Mrs. J. P. Hanway World War I Nurse, Still in War Work

Doing her share to aid the war effort is Mrs. J. P. Hanway, who is Secretary of Home Nursing for the American National Red Cross. Mrs. Hanway has been a member of the Red Cross Nursing Staff for over twenty years and since war was declared, she has conducted three classes in Home Nursing and is to open a new class next month.

In addition to her Red Cross duties and Nursing Classes, Mrs. Hanway has done valuable work in assisting out-of-town doctors in taking care of their patients here. This has been a great aid to many people, since doctors are so much busier during war-time conditions and since travelling is such a problem.

Speaking of her new class, Mrs. Hanway stated that she would appreciate it if those who are interested in taking the course would telephone her because the hour for holding the class will depend on the most convenient time for those taking it.

The Standard Class, which she gives, will run 45 hours and covers hygiene, child care and home nursing. Those completing the course will be in a position to give efficient help in case of an emergency in the community.

Mrs. Hanway, who has resided here for ten years, was born in Birmingham, Ala. She attended school in Birmingham and took her nurse's training in Chattanooga, Tenn. After a private practice of seven years, she joined the Army Nurse Corp as a 2nd lieutenant in 1922. She was stationed at Fort Sam Houston for the eleven years she was an Army Nurse.

"A good many patients were veterans of World War I," Mrs. Hanway explained, "and it makes it very understanding to me why they are begging for nurses now."

Following her army work, Mrs. Hanway spent a year in Arizona in the United States Indian Service. She admitted that the Indians led a colorful life but that she took care of hospital patients and that the hospital work was about the same as in any other hospital. Most of her work dealt with tuberculosis.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanway have two children. Their son, Capt. Jimmy Hanway Jr. is in the signal corp and is radar officer for the Central Pacific. He has been in the army since 1942. Her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ankele, have recently moved to Rockport. The Hanways have three grandchildren: James Edwin and Terrie Lee Ankele and Linda Lee Hanway.

Mr. Hanway has a radio service and sales business here.

Proposed Road Would Link Gregory, Bayside and Woodsboro

Chas. T. Picton this week accepted chairmanship of the Red Cross War Fund campaign for Aransas county after being renominated to the post by the executive committee of the Aransas County Chapter of the Red Cross. He served as chairman of the fund raising committee last year.

A quota of \$2,700 was assigned for Aransas county to subscribe during the 30-day period beginning March 1, when the National campaign opens. This is a \$300 increase over last year's quota of \$2,400 for the county.

The increase is due to a greater demand on Red Cross services in the war zones, and a twenty-million dollar increase in funds is sought nationally.

Picton will announce plans for the local campaign at an early date.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24—The goal of the Red Cross War Fund campaign in March has been increased to \$200,000,000 from \$180,000,000 as a result of mounting demands for Red Cross services in the European and Pacific theaters of war, Chairman Basil O'Connor announced today after conferring with Colby M. Chester, national chairman of the campaign.

The decision to increase the goal has been telegraphed to the chapter following a meeting of the Red Cross central committee, governing body of the organization, Mr. O'Connor said.

"It is obvious that the estimates we made last fall for our War Fund campaign in March are now inadequate," Mr. O'Connor said. "Accordingly we have revised our goal to meet this new situation. I am confident the American public will respond generously to this emergency when the campaign opens on March 1."

Jesus Solis Wounded In Belgian Fight

Structure Will Replace School Department Destroyed by Fire

Bids for reconstruction of the home making department of the Rockport school will be open Friday, Jan. 26, and all interested parties may obtain plans and specifications by calling at the business office of the board of education at the school, between Friday, Jan. 26 and Feb. 3. All bids must be in by 4 p. m. Saturday, Feb. 3, 1945.

Supt. Morgan Wheeler said today that the Sparks Colony house would be used in construction of the new home-making department. The modern new cottage will be built northwest of the present high school.

The cottage will include a laboratory, which will include kitchen facilities and those for sewing, a living room and bedroom with bath. This type of building will give the students experience under actual conditions in home making. The girls will make curtains and do the interior decorating of the cottage when it is complete.

Large enough to care for a class of sixteen at a time, the new cottage will meet all state and federal requirements. This will make the local home-making department eligible for federal salary and equipment assistance after the war.

Following the recent consolidation election with Sparks Colony school, the building at Sparks Colony became available for the project. The present industrial building will also be used in constructing the new home-making cottage.

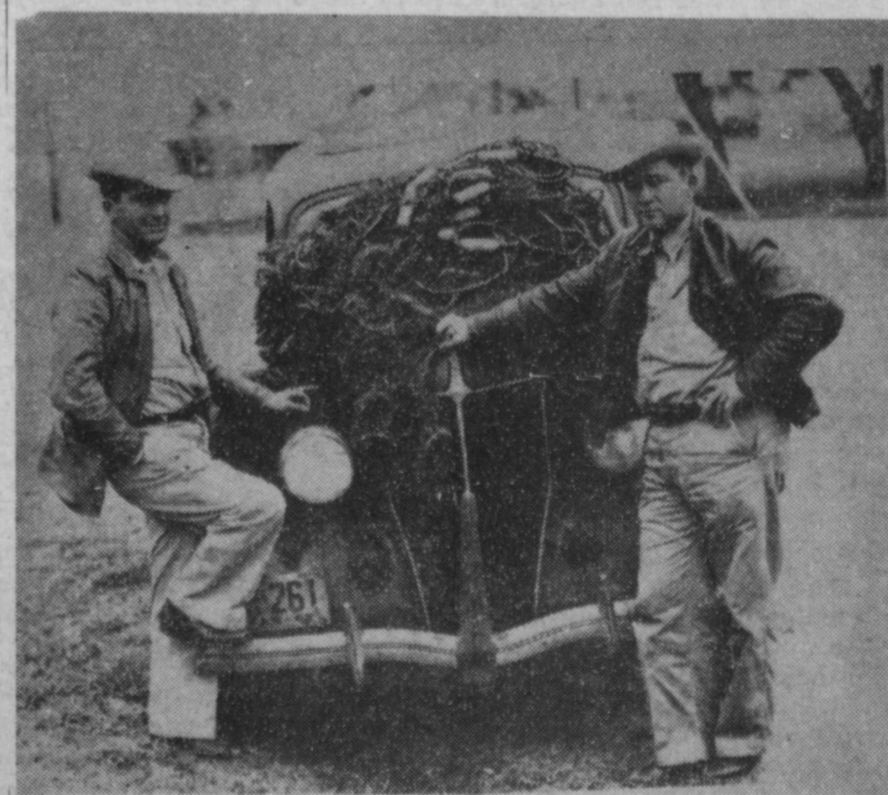
John Peres Injured By 'Wild' Drill

Solicitation of Funds For Red Cross to Begin March 1

County Judge B. S. Fox will go to Austin next week to file an application with the State Highway Department for the designation of a farm to market road from Gregory to Bayside and Woodsboro, of which two and a half miles would be in Aransas county.

The route is being used at present and is paved with the exception of a quarter mile in San Patricio county and two and a half miles in Aransas county, and at Bayside causeway bridgehead.

The designation of the road would be no expense to Aransas county, Judge Fox stated, because there is already a 100 foot right-of-way through the county. He said that if the road is taken over by the state it would save Aransas county considerable expense in maintaining the two and a half mile strip.

The application will be accompanied by resolutions from Aransas, San Patricio and Refugio county commissioners courts, promising full co-operation and to furnish right-of-way.
