Interests Confer

The Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission will meet at the Battle House, Mobile, Alabama, July 20-21 to hear and discuss progress reports on the programs of biological research and exploratory commercial fishing recently adopted by that interstate fisheries organization.

The government assigned two motor vessels of the trawler type, in October of 1949, to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, primary agency of the Gulf Commission. The ALASKA, to be used exclusively for marine biological research in the Gulf, is being converted into a modern floating laboratory and should be ready for service in the late summer. Due to less conversion being necessary in the case of the second vessel, the OREGON, it was possible to initiate the exploratory fishing program May 8.



meeting, adopted a resolution recommending that the Federal authorities place Texas in two zones for the coming waterfowl season. Under this plan, the Panhandle region which is framed by Oklahoma and New Mexico would have an earlier season in keeping with the surrounding area in the adjacent states.

The Commission recommended as a companion plan that the state at large have a straight shooting season for migratory waterfowl beginning not earlier than November 10, instead of the split season authorized last year. The Commission also recommended a limit of eight ducks per day and eight in possession. They were four and eight in 1949.

Shivers Favors Lifting Ceiling On Old-Age Aid

Forthright answers to four questions put to him in a letter from a West Texan this week placed Gov. Allan Shivers clearly on record for a "fair and equitable" old-age assistance system in Texas.



But even with the increase in attendance there are still about 150,000 scholastics in the state not in school, Tennyson said.

Food Poisoning Can Be "Thing of the Past" Says Dr. Cox

AUSTIN-Food poisoning and the spread of food-borne diseases can be "things of the past", State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox asserted here today.

"People need only remember three things to bring about the end of the food poisoning disease classification," Dr. Cox declared. "Buy food from safe sources, prepare it in a sanitary fashion and serve and store it correctly."

He said state laws covered the sale of contaminated food to the housewife, but "only the homemaker can see that food is properly stored and cleanly prepared for serving to the family."

There is a difference between food infection and food intoxication, he pointed out.

Food infection comes from eating or drinking a product contaminated by a germ. Dysentery typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever and tuberculosis are examples. Animal parasites can also gain entry to the body in this way. That, the doctor said, is how people get trichinosis and tapeworm.

The growth and multiplication of certain toxin forming bacteria in unrefreigerated foods bring on food intoxication, according to the explanation. That is the source of staphylicoccus infection and the deadly botulism. Some kinds of mushrooms and certain shellfish are also poisonous.

Some poisonous substances may be accidently introduced into food, Dr. Cox said. "For instance, roden


