Occupation Tax Levied On Coin

An occupation tax on all coin operated machines was passed on June 25th by the city council of Rockport and provides for the levying of the tax, collection of the tax, and for penalties for failure

It provides for a tax on each merchandise or music machine of \$10.00 where the coin used is in excess of five cents. A tax of \$1.25 is assessed on each machine that uses a coin five cents or less.

For each "skill or pleasure" machine the tax is \$30.00 where the coin used is in excess of five cents. 'skill or pleasure" machine where the coin used is one five cents or

All persons or firms subject to the tax shall pay these taxes to the Rockport Allstars city tax assessor and collector of the City of Rockport for the calendar year or the remaining part thereof, due on January 1 of each and every year.

This ordinance went into effect June 25, 1946, and any person or firm subject to taxes shall have thirty days in which to pay such taxes before being liable to penalty for failure to pay.

There is nothing in the ordinance which can be construed to authorize the operation of any contest practice or device now prohibited by law.

If I had known that everything was not in order I would have taken care of it at once. In fact I thought everything was alright until I was notified by Miss Iris Sorenson that she could not find my application. Then I old her what had happened, and she suggested that I get letters from the other two candidates stating that they had no objection to my name being on the ballot, and submit the letter with their signatures with the application to the Democratic Committee. One of my opponents who said he would sign later refused because he was advised otherwise by certain parties in the courthouse. The other opponent was in favor of

signing the letter. Therefore, I ask you to take these facts into consideration, and if you could possibly find any way to justify putting my name on the ballot, in the interest of fairness, I will appreciate it very much.



Bill of Rights

Being the First Ten Amendments OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Freedom of Religion, Speech, and the Bress; Right of Assembly and Petition

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Right to Keep and Bear Arms

A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

Quartering of Soldiers

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Regulation of Right of Bearch and Seizure

The rights of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the person or things to be seized.

Protection for Persons and Their Property

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law;

nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Rights of Persons Accused of Crime

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and so have the assistance of counsel for his defence. -

Rights of Trial by Jury in Suits at Common Law

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

VIII Protection Against Excessive Bail and Punishment

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

Constitution Does Not List All Individual Rights

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Bowers Reserved to the States and the Beople

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.


