## Sugar Rationing Not Affected By Lapse Of O. P. A.

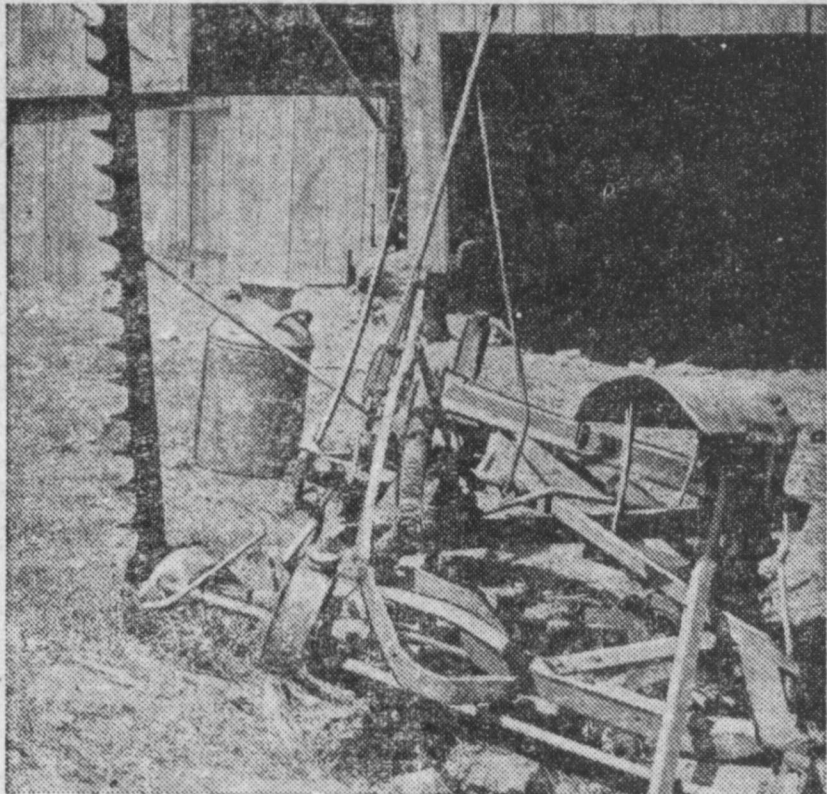
"All phases of the sugar rationing program are still in force," Cal C. Straughan, sugar rationing officer for the San Antonio area, said today.

The president issued an executive order on June 30 that specifically directed OPA to continue to perform all functions relating to sugar rationing.

While the sugar rationing program is in effect, consumers should retain family ration books in their possession, Straughan added. Other sugar users, such as industrial, institutional, wholesalers, and retailers are also advised to retain unused ration evidence and records in their possession.

Straughan also reminded home canners that Spare Stamp No. 10 was validated July 1, 1946. However, he urged consumers not to spend Spare Stamp No. 10 until they actually have fruit on hand to be canned, as there will be no other sugar allocated for canning purposes during 1946.

## Farm Scrap Needed By Mills



Farmers can help themselves to get steel—whether it be a new piece of farm machinery, an automobile, a keg of nails, a roll of fencing or other products—by promptly taking their accumulated scrap to the nearest scrap dealer, the Committee on Iron and Steel Scrap of the American Iron and Steel Institute said today.

A grave shortage of scrap threatens to thwart the steel industry's attempts to make up the 19 million tons of steel that it has lost since V-J Day as a result of strikes and work stoppages. The scarcity of scrap is due largely to the fact that industries which usually generate scrap in large quantities have not been operating at all or operating at low levels since V-J Day.

## Capt. Iansen's Nephew In The Netherlands Honored by Montgomery

Word was received by Capt. Iansen of Fulton from his brother Jos. Iansen of Delden in the Netherlands that his son Joep had received the following certificate signed by Field Marshal B. L. Montgomery:

"By this certificate of service I record my appreciation of the aid rendered by J. Iansen as a volunteer in the service of the United Nations for the great cause of freedom.

"B. L. Montgomery, Field Marshal Commander in Chief 21st Army Group. Dated 1st January, 1946. Serial No. 10056."

Mr. Iansen says that his nephew organized the underground movement in Holland with an ultimate membership of 1800 workers. He was commissioned into the Netherlands army in recognition of those services.

## Reverend Meyers Dies Suddenly In Austin

Reverend E. John Meyers, pastor of the First Baptist Church for the past three years, passed away suddenly July the Fourth while visiting relatives and friends in Austin.

He was born in New York in October 1882, the oldest son of a Baptist minister. He received his early training in the New York public schools and took his theological training in the Baptist Seminaries in Fort Worth, Texas, and Kansas City, Missouri. He obtained his Bachelor's Degree at Fort Worth and took graduate work in Kansas City. His first position after finishing school was as music and educational director of Baptist churches in Beaumont and Amarillo. From there he went to the North Shore Baptist Church in Chicago, Illinois. He left Chicago to assume the duties of the ministry in churches in Texas and Missouri.

Funeral services were held in Austin, with Dr. White, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Austin, officiating. He and Dr. White were classmates at the Fort Worth Seminary.

He is survived by his wife and two brothers, one of Cleveland, Ohio, and one of St. Louis, Missouri.

## TWO FISH COMPANIES ROBBED LAST WEEK

Last Wednesday night the Jackson Sea Food Company and the Johnson Fish Company were robbed of a total of about 220 pounds of shrimp and about 30 pounds of flounder.

The Jackson Sea Food Company was robbed sometime between 11 p. m. and 2 a. m. One of the back doors was forced open and the burglars took about 150 pounds of shrimp and 30 pounds of flounder but did not touch any of the trout and reds that were there.

The same night the Johnson Fish Company reported that some one had entered their place and taken about 70 pounds of shrimp and did not take anything else.

Sheriff A. R. Curry reports that as yet they have found no clues as to the identity of the burglars.

## Present Prices No Basis for Higher Prices Under OPA

Price increases during the interim before final Congressional action on price and rent control cannot become the basis of new, base-period prices in case price control is reinstated, Clifton George, Jr., price executive of the San Antonio OPA district, advised merchants and businessmen today.

"According to present policy, no consideration will be given to price changes resulting from increases made during the interim in which final Congressional action is awaited," George said. "In other words, any price increases which might take place now, while final OPA action is pending, will not be considered as a basis for higher prices, to be charged later if OPA price regulations are re-instated."

George said that he had received many telephone calls from merchants who wanted to "stay in line" if possible, yet were under the impression that any price changes made now would be taken into consideration by OPA if price control returns. The price executive also stated that many merchants have indicated a determination to hold prices at present levels, at least temporarily.

## Sheriff Asks That Parents Aid Him With Children

Tuesday two boys about eleven or twelve years of age took a motor boat from the wharf and rode out to the end of the rocks in the harbor with three smaller children and returned, but after they started back the motor went out and they drifted in.

The boys told Sheriff Curry that the owner of the boat had told them they could go riding in the boat any time they wanted to. However, the sheriff says, he is sure the owner meant they could go with him when he was going out.

They took three small children with them. One boy about two and a half years of age, one girl about four years old, and one boy about seven years old. They went all the way out to the end of the harbor before turning back. The motor then got hot and cut off and they drifted into the wharf where the boat had been moored and the sheriff took them all home.

Sheriff Curry says: "I want to ask that parents aid the law enforcing authorities by seeing that their children are not allowed on any of the boats in the harbor unless they are with some older responsible person, preferably their parents. This will make the job of the police officers much less difficult and will certainly do much to insure the safety and well being of the children in Rockport."

## Urban Hemmi New Head Of Merchants Committee

Urban Hemmi has been appointed as temporary chairman of the Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Morgan C. Wheeler has just announced, and will serve until the Board of Directors meets to make a permanent appointment.

Wheeler says that any firm having business in that field can contact Hemmi at the Humble Service Station.

## Application For Gym Resubmitted To The C. P. A.

Morgan C. Wheeler, superintendent of schools, just returned from a trip to San Antonio in an effort to obtain permission from the Civilian Production Administration to build the high school gymnasium for which bonds were voted in March of last year.

Mr. Wirtz, district director of the C. P. A. informed him that because of the impact of strikes on production of scarce building materials, and in order to prevent stoppages of construction already underway, drastic reductions in approvals for commercial construction will be in effect for the next 10 or 15 days. Approvals for the entire San Antonio district have been averaging \$941,513 weekly, and must now be reduced 66 and 2-3 percent. Under this limited quota, only those projects meeting the following requirements can be considered for approval:

1. Those vitally necessary to public health and safety.
2. Those that will increase production of critical products.
3. Those essential to increased food production or preservation.
4. Those which will provide minimum community facilities absolutely necessary for new residential areas developed as part of the veterans' housing program.
5. Those providing urgently needed veterans educational facilities.
6. Essential and nondeferrable maintenance and repairs.
7. Those which will have no impact whatsoever on the housing program.

He stressed the fact that hereafter every commercial construction project must be assumed to be an impact on housing, unless it can be proved clearly that it is not. Requirement No. 7 is the only possibility for gaining approval of the construction from the C. P. A. until after July 15, at which time some of these other restrictions may be relaxed. If they are, then Wheeler says that there may be a possibility of obtaining the approval under one of those that are relaxed.

## The Main Event, Rockport Bay Race Was Won By "The Bandit," "The Flirt," and "The Cheerio," Out of Houston

The Rockport sailboat regatta sponsored by the Rockport Yacht Club was held here from July 4 through July 7, with the Bludworth Brothers of Houston carrying off practically all the honors and prizes.

The Rockport Bay Race, which was the main event and was held Sunday, was a handicap race for boats under 25 feet, and was won by Martin Bludworth's "Bandit" for which he will receive the John L. Bludworth Memorial Trophy donated by Clyde Armstrong as soon as it can be obtained. In the meantime he was presented with a plaque. Second place went to Danny Bludworth's "Flirt," and third place was won by the "Cheerio" owned by Jay Bludworth. All three of the Bludworths were given inscribed barometers as prizes.

The handicap race for boats over 25 feet was won by Dr. L. P. Guttman, of Corpus Christi, with the "Saga." Travis Bailey's "Circe" took second place. Robert Flato's "Anita" and A. C. Jephson's "Cygnets" tied for third place after both of them ran aground. Bailey's "Circe" made the race in shorter time than any of the others and won it on a boat to boat basis, but with the handicap rules the first place prize went to the "Cygnets."

The handicap series for boats under 25 feet was won by the "Bandit" owned by Martin Bludworth, with Jay Bludworth's "Cheerio" tying A. C. Jephson's "Kiwi" for second place. The "Flirt" owned by Danny Bludworth came in third in this series. The series consisted of six races, two each on the first three days of the races. The "Bandit" won five first places and one second place to earn 29 out of a possible 30 points for the series. The prizes for this race were inscribed barometers and were given to all four skippers.

The Snipe race series was won by the "Kiwi" owned by A. C. Jephson of Corpus Christi. The "Jerry L." owned by Ray Luckett of Corpus Christi, took third place, and the "Ducky" owned by Billy Wicker of Corpus Christi, took third place. Wicker had some hard luck the second day of the races when his mast broke with him in the lead after winning the first day's races.

## Workmen's Compensation Insurance No Job Bar To Disabled Veterans

In response to numerous complaints from widespread sections of the country that some employers are failing to hire disabled veterans on the ground that it is either forbidden or heavily penalized by workmen's compensation insurance contracts, J. Dewey Dorsett, general manager of the Association of Casualty and Surety Executives, today issued a sweeping denial that there is any provision in insurance policies or rates on which to base such erroneous statements.

"Employers who make any such claims are sadly uninformed about the provisions of their workmen's compensation insurance policies," Mr. Dorsett said. "There is nothing whatever in the policy which either forbids or even advises against the employment of any disabled person, veteran or non-veteran. Neither is there anything in the rating formulae which even takes into account whether or not an employer has disabled persons in his hire."

Dr. Dorsett's statement was made public solely in an effort to help relieve an acute unemployment problem among the very class of veterans who are most deserving of the nation's consideration. The claim that insurance companies are even partially to blame for this condition, Mr. Dorsett said, is so entirely contrary to the facts that in justice to employers, veterans and insurance, he could not remain silent longer. As the Association of Casualty and Surety Executives is the public service organization of 66 leading capital stock casualty and surety insurance companies, which write a very substantial part of the country's workmen's compensation insurance, he may be regarded as speaking on high authority.

Senator Allan Shivers Focuses Attention On War Veterans

Now touring the state in the interest of his candidacy, the Senator stated he is asking for promotion upon the basis that he is the only candidate for lieutenant-governor who has the experience and qualifications that are so badly needed in order to properly preside over the Texas Senate, the lieutenant-governor's chief function.

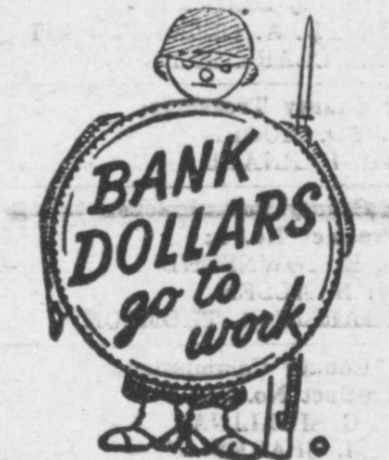

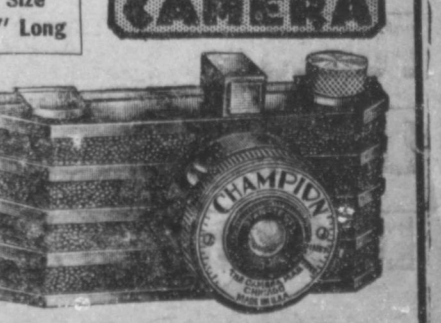
