Teacher Training
Discussed At
Kingsville Meet

About 200 men and women from South Texas schools in 28 counties attended a conference of school administrators held by the Gulf Coast Executive Association at Kingsville Monday night.

The executive committee, consisting of Morgan C. Wheeler, superintendent of Rockport schools, chairman; Principal Stewart of Sinton, Principal Holloway of Kingsville, Supt. Herndon of Odem, and W. W. Galligan, Laredo superintendent, met before the assembly and planned the work of the association for the year.

The theme of the work will be "In-service training for teachers" meaning training teachers in how to teach while they are teaching.

At the assembly in Lofton Hall, the Sinton High School band and Choral Club presented a musical program. M. P. Baker, superintendent of Corpus Christi schools, asked 100 per cent membership in Texas State Teachers Association and solid backing for Ernest H. Poteet, superintendent of Harlingen schools, as first vice-president of the association.

Main speaker of the evening was Dr. George Mechem, in-service training supervisor of Corpus Christi Independent School District, on leave from Texas Tech. His talk was on the use of material and thought in supervising teachers in local schools.

The next meeting will be Nov. 19 when Superintendent Burnett of Bishop will be in charge of the program.

Pre-game odds fell like a thunder shower last Friday night when a fighting little team of Rockport Pirates fought every minute of the game to hold a more out-classed and powerful Ingleside eleven to a 33-7 score. Only the lack of mass defense did it cause the Pirates to be beaten at all.

The Mustangs lost no time in making their first score. In the opening minutes of the game and after trying line plunges to no avail, the Mustangs' Dahman-Offor pass combination connected to bring the ball down on the Pirates' 10 yard line. Two plays later Walker plunged for the first score. Dahman's kick for extra point failed.

After exchange of plays which placed the ball on the Pirate 45 yard line, Offer took a pass in an open Pirate defense area and scored standing up.

Dahman's try for extra point was good. The third Mustang tally came on the first play after the Pirates received the second quarter kickoff. A pass from Mundine intended for Rowe was intercepted by Dahman who carried the ball 40 yards to score. Extra point failed. In the closing minutes of the first half, Offer again took a pass from Dahman to score and the extra point by Dahman run the Mustang score 27-0.

C. P. and L. Takes
Power Line To
Lamar By Nov. 1

On or before Nov. 1, Lamar will be switched onto a Central Power and Light Company line and receive the first electric power ever brought in to serve the whole community.

Fifteen miles of line was brought down by C P & L from Tivoli and runs through Lamar, Goose Island and to Saint Charles Bay Club. The construction line built by a Victoria crew has now reached the beacon. A Sinton crew has completed the wiring at Lamar.

A line of 11,000 voltage is run into Lamar with eight transformers to reduce the voltage to 110 for household use. Connections are being made in 25 Lamar homes. This area will be serviced by the Rockport CP&L office. Rural customers along the highway will be picked up by the line and serviced out of Victoria.

Previously the only power at Lamar was furnished by portable plants or small power units. A diesel engine owned by Jimmie Heard served a number of buildings but could not handle the necessary load.
