

Election Set Tentatively August 13 For NTMWA Water Purchase Contracts

Election for water purchase contracts for the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority has been tentatively set for August 13th.

The project has been engineered and the financing planned, so that the Authority can operate and retire its debt from the net operating revenues.

Each city in the NCTMWA will pay the Authority for a stated amount of water in an amount sufficient to assure the Authority its operating expenses and debt payment—26¢ per 1,000 gallons being projected at this time to member cities.

A low rate of interest will be charged on the \$3,000,000.00 bonds—3.70%. If the bonds were to be sold on the "open market" the rate would be 5% or more. The savings in interest between 3.70% and 5% is more than \$1,000,000.00.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development is giving the Authority \$1,500,000.00.

The Texas Water Development Board is purchasing Surplus Water Storage rights in the lake for \$730,000.00. This storage may be purchased from the Texas Water Development Board in the future as needed. This makes a total of \$2,230,000 assistance to the Water Authority.

L. B. Patterson, president of the board of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, said: "When your city calls the election for approval of the water purchase contract, every qualified voter is urged to go to the polls and vote."

Member cities of the Authority are Haskell, Munday, Goree and Rule.

Haskell County Sheriff's Posse Places First At Santa Fe, N. M.

The Haskell County Sheriff's Posse, the "winningest" and one of the most colorful riding clubs of West Texas, won first place parade honors at Santa Fe, New Mexico last Thursday, and rode in the grand entry at the rodeo that night.

Sporting red and white gear, the club has gained a lot of publicity as it has carried the name of Haskell to rodeos and stock shows over a two-state area. The riders regularly make rodeos in west and central Texas and have won honors three times at the New Mexico State Fair at Albuquerque.

Last Thursday was the first time the club had performed at Santa Fe, and with 18 riders strong, competing against some 15 or more riding clubs, president Gene Hunter's proteges hit the jackpot.

The club has made eight rodeo trips this season, and has

brought home eight trophies including five first places; one second and two third places. Honors include first at Pduch, Throckmorton, Rota, Stamford and Santa Fe; second at San Angelo and third at Baird and Olney.

Every Palomino of the club is equipped with white bridles, white harness and red and white Navajo blanket. Riders wear red satin shirts and white neckerchiefs. Riding chaps are cream-colored with the letters H-A-S-K-E-L-L in red.

Other officers of the Haskell County Sheriff's Posse, other than "Prexy" Hunter, are C. O. Holl, secretary; Otto Baumhach, parade captain; and Adel Thomas, chuck wagon boss.

The club will head for Seymour, today, Thursday, July 18th, to ride in the parade and grand entry tonight and on the 25th will be in Brownwood.

Stitching And Stewing

Although meat, poultry and fish are available year around there are times when they are more plentiful and cheaper. Take advantage of these times to stock your freezer.

These frozen products equal the fresh items in nutritive value, original flavor and color, if properly packaged and frozen. Freezing does not improve meat so it is important to select good quality, government-inspected products. Look for the U. S. Prime, Choice or Good Grades.

If you are butchering beef or lamb, remember aging improves the tenderness and flavor. Age a choice 300-pound calf carcass at least six to seven days at a uniform temperature of 37 to 40 degrees F. Let choice 500 or 600-pound carcass hang at least 10 days or two weeks. Age lamb no longer than seven days.

Cut meat according to best improved methods. Boneless cuts save freezer space. But it is best not to bone steaks, chops, short ribs and legs of lamb.

Freeze the size package required for a meal. Thawing and then refreezing lowers the quality of the product. Cut poultry into serving pieces to save space and add convenience.

Pre-packaged self-service meats may be stored in the freezer for one to two weeks in the well-sealed store package. For longer freezer storage, over-wrap or rewrap with special freezer material.

Meats should be wrapped tightly in moisture-vapor-resistant material to prevent discoloration of the skin and flesh by drying. At low temperature, air is very dry and will absorb moisture from improperly packaged food leaving it dry.

Known as freezer burn, this condition leaves the meat dry, tough and less flavorful.

Crayon or china or felt tipped marking pencils work well to label packages with the name of the product and date packaged.

Fish should be frozen immediately after the catch because it deteriorates rapidly. If this is not possible, pack in ice until it can be dressed.

Prepare for cooking: remove fins, head, tail, entrails and scales. Wash and dip in a salt solution of one cup salt to one gallon water for one minute.

Then wrap the fish tightly in moisture-vapor proof material and freeze immediately.

To freeze shrimp, remove the heads and dark vein. Pack as soon as possible. Wash the shrimp in salt water (2 table spoons for one quart water). Drain thoroughly and package and freeze immediately. They can be frozen shelled or unshelled.

You may cook frozen or with thawing. When meat is completely or partially thawed, it is cooked as fresh meat. If frozen solid, roasts require about one and a half times as long to cook as they otherwise would.

Stewing or braising meats may not have to be cooked as long as usual because of the tenderizing effect of freezing.

Storage Table for High Quality Home-Frozen Meats & Poultry at 0° F.

Beef—6-12 months. Lamb and Veal—6-9 months. Pork, fresh—3-6 months. Sausage and Ground Meat—1-3 months.

Cooked meat or poultry (not covered with gravy or other sauces)—1 month. Meat Sandwiches—1 month. Chickens—12 months. Turkeys—6 months.

Cooked poultry meat covered with broth or gravy—6 months. Cooked poultry dishes—3-6 months.

These products will be safe to eat if stored for longer periods of time, but may lose some of their quality.

The Good Earth

By Mrs. B. E. Cobb

It seems that powdery mildew has invaded gardens in Haskell. If your plants have a white powder on the foliage it is a good guess it is powdery mildew. If all lower foliage is pulled from the plant and if things are not too crowded in the flower bed, there is a good chance of combating the fungus. Mildew thrives in tight, airless beds. Trimming foliage off lets air circulate around plants. I removed the first five or six leaves from my Dahlias and the mildew disappeared; of course, if the whole plant has been invaded, there isn't much chance of stopping the damaging disease. Sulphur in the flower beds helps cut down on all fungus. I failed to put any in the soil around my Dahlias, so they had a few spots of mildew.

There is also an invasion of spider mites this year. If on examination the microscopic insects are detected, dust the beds with sulphur then apply as strong a stream of water as possible to the plant, being sure to wash under the leaves as well as on the top. The tiny insects will wash down into the sulphur and die. It may take two or three times of this method before the mites begin to thin out noticeably.

There are two or three ways of determining if the plant has spider mites...the under side of the leaves will contain webs, on close examination the tiny insect can be seen crawling, foliage will be specked with tiny white specks where the mites feed. The lower leaves of tomatoes are favorite food for the pests.

Zinnias planted up to the 16th or 18th of the month will have time to mature before frost. Start preparing beds for fall greens and other vegetables. It is good to work some all-purpose fertilizer into the soil, rake out all clods and let the soil settle before incorporating seed into the bed.

Those lucky enough to have good compost should work it into the beds. It is still a good idea to use a little commercial fertilizer even when organic matter is used.

Cut off all old blossoms and damaged foliage so plants can renew their blooming trend as soon as cool weather makes an appearance.

Do not forget to look for seed pods, flowers, and foliage that will make an attractive winter arrangement.

One part Borax to four parts corn meal makes a good medium for drying flowers. One part glycerine and three parts water is used to treat foliage for lasting beauty. Have the water warm, select the size of limb you would like to treat...

peel about three inches of the bark off at the base place the stem into glycerine solution until the foliage becomes soft and pliable. Treated leaves will turn several different colors, from reddish brown to nearly black. The type of foliage and the length of time it is left in the glycerine water will determine the color.

Magnolia, oak, photinia and loquat leaves are turned into lasting beauty by the use of glycerine.

Haskell Garden Club members should begin to prepare and groom plants for the fall show.

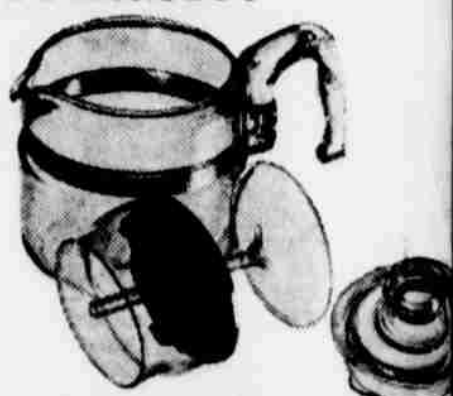

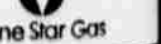

OIL NOTES

HASKELL DISCOVERY
John Chalmers of Abilene has completed No. 1 M. M. Cobb as a Flippin Sand discovery 15 miles east of Stamford in Haskell County.

Location is 2,310 feet from the north line and 900 feet from the east line of Section 3, Block 3, H&TC Survey on an 80-acre lease.

The well potentialized 18 barrels in 24 hours. It is pumping from perforations at 1,524-30 ft.

On a drillstem test the gas surfaced in 37 minutes and recovered 250 feet of oil. Initial shut-in pressure was 630 lbs. in 30 minutes. Final shut-in pressure was 615 pounds in 30 minutes.

A project was plugged back to 5,032 feet from 5,321 feet and recomplected in the Sojourner (4,600-foot) Field four miles west of Haskell.

It is Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1-C E. O. Miller, 1,650 feet from the south and 1,470 feet from the west lines of Section 41, Block 1, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 74 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil. It is pumping from perforations at 4,742-50 feet, treated with 250 gallons of acid. The 5/8-inch casing is set at 5,296 feet.

Crown Central Petroleum Corp. staked No. 5-A Sallie E. Cloud in the Herrin (Upper Burson) Field five miles northwest of Haskell.

Having a proposed depth of 5,000 feet with rotary, it spots 1,630 feet from the north and 1,700 feet from the west lines of Lot 7, Coryell CSL Survey 72.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. filed application to re-enter and deepen to 5000 feet at a project five miles southwest of Weinert in the Weinert (Strawn) Field. It is to be an injection well in a waterflood.

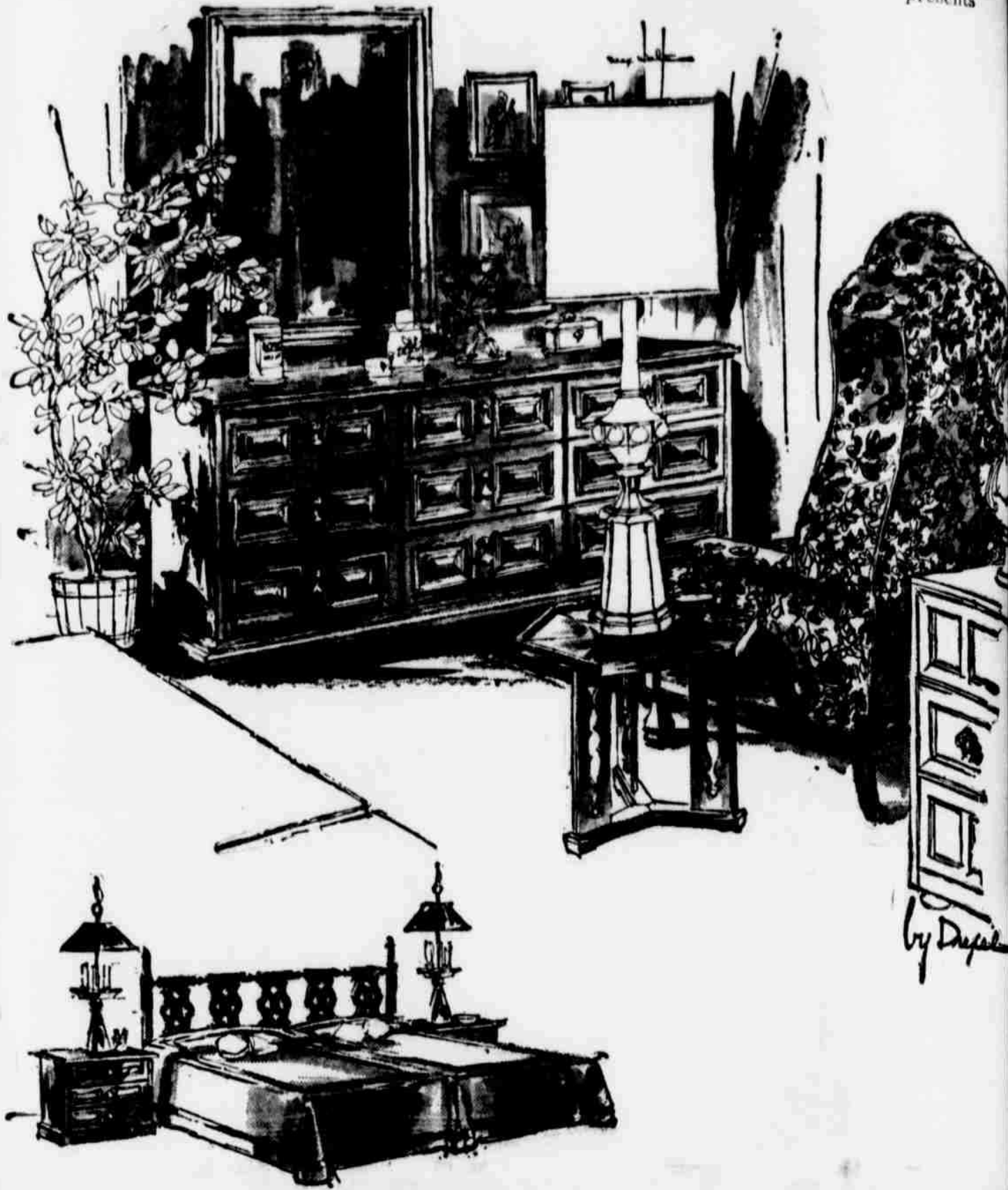
