water to the cities in 1970, Reasons for the Water Development Board's interest are: (1) it is loaning the Authority \$730,400 and (2) will purchase the Authority's bonds at a rate

Thorough study proved that the Millers Creek location is the only one where a reservoir of capacity sufficient to serve the entire area can be built. It is designed to meet needs of the cities of Haskell, Knox, Baylor, Stonewall and Throckmorton counties for the coming 50 years. growth of the cities during the next half century.

Lake Stamford has been suggested as a possible source of water for Haskell, Rule and other cities of the area. Several qualified engineers have studied the water yield from that lake and have determined that it is

If your tax return is selected for audit, there is no reason for panic on the other hand, there is no reason for you to be enraged or feel "picked on." Internal Revenue audits several million returns each year after the computer has corrected the math and taken umbrage at a number of careless errors. The Internal Revenue Agent is a well - trained, professional employee. A part of his training is to be fair. He has the same responsibility for seeing that you get extra deductions that you missed as he does for seeing that the government gets all the tax due from you. A large part of the tax audits result in the taxpayer verifying his questioned items and receiving no change in his tax liability. About 7% of those audited receive a refund, due to the Internal Revenue Agent finding additional tax credits or deduc-

So - gather your records, review your return with the Agent in a business-like manner. If you don't agree with his findings, exercise your appeal





Surface Pollution

Pollution of the water well supplies from the surface is a problem about which little has been said. The present wells are quite shallow and it is impossthie to case them to prevent pollution from the surface.

The State Department of Health has advised that it will be unable to approve the four cities' water supplies so long as they use the untreated underground water.

In order to meet the Health Department standards, city would be required to build and operate its own separate treatment plan, which would be quite expensive. That type of freatment would not, however. remove the nitrates. That would have to be accomplished by distillation or some other costly process. The cost of treatment and distillation of the underground water would be higher than that for surface water from Millers Creek, the engineers have determined.

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

Tolerance of violence and property destruction may diminish when the price of our "permissive anarchy" hits home. An inkling of that price has been given by a spokesman for the insurance industry. He says, "No business...can continue to operate in a society where order, reason and confidence do not prevail. The insurance business alone cannot continue to offer security to property owners when these spasms of lawlessness which at times seems to approach insurrection become so widespread and frequent..."

No business or industry can turn a wheel without insurance. Legislation is now pending in Congress for the federal government ...the taxpayers...to provide reinsurance. However much one may deplore further involvement of government in the financial and economic life of the nation, the alternatives in this instance are even more grim. Excessive riot losses could bring about a total collapse of insurance coverage in metropolitan centers. Whether the taxpayers could then be expected to assume the awesome cost of rebuilding and insuring our cities is doubtful.

Re-establishment of law and order in the land is the only permanent solution. On this depends our survival as a nation, We should not lose sight of the fact that a subsidy for anarchy in the form of taxpayer guaranteed insurance coverage for the uninsurable risk of urban welfare is a stop-gap measure. There's some magic about this fish that's difficult to describe. It isn't a very sporting fish, not really. It bites in a series of light tap-taps, and when hooked it battles deep in tight figure eights. surrendering after only a brief fling of energy. Perhaps the basic motivation behind its inherent popularity is that it is an epicure's delight on the dinner platter. Many fishermen claim the crappie has the best flavor of any fish, bar none. It is a kind of sweet, succulent meat. Best way to cook one, they say, is to lop off the head, gut it and fry whole, a rich golden brown.

Two species of crapple are found in Texas-the white and black crappie. Offhand, it is al-most impossible to tell them apart. A large male of the white species might be almost entirely black, Only sure-fire identification is to count the spines in the dorsal fin. If it has five or six spines, you've got yourself a white crapple; seven or eight and it belongs to the black fam-

Actually, most fishermen could care less whether it is white or black. All they like to do is eatch them ... and the more the merrier. Fortunately for anglers, crapple have a way of cooperating quite nicely. Another good thing about the crappie is that they are school fish and where you catch one, you'll likely take several.

Any kind of rod and reel can be used for crappie fishing, and if the water is shallow enough, an ordinary canepole will suf-fice. Tie about a No. 1 thinshanked book on the end of your line, add a clinch-on sinker about eight inches up and you're
