above two million."

"The bill would also allow the operator to deposit with the Department of Agriculture cash, a letter of credit, certificate of deposit or securities in lieu of a bond for the same amount as required for the bond.

"This makes it substantially easier for the warehousemen who are finding it difficult to obtain a bond, to do so."

The other bills, HB 1721 and HB 1723, relate to the regulation of public grain warehouses. It would allow a warehouseman to transfer to the state treasurer the balance of the proceeds of the sale of grain which is abandoned or unclaimed

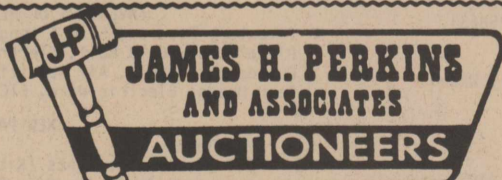

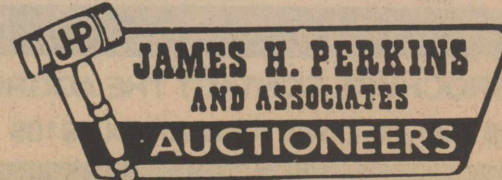

"This section lifts the burden of holding the balance of the sale from the warehousemen, and places it with the state," Waterfield said. "Also, the purchaser of the grain would not be liable for any claim made by the holder of the receipt for the grain."

All three bills were referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Livestock, where they will be set for public hearing.

"We have the support of the industry, as well as the Department of Agriculture, so I am not anticipating any problems," Waterfield said. "Should the bills move right out of the House and Senate, and receive the support of the governor, they will be effective immediately. This will allow the operators to realize the benefits right away."

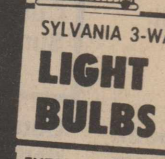
