Chicken Meat Salad
3 cups diced cooked and boned chicken,
1 1/2 cups chopped celery
1 t. salt
3 hard-cooked eggs
3 sweet pickles, chopped
Mayonnaise
Combine chicken, celery, salt, 2 chopped eggs, and pickles. Moisten with mayonnaise. Serve on lettuce cups and top with remaining slices.

Melissa Nierdieck won first in the Bread and Cereal division

with Blueberry Muffins.
Blueberry Muffin
1/4 cup shortening, melted
2 cups sifted flour
3 t. baking powder
1/2 t. salt
1 cup sugar
1 cup blueberries
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
Pre-heat oven 425-degrees. Grease muffin tin. Melt shortening. Sift flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar together. Add berries to sifted dry ingredients. Combine egg, milk, and melted shortening. Add liquid ingredients to flour mixture, stirring only until mixed. (Over mixing causes tunnels in muffins.) Dip batter with tablespoon into greased muffin pans. Filling them two-thirds full. Bake 20 to 30 minutes or until nicely browned. Makes 12 medium-sized muffins.

Caesar Salad
1 clove garlic mashed
1/2 c. salad oil
1 head lettuce
1 C. crouton
3-4 tomatoes, diced
1/4 C. lemon juice
1 beaten egg
1/2 C. parmesan cheese grated
1/4 C. blue cheese finely crumbled
1 t. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 t. pepper
1/4 t. salt
Combine garlic and salad oil. Combine lettuce, tomatoes, and croutons. Strain oil garlic mixture. Pour over vegetables. Combine remaining ingredients, beat well. Pour over salad, toss lightly. Garnish with tomatoes.

HASKELL WELL REPRESENTED AT ALBANY GOLDSMITH SHOW

Area residents, including a large delegation from Haskell, viewed an exhibit of goldsmithing by San Antonio Bart Mann in Albany Thursday, April 17.

The exhibit was sponsored by the Albany Garden Club, and was hosted in the home of Mrs. T. W. Williams.

Proceeds from the exhibit will go to the Texas Garden Club, Inc., fund for the landscaping of the Governor's Mansion in Austin.

In conjunction with the exhibit tea was served from 3:00 until 6:00 p. m. Chief source of excitement were the goblets Mann has perfected since he began smithing as a hobby in the 1950s. Most spectacular was the goblet molded after the chambered nautilus, balanced on the back of a flying fish. This masterpiece, set with various precious stones, reportedly holds 12 ounces of beer.

Cups of wine glasses were balanced on fragile seahorses, flower stems inlaid with jade and even the trunk of a plum tree. A small golden boy climbed up the tree while a friendly dragon guarded star rubies already plucked.

Smaller chalices were balanced on the forelegs of beetles or held up by a mythical golden dragon.

A salt cellar fashioned in gold after the Taj Mahal was set with sapphires of pink, blue, yellow and gold. Smoky blue star sapphires topped the minarets.

Also on display were the many pins and rings that Mann crafts. Most expensive piece of jewelry on display was a gold necklace set with diamonds, valued at \$15,000. At the other end of the spectrum was a tiny road-runner, a pin for only \$6. He

has also designed wedding bands, quarter-inch wide circles of gold encased with flowers centered with diamonds. They follow the more popular desire of a single band, rather than a two-banded set.

Mann designs most of his own work, although in the last year, he has had the help of designer Remo J. Scardigli, formerly of Taos, N. M. Designs are first molded in wax, then filled with molten gold. Time needed to complete an object depends on the intricacy of the design.

Mann buys his gold from refiners in the United States, primarily from Philadelphia. However, he says most of the gemstones must be imported since there are few gemstones in the U. S.

"It's still a hobby," says Mann, and added that he sells the jewelry to support the hobby. Approximately 200 persons registered for the occasion.

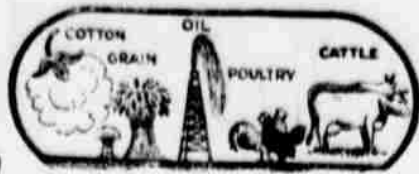

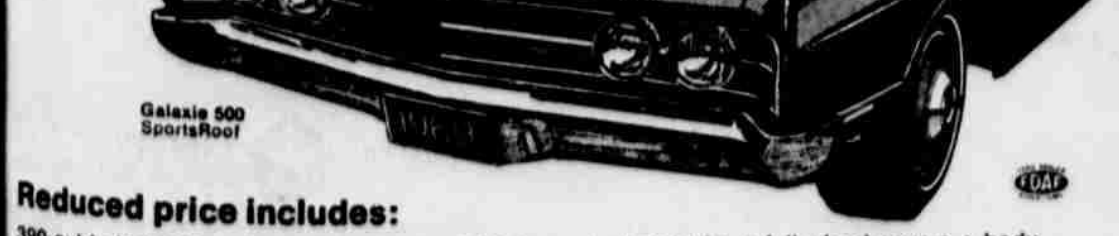

NO SURPRISE

What is a newspaper like in a country where there is no freedom of the press, no advertising, no dissent; a country where the press is but the sounding board of dictatorship.

The answer can be found in the comment of a U. S. writer, Rebecca Tarshis, recently returned from the Soviet Union, who had an opportunity to visit the headquarters of Pravda, official newspaper of the Soviet Communist party. In an article in the Portland, Oregonian, she says, "Pravda... is not attractive by our standards. It has no comic strips, advice to the lovelorn, household hints, recipes, advertising, or any of the numerous other features that brighten American newspapers." She was told the primary function of Pravda is to crusade for the principles of communism. It is published in a giant government printing establishment. Its profits are turned over to the communist party.

There can be no free press in Russia, since there is no free enterprise to support it. The color and diversity of the U. S. press... and its independence... are products of the very things we hear criticized so often... advertising, promotion, private enterprise, the free market, competition, profits... things which do not exist in Russia. And without which there would be no free press. That Pravda is dull should come as no surprise.
