All the fishing reports have been good this week, everyone is catching plenty of fish and a variety of the finny tribe are biting. J. H. Miller of San Antonio, caught a nice lot of beautiful fish out there. Stanley Winters and wife of San Antonio fished one week and took home 300 pounds of fish.

Dan Sitterle, 15 years old, of Victoria, landed a 4 foot 3 inch tarpon in the bay north of Fulton, Friday. Dan's brother, Frank was in the skiff with him and rowed toward shore while Dan fought the fish, landing it in about an hour.

Out at the Jolly Roger Pier the fishermen are catching lots of fish and of different varieties, too. Henry Roberts and party from Palm Village, fished with Harry Mills, from Mills Wharf, Thursday, landing 278 trout. Jack Lawler had Melvin Tyler of Eagle Lake out that day, getting 93 trout. A party from the Southwest Texas Oil Sales Co. fished with Harry Mills, getting 243 trout, and a party from the Southern Oil Sales Service, Jack Cantrell, host, fished with Jack Lawler, bringing in 110 fish. D. D. McWilliams, of San Antonio, went fishing with Harry Mills Saturday, getting 165 trout, and Mr. and Mrs. Bert Marchwaldt were out with Jack Lawler, landing 109. Frank Formey caught 130 trout, fishing with Herb Mills. There were two boats out from the Wharf Sunday and both had good catches. Monday, V. Byron of Rowena, Texas, fished with Harry Mills, bringing in 35 reds and drum. There was a party out from the Wharf Wednesday which brought in a good catch of reds, trout and drum.

Floyd Fros and party of San Antonio, fished from Floyd's Boat and Sales Co. Saturday morning, getting 99 trout. They went out from there again Sunday morning and came in with 96 nice trout. The fishermen are getting lots of fish at Perry Jones' Wharf every day now. A fisherman from Dallas caught a gar out there measuring over five feet long. Boys Land Tarpon In Bay Friday

The boys were fishing from a skiff about 350 yards from shore in front of Crescent Beach, when Dan, 15 years old, hooked the tarpon on a No. 3 triple hook with a gut lead. He was over an hour landing the fish, fighting him all the way to shore, as Frank pulled the boat.

The tarpon weighed about 45 pounds and the boys did not have a gaff hook, so Frank took a feeling pole and tied a large hook to it to bring the fish to shore.

The boys say there were two tarpon in the bay up there Friday morning as one of them hit Frank's hook and broke the line just before Dan hooked his tarpon. They could see it going out, taking Frank's cork with it, while Dan was fighting his fish.

Several spectators saw the boys land the fish and made pictures of the event.

The men are sponsoring the project of building tables for the annex. Plans for charter night were discussed.

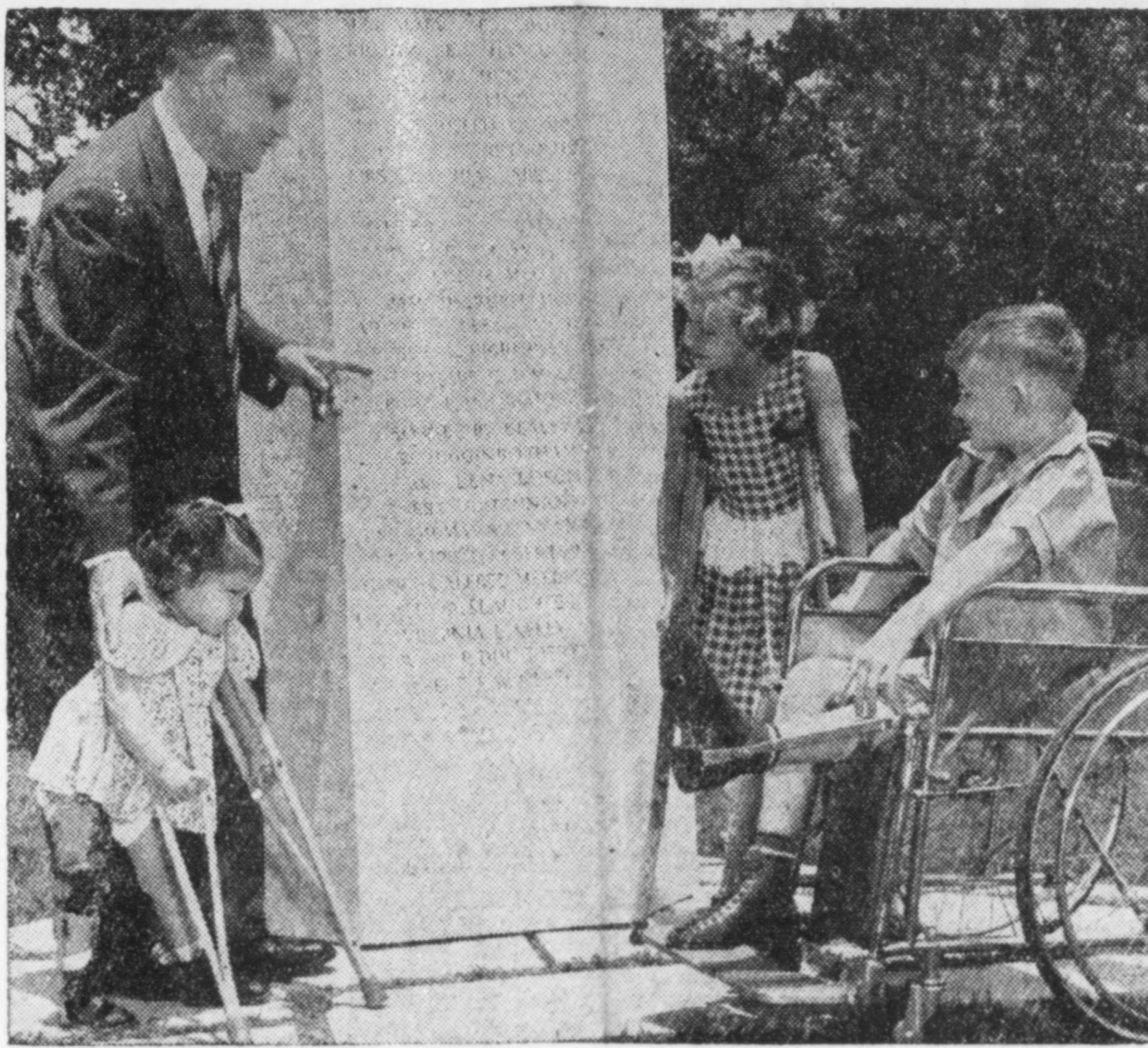
Mr. Godde served the men cantaloupes which he raised in his garden.

POSTOFFICE BOX RENT INCREASE DUE JULY 1

Postmaster Marion McElveen has announced that there will be an increase in the rental of post-office boxes effective July 1. The new rates will be: Boxes that formerly were 60c will be 90c; 75c boxes will be \$1.10, and \$1.00 boxes will be \$1.50.

"The postmaster pointed out that this is the first basic increase in box rents since 1907. The last increase at the Rockport office was July 1, 1945, when the rates were increased 15c per quarter.

The new increase is being made to conform with the increase cost of providing the equipment and maintaining the service. McElveen said it is believed the patrons will recognize that this is a proper step.

Stolen Shrimp Sold In Corpus Christi

Sheriff Arley Shivers has reported that his department picked up Albert D. Dupree, who has been charged with stealing shrimp off of the Captain Kidd, on May 30, and taking them to Corpus Christi and selling them to a cafe in that city. Dupree is in the jail here.

Two Aransas County Mansions Attract Many Visitors

Two of Texas' most famous nineteenth century mansions are finding new roles as showplaces in the center of one of the state's foremost modern-day resort and recreation areas.

The mansions are those erected during the reconstruction period by Colonel George W. Fulton and W. S. Hall on the shore of Aransas Bay in the Fulton Beach section adjoining Rockport.

Although unoccupied for years, both have remained in extremely good condition.

Colonel Fulton, a cousin of the inventor of the steamship and a cattle baron in his own right, moved into his mansion in 1875.

It was a three-story structure that was under construction for four years—and no expense was spared.

The ground floor was of thick concrete, reinforced with iron rails. Fifty-foot cypress planks were used to construct the second and third story walls. Gutters and roof were of pure copper, and slate shingles were used to enclose the top floor.

Marble quarried in Italy was converted into wash bowls. Bath-tubs were of cypress, and were lined with copper.

In the parlor were Italian chandeliers, mantles of marble and ebony, and mirrors with gold-engraved trimmings.

Inside the mansion were a hot-water system—something virtually unheard of at that time—and an elevator shaft through which food was transported to the main-floor dining room from the kitchen below.

The Hall home was built in 1870, and while not as ornate as the Fulton home, was one of Texas' most fashionable estates.

The two-story structure was used as a residence until 1888, at which time it was converted into a hotel. In 1929, a third story was added.

The Fulton home is visited each year by thousands of Texans and other Rockport guests.

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Excessive Perspiration May Prove Dangerous

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink. Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal regions, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

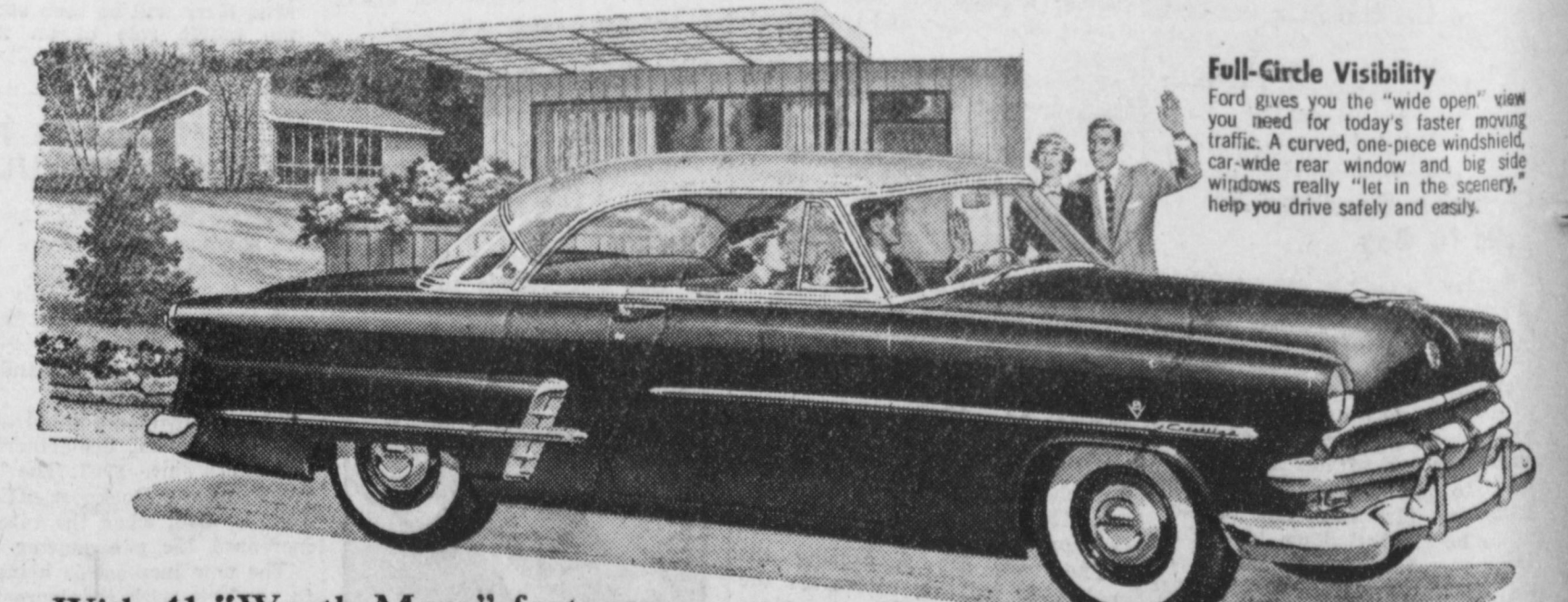

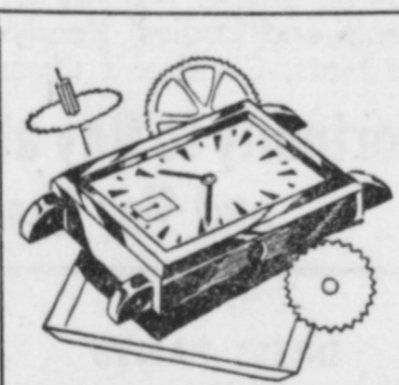

Farm Quotas
Look for quotas on both cotton and wheat next year. Cotton farmers from the Pecos area, here last week, urged Agriculture Department to consider recent heavy increases in cotton planting in Texas when lower acreage quotas are set for 1954. Recent ruling by the department's solicitor says 1954 quotas must be based on planting of past seven years, not including 1953. Plantings in West Texas and South Plains were much smaller in 1947 and 1948 than in more recent years. The ruling, if it stands, would require growers in these sections to take acreage cuts far greater than the national average. Revision of wheat quota laws will be proposed to bring them more nearly in line with laws governing cotton, tobacco, peanuts. Congressman W. R. Poage of Waco reports House Agriculture Committee, of which he is a member, is working on revisions.

Loans and Grants
During first five months of this year, Texas received the following Federal loans and grants: \$394,000 for one telephone cooperative affecting five counties; \$2,433,000 for 10 electric cooperatives affecting 59 counties; \$1,457,303 for 125 schools in 41 counties.

It ain't necessarily so. People who consult a doctor because they fear they have heart disease often find their symptoms are of little or no importance. Of course, their alertness is worthwhile because if heart disease is present, it is discovered in time for treatment to do the most good. Also, disease in other parts of the body may be disclosed.

A number of symptoms may point to or be confused with heart disease. The following is a partial list: Rapid beating of the heart (palpitation), tiredness which is brought on easily, shortness of breath, pain in the heart and stomach region, fainting, dizziness, trembling, loss of feeling or swelling (edema) of parts of the body, or cold, clammy hands and feet.

Medical examination can reassure the patient he's all right if no disease is found or lead to early treatment if it is. Prompt, correct treatment of heart ailments in most cases adds years to the life span and permits the patient to lead a happier, more useful life.

Several procedures are indispensable to the doctor in examination of the patient with suspected heart disease. First, as in other diseases, the medical history and physical examination are of utmost importance; the patient's complaints contribute much to a correct diagnosis. Several machines give precise information about the heart. The electrocardiograph traces a pattern of the heart's action. With the x-ray machine may be seen the size and shape of the heart, appearance of the heart's chambers and valves, and perhaps defects of the heart and nearby blood vessels. Dyes or opaque substances that will cast

an x-ray shadow can be injected into the veins; when they reach the heart, its part can be seen clearly and in great detail. Interpreting the results of the many varieties of tests made with these machines requires much skill. Some diagnostic methods can be carried out only with the use of special equipment and medical teams that include heart specialists (cardiologists).

Two chief causes of heart disease are rheumatic fever and high blood pressure (hypertension). The former attacks chiefly children and young adults; the latter, more mature persons, usually 30 years and older.

In the South, rheumatic fever is less common and usually strikes in a milder form. In fact, its mildness may cause its early symptoms to be overlooked completely, with the first evidence lying in a damaged heart. All victims do not have this complication, however.

Doctors have noticed that rheumatic fever almost always follows a "strep" infection, such as "strep" throat, tonsillitis, erysipelas, scarlet fever, or middle ear infection. If the attack is mild, the usual symptoms of hot, swollen joints may easily be taken for "growing pains."

Children who have one attack of rheumatic fever are highly susceptible to subsequent attacks when exposed again to the "strep" germ. Therefore, medical advice is to guard them in every way possible by isolating them from those who may have "strep" infections.

High blood pressure usually yields to conservative medical measures, such as diet, rest, and drugs. Many new safe and effective drugs have been perfected. Several operations performed on carefully selected patients have given good results. One is the removal of a diseased or deformed kidney which is known definitely

to be responsible for the hypertension. Another, called "sympathectomy," is removal of part of the sympathetic nervous system, two chains of nerves running along each side of the spinal column. Not entirely essential to life, these nerves supply the heart, glands, smooth muscles, and small blood vessels of the body.

Early detection of heart disease and correct treatment means that most patients with heart ailments can look forward to a longer, more satisfying life.

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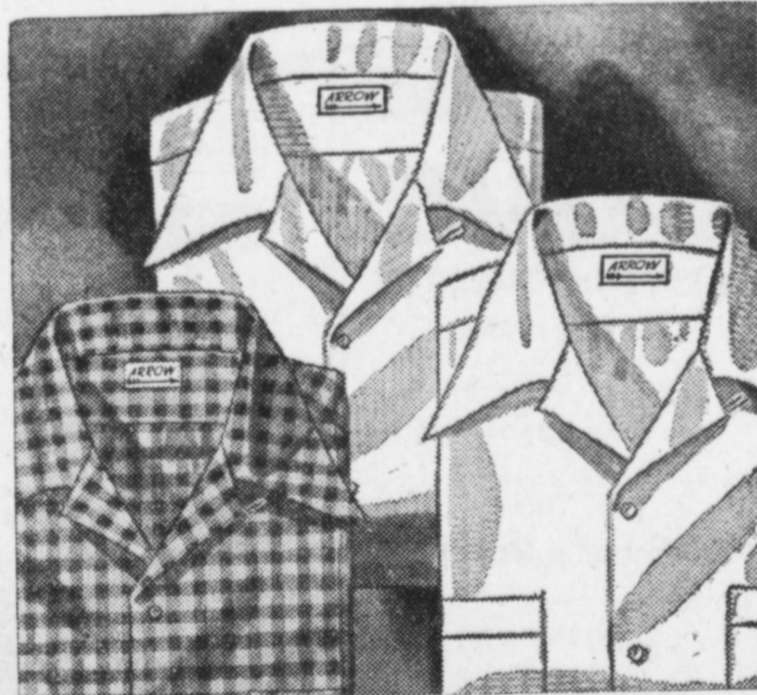

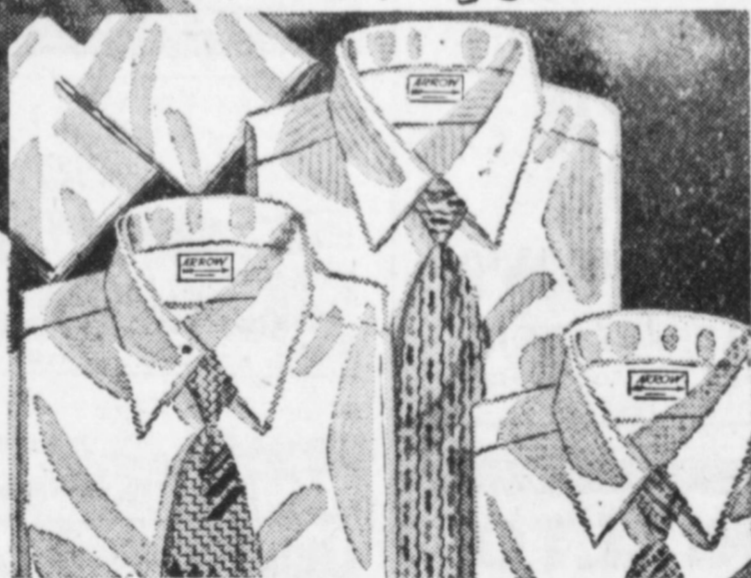

Property Rights of Married Persons Explained

June is traditionally the month for weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows with the next few weeks. But the act of marrying another person does not give you the authorization to take control of his property.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and dispose of his or her separate property. The separate property of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary community estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which includes all the income from her separate real property, and probably the interest on bonds or notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right. While the husband may have similar assets, the law accords them no particular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the matter is somewhat confusing, it appears that under present day law the husband has control of ordinary community property; but control of the wife's special community property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the homestead without her signature and acknowledgment. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction—he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special community property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordinary community property.

On the other hand, debts incurred by the wife in obtaining necessities for herself or the children bind all property belonging to either party, including the husband's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions emphasize the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a married couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special protection afforded to it by our laws.

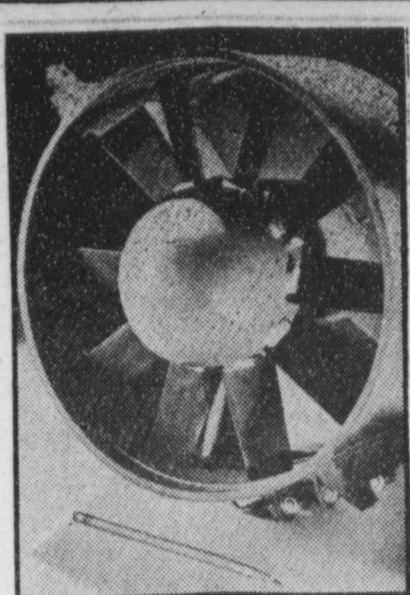
