Financial Statement Reveals Local Tax Rate Supplies Only 57.4% of Cost Of Operating Aransas County Schools

The financial statement for the Aransas County Independent School District, 1949-50 term, reveals that the local tax rate supplies only 57.4 per cent of the cost of operating the schools. The balance, or 42.6 per cent, is supplied by assistance from the federal and state governments.

Total collections for this period, which includes collections for bond service, amounted to \$145,781.47. Instruction



costs (salaries paid teachers) claimed the largest slice. During the 1949-50 school term 47.7 per cent, or \$69,534, was paid out as teacher salaries.

> Local debt service made a claim for 19.3 per cent of the total figure as \$28,212 was earmarked to take care of bonded indebtedness. Maintenance and operation of the school plant required 10.2 per cent of the collections for the year. The sum allotted to maintenance and operation was \$14,931.90. Capital outlay, amounting to 6.2 per cent of the collections, proided equipment, alterations and additions, and furniture for the
