The City of Rockport is replacing the outfall line for the city wer plant. Work got underway last week and will be completed this eekend. Fred Percival is the engineer on the project and J. L. Mc-Fadden of Houston is the contractor.



Dollar Due to Buy More Farm Products in '49

College Station, Tex.-The housewife's dollar will buy more food and fibre in 1949 than during the previous year, according to Louis Franke, extension editor for A & M. College.

Mr. Franke sees lower prices for farm products next year. He says for more than a year the price of farm products has had a tendency to ease down.

Here is Mr. Franke's analysis of the situation for November 15, 1948, as compared with the same date in 1947:

Down-Wholesale milk a little ess than 1 per cent; cotton, 4 per cent; wheat 25 per cent; oranges, 30 per cent; oats, 31 per cent; grain sorghums, 36; corn, 44, and grapefruit, 50.

29 per cent. Citrus growers have been hard-

est hit; grapefruit prices were already low a year ago. Vegetable prices generally are down about a third from November 15, 1947. Mr. Franke in a recent interview

asked John McNeeley, who teaches courses in farm commodity prices at A. & M. and is regarded as an authority on price trends, if he ooked for serious trouble in the orice situation.

Mr. McNeeley said there is a lot of similarity between the 1920 situation when farm prices crashed and today, except in 1920 there was no Marshall plan.

Government price floors, he said, will tend to slow up the drop in farm prices. The U.S.D.A. will support prices through loans and in heavy buying of surplus products for export under E.C.A. and to the occupied zones.

Most of all, Doctor McNeeley says, there can't be any general collapse of farm prices as long as the United States employment figure holds around 60,000,000 there's just too much buying power. A general "leveling off," maybe; but a big crash, no.



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


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Novel Dinner Rolls



Next time you make dinner rolls, duplicate these tricky-looking butterhorn and S-shaped buns, for the shaping is easy to learn and do.

When you serve hot rolls, your simple stew, meat loaf, or frankfurters and kraut, will taste extra good. After you have made raised rolls a few times, you can turn out a number of variations with ease.

Use a standard roll recipe or a hot roll mix to make butterhorn and S-shaped rolls. For butterhorns, cut a circular sheet of dough into pieces and roll, up, starting at the wide and Go a starting at the wide at the wi

and S-shaped rolls. For butterhorns, cut a circular sheet of dough into pie-shaped pieces and roll up, starting at the wide end. Go a step farther, if you like, and curve into crescents on the baking sheet.

Although intricate looking, S-shaped rolls are simple. Roll both sides of a rectangular sheet of dough to the center, cut in inch slices and twist each piece in the middle. After rolls are shaped, brush a little melted butter or margarine over the top to keep a crust from forming during the second rising. Rolls baked quickly until a medium brown are moist and fluffy inside, crusty-crisp outside. A moderately hot oven (425 degrees F.) is best for achieving this color and quality. Leftover rolls can be re-heated for serving at another meal. Put them into a paper bag, sprinkle lightly with water, fold the end of the bag to close it, and heat in a hot oven for five minutes before

In addition to providing variety in the menu at low cost, dinner rolls contribute six-way nourishment: protein, iron, food energy, and three B-vitamins. DINNER ROLLS

1 package yeast, compressed or dry granular 1 cup lukewarm water 1 cup milk

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add one cup flour. Beat well. Add softened yeast and egg. Mix well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough Turn out on make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until satiny (about 10 minutes). Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled (about one and one-half hours). Punch down. Cover and let rest ten minutes. For butterhorns: Turn dough out on mixing board and divide into four portions. Roll each portion into circle about one-eighth inch thick. Brush rolled dough with

melted butter or margarine. Cut into pie-shaped pieces. Roll up, starting at wide end. For S-shaped rolls: Roll dough out to rectangle eight inches wide and one-fourth inch thick. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Roll each side toward center as if making twin jelly-roll. Cut into one-inch slices. Twist each piece in center to form S-shaped roll. Place rolls on greased baking sheets. Let rise until doubled (about one hour). Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes three and one-half dozen

ncrease Central Power and Light Company's power production capacity by 41 per cent before next summer, when the largest customer use of electricity usually occurs. During 1948 engineering work also went forward on a new power plant at Laredo. Equipment for the Laredo plant, which will have an initial capacity of 33,-000 kilowatts, was ordered late in 1947 and the plant is expected to be in service during 1951.

Although the power plant additions are an important part of CPL's long-range expansion program, Hill pointed out that they accounted for only part of over eight million dollars which Central Power and Light Company spent during 1948 for new facilities to serve its customers. More than 100 miles of 69,000 volt transmission line was added to the company's system, including the links from Cotulla to Artesia Wells, Corpus Christi to Taft, Beeville to Three Rivers and Bonnieview to Victoria. Other high voltage lines in the Corpus Christi and Port Lavaca areas were nearing completion at the close of the year. During 1948 CPL also built numerous new substations, enlarged and improved distribution systems, extended low- all season. RESERVE COMMISSIONS NOW AVAILABLE FOR DOCTORS, DENTISTS

AUSTIN—Reserve commissions are now available for young doctors and dentists, subject to the draft, if they volunteer for these commissions and are placed on active duty before being inducted under the Selective Service Act, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Army Instructor for the Organized Reserve Corps, has announced.

Under congressional provisions, these young doctors and dentists will receive \$100 per month compensation in addition to regular pay and allowances. The extra compensation will not be given to those who enter the services through the Selective Service, even though they are subsequently commissioned.

These reserve commissions are available to qualified doctors of medicine and dentistry who have completed a four-year course, physically able and now are serving an internship. Once they are accepted and commissioned in the reserve, they may be called for a period of active duty after they have finished their current year of internship. Such commission can be used to support a request for deferment in the draft. At the present time there is a

dire shortage of doctors and dentists, it is stated, and young doctors and dentists, who are subject to the draft, are urged by the armed services to give serious consideration to accepting commissions. They may get detailed information from, any Organized Reserve Corps Instructor's office.




