## Duck Hunters to Attend State Meet

Texas duck hunters are invited to attend a state wide meeting in Houston, May 4, 6:30 p.m., when Al Day, director of the National Wildlife Service, his assistants and representatives of Ducks Unlimited, will be on hand at the San Jacinto High School Auditorium, to discuss waterfowl prospects for next year.

The regional meeting is one of 12 being held over America to get a line on the opinions of duck shooters as to seasons, limits and other regulations.

The May 4 meeting is sponsored by Conservation of Texas Fish and Game, Inc., otherwise known as COTFAG, an organization of some 3,000 sportsmen along the coast.

Louis Bonner, president of COTFAG, will preside while Andy Anderson, Outdoor Editor of The Houston Press will act as master of ceremonies. Members of the Texas Game Commission along with Executive Secretary Howard Dodgen will be present.

Duck shooters will be permitted to ask question of the experts. All questions must be submitted in writing and cleared through a COTFAG committee. Every effort to eliminate useless discussions will be made.

Questions to come up for discussion will be—bag limits, shooting hours, increase in cost of duck stamp, more rigid enforcement and standard shooting hours.

A duck calling contest for non-professional callers will start at 6:30 p.m. Valuable hunting and fishing equipment will be given as prizes. Out-of-town entries are solicited.

The San Jacinto High School auditorium will accommodate 3,000 and with inquiries coming in from all sections of the coast, indications are that the hall will be filled.

A movie of the duck population of Texas and slides furnished by the Wildlife Service will be shown.

All conservation organizations of the state are urged to send representatives.

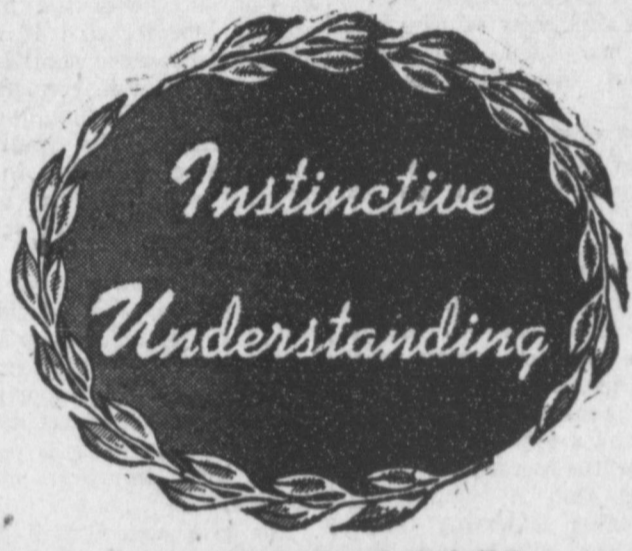

### Change In Menu Good and Cheap

Molasses made from citrus pulp is a good and cheap replacement for part of the grain in fattening cattle, according to tests conducted recently at College Station by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Steers fed balanced rations with 2, 3 and 4 pounds of citrus molasses respectively replacing equal amounts of ground Martin milo during the 112-day trial made about the same gain as steers fed milo without molasses. The milo was priced at \$70 and the molasses at \$42 per ton.

There was no trouble getting the steers to eat the molasses. It was not noticeably laxative, and it seemed to improve the hair coat.

One lot of steers made an average daily gain of 2 pounds per head on a daily ration of 11.08 pounds of milo, 1.5 pounds of cotton-seed meal and 11.9 pounds of mixed hay. Lots receiving 2, 3 and 4 pounds of molasses made average daily gains of 1.78, 1.95 and 1.96 pounds daily respectively.

The steers fed no molasses made a net profit of \$10.16 per head. The steers fed 2, 3 and 4 pounds of molasses made a net profit of \$7.97, \$14.79 and \$14.97 per head respectively. The carcasses of all 4 lots graded about the same.

Citrus molasses is a by-product of the grapefruit and orange juice canning plants. In the early days it cost around \$2.50 a ton to haul away the pulp from the plant. Now the pulp is dehydrated and made into livestock feed after the citrus molasses has been extracted from it.

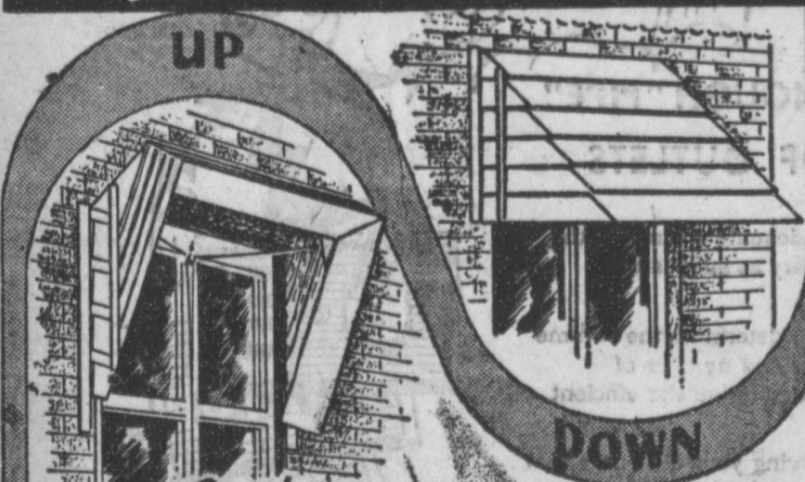
