

FIRST POLIO CASES REPORTED IN ROCKPORT

Along The Waterfront

Polio Specialist Says No Need For Alarm In Rockport

A polio specialist connected with the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children said in an interview with a Pilot reporter today that there was no need for alarm in Rockport over the two cases of poliomyelitis, one of which resulted in death, reported here.

The specialist declared there was practically no danger of contagion. He pointed out that hospitals in the big metropolitan centers no longer isolate polio cases. He does not believe there is any need for a quarantine under present conditions.

Frozen Food and Locker Plant Will Open Here About July 1

Charles A. Roe has announced that the new frozen food and locker plant, of which he is co-owner with A. R. Steirly, will open around July 1.

The plant, equipped with 315 lockers and two large storerooms for frozen foods, will be the only one of its kind in Aransas County and one of the few such establishments in South Texas. Mr. Roe, who owns the Modern Market and has been in the market retail business for many years, will manage the plant and operate a retail meat market in connection with it.

Assessments For Filing Decided By Committee

The Democratic Executive Committee of Aransas County met last Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock for the purpose of determining assessments against candidates for election expenses.

John Haynes was appointed to the committee to fill the vacancy left by James C. Herring, a former member who has filed for county-district clerk.

Approximately \$500 will be needed to defray the expenses of the election, and Chairman Jack Blackwell proposed assessments that will give the committee a small operating margin. He said the surplus could either be refunded after election, or maintained as an operating fund. New ballot boxes will have to be purchased in the near future, he said, and other expenses will be incurred.

Blackwell pointed out that the fee for filing is the only source of revenue the committee has with which to defray these expenses. A fund of about \$70 has been accumulated from past elections.

The committee voted the assessments, and Miss Iris Sorensen, secretary, was asked to mail notices to local candidates. Midnight of Saturday, June 22, is deadline for payment.

Present at the meeting were Committeemen Blackwell, Haynes, Miss Sorensen and Elwood Webber. The group will meet again on Monday, June 24, to pass on the final ballot.

Dr. Cron said there was danger of infection, of course, since it is a virus type disease, but went on to say that since the cases were not contracted in Rockport there was no imminent danger of the spread of polio here.

Jim Hague Dies of Poliomyelitis In Corpus Hospital

3-Year-Old Daughter Has Mild Case But Not Critical

Jim Hague, 27-year-old employee of The Rockport Pilot, died in Memorial Hospital in Corpus Christi Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock of bulbar poliomyelitis.

His wife, Mrs. Iva Blackwell Hague, is in the maternity ward of the same hospital, where the birth of their fourth child is momentarily expected. A hospital attendant said Mrs. Hague had been told of her husband's death and that she was taking it like a "good soldier."

"What she needs more than anything else," he said, "is rest." One of the Hague children, 3-year-old Joan, has been taken to the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children where she will be given paralysis treatment. A specialist at the Memorial Hospital said the child had a mild case of polio that had affected her legs, but that the acute stage was past. She was admitted on his recommendation.

Hague worked on last week's Pilot until it went to press, but complained of a back ache Thursday. He received treatment for a kidney ailment before being admitted to the Corpus Christi hospital. There his case was diagnosed as bulbar poliomyelitis, and he was immediately placed in an iron lung where he remained until his death. Both legs and his left arm were affected.

Hague came here from San Antonio just three weeks prior to his death, but he had lived in Rockport before and had a wide circle of friends. He first worked for The Pilot when it was edited by his father-in-law, J. O. Blackwell, and again after Jack Blackwell had assumed the editorship. He returned to Rockport on May 30, after the newspaper had again changed hands, and immediately went to work.

Surviving Hague are his wife, Mrs. Iva Blackwell Hague; two daughters, Joan, 3, and June, 4; one son, James Michael, 1; and his mother, Mrs. M. W. Hague of Three Rivers.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the First Baptist Church in Three Rivers, with the Rev. Manley Reynolds of Austin and the Rev. J. W. Burns of Refugio officiating. Burial was in the Three Rivers Cemetery under direction of the Cagle-Mills Funeral Home of Corpus Christi.

Polio Prevention Measures Reiterated For Rockport Area

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is now occurring in certain sections of the state.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particularly attention should be paid to personal hygiene.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children, during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theatres be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

CP&L Announces New Lower Electric Rates to Become Effective In July

Electric rate reductions which will save its customers approximately \$1,000,000 a year have been announced by Central Power and Light Company.

Lon C. Hill, president of the company, said that the new lower rates would become effective in July and would apply to most customers, including residential, commercial, rural and many industrial users.

Minimum charges applicable to residential customers have been either reduced or adjusted to include more kilowatt hours. This general rate reduction, Hill pointed out, follows an earlier reduction this year of rates to municipalities for water pumping, sewer pumping, street lighting and miscellaneous purposes.

The general rate reduction is being submitted for approval to city governing bodies throughout Central Power and Light Company's operating area.

"It has always been the policy of Central Power and Light Company to reduce rates as often as our economic position justifies this course," Hill said, "with the result that a dollar today will buy about twice as much electricity as it would 15 years ago. We are particularly happy that we are able to reduce the price of electric service again at this time, when the cost of living generally is high and still going up."

"The cost of doing business has also increased sharply, and our industry is no exception in this general trend. On the other hand we

have more customers than ever before, and confidently look forward to greater use of electric service per customer as new appliances become available. Other favorable factors are larger volume of business and increased operating efficiency.

"The savings made possible by this latest rate reduction will vary according to each customer's electric service requirements. In some cases it may amount to no more than a few cents a month, in others it will be much larger.

"Electric service is already one of the smallest items in the average household budget," Hill pointed out. "The cost has remained low while the benefits have steadily increased. Electricity has played an important part in raising our standard of living. It powers our great industries, lights our commercial establishments, takes the drudgery out of household chores while aiding comfort and health."

"Still better things are ahead in electrical living. New applications of electricity have been developed. These will bring more comfort and convenience to the home, more efficient and attractive lighting for all purposes, more industrial and rural uses of electric power.

"An ample supply of low-cost electric power is particularly important to South Texas, which is experiencing rapid expansion in commercial, industrial and agricultural activity along with its population growth. By making electric service available at still lower cost, we hope to do our part toward attracting more industry, stimulating rural electrification, and making it possible for all users to derive greater benefit from their service. Our aim is to assure each customer the greatest possible use of his electric service at the lowest possible cost."

Central Power and Light Company serves approximately 111,000 electric customers in South Texas. The area served includes 169 communities and their surrounding areas, with a total population of more than a half million.

Dr. H. P. Rainey To Speak In Aransas Pass

Friends and supporters of Dr. Homer P. Rainey in Aransas County received word this week that the nationally-known educator and former Texas League baseball pitcher is on his way to the Gulf area for a talk scheduled at 4:00 p. m. on Monday, June 24 in Aransas Pass.

Going on into the third and fourth weeks of his whirlwind campaign tour of Northeast, East, and South Texas, Dr. Rainey made a strong bid in two state-wide radio speeches for the rural support which he says that he is counting on to help him "finish the fight against the Texas Regulators that the Democrats started in 1944."

Speaking from the steps of the Anderson County courthouse at Palestine on the night of June 13 and from the Montgomery County courthouse square in Conroe June 18, Dr. Rainey took before a statewide audience his recommendations for a farm program for Texas. Dr. Rainey stresses this as an important part of the general program upon which he is seeking the governorship.

In addition to his June 24 talk in Aransas Pass, Dr. Rainey has scheduled talks in nearby Refugio at 10:45 a. m. and at Sinton at 1:00 p. m. and Robstown at 7:30 p. m.

In spite of his heavy speaking schedule of three and four major addresses a day, Dr. Rainey also plans to stop for short visits in as many as fifteen other towns a day to try and meet personally as many as possible of the friends he has made over the state during the many years he has spent as a professional baseball player, educator, and—more recently—as a radio speaker for the Jaques Power Saw Company.

In the Aransas County area, Dr. Rainey will visit Rockport and will also visit Taft and Odem in San Patricio County and Tivoli and Woodsboro, in Refugio County.

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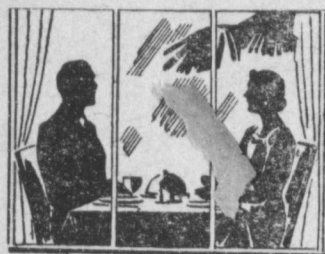

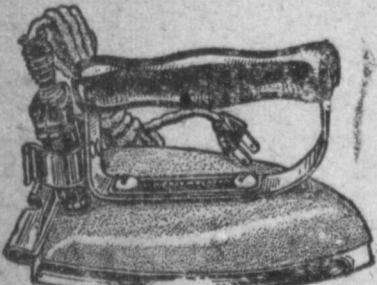

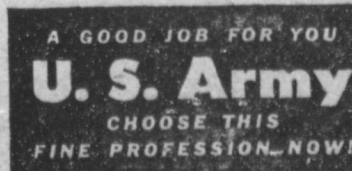
