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Shivers Favors Lifting Ceiling On Old-Age Aid

Fortright answers to four questions put to him in a letter from a West Texan this week placed Gov. Allan Shivers clearly on record for a "fair and equitable" old-age assistance system in Texas.

Replying to a communication from Archie Yates, 1318 North 15th St. Abilene, Shivers set forth in one-two-three fashion his views on old-age assistance. He wrote Yates as follows:

"Your first question is, 'Do you favor the removal of the ceiling on old-age pensions and payments to needy children and dependent blind?' My answer is yes.

"Your second question is, 'Will you or will you not do all you can to have a constitutional amendment submitted to the people to be voted on at the earliest possible time?' My answer is, I will.

"Your third question is, 'Will

you or will you not, if ceiling is removed, support a law raising such payments?' My answer is: This is a matter entirely for the Legislature, but I will be happy to see the Legislature pass such laws as it feels fair and just in all the circumstances.

"Your fourth question is, 'Do you or do you not favor the State taking a lien on whatever property the old folks may have?' My answer is, I do not."

In his letter to Yates, Gov. Shivers pointed out that, as a member of the State Senate in 1935, he wrote and sponsored the first old-age pension law that Texas had. Shivers also was a co-author of the 1941 tax bill which to this day provides revenue for the old-age assistance program.

"As a public official," he said, "I have always endeavored to work for a fair and equitable old-age assistance program in Texas."

Civil Defense Program Ready for Texas Wartime Operation

Austin, Texas.—Texas is ready to place a civil defense program into wartime operation immediately in case of need, Gov. Allan Shivers indicated Wednesday in a letter to all mayors and county judges.

At the same time, the governor advised the importance of surveys and realistic planning for coordination of local units in the event of man-made or natural disaster.

The governor's letter to the city and county officials, not yet released, pointed back to a memorandum from his office last April 14.

The memorandum noted that "Texas now has a complete state organization available for handling such problems relating to civil defense as may arise in the immediate future."

"In reporting this fact, an announcement from the office of the governor revealed that the organization had been developed quietly over a period of months, being expanded or revised from time to time in the light of information received by the state from the agencies of the federal government charged with responsibility for such matters."

As outlined in the April 14 memorandum, the state plan of civilian defense is built on the foundation of the state disaster relief organization and procedure. The governor, by the constitution, heads the civil defense organization.

His executive secretary, William McGill, will act as coordinator for such state agencies as public safety, health, fire, highways and welfare, all of which have been assigned their functions. McGill is now in Detroit at a meeting of the board of governors of the American Red Cross, of which he is a member.

Last April in Washington, representatives of the State Disaster Council reviewed in detail with Gen. George Marshall and other national officers of the American Red Cross of the plans under which surveys of emergency shelter, food, clothing, and medical supply resources will be made throughout the state, utilizing the existing disaster relief organizations in 251 of the 254 counties of the state.

1. Military affairs, including the selective service, Texas National Guard, and the Texas State Guard Reserve Corps, all under the direction of Adj. Gen. K. L. Berry.
2. Transportation and communication.
3. Civil protection, including fire control, aircraft warning service, defense police mobilization, air raid warning system, evacuation, emergency medical service, including emergency sanitation and radiological service.
4. Resource and production, including the mobilization of natural, industrial and human resources.

Gilmer-Aiken Laws Bring More Children Into Texas School

Texas' Basic Education Foundation Program, which went into effect one year ago, has succeeded in providing better education and bringing more children into the classrooms throughout the state. A report on the first year of the program was issued to all school superintendents by Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, this week.

Average enrollment over the state skyrocketed more than 100,000 the report said. This was credited to renewed interest among educators in getting children into the schools, plus more attractive programs offered the pupils to sustain their interest and attendance.

"The spotlight of publicity thrown upon school while new education laws were being studied by the public and enacted by the Legislature caused Texans to take more interest in their schools than ever before," Tennyson said.

Every district has waged intensive campaigns to get children in school and keep them there. Schools have expanded or instituted classes in shopwork to interest the older scholastics.

The state report shows improvements on the problem of regular attendance by Latin American and Negro pupils in those areas where itinerant workers are prone to keep their children out of school several months of the year. But, even with the increase in attendance there are still about 150,000 scholastics in the state not in school, Tennyson said.

Most schools in the state face a serious shortage of classroom space, the report said. Necessary additional school facilities will be made available to school districts due to increased revenue obtain-

Ben Ramsey Making Active Campaign For Lieutenant Governorship

Ben Ramsey, candidate for lieutenant governor and former Secretary of State, last week completed another chapter in his person-to-person handshaking tour of the state.

Ramsey found considerable interest in his program for economy in government, blacktop roads to every farm home, soil and water conservation and rural telephones at reasonable rates.

Ramsey, a 46-year-old lawyer from San Augustine in East Texas, has been conducting soil and water conservation experiments on his own farm near San Augustine. Several classes of students studying conservation have visited the farm to observe the results of the experiments.

Ramsey is campaigning for the office of lieutenant governor, the presiding officer of the state Senate, on the basis of his experience. Ramsey served in both the House and Senate before he be-

He was elected to the House in 1931, the same year he received his license to practice law. He served two terms and was then elected to the Senate in 1941. Ramsey retired from the Senate in 1947 and in 1949 he was appointed Secretary of State by the late Governor

Food Poisoning Can Be "Thing of the Past" Says Dr. Cox

AUSTIN—Food poisoning and the spread of food-borne diseases can be "things of the past", State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox asserted here today.

"People need only remember three things to bring about the end of the food poisoning disease classification," Dr. Cox declared. "Buy food from safe sources, prepare it in a sanitary fashion and serve and store it correctly."

He said state laws covered the sale of contaminated food to the housewife, but "only the homemaker can see that food is properly stored and cleanly prepared for serving to the family."

There is a difference between food infection and food intoxication, he pointed out.

Food infection comes from eating or drinking a product contaminated by a germ. Dysentery, typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever and tuberculosis are examples. Animal parasites can also gain entry to the body in this way. That, the doctor said, is how people get trichinosis and tapeworm.

The growth and multiplication of certain toxin forming bacteria in unrefrigerated foods bring on food intoxication, according to the explanation. That is the source of staphylococcus infection and the deadly botulism. Some kinds of mushrooms and certain shellfish are also poisonous.

Some poisonous substances may be accidentally introduced into food, Dr. Cox said. "For instance, roden

To point up the deadliness of some food poisons, he related the story of the housewife who suspected some home-canned green beans she had just opened were tainted.

"She barely tasted one of them, but it killed her in a matter of hours. Such instances are rare but do occur."

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

