School Authorities Attempt To Place Home-to-College Shuttle Bus In Operation

ROCKPORT, ARANSAS PASS, INGLESIDE AND **GREGORY STUDENTS WOULD BENEFIT FROM** STAY AT HOME, GO TO COLLEGE PROGRAM

Rockport school authorities are attempting to work out a plan whereby transportation can be provided for high school graduates so that they can attend Corpus Christi Junior College and at the same time live at home. The tentative plan would be to have a shuttle bus operating between Rockport and Corpus Christi picking up students in Rockport Aransas Pass Ingleside and Gregory. Supt. Faulk dealt with by the 51st legislature an embankment across the north of Aransas Pass and Supt. Andrews of Gregory are in favor of the plan and will work with the Rockport group to put such a bus into operation.

The school board of the Corpus Christi Junior College will be contacted to see if they will be able to provide the shuttle bus. If arrangements cannot be made with the college other sources will be investigated in order to provide the transportation.

It is believed that with the completion of such arrangements many students would be able to further their education who otherwise would not be able to do so.

"If it can be developed this will be one of the finest arrangements that has been made to insure more students in this area the opportunity of going to college," said J. F. Harbin, superintendent of schools. Harbin went on to say that the chief cost of education is not the tuition and books but room and board. Dr. Cox Advises On Care of Aged

Some folks are old at sixty others are mentally and physically alert at eighty. The number of years one has lived may not be a true index to ones physical condition. Actually the length of a persons's life span is influenced by the condition of his arteries. Premature hardening of the arteries, often due to avoidable infections, improper diet, and possibly worry and strain is to a certain extent, preventable, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health

Many of the problems connected with the hygiene of old age are due to lowered mental power. Therefore a cheerful and optimistic attitude toward the aged, especially during sickness, is essential to their well-being.

Old people regard their condition as far less serious when they can be fully dressed and out of bed. When they can be up, the excretory organs function more satisfactorily, too. However, when an elderly person complains of being overtired, or otherwise not physically fit, a day of rest in bed is advisable. By providing light and easily digested food and applying warmth to the body of an aged patient, he is often tided over a mild or threatened illness.

Special attention should be paid also to proper clothing, diet and exercise of the elderly. With reasonable attention to certain welldefined and easily followed principles of personal hygiene, it is possible to grow old gracefully.
