## Haskell Man Is Killed; Charges Filed

Domingo Villa, 27, of Haskell, died at 5:00 a. m., Friday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene, from a gunshot wound received Thanksgiving night shortly after 10:00 o'clock at Cook's Trailer Court South 8th Street, Haskell.

District Attorney, Royce Adkins, said that charges of murder will be filed against Melio Perez, 21, also of Haskell, at 5:00 p. m., Friday in Hubert Bledsoe's Justice of Peace Court Precinct 1.

Perez is in the Haskell County Jail, without bond, pending action of the Grand Jury.

Haskell County Sheriff, Garth Garrett, said that several shots were fired from a .22 caliber pistol, but only one shot struck Villa in the back.

Villa was taken to the Haskell County Memorial Hospital, then moved to Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, by Deputy Sheriff, Pete Mercer.

Investigating officers included Sheriff Garrett, his deputies, Pete Mercer, Buster Shelton and Olen King; District Attorney, Royce Adkins and Tom Paul Barnett, City Police Chief.

Villa was born January 14, 1941, at Archer City, and was married to Maria Delia Martinez, July 8, 1963, at Haskell. He was employed by Jones and Son Tin Shop, Haskell, for eight years as a tinsmith.

Funeral services were held Sunday, December 1, at 12:45 p. m. from the St. George Catholic Church, Haskell, with Father Dudley, of Stamford, officiating. He was a member of St. George Catholic Church.

Holden-McCauley Funeral Home was in charge of services, and interment was in Willow Cemetery.

County Savings Bonds Reaches 83% Of Goal

October sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$7,652 in Haskell County, according to a report received from R. W. Herren, chairman of the Haskell County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales in the county for the 10-month period, January through October, totaled \$183,270 and 83 per cent of the 1968 goal has been achieved.

Statewide sales of Savings Bonds reached an all-time high of \$151,715, 504 for the first 10 months of 1968. During 1967 sales totaled \$139,007,131—a 9.1 per cent increase over the same period for 1967. October sales during 1967 totaled \$14,689,704 and October 1968 sales totaled \$16,886,405—an increase of 15.6 per cent for October 1968 over 1967.

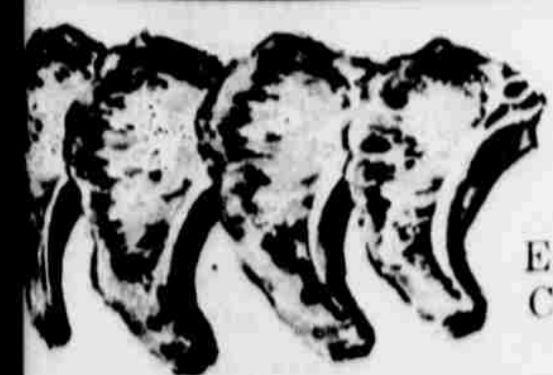

**Wayne Merchant Visiting Here**

Editor's Note: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.



**Q**—My mother died recently. She had been receiving a pension as an unmarried widow of a Spanish-American War veteran. Will the Veterans Administration reimburse me for any of her burial expenses?  
**A**—The Veterans Administration is permitted to make payment of up to \$250 for the burial expenses of war veterans only. This benefit cannot be extended to any dependents of veterans.  
**Q**—I recently married. Are there any forms for changing the beneficiaries of my VA insurance?  
**A**—Yes, VA Form 29-336 is used for this purpose. You may obtain this form from any Veterans Administration office. When completed the form should be forwarded to the VA office to which you send your insurance premiums.  
Be sure to show the option under which your insurance will be paid upon your death; i.e., in a lump sum or monthly payments. Any statement in writing over your signature clearly showing how you want the insurance to be paid will be acceptable to the VA.

**SPENT MORE MONEY**  
Hunters and fishermen spent more money on their sport last year than the entire nation spent on radio, TV, records and musical instruments combined.

**TAX LAWS REQUIRE GOOD RECORDS**  
If you plan to list a business deduction for travel and entertainment expenses be sure to have the records to substantiate these expenses. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today. Estimates of these expenses are not legally acceptable for tax purposes.  
Mr. Campbell said in many instances, a taxpayer should keep a diary or timely record as well as receipts and invoices to back up a travel or entertainment expense.  
To substantiate entertainment expenses you must establish the amount of each separate expenditure except for miscellaneous items like cabs, phone calls, tips and meals while traveling away from home, which can be added together for each day. In addition, the date of the expenditure must be confirmed, the name of the person entertained indicated and the type and location of the entertainment described.  
Mr. Campbell said the taxpayer's records should also show the reason for the entertainment or the business benefit expected, the nature of the business discussion and the names, titles and business relationship of the persons entertained.  
The detailed rules on how to deduct travel and entertainment expenses are given in IRS Publication 463. For a free copy, send a postcard to Supply, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas 75221.

### Texas Has Received \$120,037,731 In Federal Funds Under The NDEA

Texas has received a total of \$120,037,731 in Federal funds under the National Defense Education Act (NDEA) since its enactment in 1958, J. H. Bond, Regional Director, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, said today.

The Act was signed into law on September 2, 1958, in the wake of warnings that the U. S. was falling behind in the scientific field and such evidence of Russian advances as the launching of the Sputnik satellite.

Its immediate aim was to augment the supply of highly-trained manpower in fields relating to national security—science, mathematics, and foreign languages. Subsequent amendments extended its coverage to virtually all areas and levels of education. Over the

past decade, this Act, administered by the U. S. Office of Education, has provided a Federal investment of nearly \$3 billion to support American education from kindergarten through graduate school.

NDEA's various titles provide for: a student loan program; strengthening instruction in key subjects; graduate fellowships; guidance counseling, and testing services; foreign language development; research and experiment in educational use of communications media; technical education; improved State statistical services, and institutes for advanced study for teachers.

Funds for some programs are allotted according to State formulas, others on the basis of the quality of the proposals submitted.

### Some 1,500 Haskell Countians Need To Review Their Medicare Claims

Every one of the some 1500 Haskell countians covered by the doctor bill insurance part of their Medicare since 1966 should spend part of this December reviewing whether the program owes him some money.

That is the advice of R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security's Abilene district manager, who added that this is most important for those older people who had medical expenses between October 1, 1966, and September 30, 1967. Any claim for payment of such expenses must be filed by December 31, 1968.

Tuley pointed out that, in the past, some Medicare beneficiaries who were unable to supply evidence of having paid the doctor or the medical supplier, thought they could not file a claim. "These people are in danger of short-changing themselves," Tuley said. "The 1967 amendments of the Medicare law provide that an itemized bill, showing the services or medical goods received and the charges therefor, even if un-

paid is now sufficient for collecting from Medicare."

He issued a reminder that if the annual \$50 deductible is not met until in the last 3 months in any year, that part can be carried over to the following year as part of the deductible for that year.

All social security offices are now prepared to help people make these last minute claims for doctor bill insurance payments on services and goods received between October 1, 1966, and September 30, 1967, on which no Medicare claim has yet been filed.

The Abilene district office is located in the Federal Building, Room 2321. The phone number is 677-5262. Office hours are 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. weekdays, and each Tuesday evening until 7:00 p. m.

## Cotton Classing Report

Sample receipts in the Monday Cotton Classing Office dropped to almost nothing as wet weather set in early last week, according to A. D. Peebles, in charge. Classing should catch up with receipts early this week.

During the week of November 23 thru 29 there were 10,756 samples classed bringing our season's total to 78,634. Last year this office classed a total of 68,000 samples.

Middling Light Spotted grades showed a sharp increase with a total of 41 percent. Six percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. Although the number of white grades dropped, there is still a large amount of white cotton for this late in the season. Thirty-eight percent of the cotton classed was Middling and 12 percent was Strict Low Middling.

Staple lengths decreased with only 17 percent stapling 1 inch or longer. There was 5 percent in the 29/32 of an inch, 54 percent was 35/16, and 22 percent was 31/32.

Micronaire readings continue to improve with 83 percent of the cotton falling in the premium range, 3.5-4.9. Thirteen percent milled in the 5.0-5.2 range and only 3 percent milled 5.3 or higher. Pressley strength readings stayed the same with the week's average being 81,000 pounds per square inch.

Market activity continued slow and a few more reports of cotton stapling over 1-inch put into CCC Loan were received. White and Light Spotted Cotton brought from 50 to 125 points above Loan prices.

## TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

For a number of years the withholding tax system has worked well. Wage earners find that it is a lot easier to pay their tax throughout the year than to try to save enough to make a big payment at the end of the year. Changes such as this year's surtax charge perturb many taxpayers when they think of coming down to April 15 and having to pay additional tax.

While most employers do an excellent job of withholding income and social security taxes for and paying these taxes to Uncle Sam, there is a small group who misunderstand the law. These employers feel that they are not required to withhold on a student working during the summer, or a housewife who will work at Christmas, since the employee will not earn \$600 and will not be required to file an income tax return. IRS points out that this is wrong, since the housewife would ordinarily be liable for tax on community income here in Texas, and that the student might well have income from other sources that would require him

More Families Are Favoring The Permanent Holiday Tree

Is this the year you're thinking about replacing the natural Christmas tree in your home with a store-bought permanent tree?

More families are doing it than ever before. And there are several reasons for their decision. First, the so-called permanent trees can be reused year after year if given reasonable care.

The run on aluminum Christmas trees has been heightened by the added variety in color, sizes and styles.

Manufacturers are offering trees in gold, green, blue and red in addition to the natural

silvery color. Sizes begin with table-top models and range up to 7 feet in height. Styles vary from the basic tree to those where the branches end in a flower-like tassel.

Setting up an aluminum tree is not difficult. A center pole is set into the stand and tightened. Then the branches are put into the factory-drilled holes. It is best to work from top to bottom. A 7-foot tree can be assembled and ready for decorating in about an hour.

A word about decorating the tree—it's best not to put electric lights directly on a tree, aluminum or otherwise. A better approach is to use spotlights or color wheels. They create attractive and dramatic effects merely by shining the light on the tree.

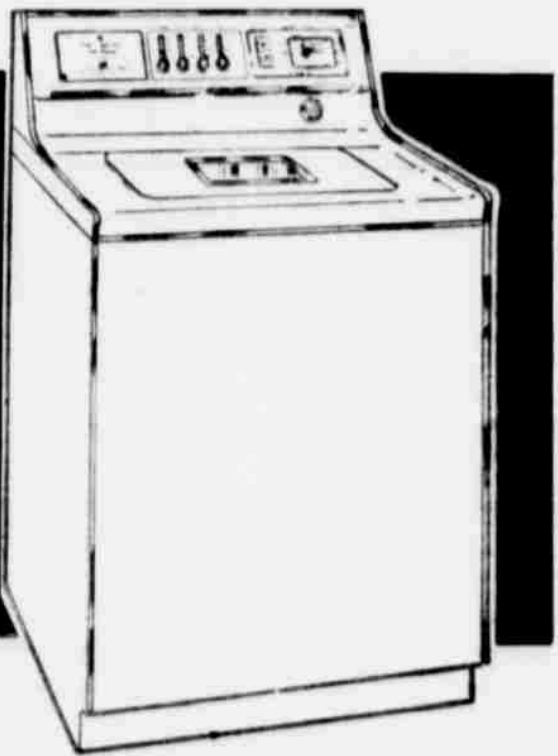

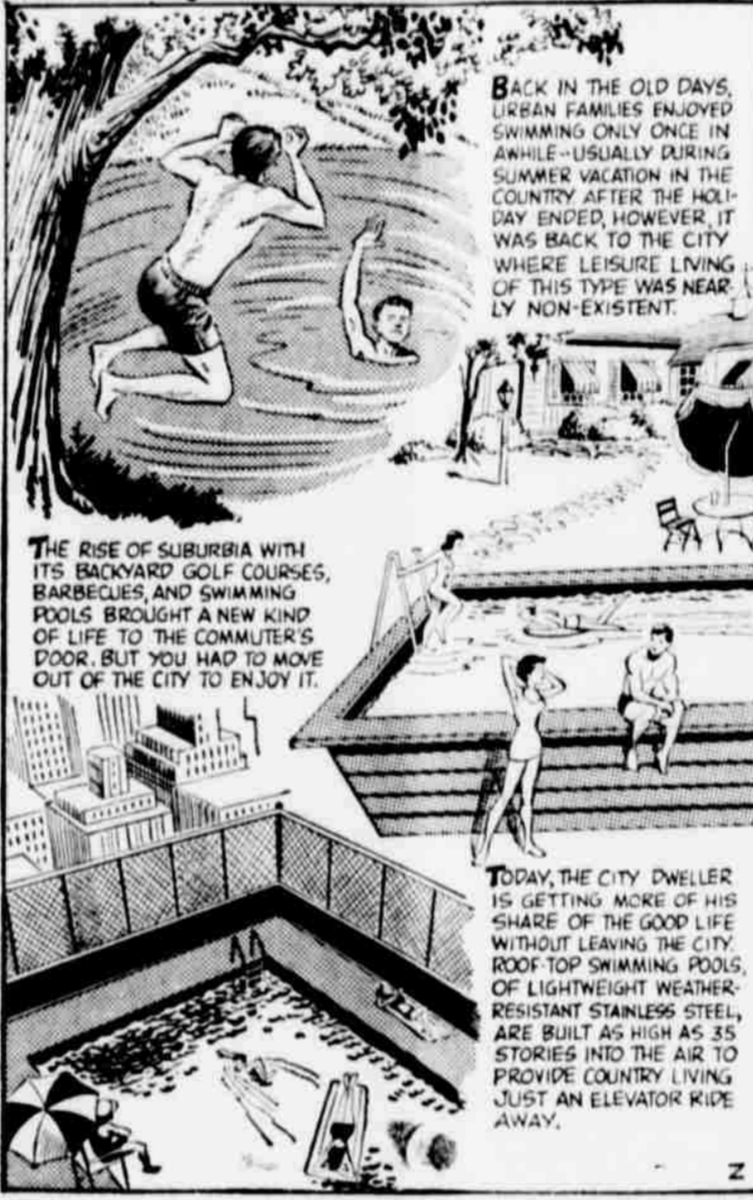
