On Jan. 9, 2020, at approximately 7 p.m., Big Spring Police Department officers were dispatched to 1900 Martin Luther King Boulevard (Knollwood Heights Apartments) in reference to suspicious activity. Upon arrival officers made

The suspects have been identified as David Morales Jr., hispanic male, 24 years of age and Kevon Williams, black male, 17 years of age.

The preliminary investigation revealed both Morales and Williams entered the dwelling with a firearm with the intent of robbing the residents of marijuana and currency.

The Big Spring Police Department Criminal Investigations Division and Narcotics Division responded and took over the investigation.

Both Morales and Williams have each been charged with two counts of Aggravated

Large item pick up on schedule to start Jan. 15 Two pickups per district scheduled this year and other bulk items without the hassle

Spring cleaning is starting a little early this year, with the announcement of Large /Bulk

Item Pick Up by the City of Big Spring. According to a

press release issued by the City earlier this week, Large/Bulk Item Pick Up will begin for 2020 on Jan. 15, with District 1.

"This is a service that the City

of Big Spring can offer to the citizens and we encourage the community to take advantage of it," Mayor Shannon Thomason said.

Large item pick up is an opportunity for residents to get rid of old furniture and expense of hauling it off. Those wanting to take part in the pick up should visit the City of Big Spring web-

site for more details - district location, assigned date of pick up, and a list of acceptable items - about the service.

"This is something that used to routine basis and the mem-

bers of the City Council agreed, almost unanimously, to restart the service," Mayor Thomason said.

City Staff will only pick up items that are placed on the curb on the designated day. Each month, a different district will be picked up, with the rotation to restart in July.

"The service doesn't cost the resident anything, but it helps them get rid of bulk items without having to take them to the dump," Mayor Thomason said. "If they miss their designated pick up day and can't wait until the next one, they are welcome to take the items to the dump. The items we will be picking up are the same items that are accepted at our dump."

He continued, "This is a great service and one that I myself have used in the past. I encourage our citizens to take advantage of it."

Acceptable items include: appliances, take place on a - furniture, scrap metal, lumber, brush/ tree limbs, mattresses. Not accepted items include: automotive products, chemicals/petroleum products, demolition/construction debris, paint and



was one of the early ambas- and various garnishes on it. final resting place in a horsedrawn carriage."


Hondo Crouch of Luckenbach was a popular figure at the festival. He used to dance with the belly dancers.

Although George P. Mitchell's name is unknown

to most Americans, he altered the economics of oil more than any individual since John D. Rockefeller. In "George P. Mitchell: Fracking, Sustainability, and an Unorthodox Quest to Save the Planet" (B MIT G) by Loren C. Steffy, Steffy places Mitchell's life and legacy in a global context, highlighting the significance of his discoveries and the lingering controversies they inspired. Mitchell will forever be known as "the father of fracking," but he didn't invent the drilling process; he perfected it and made it profitable. He pursued its use for seventeen years to save his company and inadvertently unleashed an era of energy abundance transforming an America dependent on foreign oil into one of the world's biggest producers of oil and natural gas. Anyone who puts fuel in a tank or turns on a light benefits from Mitchells efforts. Long before his company ever fracked a well, he pioneered sustainable development by creating The Woodlands, near Houston, one of the first and most successful master-planned communities. Its focus on environmental protection and livability redefined the American suburb. The apparent contradiction between his energy interests and environmental pursuits, which his son Todd dubbed "the Mitchell Paradox," was just one of many that defined Mitchell's life. But if Mitchell himself seemed at ease with these conflicting ideas, it might be because he had always been a quiet contrarian.

Learn how to identify the alarm bells that signal untrustworthy information. As a buried force in our lives, desire remains

largely unexplored, "Three Women" (306.7 TAD L) by Lisa Taddeo, is a riveting true story about the sex lives of three real American women, based on nearly a decade of reporting. Over the past eight years, journalist Lisa Taddeo has driven across the country six times to embed herself with ordinary women from different regions and backgrounds. The result, Three Women, is the deepest nonfiction portrait of desire ever written. In suburban Indiana we meet Lina, a homemaker and mother of two whose marriage, after a decade, has lost its passion. In North Dakota we meet Maggie, a seventeen-yearold high school student who finds a confidant in her handsome, married English teacher. In an exclusive enclave of the Northeast, we meet Sloane, a gorgeous, successful, and refined restaurant owner who is happily married to a man who likes to watch her have sex with other men and women. Based on years of immersive reporting, and told with astonishing frankness and immediacy, Three Women is a ground-breaking portrait of longing in today's America, exposing the fragility, complexity, and inequality of female desire. COAHOMA - It was nothing pretty about it, but it was a win. The Coahoma Bulldogs squeaked out a 45-43 win over rival Stanton in a 5-3A contest here Friday night. The win evens Coahoma's district record at 1-1 and 5-8 overall. Stanton falls to 1-2 in league play and 4-15 for the season.

The game was back and forth the entire way. It came down to a free throw shooting contest in the fourth quarter and both teams were bad. In the last three minutes of the game Stanton held a 40-38 advantage. Both teams sent each other to the foul line time after time. The consistently missed their attempts, sometimes shooting air balls. But at the end it was Zack Schneider and Gaige Hill converting one free throw each that propelled Coahoma to the win.

Coahoma coach Joe Mireles said the pressure got to his team. "Our free throw shooting was not good," said Mireles, on his team that shot a miserable 15 of 34 from the line. "We missed a lot of the front end of the free throws and then we just tightened up and started shooting short."

Stanton wasn't much better, although it didn't take as many trips to the line. The Buffaloes only made five of 14 attempts themselves.

Coahoma was led by Zack Schneider who hustled and willed his team to victory. It was blue collar basketball - hard work with ample dividends. Schneider finished the game with 16 points and 12 rebounds. He like his teammates struggled from the line; he was only eight of 19.

"Zack is not only a leader on the floor, he's an all-around leader. He leads in the classroom and leads by example. He's been there. He helps calm the other kids down," Mireles said.

Kolt Redden was another reason the Bulldogs won. He scored 13 second half points and ended the contest with six rebounds. Braydon Smith also contributed quite bit by scoring eight second half points.

The halftime score was 17-17 but the scoring picked up in the third quarter and Stanton led 35-34 going into the final period. The Buffaloes were led by the defensive play of guard Austin Hewtty who got several steals which turned into baskets, and the inside play of Chandler Denson who finished the game with 11 points. Cody Beasley hit a couple of big outside shots to keep the Buffaloes in contention.

"We were hustling and playing hard on defense," Mireles said. "We did a lot better on defense at the end. We play Anson on Tuesday and we can win that game. In this district I believe there is not one team that can overpower another."

James leads Lakers over frustrated Doncic, Mavericks 129-114

DALLAS (AP) — LeBron James drove for easy layups or quick passes to open shooters at the 3-point line early in another meeting with Dallas phenom Luka Doncic.

The 20-year-old Mavericks star played the last few minutes of the first half with a jersey he ripped into a V-neck look on a frustrating night against the player he admired growing up.

James had 35 points and 16 rebounds, Kyle Kuzma scored a season-high 26 points starting in place of injured star Anthony Davis, and the Los Angeles Lakers went up big early in a 129-114 victory over

the Mavericks on Friday night. The four-time MVP scored or assisted on seven of the first nine LA baskets to help build a 22-point lead in the first half, while Doncic missed five free throws while ending up a team-worst minus-24 in scoring margin before halftime.

Hence, the torn jersey.

"I played really bad," said Doncic, the 2019 Rookie of the Year. "I felt like I don't know how to play basketball. It wasn't me. I gotta get better. A lot."

James was 14 of 25 from the field to help the Lakers shoot 53%, and his 16 rebounds were a season high in LA's seventh consecutive win.

"It's not about how many you can win in a row," James said. "It's just how you continue to get better every individual game and I thought we did that here."

Dallas coach Rick Carlisle was as flummoxed as his young star, getting ejected after his second technical early in the fourth quarter when he exploded over the Lakers getting to challenge an outof-bounds call after he thought the Mavericks had thrown the ball in.

Doncic, who had played James just about even while the Lakers took two of first three in the season series, had 25 points and 10 rebounds. But Dallas trailed by double digits for all but the first fiveplus minutes.

"Those are emotions and feelings that are about winning and losing," Carlisle said. "I get it. He's going through a lot this year. He's going through a lot of different situations."

Davis missed the first game of a road back-to-back after taking a nasty fall in a 117-87 win over the Knicks in Los Angeles on Tuesday night. An MRI exam showed no major concerns, although Davis was extremely sore.

Kuzma filled in just fine in his second start, scoring 11 points in the first quarter after totaling just 13 in the first three meetings with Dallas. He ended up 9 of 22 from the field, 2 of 8 from long range.

"It's not any extra motivation," said Kuzma,

whose previous season high was 25. "I'm just confident, especially when I know, being I'm a rhythm player, when my minutes are high, just trying to

Both leading men — James and Doncic — were without their star sidekicks for the final regularseason meeting as both fell short of a triple-double after both had one in the previous meeting in Dallas. They had seven assists apiece.

Mavericks forward Kristaps Porzingis has already been ruled out for the final two games of a six-game homestand because of a sore right knee. It's not the knee the 7-foot-3 Latvian injured in his

final game for the Knicks almost two years ago. The Mavericks got within 91-81 late in the third quarter when Doncic found Tim Hardaway, who scored 22 points, for a 3-pointer. It was the closest Dallas had been since 19-9 midway through the

Dallas never did get the deficit back to single digits, and James hit a 3 to open the fourth quarter to push the lead back to 16.

New report addresses status of working lands

Report shows 20-year changes in Texas' population, land values, size of operations

The new Texas Land Trends report "Status Update and Trends of Texas Working Lands 1997–2017," produced by the Texas A&M Natural Resources Institute, NRI, has been published. Land-trends reports have informed private and public landowners and decision-makers for more than two decades.

"With this report, we are able to examine new patterns and identify trends following the release of the Census of Agriculture datasets by the U.S. Department of Agriculture National Agricultural Statistics Service," said Roel Lopez, Ph.D., director of the NRI. "This most recent report is the fifth iteration and specifically describes the status and recent changes in land values, ownership size and land use of privately-owned Texas working lands."

Lopez said some highlights of the report relate to the areas of population growth, land values, ownership size and working lands.

Population Growth

Texas contains seven of the top 15 most rapidly growing cities in the nation. From 1997 to 2017, the Texas population increased 48% from 19 million to 29 million residents or nearly 470,000 new residents annually. Eighty-six percent of the population increase occurred within the state's top 25 highest growth counties.

As with previous land-trend reports, the largest increases in land values were observed in proximity to major metropolitan areas. The average appraised market value of Texas working lands was 1,951/a cre in 2017, a 24% increase from 2012 and a 291% increase for the 20-year period.


Ownership Size

Texas gained approximately 1,000 new working operations per year from 1997 to 2017, totaling greater than 248,000 ownerships in all. Average ownership size declined from 581 acres in 1997 to 509 acres in 2017. Small operations of less than 100 acres in size were 58% of all ownerships but only accounted for 4% of land devoted to working lands.

Working Lands

Texas lost more than 2.2 million acres of working lands from 1997-2017. (Texas A&M AgriLife Re-

From 1997 to 2017, Texas lost approximately 2.2 million acres of working lands by way of those lands being converted to non-agricultural uses.



There was a decline of nearly 1.2 million acres as a result of this conversion over the last five-year period alone. Accounting for the majority of working lands in the state, grazing lands have been steadily decreasing since 1997, losing and/or converting roughly 4.6 million acres to other land uses over the 20-year period. Wildlife management acres have significantly increased in recent years, now totaling approximately 5.4 million acres, up from about 94,000 in 1997.

"The report shows as Texas continues to grow in population and economy, the demand for rural land, especially in areas surrounding major urban centers and transportation corridors, will continue to increase and have long-term impacts on working lands." Lopez said. "Lands across the state are following much of the same trends in ownership fragmentation and conversion in the last five-year period as have been observed in previous years since

He also noted population growth and increasing land values are creating incentives for landowners to subdivide and sell their land.

"As ownership sizes decrease, the likelihood of maintaining a profit with traditional farming, ranching, and forestry uses also decreases, facilitating the conversion of working lands to non-agri



hope that they will win, but once in a while a situation arises where declarer hopes a finesse will lose This seeming paradox is illus-

trated by today's deal where declarer had to find the best line of play at three notrump. After taking East's king of spades with the ace at trick one, he naturally concluded that his best chance for the contract was to try to make use of dummy's long diamond suit.

However, instead of playing the king and another diamond and finess-

ing the jack, which seems the normal thing to do, South led the five of diamonds to the jack at trick two, hoping to lose to the queen. But East smartly declined to cooperate with declarer's plan and allowed the jack to win the

South thereupon led a club to his queen, and after the finesse succeeded, he next played the king of diamonds and overtook it with dummy's ace. He was hoping that either East or West had started with the Q-x of diamonds, in which case he would score six diamond tricks.

But when the queen did not fall, declarer countered by leading a club to the jack, then continued with the ace and another club. As a result, he finished with 10 tricks consisting of two spades, two hearts, two dia-

monds and four clubs. On balance, declarer's method of play, though unusual, was the most flexible choice in a difficult situation. If he instead starts by playing the K-x of diamonds, planning to finesse, he has very little chance of making the contract if the finesse loses. But if he begins as he did by leading the five of diamonds to the jack, he not only retains a reasonable chance of scoring five or six diamond tricks, but also gives himself the alternative possibility of utilizing his club suit to get home safely.





Texas Drilling Permits and Completions Statistics for December 2019

Special to the Herald

AUSTIN — The Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) issued a total of 803 original drilling permits in December 2019 compared to 811 in December 2018. The December 2019 total included 743 permits to drill new oil or gas wells, 8 to re-enter plugged well bores and 52 for re-completions of existing well bores. The breakdown of well types for those permits is 162 oil, 37 gas, 571 oil or gas, 23 injection, zero service and 10 other permits.

In December 2019, Commission staff processed 491 oil, 98 gas, 17 injection and three other completions compared to 564 oil, 156 gas, 27 injection and three other completions in December 2018. Total well completions processed for 2019 year to date are 9,238; down from 10,986 recorded during the same time period

According to Baker Hughes Inc., the Texas rig count as of Jan. 3 was 403, representing about 51 percent of all active rigs in the United States.

Another major US dairy, Borden, seeks bankruptcy protection

The U.S. dairy industry, the largest in the world, is under severe pressure as the consumption habits of Americans shift.

Borden Dairy Co. filed for bankruptcy protection, the second major U.S dairy to do so in as many months. Borden produces nearly 500 million gallons of milk each year for groceries, schools and others. It employs 3,300 people and runs 12 plants across the U.S.

American refrigerators are increasingly stocked with juice, soda and milk substitutes made from soy or almonds. At the same time, protein bars, vogurts and other on-the-go breakfasts have replaced a morning bowl of cereal. That has hammered traditional milk producers like Borden, which was founded in 1857.

The amount of liquid milk consumed per capita in the U.S. has tumbled more than 40% since 1975. Americans drank around 24 gallons a year in 1996, according to government data. That dropped to 17 gallons in 2018. As milk consumption has fallen, dairy farms have closed their doors. In

court filings, Borden says 2,730 U.S. dairy farms have gone out of business

in the last 18 months alone. The remaining farms can command higher prices, but that pinches Borden, which can't charge consumers more because of pressure from big competitors like Walmart. Walmart opened its own milk processing plant in Indiana in 2018. "Despite our numerous achievements during the past 18 months, the company continues to be impacted by the rising cost of raw milk and market

challenges facing the dairy industry," said Borden CEO Tony Sarsam in a prepared statement late Sunday. "These challenges have contributed to making our current level of debt unsustainable." Borden tried to revive sales last year by relaunching its iconic mascot Elsie, the smiling cow that first appeared on milk cartons in the 1930s. It also

released new products like gingerbread-flavored eggnog and Kid Builder, a

children's milk with higher levels of protein and calcium designed to compete with Fairlife, a trendy milk brand made by Coca-Cola Co. Borden said sales rose, but not enough to offset broader trends in the industry. Dean Foods, the nation's largest milk producer, filed for bankruptcy protection in November. Both dairies are based in Dallas. The two companies controlled about 13.5% of U.S. milk sales last year, according to Euromoni-

tor, a consulting firm. Like Dean, Borden says it will continue to operate during its restructuring. Late last month, a Texas federal bankruptcy court allowed Dean to access \$850 million in debtor-in-possession financing.


