Mundred Mile Winds Veer Around Rockport

County Has Negligible Damage From High Tides and Wind "Puffs" From Storm

Ziz-zagging about in the Gulf of Mexico for several days, a treacherous tropical hurricane headed for Rockport Monday then veered in its course and Tuesday went inland a hundred miles up the coast from

Little attention was paid the storm warnings here until the two red flags with black center squares were hoisted-meaning that winds of a hundred miles per hour or more were headed toward this section. Tourists and vacationists were advised to leave until the tropical storm had passed Citizens went calmly about boarding up their homes and places of business. By nightfall the front of almost every place of business resembled a huge crate, as did homes with boards nailed across windows.

Some of the residents left to go farther inland Monday night. Half a dozen people stayed all night in the county courthouse On Tuesday the guests were gone and the storm scare provided a holiday for them. Strong winds out of the north and northwest held the high tides back from Lamar and Live Oak peninsulas. The situation would have been dangerous had the wind

changed and come in from the east. Most serious of the damage here from the high tides and strong wind puffs was to the beach drives. In only a few spots the drives were cut into slightly by the water, but

is plenty of refined sugar for civilian needs. Production in the next few months, plus the reserve stocks of beet and cane sugar refinersamounting to over 1,550,000 tonswill be more than enough to meet consumer demands until the next

Only problem is what government experts term "mal-location." Due to consumer hoarding, stocks in the East are below normal, though rapidly being replenished from the topheavy reserves of refineries in other sections, chiefly the Gulf states.

As a double precaution, the agriculture department has approved sharp increases in 1941 marketing quotas, which were stepped up to 9,002,976 tons. This is 2,386,000 tons more than the quotas announced at the beginning of the year and a million tons greater than those ap-

Some sugar-producing areas, including Cuba, are not expected to supply their enlarged quotas, due to heavy drains on their raw stocks, but Puerto Rico and U. S. beet areas maimed or disfigured by modern have plenty of supplies on hand to meet the new marketing allotments,


