

Dr. Alice Brown, Repatriated Missionary Speaks at Rio Theatre

Dr. Alice Brown of Corpus, who returned recently on the Gripsholm with a group of repatriates from a Japanese internment camp, was presented to the citizens of Rockport, at the Rio Theatre last Thursday afternoon by the members of the Woman's Guild of St. Peter's Episcopal Church. The Rev. George W. Walton, rector, gave the invocation and Scripture readings, after which he introduced the speaker.

Dr. Brown, who had been a medical missionary from the Episcopal church, had lived and served in China for 20 years and spoke of the Chineses provinces, their customs, life in the homes of the rich dress and the characteristics of the Chinese people. She also described living and social conditions in the concentration camp for 6 months, where she was one of 1800 internees and of her trip back home on the Gripsholm.



Can't you make some new items in your oil mill, your feed mill, your planing mill, your big garages, your machine shops, etc.? This will give jobs to these better trained men when they come home and keep population and purchasing power, for some of these boys are going to leave your community if there are no jobs and no opportunities for them. Wouldn't you, if you were in their places?

"Then there are new industries, new small factories that can be started working. Just a few people could start making some useful articles, and there are thousands of items to be explored in this field; they could be made just as well in your town as in the larger cities, and in some instances at a lower cost. Today the consumer isn't interested in what town an article is made ;it's the quality, the usefulness, and the price.

"You can't wait until the war is over and the boys come home to do your thinking and planning, and to make preparations. The time. to prepare is now, or the community that has planned and has made opportunities will get your boys. It seems to me that the boys in the war have a right to depend on you and me to do the best job we can for them, and that our respective communities in this state have a right to expect that their leading business men should get out and take the lead. The road that can't be traveled leads "no place", so it isn't enough for you and me to say that we are ready to help if someone will start something, and to do it now."


