Any veteran may reinstate his insurance policy by paying the premiums for two months regardless of how long it has been since he dropped the insurance if he is in as good health as he was at the time he originally took out the insurance.

Alien Vets Must File For U. S. Citizenship Before December 31st

December 31 is the deadline for aliens who served in the armed forces of the United States during World War II to qualify for quick citizenship under the Second World War Powers act of 1942.

The act, which expires at the end of the current year, is applicable to all aliens who enlisted or were inducted before December 28, 1945. Recent reports indicate that approximately 100,000 men, both in and out of the services, have failed to take advantage of the right to become American citizens.

The Veteran's Administration points out that those affected by the law are not required to file the customary declaration of intention and need not have lived in the United States for any specified time.

Also, the alien petitioner is not required to speak the English language nor is he required to meet any educational standards or to pay any fees for filing his petition.

Fire Marshal Asks Caution With Xmas Trees & Trimmings

Paul C. Sorenson, City Fire Marshal, has asked that the people of Rockport observe extreme caution in setting up their Christmas trees and decorations to prevent fires from faulty electric connections or careless smokers.

He suggests that one extremely good way to fireproof your Christmas tree is to replace its natural moisture with a fireproof substance. This should be done while the tree is still fresh enough to evaporate water furnished to the needles by the stem.

Sorenson recommends either of two relative inexpensive chemicals that will fireproof your tree—calcium chloride or ammonium sulphate. Either of these can be obtained very easily in the small amounts that are required for this purpose.

The Christmas tree should be weighed and the chemical used should equal one fourth of that weight. Use one and a half pints of water for each pound of chemical to dissolve it. Cut the tree stem in a V-shape about an inch above the end and set the tree in the solution in a cool place away from the sun and leave it until this mixture has been absorbed by the tree.

This will usually take five or six days, and the tree thus treated, won't be set fire by a spark from the electric connections or by a cigarette.

In selecting "snow" for the tree, be sure to choose a package that is flameproofed. If this is not available, many stores carry flameproofing mixtures which can be sprayed on the decorations. This spray can also be used on the tree if necessary; however, Sorenson says the chemical absorption method for the tree is much better.

Sorenson says that we have never had a bad fire caused by Christmas trees or decorations; but he also requests that we take the necessary caution to prevent one from happening this year. The old adage—"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure"—still applies, in his opinion.

Bailey Motor Company Building Marine And Auto Display Room

The Bailey Motor Company has started construction of their new marine and auto display room which is being built in front of their present building.

This show room will be 44 feet wide across the building and 28 feet deep when completed. This will place it back to the present shop. It is being constructed of cement block with prefabricated iron and steel framework, which will be filled in with glass and cement block. They hope to have it completed in the near future.

Clark Bailey New Scout Master For Boy Scout Troop Of Rockport

Clark Bailey was appointed by DeWilton Jeffries last Monday night to take over the duties of Scoutmaster for the Rockport troop effective immediately at their regular weekly meeting at the Catholic Hall.

Bailey has been working with the Scouts for quite awhile. He also worked with them before the war.

Fire Department To Give Baskets To Needy Families

The Rockport Volunteer Fire Department will give baskets of food to the needy families of Aransas County again this year as it has done for the past several years.

Funds for these baskets will be obtained by placing milk bottles in each place of business in Rockport and all citizens will be asked to drop some change in these bottles while doing their Christmas shopping.

In the past, the Fire Department has taken up a collection of toys and repaired them and added what they could to that collection for children in needy families. However, this year the Camp Fire Girls are taking over that function. The toys will be collected, repaired, added to, and distributed by the Camp Fire Girls.

Miss Iris Sorenson, Secretary-Treasurer for the Fire Department, stated today that there would probably be from 25 to 30 families in the County who will receive these baskets of food.

Third Party Gets No Aid From The County Judge

A hand-written letter addressed "Manager, Aransas County, Rockport, Texas" reached the desk of County Judge B. S. Fox, but the Aransas County judge said he wanted no part of it.

"Dear Sir: I wonder if you will be so kind as to send me a telephone directory of Rockport, Texas," the letter begins.

"The third party was organized two years ago and is now ready to open headquarters in Columbus, Ohio. It is the Farm Labor Party. Mr. John L. Lewis will run for president and I will run as his vice-president of the United States. I am an Ohio farmer."

The letter assured Fox that Henry A. Wallace is not on the ticket—that it will be made up of labor men, farmers and ex-servicemen who were not officers—"impossible to defeat."

The letter, signed "Helen Brinkman," was dated Nov. 25, 1946, and listed four addresses, Box 1384, Charleston, W. Va., Box 2303, Washington D. C., Box 133 Columbus, Ohio, and Rodney, Ohio.

The judge handed the letter to a reporter, with no comment—except that he wasn't interested and didn't have an extra telephone directory.

The city secretary has announced that she has received only one petition so far in connection with the special election to be held next Wednesday, December 18th, for a mayor and a councilman, from Ward One to replace Albert Collier and W. Mrs. Alvin Brundrett has been chosen as election judge and Mrs. Fred Diederich and Miss Floy Kennedy were appointed as election clerks. The poll will be open at the Fire Station from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Mrs. Jean Cope, City Secretary, stated that anyone wishing to have their name placed on the ballot must have a petition with at least 10 signatures on file with her by noon Saturday, December 14th.

Kiwanis Trophy Not Awarded Because Of Bad Weather

T. O'Connor Rites Held In Victoria Last Saturday

Rites were held Saturday morning at the family residence in Victoria and at 10:00 o'clock at St. Mary's Church for Thomas O'Connor, 64, who died suddenly Thursday at 5:45 p.m. of a heart attack.

Requiem High Mass was celebrated at the church with Msgr. F. O. Beck officiating and burial was in the Catholic Cemetery at Victoria.

O'Connor was one of Texas' most prominent cattlemen and was vice-president and a director in the Victoria Bank and Trust Company.

He was born on the River Ranch in Refugio County on January 28, 1882, and spent his entire life in Victoria and Refugio Counties. He was the son of Mary Virginia Drake and Dennis Martin O'Connor. His grandfather was Thomas O'Connor, I, who was one of Texas' pioneers and a veteran of San Jacinto. He completed his education at Spring Hill College, Mobile, Alabama.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Kate Stoner O'Connor; two sons, Dennis and Tom, Jr., a daughter, Mrs. Dan Braman; a brother, Martin; and two nieces Mrs. Virginia Hallinan Tatten and Mrs. Maude Williams and three grandchildren all of Victoria.

O'Connor spent a great deal of time in Rockport, where he owned some property and his sons kept two boats, the "Fiddie" and the "Cascabell."

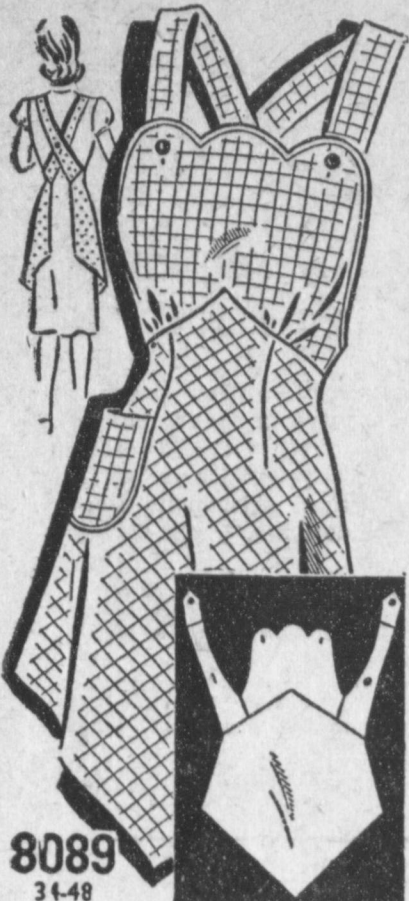

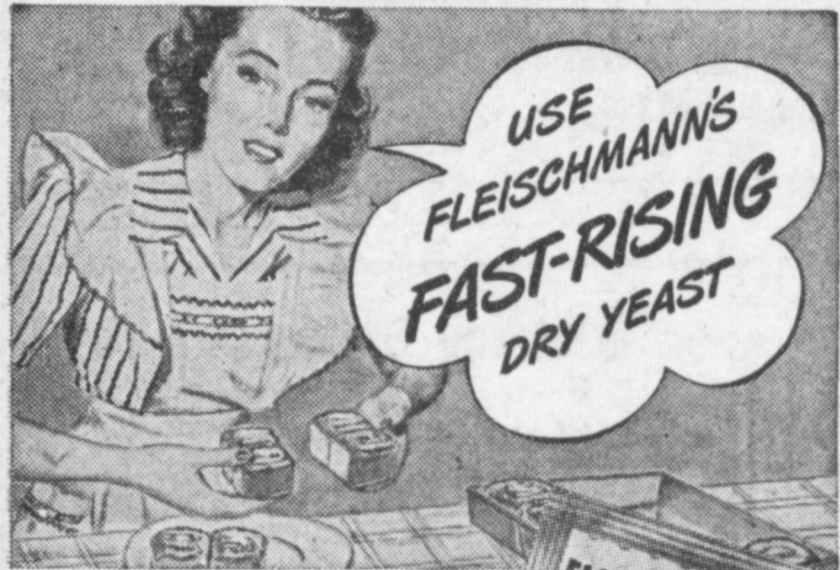

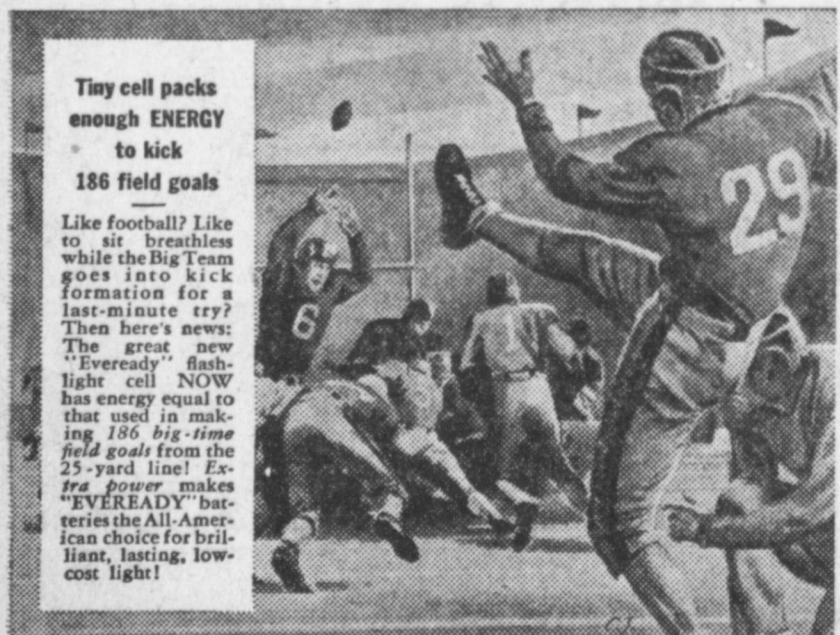

World Bank Wants More Nations to Seek Funds

WASHINGTON. — The 15 1/2-billion-dollar World Bank and Fund, urgently prodded by both United Nations and UNRRA, moved toward their goal of making "a major contribution to the restoration of international trade and domestic economic stability in all countries."

Frankly hanging out the "customers wanted" shingle, the twin lending agencies concluded their first annual meeting with the election of Hugh Dalton, British chancellor of the exchequer, as the new chairman of the bank and fund boards of governors.

London was selected as the site for the next meeting in September, 1947.

So far only six nations have intimated that they will seek long-term loans for reconstruction and development and none of the six has yet made a formal application.

Altogether their requested loans total more than \$1,550,000,000, with France seeking 500 millions, Poland 600 millions, Czechoslovakia 350 millions, Denmark 50 millions, Chile 50 millions, and Holland an unspecified amount.

New Disease Is Traced to Mice-Borne Bug; Many Suffer

NEW YORK. — Bites by mite-borne mites—no larger than a pinhead—caused the mysterious fever that gripped 102 New York City residents during the summer months, the health department disclosed.

Israel Weinstein, city health commissioner, said the fever—characterized by a rash, high temperature and prostration—was a "new disease as far as human knowledge is concerned."

The mites are only accidentally transmitted to humans, Weinstein said. He added that tests showed the mite was present in the blood of patients and that infected mice were found in homes in which the disease occurred.

British Financier Elected Head of the World Bank

WASHINGTON. — Hugh Dalton, British chancellor of the exchequer, was unanimously elected chairman of the joint boards of governors of the 42nd World Bank and the 43rd International Monetary fund.

The World bank admitted Italy to membership and borrowing privileges, along with Turkey, Syria and Lebanon.

Approving every move of the International Monetary fund, governors of the World bank voted to accept Italy into the \$7,670,000,000 institution with only one dissent—that of Yugoslavia.

Disabled Vet Meets Meanest Man; 2 of 'Em

WEST LOS ANGELES. — The meanest man in the world is twins. William Brooke Jr., 25, disabled veteran with his hips in a cast and walking on crutches, was offered a ride by two strangers. They drove him into an alley, stripped and robbed him. Then they tossed his crutches out of reach and left him.

Apple Is Not Enough For Teacher Today

More Pay and Freedom Asked These Days.

WASHINGTON. — Any moment now teachers may be allowed to act like human beings.

That's the prediction—and the hope—of Dr. Francis Brown, executive secretary of the President's Commission on Higher Education.

Dr. Brown said that two developments may come from the teacher shortage.

They are better pay and more freedom for teachers.

There are 127,000 teachers, mostly in one-room schools, who make \$700 or less a year. Even counting in the city aristocrats, the average teacher's salary is but \$1,900 a year.

As for behavior, Brown says almost every community has a double standard. One is for the way teachers must behave, in and out of the classroom. The other is for regular people.

"As an example," he said, "in how many communities can a teacher smoke? Or have a sociable drink?"

"I'm not condoning tobacco or liquor. But I'm pointing out a double standard does exist—and it shouldn't. Teachers should be allowed to act like other people."

Brown believes that if teachers don't get more pay and freedom, the shortages will get shorter.

Half of those going to teachers' colleges today don't intend to teach. And in another three or four years, the war's bumper baby crop will be starting to school.

Brown explained that while he thinks teachers should be given more freedom, they shouldn't run wild.

"After all, teachers are setting an example for students," he said.

He said, yes, he had noticed a story about a versatile Chicago miss who doubled as a teacher and nightclub dancer.

Did he approve? "Well," said Brown. "Well, in theory, yes."

Soviet Cancer Treatment Will Be Studied in U. S.

WASHINGTON. — Government health officials said it is likely American medical experts will visit Russia to study a new cancer treatment, called KR, developed by Soviet scientists.

Little is known in this country of KR but an article published in the Soviet embassy bulletin said it means "A new page is turned in the history of the struggle against the dread disease."

The bulletin said that while KR had little effect in cases of cancer of the skin, "it was highly effective in cancer of the throat, of the cervix of the uterus and of the breast."

KR is a preparation made of living material, the trypanosoma cruzi, a parasite found in the blood and a carrier of disease fatal to human beings.

"Further research proved that trypanosoma, on being introduced into the organism of a mouse suffering from cancer, penetrated to the tumor and multiplied, devouring the cancer cells," the article said.

Government Puts Ban on Building of Play Centers

WASHINGTON.—The government banned the construction of swimming pools, boardwalks, roller-coasters, drive-in theaters, parking lots, concrete tennis courts, and walls and fences of wood, brick or concrete when any of these projects costs more than \$200.

The civilian production administration also took two other steps designed to aid the housing program:

1. It reduced from \$15,000 to \$1,000 amount of repair and other work that may be done in industrial, utility and transportation buildings without a permit, unless the buildings have a floor area of 10,000 square feet or more.

2. It proposed a \$20 a ton subsidy to wire nail manufacturers to increase their output. The industry advisory committee took the plan under consideration.

Mother Gives Baby Popcorn; Child Strangles on Kernel

CHICAGO. — Before putting her three-year-old son, Gerry, to bed, his mother, Mrs. Blanche Phlaum gave him some popcorn.

She and her husband, Paul, were awakened by the child, who appeared to be choking on something lodged in his throat—apparently, the popcorn.

They took the boy to the office of Dr. Charles T. Kessler. Dr. Kessler applied artificial respiration and tried to remove the obstruction, but Gerry died in his arms.
