OPA Forbids Tie-In Sales With Drinks

Reports of "tie-in" sales, in which foods, bottled drinks, soap and soap powder, and other items are sold only if the customer buys an additional item which has not been requested are being reported in increasing numbers, Herman Hildebrand, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, has announced.

Such sales are illegal, Hilaebrand explained, OPA regulations expressly prohibit them. Bottled drinks, for example, are offered warm, and an extra nickle is charged for ice. In some areas the scarcity of soap has led to tie-in sales of soap and soap powder. Certain scarce food items are sold only if other food items are purchased. All such sales are illegal and should be reported to the local board, Hildebrand saiid.


