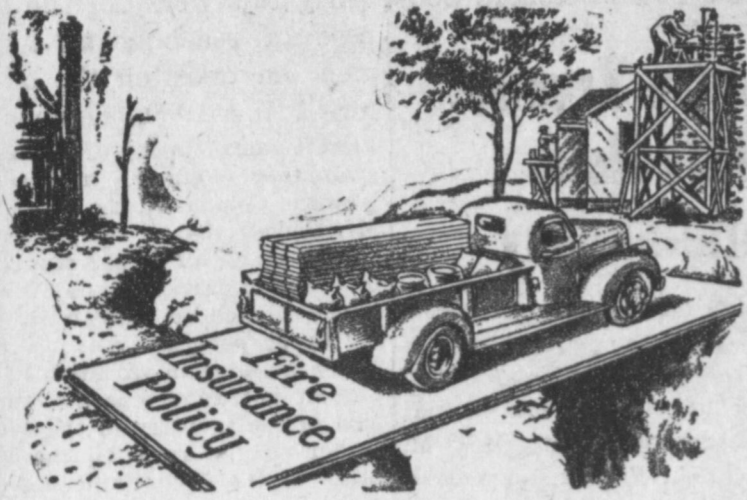

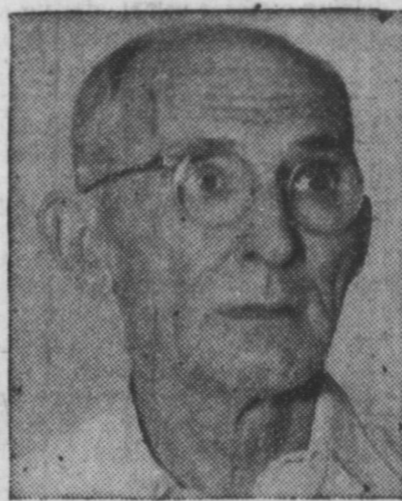

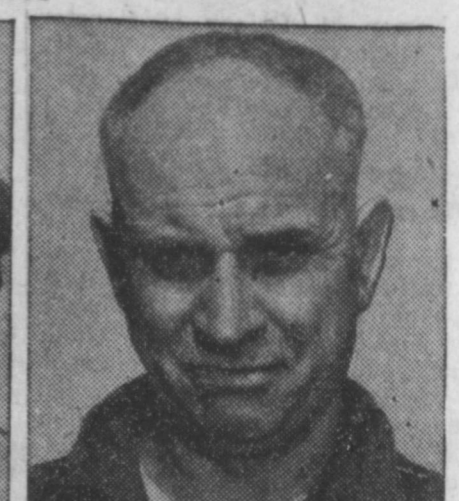

Value of Real Estate Development Discussed At Rotary Meeting

Travis Bailey discussed real estate development in the area at the Rotary luncheon Wednesday. He pointed to areas in the county which have been developed and resulted in many persons purchasing property and building homes here. More than \$500,000 has been invested by persons purchasing property in the Live Oak Point tracts alone, he said.

Bailey pointed out that the property line for waterfront property is established by the ordinary high tide which is determined by the growth of vegetation.

President Dick Denny informed the group that four standards, eight poles and eight yellow flags are needed to carry out the school

safety program. The Rotary Club sponsors the safety program at the school.

The Rotary Club also sponsors the Cub Scout organization. Committeemen and a Cub Scout master are needed by this group. Earl Morris served as master last year but has since moved from Rockport. 

New Law Affecting Vets With TB Explained

A new law (P. L. 578, 81st Congress) which became effective last June may be of a great deal of benefit to veterans of World War II who are suffering with tuberculosis.

Under former legislation, if a veteran discovered that he had tuberculosis within a year after discharge, it was "presumed" that the disease was due to service. Under the new law this period after discharge has been extended to three years.

This means that a veteran who has applied for compensation and was denied this benefit may still receive compensation payments. The Veterans Administration officials state that all cases on file will be reviewed to this end and the veteran who formerly applied and was denied, automatically will be awarded compensation, provided his application shows that his case comes within the meaning of the law.

However this does not apply to those who never made a claim. A claim must be filed before any action can be taken and the veterans county service officer believes that a considerable number of tubercular veterans of the second war now will come under this new law. All those veterans so afflicted should file a claim as soon as possible.
