Explosion Demolishes A. L. Bracht Food Store

City Council To Ask Cmmissioners Court For Joint Tax Session

Jarring Blast Shatters Windows Over Wide Area

Explosion Felt For Miles, Believed Caused By Faulty Gas Line

Bracht Bros. Grocery was flattened Monday night by a terrific explosion that shattered windows in buildings four to five blocks away. Flying debris from the jarring blast short-circuited high voltage power lines and threw the city into darkness for nearly an

Tremors and concussion of blast felt for miles around, the accompaning glaring flash as a huge ball of fire literally rolled down the shorted power lines, and then complete darkness brought excitement and confusion to almost every home in the city.

The small, but heavily stocked grocery store, was demolished by the blast. Fire blazed brightly for a short time after the detonation, but the fire department responded promptly and the blaze was brought under control,

Across the street to the east the Urban Hemmi's Humble Station caught full force of the blast. way roof was ripped open, and cans of oil and other merchandise was blown off shelves. Thompson's Spa, across the street to the north, also suffered heavy glass damage. Some fifty window panes were shattered in property across the street to the north of the wrecked store.

At the A. O. Freeman residence four blocks away, two windows were knocked out by the concussion. Glass was also broken at the home of Mrs. Nannie Dean near the school house. The home of A. L. Bracht, owner of the store, a block away had one window broken.

No one was injured by the explosion, which fortunately occured after everyone had left the store and filling station across the street, and no one was passing along the street or high-

Luckiest person involved in the explosion was perhaps Tom W. Brown, who was asleep in his trailer house only 50 feet to the rear of the store. Brown was momenwas unhurt. The trailer house was not damaged, but a huge piece of home with her. plaster landed only a few feet from one corner of the trailer. Mrs. Brown was in Victoria at the time.

"It did something to me," Brown said. "It seemed like I was asleep and couldn't wake up. I have never been in that shape before."

Brown said that when he looked out the window of his trailer the store was blazing and the gas tank outside was spouting fire.

Harry Mills, city fire marshal, made an investigation Tuesday

morning. "I don't know how - for sure but the store evidently became filled with gas," Mills said. "As near as I could figure out, they had moved a stove during the day The stove had a bad hose. It may have leaked badly, or the cock

could have been left open." The fire marshal said he believed the blast occured when a spark from the electric refrigerator motor ignited the gas.

City Election Ballot May Be Blank City Jobs May Be Anybody's

Thru Write-Ins

Present Council And Mayor Indicate They Will Accept if Elected

With the city's election ballot for next Tuesday still a blank and a lack-of-interest light vote likely, anybody could be elected to the three vacancies as aldermen and mayor. It is possible, however, for candidates to file, or petitions be presented to place names on the ballot.

Members of the council up for re-election at this time have indicated they would accept the places they now hold if re-elected. Those include Mayor Albert Colli-er and Aldermen Arley Shivers Lloyd Lassiter Those include Mayor Albert Colliand W. D. Allen, however, none of them have filed or made public statement to the effect they would be candidates for re-election. They may do so, or their names may be

placed on the ballot by petition. Unless there are names printed on the ballot to guide voters, then it may be anybody's race.

Joe Johnson appears likely as a good bet for election as mayor in a blank-ballot election - even though he has said definitely that he would not accept the job if elec-Johnson's "candidacy" start ed last week - unbeknownst to him, and to his discomfiture when overnight the main street was placarded with hand-drawn caricatures and wording urging people to "vote for Johnson for Mayor", because he was for "pensions, a barbecue pit in every yard, prohibition, and a diplomat.'

Johnson was a bit puzzled about the whole thing, but one thing was certain, he said: "I wouldn't take the job - positively."

"If they elect me they are just going to have the expense of another election, because I wouldn't have the job," Johnson emphasized. Johnson's statement, however, probably won't prevent his "backers" from waggishly carrying on his "campaign", especially if the election ballot is blank.

Mayor Aibert Collier, who last week said that he would not be a candidate for re-election and could not take the post again, has indicated that if elected he would continue in office if the old council stayed on.




