## THE CHURCHES AND NEWSPAPER

In these days when almost everybody is saying slighting things about the newspapers and the motives that prompt their every utterance it is pleasing to note a statement by a New York minister. Rev. Christian F. Reisner, pastor of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church. In a recent sermon he plead for cooperation between the churches and the newspaper men.

He said no single person has so big a chance to influence the community as the reporters, who ought to tremble before their responsibilities.

"No one can adequately picture the power of the press," Dr. Reisner continued. "Every one reads papers. If they cannot decipher words then they draw conclusions from pictures. The newspaper man speaks to the largest audience known. It is no wonder a noted Chicago preacher gives his life and best thought to writing one article a day for a syndicate of papers. He speaks to over a million.

"Printed words usually sink deeper than spoken ones. All hail the hustling news gatherers and outgivers who serve the people, and often without worthy appreciation. Newspaper men cannot hold their jobs unless they have exceptional ability. They must be alert for every possible clue every moment. Everlasting resourcefulness is required.

"It is no wonder that Mr. Moody advised young theologues to become newspaper reporters for a season to sharpen their wits. My own experience as a newspaper reporter has been invaluable to me as a minister. The daily papers will welcome co-operation from the churches.

"I have now been preaching over fifteen years. I have known scores of newspaper men, I have never known one who was not friendly to and ready to help the church. The daily paper was never so clean as now. Much is given to the newspaper men in the way of influence and power. Much will be expected of him. And with encouragement he will give it."

### Rev. Arbuckle Declines Call.

The First Baptist Church of Taylor which last week issued a call to the Rev. John A. Arbuckle has received a letter from him declining to accept the call. Rev. Mr. Arbuckle was for nine years pastor of the Taylor Baptist Church, and was one of the best beloved ministers Taylor ever had. His declination of the call back will be a source of deep disappointment to not only the church but to the people generally of Taylor. In his letter he stated that Taylor was the most beloved spot on earth to him, but that duty called him elsewhere. He recently quit the Lubbock Baptist Church to return to the Haskell Baptist Church, where he was also formerly pastor. Three former pastors were calling him back at the same time—Haskell, Cameron and Taylor.—Taylor Daily Democrat.

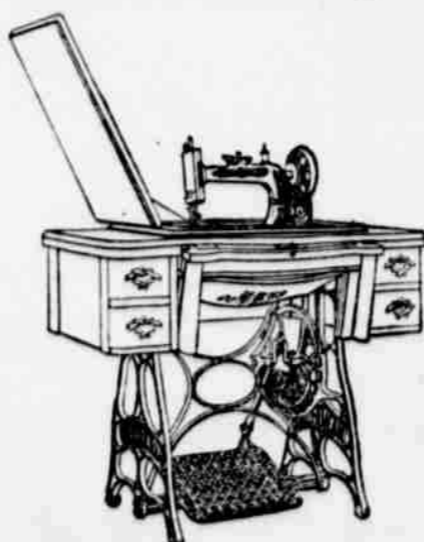

#### Texas Has Attractions

Within the last week or two some shrewd booster's editorial has been going the rounds of the press calling attention to the fact that there are still a few unmarried women in Texas, and that, considering the fame of Texas women for beauty and all good womanly qualities, including obedience of wives to husbands, this should prove an incentive in attracting large numbers of America's best and richest bachelors to this state.

The foregoing, no doubt is one of the great attractions of the state, but there are others. A dispatch from El Paso says that 5,000 Mexicans had crossed the border there within ten days to help in the cotton fields of Texas. Judging from the reported uprisings in Mexico during the past two years, great must be the incentive to induce a Mexican peon to give up the attractions of revolution to come to this state to do real work. But the attractions do look rather enticing, as pickers are reported making \$5 to \$8 a day, which looks real good even to a Texas white man, and no doubt much better to the Mexican peon and his usual 30 cents per in gold.

#### Texas' Financial Policy.

The old adage, "Make hay while the sun shines" is a good one. Now that the sun is shining upon Texas and times are prosperous within her borders, would it not be well for the commercial, legislative and financial interests of the state to "clinch" this condition as a permanent state asset, so that investment and expansion can go ahead in confidence without constant fear that from "out of the blue sky" of real, genuine, bubbling-over prosperity, as in 1907, there may stalk forth the black and financially despairing business panic.

"Banking Reform" said editorially in a recent number: "In times of peace in this country we frequently have panics. The disastrous panic of 1907 was simply a money panic. With no signs of war industrial situations the best, mills and factories running full, and bountiful crops, our entire business fabric collapsed, millions of dollars were lost and thousands of people ruined." The cause was simply one of the manipulations mentioned above.

The Louisville Times says that although "our banking conditions are the worst in the world, the United States besides its marvelous growth and prosperity, is favored in another way, it enjoys a monopoly of panics or panics on paper, that England, Germany and France know not of."

The Lexington, Ky., Herald says: "Such a condition as to the system of banking and the manipulation of money and commercial trusts, pools, syndicates and combinations exists only in this country which alone has a corner on financial panics."

If Texas industrial interests wish to insure continuous prosperity to the state, they can do so by making the finances of the state entirely safe and stable.

### The Financial Value of Common Schools to the State.

[BY A. CASWELL ELLIS.]

(Continued from last week.)

The financial value of education through its increase of productive capacity and, hence, of earning power, was lately well illustrated by President Dodge at a recent meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He calculated the financial value of education by comparing the earning capacities of the common laborer, the shop-apprentice trained workman, the trade school graduate, and the technical school graduate. He capitalized at 5 per cent the annual earning power of fifty weeks of work of a member of these classes, and took this sum as a potential value of each when making his comparisons. "A chart thus obtained shows that the laborer starts with \$3 a week when he is sixteen, and rises to \$10.20 by the time he is twenty-one; but rises no higher. His potential value at that wage is \$10,200. The apprentice or shop-trained worker starts with

er dividend in social betterment than can any other investment. Mr. Carnegie, the great steel maker, writing in the Tribune in 1890, said:

"The polytechnic and scientific school or course of study for boys is beginning to show the most valuable fruits in the manufacturing branch. The trained mechanic of the past, who has hitherto carried off most of the honors in our industrial work, is now to meet a rival in the scientifically educated youth, who will push him hard—very hard indeed. Three of the largest steel manufacturing concerns in the world are already under the management of three young educated men. Walker of the Illinois Steel Company, Schwab of the Edgar Thomson Works and Potter of the Homestead Steel Works are types of the new product. Not one of them yet thirty. Most of the chiefs of the departments under them are of the same class. Such young educated men have one important advantage over the apprenticed mechanic—they are open-minded and without prejudice. The

must be education adapted to the end in view, and must give instructions bearing upon a man's career if he is to make his way to fortune."

The railroads and other large business corporations have lately learned the financial value of education because of its great power to increase efficiently, and many of them are now providing, at their own expense, special courses and night schools to educate their employees, as it is impossible to get enough well educated ones in the market. It is reported that one great railroad system has recently adopted the policy of employing no boy with less than a high school education even for apprenticeship in any but the lowest grades of railroad work. This is not due to any fine spun theory about the value of education, or any philanthropic impulse on the part of the railroad managers but is due to the fact that their long experience has shown them that the chances of a boy with little or no education ever being able to do successfully the higher class of work demanded now on the railroad were so small that as a business proposition the railroads could not afford to bother with these boys. About the same time that this happened, the head of one of our great transcontinental lines wrote to the president of the University of Texas, asking for twenty graduates to put to work in the auditing and other branches of railroad work with the view of training them up for heads of departments and divisions. He, too, had found the great advantage which the educated citizen has placed in those higher business positions which demand not only quickness of thought, but breadth of outlook.

the same wages as the laborer at sixteen, but rises more rapidly, and is earning by the time he is twenty-four years old \$15.80. His potential value at that time is \$15,800, but he makes no further rise. The trade school graduate, starting at the same point, rises still more rapidly, and is earning, when he is twenty-five years of age, \$22 per week, his potential value at that time being \$22,000. From this point his wages rise less rapidly, reaching possibly \$25 a week at the age of thirty-two, and representing a potential value of \$25,000. The graduate of the technical school starts at the same point at a weekly salary of \$3, and is earning \$4 when he enters college at eighteen. Upon graduating from college, at the age of twenty-two, he can draw a salary of \$13 per week. He has then already passed the laborer, but is still a little below the shop-trained apprentice. He passes the latter, however, during his first year of employment, but is still below the trade school graduate, whom he does not overtake until his twenty-fifth year. From this point on he rapidly leaves behind the other three workers, and at the age of thirty-two is drawing \$43 a week, his potential value being \$43,000. Thus, four years' training at a technical school makes a man, by the time he is thirty-two four times as valuable as the laborer, approximately three times as valuable as the shop-trained apprentice, and seventy-two per cent more valuable than the trade school graduate. Surely a good return for four years spent in preparation."

The fact that the world's most successful business men, such as Morgan, Rockefeller, Schwab, Hopkin, Clark, Cornell, Carnegie and hundreds of others, pour out more of their accumulated millions to build schools than for any other purpose, also shows that the great leaders of business have learned that an investment in education yields a large

scientific attitude of the mind that of the searcher after truth, renders them receptive of new ideas. Great and invaluable as the working mechanic has been, and is and always will be, yet he is disposed to adopt narrow views of affairs, for he is generally well up in years before he comes into power. It is different with the scientifically trained boy; he has no prejudices, and goes in for the latest invention or newest method, no matter if another has discovered it. He adopts the plan that will beat the record, and discards his own devices or ideas, which the working mechanic superintendent can rarely be induced to do. Let no one, therefore, underrate the advantages of education; only it

**GOOD NEWS ABOUT COTTON**

**FIFTEEN CENTS FOR COTTON TO BE REALIZED. MONEY SECURED IN GERMANY**

We are informed by Judge Poole, who represents the Southern States Cotton Corporation, that he is in receipt of telegrams and letters from the state headquarters advising him that the President of the Corporation, Mr. Geo. Dole Wadley, has cabled from Bresnew, Germany, that his trip has been entirely successful. As President Wadley's trip was for the express purpose of making a deal with German financial interests for three hundred million (\$300,000,000) with which to finance the cotton marketing plan of the Southern States Cotton Corporation, his telegram can mean nothing else than that he has succeeded in getting control of the money. He was to sail for the United States at once. Judge Poole estimates that it will probably not require more than two weeks to make the arrangements with local banks for advancing money on cotton, which is to be 11 cents, middling basis, as it is delivered, and to issue and send out the Selling Certificates or contracts and to make the necessary handling arrangements at shipping points etc. As quickly as this can be done they will be ready to receive cotton from those who have certificated it with them.

tion means the emancipation of our Southland and the prosperity not alone of its farmers but of its every legitimate business interest, because it means fifty per cent more money every year for its great staple crop.
