#### Inspecting the School Building

On account of a report in the community that the North Ward School Building had been inspected, condemned and abandoned, it appeared to the school trustees when considering this matter that it was proper to look into this and see whether there was any ground for uneasiness about the safety of the building. The trustees appointed a committee consisting of the undersigned persons who have examined the building and find that the cracks in the building are contraction and expansion cracks such as make their appearance in nearly all brick and stone buildings, and that they do not endanger the safety of the building. The plaster falling off in places is mostly from its being wet and not from the vibration of the wall. The roof has leaked and caused part of this and water soaking through the wall has caused some of it.

The building needs some repairs, but there is no evidence at all that the building is unsafe, and we trust all who feel concerned in this matter will feel easy.
