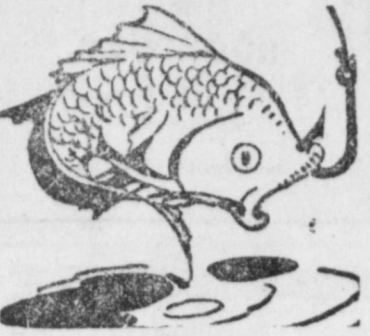


Along The Waterfront



When the wind does not blow the fishing is fine. When it does blow it is best to stay on land, so a number of fishermen learned in this area last Sunday morning. After a good day's fishing on Saturday several fishermen ventured out in boats before the strong north wind blew in Sunday morning.

Four of the fishermen got stranded at the oil rig just south of town, and tied up their boats and were staying on the oil rig when Fred Christilles saw them as he came into town with the party he had aboard. Mr. Christilles went back and rescued them, Mr. Auge and son-in-law, John Keen, of San Antonio and Col. Lewis and a friend. They were two separate parties. Both had their boats tied up at the rig. Morris Gregory caught 35 or 40 nice trout Wednesday morning out there. On Saturday, Leon Bennett and Mr. Wilkie, of San Antonio, fished with Harry Mills, getting 55 trout and 12 gaff tops. Some of these trout were exceptionally nice. Dr. Nash, of San Antonio, fished with Jack Lawler Saturday. They caught 35 nice trout. Mac Miller fished the same day with Herbert Mills, catching 40 trout.

Earle Thomas had a party out Friday which brought in 52 trout and Saturday Leland Hastings and party landed 36 trout. Mr. Thomas and party got caught at Long Reef Sunday morning in the storm, anchored a couple of hours and came back to town. Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Rogers, of Amarillo, and C. E. and Lena Pitts, of Lone Prairie, fished with Hugh Morrison Wednesday and brought in over 58 nice trout. H. L. Bobo and J. T. Burtis, of Texas City, caught 70 trout from Johnson's Bait Stand last Friday, some of them weighed over 3 pounds. These men were very happy at they had fished at Port Isabel on Tuesday and Wednesday, getting only 6 trout. On Saturday, Mr. Bartlett caught 36 trout and Mr. Whitfill and Mr. McKnight got 40 before noon. Jimmy Smith and Mr. Johnson caught 26 nice trout Wednesday, three of them weighed over 4 pounds each, all were large. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson went fishing Wednesday, coming in with 18 trout and 22 gaff tops. Mr. Johnson says the fish average larger this year than for the past three years.

Travis Bailey, sailing his boat, "Easy Going" won in the sailboat race from Corpus Christi to Port Aransas last Saturday afternoon. Dave Herring, James Bracht, Ernie Glover and Doug Stevens enjoyed helping operate the boat. The elapsed time for the race was two hours and twenty-six minutes. The race was sponsored by the Corpus Christi Yacht Club. There were 16 boats in the race. Bailey stated that he and others interested in sailing are planning to sponsor the usual 4th of July races from Corpus Christi to Rockport again this summer.

Sun Aransas Test Coring At 7,151 Ft.

Sun Oil Co. No. 9 State Tract 41, Aransas County test in the Fulton Beach Field, 2 1/2 miles southwest of Lamar, was coring at 7,151 feet. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 12 State Tract 106, test in the Fulton Beach (A 4-6 sand) Field 4 1/2 miles northwest of Rockport, will be 660 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of State Tract 106. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

C. G. Glasscock and Humble Oil and Refining Co. have staked location for an Aransas County offshore wildcat 7 miles northwest of Rockport.

Their No. 1 State Tract 11 will be 2,333 feet from the south line and 467 feet from the east line of State Tract 11. Permitted depth is 8,000 feet.

Lonnie Glasscock No. 1 E. McCabe, slated 8,000 foot test in the Lamar Field, will be 165 feet north of Aransas Bay (State Tract 84) and 495 feet south southwest of State Highway 35, which is also the eastern northeast corner of the lease. The try will be 7 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 N. H. McDowell, indicated 1/2-mile north extension to Aransas County's St. Charles Field eight miles northeast of Lamar in Sumpter Turner Survey, has set 7-inch production string on bottom at 8,335 feet.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 95, test in the Goose Island Field, 5 miles north of Rockport, had set 10 1/2-inch casing at 1,500 feet after running electric log to 1,542. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Texon Drilling Co. was rigging up for Sullivan and Garnett No. 1 James B. Heard Estate, slated 7,500-foot Lamar Field test 10 miles north of Rockport. The test is in Block 162 of Lamar Townsite.

Hugh J. Fitzgerald No. 1 Henry Brenner, test in the East Fulton Beach Field, will be 43 feet from the north and 350 feet from the west lines of tract 1, Live Oak Point Tracts subdivision, David Lockard survey A-97. Permit depth is 8,000 feet.

Selby-Walker Corp. and P. G. Lake Inc. No. 1 A. G. Collins, East Fulton Beach Field test five miles northwest of Rockport, was drilling below 7,270 feet on an 8,000-foot permit. It had earlier cored from 7,120 to 7,203 feet. The test recovered five feet of firm, fine grain, porous gray sand with good oil odor and taste from 7,165-70 feet and four feet of sand with fair oil odor and taste from 7,185-90 feet.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Asks City For Rate Increase

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. April 14, filed a request for higher rates in Rockport, as provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

Stan Bell, district manager for the company, pointed to inadequate earnings on the company's local property in filing the request.

The company last requested an increase in telephone rates here in May, 1951. The application was based on operating results for 1950.

"Since that time two general wage increases have been granted telephone employees, taxes have continued to go up, and the cost of many things we use in providing service here have risen," Bell added.

"As a result, after paying today's costs of furnishing service, the present rates do not leave enough to provide a fair return on our operations here," he said. In the application to the City the company did not file for a specific schedule of rates but asked the City to authorize a new schedule of rates which would produce a fair rate of return based on the fair value of the property.

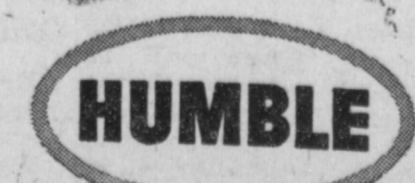
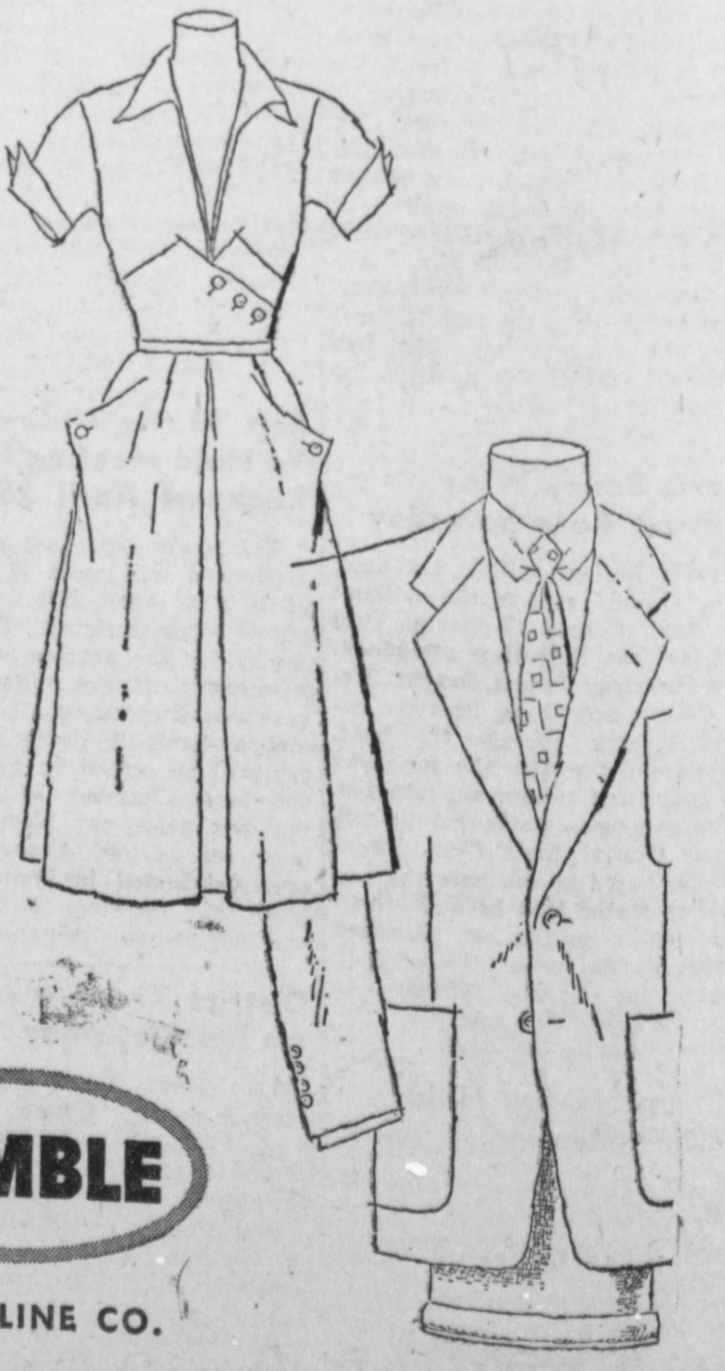

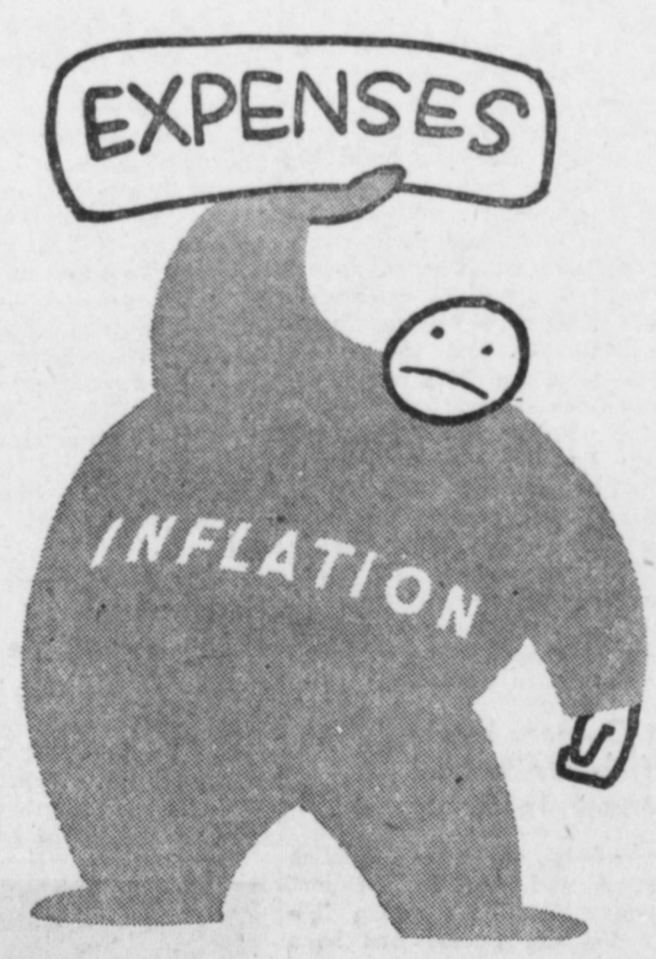

1952 Auto Accident Toll At All-time High

More than two million casualties, the worst automobile accident toll in the nation's history, were recorded in 1952, according to figures released today by The Travelers Insurance Companies.

Last year's traffic deaths totaled 37,600, an increase of 500 over the 1951 mark. The injury count soared to 2,090,000, more than 127,000 over 1951, the Hartford firm reported.

The death and injury totals are highlight statistics from "Who, Me?", nineteenth in an annual series of traffic accident data booklets published by The Travelers. Company statisticians collect and analyze accident facts from each state.

The most dangerous mistake in driving last year was excessive speed. Speed killed 13,430 persons and injured nearly 600,000, according to the report. Drivers under 25 years old were involved in almost 25 per cent of the year's fatal accidents although they constitute only about 15 per cent of the total of all drivers.

More than 15,000 persons were killed and nearly 750,000 hurt in weekend crashes in 1952. Forty per cent of the deaths and 36 per cent of the injuries occurred on Saturdays and Sundays last year.

It was the second consecutive year of improvement in the pedestrian record. Figures from the booklet show that pedestrian casualties were reduced by more than eight per cent in 1952. Crossing between intersections, "jay walking," still is the chief cause of pedestrian deaths and injuries.

Other facts from "Who, Me?": Three out of four 1952 auto accidents happened to passenger cars driving in clear weather on dry roads.

Eighty per cent of vehicles involved in fatal accidents were

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

Austin, Tex.—House and Senate wrestled this week with a new kind of appropriation bill—one that undertook to budget not only the state's general revenue fund, but also the all other sources such as federal aid and direct income such as highway taxes and college fees.

Last week a joint conference committee agreed on the total of expenditures for the next two years: \$1,194,266,221. It was higher than the amount set by either House or Senate in their appropriation bills.

The general revenue figure was put at \$166,569,347. Previous appropriation bills have dealt only with this fund.

Appropriations as set by the committee were estimated to be within the revenue that the state will receive during the coming biennium, thus it would call for no new taxation.

The bill provides \$180 a year pay increase for state employees and up to \$300 a year pay-hikes for university and college teachers.

The House has backed up Representative Max C. Smith of San Marcos, chairman of the appropriations committee, in his statement that under House rules no other appropriation bill may be acted upon until the general appropriation measure is passed by both houses.

That rule stymied public school teachers, who have been pressing hard for action on a measure that would give them salary increases of \$600 per year.

Charles Tennyson, secretary of Texas State Teachers Association, says that no smaller amount will be acceptable to the teachers. It is provided in a bill by Representative Lamar Zivley of Temple.

The administration is sponsoring a measure by Representative Joe Kilgore of McAllen to up the teachers' salaries by \$450 per year. In an attempt to woo the teachers, Kilgore changed the figure in his bill from \$240.

A third bill by Representative Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford would raise the salaries of beginning teachers by \$600 per year, but the increases of older and more experienced teachers would be lower.

Twelve hundred teachers were in the gallery when the House appropriations committee held a hearing on the teacher pay bills.

At the hearing, R. L. Proffer of Denison, president of the teachers association, said, "If we don't do something constructive for the teachers in the immediate future, our whole education system is going to pot."

Kilgore warned the House that "it will require the biggest tax bill in the history of this legislature if the school folks get a \$600 per year general raise with state funds."

The Legislature, meanwhile, seemed little inclined to pass new tax bills.

Hearings continued on a proposal to raise \$84 million a year by increased taxes on oil, gas, beer and various natural resources, and by placing new taxes on chemical industries and presently untaxed resources.

Passage of this omnibus bill is considered very doubtful.

Other tax propositions are dead or dying. The House revenue and taxation committee killed a two per cent levy on merchandise sales.

A new tax bill on natural gas pipelines is comatose in the committee, with no hearing set. A one-cent increase in the gasoline tax is in the same condition.

Letting bills die in committee is the way the Legislature gets rid of most of them.

At every session, more bills are introduced than the members can possibly consider, much less debate and either pass or defeat.

Thus it was that a house committee gave an overdose of sleeping powders to a bill by Representative Maury Maverick of San Antonio to regulate lobbyists.

The bill would force members of the "third house" to register, tell whom they represent and how, and list their expenses.

The committee heard arguments for and against the bill, then sent it to a sub-committee, from whence it is not likely to emerge.

A fight was promised by labor organizations against a bill by Representative W. H. Abington to rewrite the workmen's compensation laws.

The Texas Federation of Labor, the Texas CIO and the rail brotherhoods contend that the bill would reduce partial disability benefits for many workers and exclude others from benefits for which they are now eligible.

Industry spokesmen said they might not support the bill in its present revised form, although they favored it as originally written.

The bill has been passed by a committee.

Texas Manufacturers Association entertained members of the Legislature during Texas Industrial Week at a dinner where the main speaker was Clarence Manion of South Bend, Ind., former dean of the Notre Dame law school.

Manion spoke of the "evil concentration of power in the executive branch of our federal government." He urged that this power be broken up and returned to the states and to the local communities within the states.

Land Commissioner Bascom Giles pledged a "fight to the last" on any amendment to the Veterans Land Program which would take away from the veteran mineral rights he now owns.

Veterans now receive, in land purchases under the program, a minimum of 50 per cent of the oil rights, Giles said, and every fourth veteran who has purchased property is ahead of his payments because of revenue from mineral development.

Legal action will be taken against distributors of Communist propaganda in Texas if they can be arrested, said Attorney General Ben Shepperd.

Shepperd disclosed that one of his assistants went to New York for the purpose of conferring with the attorney general of that state in an attempt to apprehend the persons who mailed Red leaflets to Texans recently.

Stillwell, superintendent of the Texarkana schools, says is necessary to get teachers — both in quantity and quality.

Action will be taken as soon as the rules of the House permit.

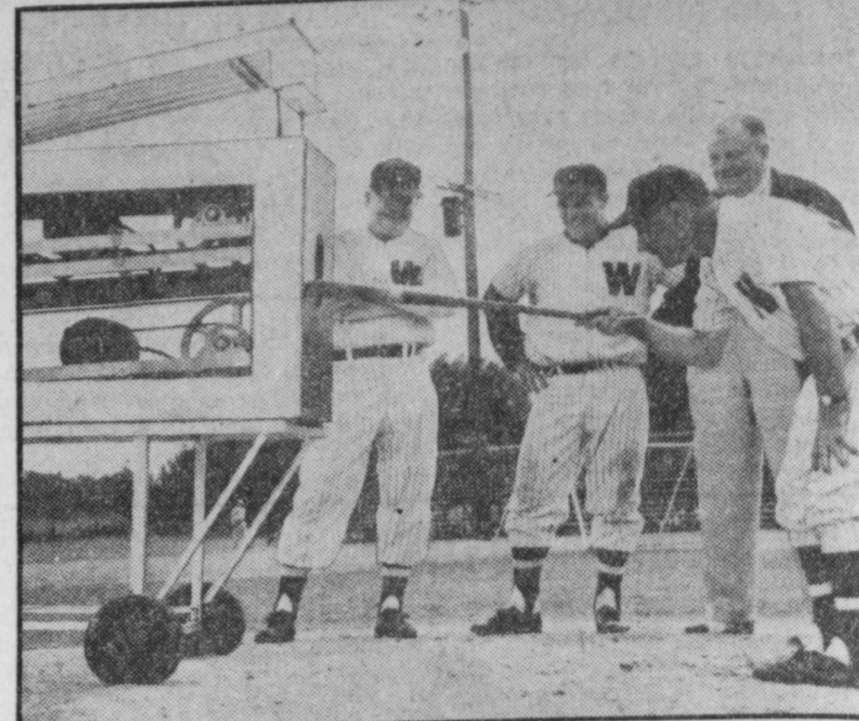
The Texas Outlook, April 1953, makes this comment on the situation: "Some branches of industry are conducting a 'mad scramble' for college seniors this year. The average beginning salary offered graduates with a bachelor degree is \$3,696.00 and the beginning salary of a graduate with a masters degree is \$4,440. The minimum teachers salary required for the new graduate with a bachelor degree is \$2,403, and one with a masters degree is \$2,628."

The average wage for a school teacher in Texas is the same as a truck driver, less than an oil field roustabout, nearly \$2,000 less than train-labor and train baggage men receive over twice the salary of teachers.

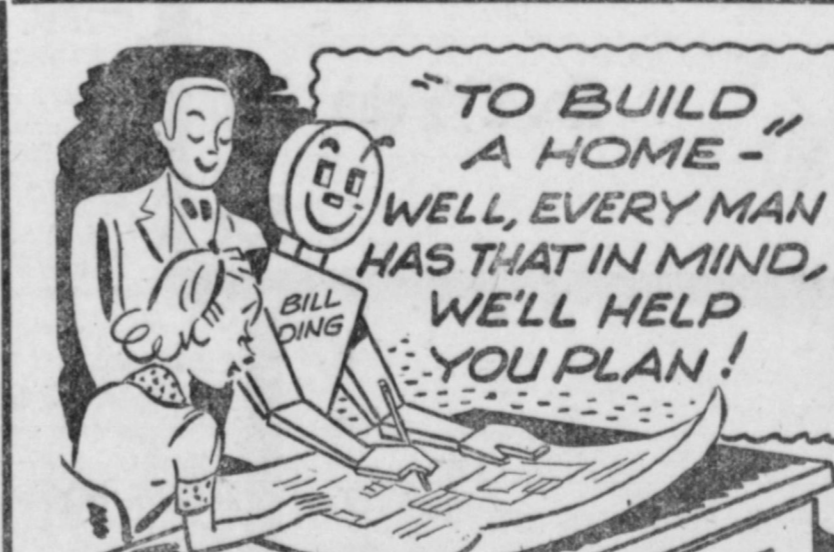

What Does the Bible Say?

SHALL WE RESPECT THE CONSTITUTION?

Recently our attention has been called again to the constitution of the United States. Our founding fathers wrote a marvelous document to safeguard our freedom. Shall we in this age respect it?

The men who wrote our constitution were outstanding men such as James Madison, Edmund Randolph, George Washington Alexander Hamilton and Benjamin Franklin. In their constitutional convention in Philadelphia, 165 years ago they earnestly labored to weld the thirteen states into one united states. When it looked as if a stalemate had developed which would doom the effort, Benjamin Franklin proposed that they go to God in prayer. Unlike our later representatives at the United Nations conference in San Francisco these delegates did not refuse for fear of offending some who did not believe in God. They prayed and from that time on the obstacles began to be overcome.

But no sooner had the constitution become the basic law of the land than there arose two attitudes toward it. One group, led by Alexander Hamilton, contended that the constitution was not to be strictly followed, but that it was to be construed very loosely. The other group, led by Thomas Jefferson, held that the constitution would be of little value unless it was strictly followed. They held that the liberty and happiness of the people would best be served by observing respect for the constitution.

In Christianity we have a constitution. It is the Bible, the Word

of God. The Bible says that men should strictly observe its precepts. "We have also a more sure word of prophecy; whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place . . ." (II Peter 1). Unlike our United States constitution it was not written by fallible men, by "men spake from God, being moved by the Holy Spirit". Hence, there is no need for amendments or later revelations. Jude says "Contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints".

The basic question in religion is this: Shall we respect the constitution of Christianity? Most of the important questions are not questions of interpretation, but questions of authority. Too many discussions about religion are on a shallow plane. They are settled on the basis of what my taste or yours prefers. We need to get back to the constitution! What does the Bible say? Then let us

follow it strictly and be on the safe side!

In the Old Testament we find God demands respect for His Word. Noah was blessed because he built the ark exactly as God specified. "Thus did Noah; according to all that God commanded him, so did he." Genesis 6. Concerning the law of Moses God said: "Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish aught from it."

When Saul was told to destroy the wicked Amalekites he did not respect God's word, but thought it would be better to bring back King Agag, and the best of the sheep and oxen to offer as a sacrifice. Samuel rebuked him saying: "Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifice, as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams." I Samuel 15.

Jesus himself learned obedience and "became the author of eternal salvation to all them that obey him." (Hebrews 5). He said: "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." (Matthew 7). Shall we respect the Word of Christ? Shall we strictly follow His instructions?

We of the churches of Christ are pleading for basic respect for God's Word in the New Testament! Prayerfully study your New Testament and follow its teaching. It will lead you to abundant life here and eternal life hereafter.

Public Urged To Keep Hands Off Wildlife

Austin—The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission asked the populace to "keep their distance" during the Animal Kingdom's rearing season. He said Texans can contribute mightily to the wildlife family by not trying to make pets of wild creatures or by trying to domesticate eggs of any kind.

"The sad part of the mistakes people make in molesting birds and beasts," said the executive secretary, "is that they think they are helping out. Well, there are rare cases when they can. I repeat these cases are very rare.

"Any baby animal or bird deserves a chance to be restored to its natural protectors, if it actually does get lost or does seem to need help. People see stray creatures, such as a fawn. Maybe they are overwhelmed by an irresistible impulse to 'save' the fawn. Generally if left alone, the animal will be found by its mother. Of course there are extraordinary instances where the mother deer is killed by a car, or some such, where a fawn may be saved. But even then if they do survive and are raised as pets, they usually become a nuisance and sometimes harmful. Furthermore, it is unlawful to pick up fawns."

The Executive Secretary said taking or handling or even "looking at" wild bird eggs may be disastrous. Some birds, such as wild turkey, will not return to a nest which has been approached by humans. He added that although eggs placed under a domestic bird do hatch, the incident merely circumvents nature since anything hatched under such circumstances invariably is lost to the cause of wildlife.

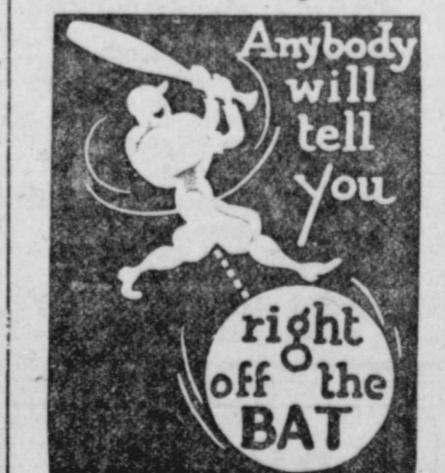

Navy Will Stage Huge Air Show April 17, 18 and 19

Corpus Christi, Tex. — One of the biggest shows in South Texas will be presented at the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi April 17, 18 and 19 — the 1953 Navy Relief Carnival.

The carnival, conducted by the Naval Air Station and the Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Cabaniss Field, will raise money for the Navy Relief Society.

The gates of the sprawling 2,800 acre Naval Air Station, located 10 miles southeast of the city at Flour Bluff, will be open to the public for the big three days and visitors may drive throughout the station.

Two huge seaplane hangars and the surrounding areas will house a mass display of exhibits, concessions, games, rides and plenty of other fun and entertainment for everyone. A large parking area will be provided to take care of thousands of cars.

Capt. John F. Greenslade, commanding officer of the Naval Air Station and head of the carnival, anticipates a crowd of at least 100,000 persons for the three-day show.

One of the major highlights will be two big air shows by the Blue Angels, the Navy's famous precision flight exhibition team that has drawn crowds up to 250,000 persons at military shows throughout the nation. They will perform on April 18 and 19 at 4:30 p. m. Admission to the carnival will be free. Carnival hours will be from 6 p. m. to midnight on April 17, 3 p. m. to midnight on April 18, and 1 p. m. to 10 p. m. on April 19.

One of the big hangars will house a colorful industrial show. The Navy has employed Southwest Decorators from Houston to set up blue velous booths to house displays of firms and industries from the Corpus Christi area. The 45 firms and industries who have subscribed to booth space are making plans for attractive and interesting displays of their products.

In the other section of the same hangar will be a display of Naval aviation, including planes, search and rescue gear, mechanical equipment and many other items used in the Naval Air Advanced Training Command which has headquarters here.

The other hangar will have the carnival midway and space for dancing. There will be a beer garden with a German band, bingo and many other attractions.

Special features include helicopter rescue demonstrations and jet-assisted takeoffs by big Navy patrol bombers in Corpus Christi Bay just off the station.

Many valuable prizes will be awarded during the carnival, including a 1953 Cadillac.

Another highlight will be the selection of the winner of the Miss Navy Relief popularity contest. Fourteen girls are vying for this honor, selling votes at a penny each. When Miss Navy Relief is chosen, the same girls will be entered in a beauty contest, with the winner of this being declared Miss Navy Corpus Christi.

Rural Phone Installations In Area Set Record

More farmers now have rural telephone service in the Rockport trade area than at any time in history, according to Stan Bell, district manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

A total of 249 farmers in the Rockport area now enjoy rural dial telephone service as a result of the telephone company's steady progress in its postwar rural program to bring dependable, all-weather service to farmers. This means that more than six times as many farmers are now connected to the nation's vast communications network than at the end of World War II when the company had only 36 telephones in operation in rural areas around Rockport, Bell said.

"The increase in farm telephones has brought not only better service to farmers but increased benefits to every telephone user in Rockport since more rural telephones mean a larger calling area open to each subscriber," the local manager said. "In addition, it increases business for Rockport merchants by broadening their trade area."

In the 14 towns comprising the company's Corpus Christi district, including Rockport, the number of rural telephones connected by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., jumped from 527 at the end of World War II to 3,893 in 1950. By the end of last year, there were 5,003 subscribers with rural telephone service—an increase of 1,110 in only two years, Bell said.

BIRD POPULACE CHANGE PLACES

Some feathered housekeeping places are changing hands on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge according to reports to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The shifting occurred unusually early this year, reports state, with the estimated 80,000 waterfowl on the refuge setting the pace undoubtedly because of open weather northward.

Even the giant Whooping Cranes presumably are poised for their long hop to the far north although they usually remain until mid-April.

As the northern nesting species leave the vast Blackjack Peninsula protectorate, some of the room they vacate is taken over by other birds which winter in the far south and summer on the coast.

Conspicuous among the birds due to begin summer housekeeping at the refuge are the Roseate Spoonbills which leave about mid-October for deep Mexico, Central America and Honduras. These exotic birds usually concentrate about this time of the year on a few ancestral coastal nesting areas, including small islands off Aransas refuge, Galveston Bay and San Benito. One favorite place is Carroll Island, off Aransas, which the National Audubon Society protects with a special watchman in the summer.

Julian Howard, manager of the Aransas Refuge, said the departure of the Whooping Cranes is very mysterious. They begin disappearing, apparently moving out at night, he said. Howard's maximum winter census count was 21 Whoopers.

Dove Outlook Reported Good

Austin—The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission said reports generally indicate promising hatching conditions for mourning doves in Texas.

He said field studies show a high dove population at this time but added that some of the birds apparently are merely stopping over enroute to northern nesting areas.

"The present population of mourning doves indicates that we should have another good batch of birds, particularly if moisture conditions continue to improve," said the Executive Secretary. "Of course, there are many deterrents. Any trend toward violent weather would be costly since the flimsy dove nests, containing eggs or young, are vulnerable to the elements."

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission (W. C. Glazener) said field observations "are very promising." He noted one unusually heavy concentration of mourning doves in the Alpine area as described by Flying Game Warden Frank Hamer. The Director said it had not been determined whether the doves were transient or part of the permanent population.

The Director added that the current healthy condition of the mourning dove flocks has accelerated the banding program. He said an increasing number of individuals are assisting wardens and other field men in this vital routine "since they realize the profound effect banding has on efforts to learn more about migration and other habits of doves."
