Aransas Wildcat For School Trustee Has Negative Test

Sun Oil Company No. A-1 Copona State 98, Aransas County wildcat about three miles west of the Salt Lake Field, had recovered gas cut mud and muddy salt water on a drillstem test at 9,489-95 feet and was drilling Wednes-The deadline for filing should day at 9,516 feet. Permit depth is 10,000 feet.

> On the 12-minute test, through 1/4-inch chokes, with a 3,500-foot water cushion, there was no working pressure and recovery was the water cushion, 90 feet of gas cut mud and 100 feet of muddy salt water. Bottomhole pressures were 1,550 and 5,260 pounds.

In the East Fulton Beach Field, High Fitzgerald No. 1 Nana Holden was drilling at 5,200 feet on an 8,000-foot permit. Correlation log is to be run at 7,000 feet and coring is to be started around 7.150 feet.

This test, west of the Aransas Bay shoreline, is in Block 93 of the Fulton Townsite.

Union Producing Company No. 9 Virginia H. Tatton, wildcat north of the St. Charles Field, was drilling at 9,658 feet on an 11,000-foot permit. It is in the H. Knighton Survey, A-89.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 58 Copano Bay State Tract 67, in the West Fulton Beach Field, will be 1,980 feet from the north and 660 from the west lines of Tract 67. Permit depth is 11,000 feet.

THE ARRIVAL OF SPRING

The vernal equinox, which heralds the beginning of Spring, occurs at 5:01 o'clock on the afternoon of March 20th this year. At that moment, the earth's axis is at a right angle to the direction of the sun. At the vernal equinox day and night are equal all over the world.

The other time during the year when this occurs is in September, at the autumnal equinox, which will occur on September 23rd in 1953. In addition to the equinoxes, there is a Summer and Winter solstice, which ushers in Summer and Winter, respectively.

The Summer solstice begins in June, when the North Pole is tilted twenty-three degrees and twenty-seven minutes toward the sun and therefore in the Northern hemisphere the days are longer than the nights. At the same time, the days in the Southern hemisphere, where the South Pole is pointed away from the sun, are shorter than the nights.

This difference, which is caused by the tilting of the earth's axis is often misunderstood by many who know only that the vernal equinox marks the beginning of Spring and that the "some kind of day" in June, September and December herald the other three seasons.

Another question which is often not clear in the minds of many is why the hottest days of Summer seem to come after the Summer solstice, on which day there is more sunshine than any other day in the year. The reason for this is that the earth continues to build up heat after the Summer solstice, while losing only a portion of it at night, and therefore it is July or August when the maximum temperature is reached—and when the heat loss at night begins to match the heat gain in the day.

Because of the tilted axis of the earth, when the Northern hemisphere is tilted toward the sun, experiencing long days and warmer weather, the Southern hemisphere is tilted away, experiencing short days and colder weather.

BOHLEN ON YALTA PACT

Charles E. Bohlen, when questioned by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee recently as President Dwight D. Eisenhower's nominee as Ambassador to Russia, gave some straight and enlightening answers on the Yalta Pact. Though heard in secrecy, which was protested by some members of the committee, some of his testimony on the controversial meeting at Yalta has been reconstructed.

Knowing that the popular mood is to condemn the Yalta agreement, as reached by the late resident Franklin D. Roosevelt and Joseph Stalin, as a betrayal of this country's ideals, Bohlen resisted the temptation to jump on the bandwagon and gave his honest views in spite of the fact that they were sure to contradict some of the campaign oratory of 1952. Mr. Bohlen is the only living American who knows what Roosevelt said to Stalin at Yalta, since has was the official translator.

President Eisenhower has a high regard for the abilities of Bohlen and he is generally credited as one of the two Americans who understand conditions in Russia best. In brief, he outlined the following views on the Yalta agreement: (1) The major failure of the agreement is that the Soviet Union failed to live up to pledges made in the agreement, and not that the agreements themselves failed to provide provisions for democratic government in areas completely communized by the Russians.

(2) Russia, at the time, occupied some of the areas involved, thus making an agreement on democratic elections and processes, in them, the only possibly U. S. course to pursue.

(3) At the time, President Roosevelt made concessions in the northern Japanese islands and Manchuria, to Stalin, the late President was trying to speed up the end of the war and thought he would have 200,000 or 300,000 American lives by getting Russia to enter the war.

(4) There was no betrayal or intended betrayal in the Pact.

Not denying that widespread subjugation of peoples followed the Yalta Pact, Bohlen nevertheless denied that the Yalta agreement, or any interpretation of it, is to blame for what has happened since. He believes the Russians alone, and their refusal to carry out the agreement, are responsible for the failure of the Yalta Pact to achieve aims which President Roosevelt hoped it might.

Bohlen said he found it hard to believe that the Yalta Agreements were so favorable to Russia, as often contended, since the Russians have found it in their interest to violate them openly and continuously. Such testimony is refreshing in times when this side of the argument is seldom heard. It is regrettable that the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate saw fit to bar the press and make a secret of Bohlen's testimony. As President Eisenhower's nominee to Russia, the American people were certainly entitled to hear his views on an issue as controversial as the Yalta Pact.



Nutritious School Lunch Beneficial to Child Health

Austin, Texas. - To assure good health for children, special attention should be paid to the school lunch, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. If good nutrition is obtained the diet must include meat, milk, butter, fruit, vegetables, and whole grain and enriched cereals in proper quan-

Inadequate lunches can deprive children of the nutrition necessary for good health and intelligent work at schools. A sandwich and a soft drink are not sufficient even though the child may have a good breakfast and evening meal.

A child's lunch should provide at least one third of the daily food requirements. Whether eaten at home or at school, it should include one half pint of milk, a substantial protein food as meat, egg, cheese or peanut butter sandwich, a vegetable for fruit or both and whole grain or enriched bread with butter. In addition to being nutritious and palatable, food should be safe. Food from unsafe sources or prepared under insanitary conditions may result in illness. Milk should be pasteurized. 

AUSTIN-Crime is the big

news in the Legislature. Lawmakers are considering a report of the House Crime Investigating Committee. Among other things, the committee recommended that the state set up an agency, something like the FBI, to act when local law enforcement officers fail to do their jobs.

Representative Fred Meridith of Terrell is chairman of the committee, which spent two years looking into the status of crime in Texas. The report said that there are fewer organized law violations than there have been in some time.

The House appropriations coma bill providing \$161,358,168 for the Court House. general expenditures during the next two years.

That is all the money in sight from present sources. According to the constitution, the state cannot spend more than it has.

The appropriation does not take care of increased spending, demanded from many sources for higher teachers' and state employees' salaries, road building, and other expenses.

If those expenses are to be met, there will have to be new taxes to raise the money.

Representative George T. Hinson, of Mineola, advocates getting more funds by means of his bill to put a tax of two cents per thousand cubic feet of natural gas produced under contracts covering more than a one-year period.

The tax, Hinson estimates, will bring the state \$30 million a year.

Another recommendation was that of a West Texas group in the House. They presented a bill that would up taxes on natural resources, refineries, and the chemical industry so as to bring the state an additional \$80 million per year.

The money would go to teachers and state employees, city streets, highways, colleges and prisons.

Some legislators were up in arms about the Esquire magazine piece "Truth About Texas." Representative Marshall O. Bell urged the Attorney General to find out whether the magazine's mailing privilege could be susspended. Representative S. J. Isaacks said "no other writer has told so many lies in so few words."





Most of the changes proposed would establish four stable Monday holidays. They would be "President's Day," which would fall on the third Monday in February, Memorial Day, which would fall on the last Monday in May, Independence Day, which would fall on the first Monday in July, and Thanksgiving Day, which would fall on the fourth Monday in November. Thus, the traditional Thursday Thanksgiving holiday would be changed to Monday under this pro-

Calendar reformers admit that this proposal is only the beginning of their efforts to change other features of the calendar which they consider completely outmoded. We believe that, from a business standpoint, the four Monday holidays might be desirable, although we are inclined to feel that many workers like to see Thanksgiving Day fall on Thursday, and welcome a break in the week when a holiday falls in midweek. Whether the calendar reformers can get the most of the states to adopt their plan before opposition developes to it seems to be the question.

But equally enthusiastic are the two 12-year-olds from South Carolina at right. "Falls" and "drops" are taken good naturedly while being taught by two pretty northern girls.
