Aransas Pass Shrimper Found Drowned In Bay

Aransas Pass.—The body of a 57-year-old Aransas Pass shrimper was found afloat near noon Monday 400 yards off Indian Point, about 4 miles north of here in Corpus Christi Bay.

The dead man was identified as Louis Perez, owner and operator of the "Miss Texas" out of Aransas Pass.

Justice of the Peace W. A. Gilleland returned an inquest verdict of death due to accidental drowning. He said Perez apparently fell overboard while pulling in a shrimp net.

Two men aboard a shrimper out of Corpus Christi found Perez' body floating in about eight feet of water. The body was face down, about 60 feet from his shrimper boat.

Billy Edwards, 638 Cheyenne, and Jimmy Dunham, 3409 Avenue D, said they noticed that the net on the Perez boat was about half-way out and hanging slack. This is unusual, they said, because when trolling the net is kept taut.

Edwards and Dunham said they saw the body as they approached the "Miss Texas."

Perez had been a resident of this area all his life. A veteran of World War I, he was a member of the Veteran of Foreign Wars Post at Aransas Pass and a member of the Catholic Church.

Courthouse Offices Will Be Closed August 20

Offices in the Aransas County courthouse will be closed all day, Thursday, Aug. 20, on account of the re-allocation of taxes election which will be held on that day.

Tax Re-Allocation Election To Be Held Thursday

Since the increased valuation of the taxable property in Aransas County will create a surplus of money in some of the constant funds, such as road building, jury service, and others, if the same percentage of taxes is placed in each of these funds, and the money from these funds is not transferable to others funds, it seems advisable to re-allocate the tax money in the county.

A re-allocation of taxes can be made only every six years, and as that is the only legal way the County Commissioners can administer taxes so that the taxpayer may receive 100 per cent benefit from his tax dollar, the Commissioners Court has called for an election for the re-allocation of taxes to be held next Thursday, Aug. 20.

The ballots for the election will have printed on them the following:

"For Re-allocation of County taxes."

Against re-allocation of County taxes."

Each voter shall mark out one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers for the election shall be respectively, as follows:

- Precinct No. 1 (Box No. 1): Voting place, Fire Station, Rockport; presiding officer, Mrs. Fay Brundrett.
- Precinct No. 2 (Box No. 1a): Voting place, Alamo Courts, Aransas Pass; presiding officer, Glenn Ellis.
- Precinct No. 2 (Box No. 1): Voting place, courthouse, Rockport; presiding officer, Mrs. Alma Ratliff.
- Precinct No. 3 (Box No. 1): Voting place, schoolhouse, Fulton; presiding officer, W. J. Moss.
- Precinct No. 4 (Box No. 1): Voting place, Concession Hall, Lamar; presiding officer, Mrs. Alma Johnson.
- The manner of holding the election will be governed by the laws of the state regulating general elections.

Aransas Pass Street Work Gets Underway

Aransas Pass.—Work of rebuilding Commercial Street and widening highway approaches into the city is underway under sponsorship of the Texas Highway Department, the City of Aransas Pass and property owners along the routes.

Heidenfels Bros. of Corpus Christi has the contract for the improvement project that calls for completion within 200 working days.

Approximately two and one-half miles of streets will be paved full-width with concrete curbs and gutters constructed on each side.

The project includes rebuilding Commercial Street in the downtown business section, paving it to a width of 92 feet from Cage Funeral Home north to Olivares Grocery, and to a width of 64 feet from these points to the north and south city limits.

The west approach of Highway 35 into the city will be paved to a width of 64 feet from Seventh Street to the intersection at the high school. City Manager T. E. Griffith said the traffic light at the school will be eliminated in the project and traffic here will be controlled by a series of islands.

The city will pay the cost of all all drainage, including installation of storm sewers where needed and property owners on each side of the routes are to pay for the curbs and gutters at the rate of \$1.50 a front foot.

Aransas Try Cases' Wildcat Scheduled

Aransas Fuel Oil Corp. No. 1 State Tract 4, Aransas County wildcat five miles north northwest of Aransas Pass, was taking sidewall cores and preparing to run 5 1/2 inch casing at 7,493 feet after running final log at that depth.

Earlier the test had cored a slight oil show at 7,211-21 feet and logged good sands at 6,784-92 feet, 6,798-6,806 feet and 6,824-32 feet.

The indicated discovery is being drilled with a Burdette Graham rig from a surface location in Block 58, McCampbell subdivision, James Orick Survey, A-167, and the bottomhole target is 630 feet to the north in Puerto Bay.

New Wildcat

C. G. Classcock has spudded a wildcat seven miles northwest of Rockport.

His No. 1 State Tract 1 is 660 feet from the south line of tract and scales 2,560 feet from the northwest corner of Tract 2. The slated 7,500-foot test, which is on a 460-acre lease, has set 16-inch conductor pipe at 148 feet.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 1 United Producing Co., proposed 9,000-foot Aransas County wildcat 5 1/2 miles west of Rockport in Gilliland Survey, was making hole below 5,400 feet. Logging at 6,450 feet was planned.

164 Barreler Selby-Walker Corp. No. 2 E. M. Baker-East Fulton Beach Field

producer in William Carper Survey, was completed for a 24-hour flow of 164.2 barrels of 42 gravity, pipeline oil. Production was through a 9-64-inch choke from 18 perforations at 7,155-58 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing at 7,170 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 810-1.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 60 State Tract 46, West Fulton Beach Field test six miles north of Rockport, will be 467 feet from the north and east lines of the tract in Copano Bay. Permit depth is 7,250 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 7 State Tract 104, test in the West Fulton Beach Field, was testing for completion from perforations at 7,838-42 feet. Total depth is 7,843 feet.

On a seven hour test, through 10-64 inch choke, the well made 59.55 barrels of oil plus 2.7 barrels of water. Tubing pressure was 975 pounds and gas-oil ratio was 819.

Union Producing Co. No. 10 Virginia H. Tatton, Aransas County wildcat, nine miles north of Lamar, was drilling below 10,900 feet on an 11,500-foot project. It is in J. M. Shreve Survey, A-186.

George W. Graham and others No. 1 Dooley Unit well in the East Fulton Beach (B-2) Field has been completed for a daily flow of 198 barrels of 43 gravity pipeline oil.

"Let's see the check," said Joe, the service station operator. The stranger handed him a check made out to Ray Gar, for \$68.10 and signed by John Jones.

"Sure, I know John Jones," said Joe. "Do business with him all the time — good as gold. I'll be glad to cash it for you. Just scribble your name on it."

Two weeks later the bank returned the check. The stranger who had signed the name "Ray Gar" on the back of the check was not Ray Gar. Joe had failed to identify the indorser of the check, and had no idea where the stranger could be found. As a result, he was out one tire and \$38.10.

The next week a taxi driver friend, Rex Fenders, came in, ordered \$3.00 worth of gas, and handed Joe a \$50.00 check payable to Pete Smith, and signed, "Miller Aluminum Company, Inc., James P. Pope, president."

On the back, across the top, were the signatures: "Pete Smith, Rex Fenders."

Having completely forgotten his recent unfortunate experience, Joe shelled out \$47.00 change. The check turned out to be worthless, there being no Miller Aluminum Company, Inc., in existence.

But this time, Joe was protected. He collected the \$50 back from Rex Fenders.

An ordinary check, legally known as one form of negotiable instrument, is merely an order by its signer to the bank upon which it is drawn, to pay the specified amount to the person named on the check, or to the order of that person. The bank must pay only as directed by the signer of the check, or stand the loss itself.

What is meant when it is said that a check is a "negotiable instrument?" The ordinary check—that is, one payable to a designated person or order, or bearer—is negotiable, and by that is meant that any good faith or bona fide holder for value takes the check free from any defenses that may exist against it in the hands of the named payee.

When is the holder of a check an "innocent, good faith, or bona fide" holder? When anyone receives a check from a person other than the drawer of such check, for value and without knowledge of any defenses which such drawer may have against the payee named in the check, he is said to be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

For instance, if the drawer should, find, after delivering the check, that the consideration received by him had been misrepresented to him, this would be a good defense against payment of the check in the hands of the payee, but a third party receiving the check without knowledge of this defense would be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

Anyone who indorses a check thereby warrants that the check is good and that all signatures thereon are genuine. Where it turns out that a check is worthless, or where the signature of the maker or one of the indorsers has been forged, the person holding the check may collect back the amount of the check from the last indorser. But obviously, if the holder doesn't know the last indorser, or where he is, his chances of collecting are very poor.

Know your indorser. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform — not to advise. No person should ever apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts, because the facts may change the application of the law.)

What About Rockport's Youngsters?

Measured by the yardstick of other localities Rockport has something to be proud of in the behavior of its children. Few people pay attention when conditions are as they should be, but it is a fact that Rockport and Aransas County are almost entirely free of juvenile induced headaches so prevalent in most communities.

Careful checking of court records reveal only three or four cases of younger generation misbehavior and these of rather minor nature. One unusual fact of this last statement is that practically all of the few recorded were committed by out-of-town teenagers, juvenile transients or comparative newcomers. Of real delinquency by permanent Aransas County children there was not a single entry. Nor was there any record of serious vandalism or what we know as "hoodlumism" among those listed. One case cited an eight year old who sat astride his rooftop peppering the dignity and posterior of passing ladies with a BB gun, but this can be classed more as an expression of youthful ebullience than delinquency. Very probably the ladies peppered failed to think the experience humorous but a mental picture of dignified femmes suddenly losing their poise and grabbing at a hot spot struck our funny bone. Not of course that we hold with promiscuous use of the distaff side as targets for BB guns. What we are trying to say is, that Rockport kids are good kids who seldom get seriously off side and we are proud of them. We are only sorry that all cities and towns are not as fortunate as ourselves.

We wondered about this almost complete absence of teenage misbehavior and did some questioning among those we thought would know why: County Judge John Wendell, County Attorney Weldon Cabaniss, Chief Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine, a teacher or two, one of the church pastors, and several parents, and we believe we found the answer.

Basically it stems from parental decency in the homes. In and out of them Rockport parents are honest, straightforward and decent. In the main they go to church, live as people should and do their part for community welfare. Naturally their children pattern after them. Other outside influences of course enter into the picture. There is no petty graft and greed prevalent among adult leaders which might cause youngsters to wonder whether or not honesty was the best policy. And we are fortunate too in having so many natural advantages affording outlets for youthful energies. Boats, fishing, uncrowded places to play, bathing pool and beaches, all of these detract from any tendency toward delinquency. A child has so much time to use and so much energy to expend. When those are gone he goes to sleep.

We made no attempt to check our ratio of childish offenses with those of other communities. Such comparison is unimportant and beside the point. We are only too happy to be part of a community which has youngsters such as ours and of whom we can say to outsiders "Our kids are swell!"

First 24 Hours of Life Are Most Dangerous The first 24 hours of life are the most dangerous. Thirty per cent of all deaths in the first year, known to be the most hazardous, occur during this period. Second only to premature birth as a cause of infant deaths is congenital deformity, that is an abnormal condition with which the baby is born. In the last ten years or so, surgical techniques to correct many of these deformities have been developed, and doctors have learned that the earlier operation is performed in most such instances, the better the results. Some examples of these life-taking conditions are an absence of openings (atresia) normally found along the food tube, a narrowing (stenosis) of the tube at various points, or an abnormal opening (fistula) between the food tube and the windpipe. Still another is "upside-down stomach," or medically speaking, "diaphragmatic hernia."

When the operation is not an extreme emergency, a waiting period is used to get the baby in good shape for surgery. He is given blood transfusions or injections of large amounts of fluids containing nutritional substances. X-ray studies are made to let the surgeon know the exact surgical problems that he faces, and he may call in consultants to view with special instruments different body structures such as the food tube or windpipe. The anesthetist, the doctor who will put the baby to sleep for the operation, with the surgeon's advice decides upon the method of anesthesia which will be safest for the baby yet easiest for the surgeon. For infants and children smaller surgical instruments and material for sewing up wounds (sutures) are available. The surgeon, who is expert in working in a more confined area with smaller body structures, operates quickly and gently. Another branch of surgery in which remarkable life-saving gains have been made is the field of breast cancer. Until the development about fifty years ago of radical mastectomy, the operation which removes not only the breast but also underlying and nearby structures involved or potentially involved by cancer, no cures of the disease could be predicted. Much of the credit for the fewer cases of advanced cancer of the breast that are seen by doctors today is due to the fact that most women are becoming more cancer-conscious. When they notice a suspicious lump or sore, they report earlier for examination. Many times the signs do not point to cancer, but their keen observation is rewarded either by the assurance that cancer is not present or by measures taken to prevent its serious effects.

If the doctor is doubtful whether cancer is present, he takes a piece of tissue from the suspicious lump in the breast to be studied under the microscope. Often, he does not let the patient leave the operating room before finding out the results of the examination. If positive for cancer, he removes the breast and often (depending upon the nature of the growth) deeper tissues such as the muscle under the breast and the lymph glands in the armpit in addition. If much skin must be removed, he sometimes is able to use a skin graft to cover the area operated upon. Later, when healing is complete, a breast form similar to the remaining breast can be fitted to make the deformity unnoticeable.

Homeowners Liability Explained
Can a homeowner be held responsible for accidents that happen to other people while they are on his property? Lawyers say it is difficult to state a hard and rule about liability for such accidents because the facts differ so much from case to case. However, some conclusions can be drawn by noting how the courts have decided in specific cases which have been brought before them.

A postman delivering mail slipped on a child's roller skate one morning. He sued the homeowner for damages. The court held that the delivery of mail is for the benefit of the homeowner and that he must take care to remove any conditions on his property which would make delivery of the mail dangerous.

Then there was the case of the meter-reader who slipped and fell on the basement steps and the courts held the owner responsible because the steps were defective.

On the other hand, a guest sued her host because she slipped and fell when she stepped on some beans strewn about the owner's living room. The host's children had been playing with bean-shooters on the day she chose to visit. The court held in this case that the host was not liable for her injury.

Similar cases where social calls resulted in disaster involved a guest slipping on a small scatter rug, and another overnight guest who slipped and fell in a shower. Both cases were decided in favor of the homeowners—not the visitors.

From these cases it may be seen

that the law is usually more strict about accidents befalling tradesmen and others who enter your premises in the line of duty, so to speak—postmen, laundrymen, meter-readers, delivery boys and the like—than it is in the cases of those who enter your home for purely social reasons.

This does not mean that a homeowner is absolved of all responsibility for injury to his guests. If he knows a dangerous condition exists, he has a duty to correct it and can be held liable for accidents which might happen if he doesn't. For example, a rotted tree branch fell to the sidewalk, injuring a passerby. The general rule here is that the owner was responsible because he knew of the defective condition and should have remedied it.

Fortunately, not everyone who falls down the front steps gets up and rushes off to sue his host. However, a substantial body of law has grown out of this type of negligence case. This is not surprising when you realize that more fatal accidents occur in and around the home each year than from traffic accidents on the high-

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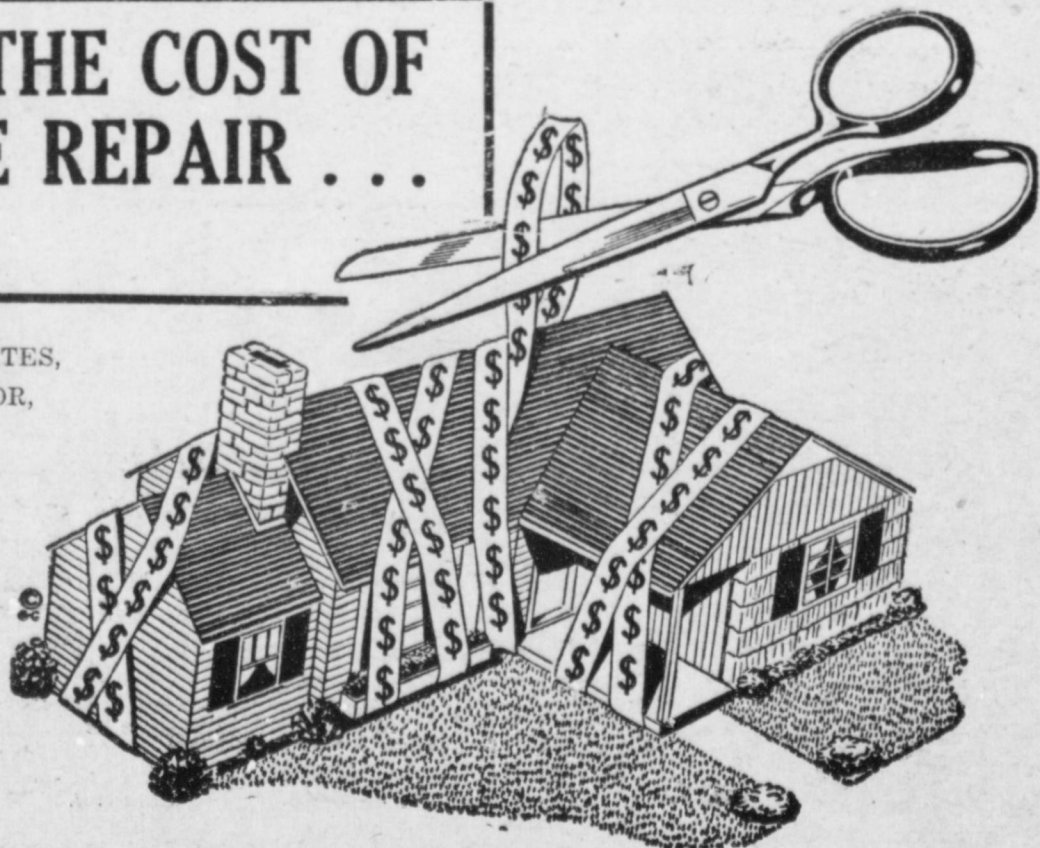

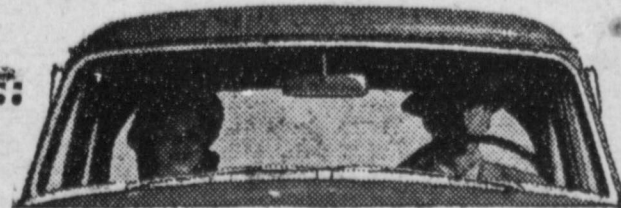

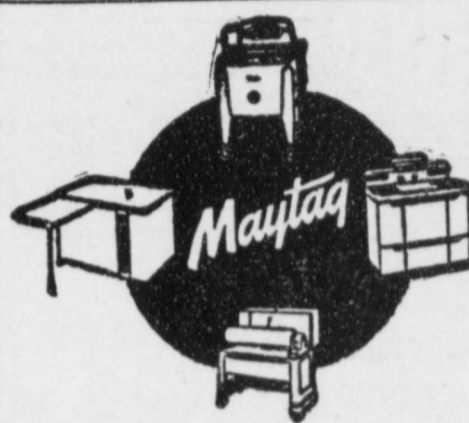

Rights of Draftees Guarded by Appeal Regulations

The rights of men registered with a draft board are guarded by appeal regulations. Appeals from local board decisions are heard by four state appeal boards.

Both the national and state directors of Selective Service may appeal from the determination of a local board at any time.

A man registered with a board, any person who claims to be his dependent, his employer under certain circumstances, and others may appeal to the appeal board from any classification except a determination of physical or mental condition.

The registered man and others named in the above paragraph, in most cases, are allowed only 10 days from date a notice of classification is mailed to file the appeal. Regulations allow a longer

period, from 30 to 60 days, when the man is in certain U. S. territories, foreign countries, or on the high seas.

The local board may allow appeals these time limits if it is satisfied that the failure of the person to appeal within the period was due to lack of understanding or to some cause beyond control of the person.

The person who desires to appeal must file written notice with the board. The notice need not be in any particular form but must state the registrant's name, and identity of person appealing. If

a registrant is registered with a Texas board and is working or living in California, for example, he may appeal to a California appeal board if he wishes.

If the registrant is placed in a class available for military service (1-A) by the appeal board, and there is a dissenting vote, he may appeal to the President of the United States.

Rockport Widely Known As Bird Kingdom

This is the crossroads of the bird kingdom. On a marshy peninsula near this picturesque resort city, the migratory species of the north and south stop and mingle with the varieties that move on an east-west course.

Why? Nobody is quite sure. But ornithologists say they know of no other spot where this phenomenon takes place.

As a result, the 50,000-acre Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, and Rockport along with it, has become a mecca for bird watchers and for tourists with a more casual interest in the workings of this particular phase of nature.

Each year, hundreds of Rockport visitors view the varied species which take sanctuary in this flat primitive area.

The birds are easily visible either from land or from boats, and in some instances show a surprising tameness seldom displayed outside the Refuge.

The most famed of Rockport's winged visitors are 32 whooping cranes—the only remaining members of their species—who are regular winter guests at the Refuge.

Each April, all except two of the huge cranes fly north through Kansas to an undiscovered nesting place in Northern Canada.

In the fall, they return to spend the winter inside the confines of the wildlife preserve under the careful protection of federal wardens.

The two whooping cranes that are barred from the annual migration were crippled by bullets while in flight. They were moved to Louisiana after several unsuccessful attempts to nest in the Rockport refuge.

But the cranes aren't the whole show by any means.

The Aransas preserve brings together birds from both fresh and salt water regions and those from the plains and mountains in a continuous pageant of primitive beauty.

Wading birds, such as plovers and sandpipers, walk boldly beside meadow larks and the stately roseate spoonbills.

There are, incidentally, only two large colonies of spoonbills left in the United States—the one at Rockport and another in Florida.

The Refuge has orchard orioles by the hundreds, and just as plentiful numbers of pelicans, herons, and avocets.

The latter are huge wader birds whose black and white stripes form rare patterns.

The Refuge also attracts many species of ducks.

The flatness of the marsh land forming the Refuge is made to order for observers because it gives a clear view over a long distance. Only rarely is the salt grass which blankets the peninsula punctuated by wind-whipped live oaks and cactus.

Wildlife Area Gets New Name

Austin, Tex. — Formal designation of the Wildlife Management Area in Anderson County as the Gus Engeling Wildlife Management Area probably will be made this fall.

The director of wildlife restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said the occasion may coincide with completion of the headquarters building late in the year.

The area was given its new name by action of the Game and Fish Commission since Engeling was the first manager of the 9,100-acre experimental and demonstration tract. Engeling was slain by an illegal hunter three years ago. He was unarmed and doing research work on the area at the time.

Gus Engeling and his family lived in Rockport for about two years when he was doing research work in this area for the Game and Fish Commission. The management plot is being developed for wildlife generally. It has deer, wild turkey, quail, doves, squirrels, and fur bearing animals.

The director said a gradual program now under way is designed to improve the quality and distribution of vegetation as well as timber stocks. Work in small, sample tracts is expected to guide future operations. A number of fenced plots are being used for a combination of soil improvement work and seasonal aid for deer and turkey through supplementing deficiencies in natural feed at critical times.

Lake development is expected to improve the supply and distribution of surface water. This process is linked to a program calling for eleven small dams, two already completed.

Garbage Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE
 AN ORDINANCE DEFINING THE VARIOUS KINDS OF GARBAGE, REGULATING THE KINDS AND SIZE OF RECEPTACLES IN WHICH TO PLACE SAME, THE MANNER OF ITS PREPARATION AND WHERE IT MUST BE PLACED TO BE COLLECTED BY THE CITY GARBAGE DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR COLLECTING SAME AND PROHIBITING THE PLACING OF GARBAGE OR ANY ARTICLE OR MATERIAL IN THE STREETS AND ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT; PROVIDING FOR SERVICE CHARGES; PROHIBITING THE MEDDLING, SCATTERING CONTENTS, PILFERING OR JUNKING, WITH GARBAGE CANS, TRASH OR RUBBISH RECEPTACLES; PROHIBITING JUNKING OR CARRYING OFF THE PREMISES OF THE CITY DUMP GROUND ANY ARTICLE OR JUNK; PROHIBITING THE COLLECTION OF GARBAGE, TRASH OR RUBBISH BY OTHERS THAN CITY FORCES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS WITHOUT A PERMIT FROM THE CITY COUNCIL; REQUIRING THE CITY HEALTH OFFICER TO MAKE PERIODIC INSPECTIONS OF BUILDING, PREMISES AND ANY PLACES WHERE GARBAGE, TRASH AND RUBBISH MAY ACCUMULATE AND ENFORCE AND ADMINISTER THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE IN THE EVENT ANY PART OF THIS ORDINANCE SHOULD BECOME UNCONSTITUTIONAL; FIXING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

Section 1. This ordinance shall be known as the garbage ordinance of the city of Rockport. The word premises as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, offices, theatres, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist camps, trailer courts, apartments, sanitariums, rooming houses, schools, hospitals, private residences, vacant lots and all other places within the city limits of the City of Rockport, where garbage, trash or rubbish accumulate in ordinary quantities.

The various kinds of garbage shall be defined as follows:

(a) By the term kitchen garbage as used in this ordinance is meant, dry kitchen refuse, all meat, vegetables and fruit refuse, small dead animals and dead fowls, from any premises within the city limits.

(b) By the term dry kitchen refuse is meant the solids after the liquid or slop has been drained off.

(c) By the term trash as used in this ordinance is meant paper of all kinds, rags, old clothing, paper containers, old rubber, pieces of wood, boxes, barrels, crates, feathers, weeds, grass and tree limbs from any premises within the city limits.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where kitchen garbage accumulates, to provide a portable garbage can constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable material, with two handles and a tight fitting cover of a capacity not less than five gallons nor over thirty gallons, and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in this garbage can. It shall also be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place all trash and rubbish from said premises in boxes, sacks, or barrels or other receptacles of reasonable size, provided that the gross weight thereof does not exceed 100 pounds. Garbage cans, boxes, sacks or barrels of trash and rubbish and tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding four feet), shall be placed inside the property line at the edge of the alley. In the event that it is not practicable to collect and remove such garbage, refuse and trash from the alley the owner, occupant, tenant or lessee of the premises shall place the garbage cans, boxes, sacks or barrels of trash and rubbish and tree limbs at such point as the agent of the city shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and removing.

Section 3. The places of wholesale accumulations, such as fish and shrimp houses, killing and dressing plants for fowls, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses, storage and other places where the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses and mules, heavy accumulations such as brick, broken concrete, lumber, ashes, clinkers, cinders, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees and other bulky, heavy materials, manure from cow lots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and waste oils from garages or filling stations shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for the same under the direction of the designated city official.

Section 4. The city garbage department will not make collection of kitchen garbage, trash, rubbish or tree limbs where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. The placing of kitchen garbage, trash, rubbish or an article, thing or material in any street or alley within the city limits is prohibited.

Section 6. The disposal of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish and that designated under Section 3 of this ordinance, or any kind of rubbish in any place within the city limits, except at the city garbage dump at the time designated by the designated city official is prohibited.

Section 7. The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles or in any way pilfering, scattering contents or junking in any alley or street within the city limits is prohibited.

Section 8. Employees of and city officers directing operation of the city Garbage Department and persons delivering garbage or other rubbish to the city garbage dump are allowed on the garbage dump grounds, and all other persons are prohibited: And it shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of trash, garbage or rubbish within the city dump ground or upon any road leading thereto, except in the pit or pits provided for that purpose.

Section 9. All junk and other material of the city garbage dump, at such dump, is the property of the City of Rockport, and no person is allowed to separate, collect, carry off or dispose of same except under the direction of the designated city official.

Section 10. The collection of garbage, trash and rubbish of any kind of junk within the city limits, except as provided in Section 3 of this ordinance, is prohibited.

Section 11. Any person, firm or corporation desiring a permit for the collection, removal and disposal of garbage, trash and rubbish shall make application for such permit to the City Council, who shall make and cause to be made such investigation as they may consider necessary in order to determine whether or not the public convenience and necessity requires the granting of such permit and the amount to be charged therefor, and in no event shall such charge exceed \$25.00 for each fiscal year of operation. All permits so granted shall be non-transferable and said permit may be recinded by the City Council at any time in its judgment such action is deemed to be the best interest of the public. In all cases where permits have been issued under this Section, such permits shall be attached to the vehicle or vehicles used for such purposes or shall be in the possession of the person rendering the service under such permit, and shall be subject to inspection at all times.

Section 12. Garbage cans shall be kept in sanitary condition and be tightly closed at all times, lime and insecticides must be used at places where receptacles for the garbage, trash and rubbish are located to be collected by the City Garbage Department to keep down odors and flies. The contents of all receptacles shall be so protected that the wind cannot blow out and scatter same over the street, alleys and premises of the city.

Section 13. In the business district and from hotels, restaurants, cafes, boarding houses, sanitariums, tourist camps, motels and trailer parks, collections will be made each week as required to comply with sanitary regulations of the city.

In the residential districts kitchen garbage shall be prepared for collection to be made 2 times per week, or as often as may be necessary to comply with sanitary regulations of the city. Trash and rubbish shall be prepared for 1 collection every two weeks, the time of such collections to be announced by the designated official.

Section 14. For garbage collection and for collection of trash and rubbish, there shall be charged, assessed and collected from each person, firm or corporation within the corporate limits of the City of Rockport, the sum of \$1.50 per month for each and every water meter, or meters, listed or registered in his, her or its name, and through which water is furnished, purchased, used or obtained from the City of Rockport, and which said sum shall be listed as a separate item on each bill and shall be due and payable as and when the bill charged against any water consumer for water used is paid, said sum of money derived therefrom shall be used for the purpose of aiding and assisting in and maintaining the Garbage Department of the City of Rockport, subject, however, to the following rates and schedules for persons and corporations where the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, to-wit:

Section 14 (a). For persons, firms and corporations not connected with city water the charges fixed herein for the removal and disposal of all garbage, trash or rubbish shall be entered by the City of Rockport against such owner occupant, tenant or lessee using or occupying any building, house or structure receiving such service, and said charge shall be collected as similar charges are collected. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail or refuse to pay the charge herein specified within ten (10) days from the date same shall become due and payable shall have such services suspended and the Health Officer for the City of Rockport shall be immediately notified for appropriate action in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not more than \$100.00, and each such day violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 16. It is hereby made the duty of the City Health Officer of the City of Rockport to make inspection trips at regular intervals to determine whether or not garbage, trash and rubbish is being properly collected, removed and disposed of as required by the provisions of this and any other applicable health ordinance, and in the event it is found that such ordinance is being violated, appropriate action shall be taken to insure full compliance with the provisions of such ordinance.

Section 17. Should any part, section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase contained in this ordinance be held to be unconstitutional, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance, but in all respects shall remain in full force and effect, and the City Council hereby declares that it would not have passed the unconstitutional part had it known such was invalid, and it would have passed the remaining part or parts that is not invalid.

Section 18. The fact that the health and safety of the public are being jeopardized and vitally affected daily by the accumulation of garbage, trash and rubbish in and on the premises of residences, businesses, on streets, thoroughfares and public places of the City of Rockport, and that such accumulation creates a danger of the spread of infectious, contagious and epidemic diseases, and that the present ordinances and regulations are insufficient to afford adequate protection against the menace, there is an urgent public need in the preservation of the health and safety of the people, and an emergency is created, and imperative public necessity requires that this ordinance be passed and that it become effective and in full force and effect immediately after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.

Section 19. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other sanitary ordinances and regulations of the City of Rockport unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in which case this ordinance shall prevail.

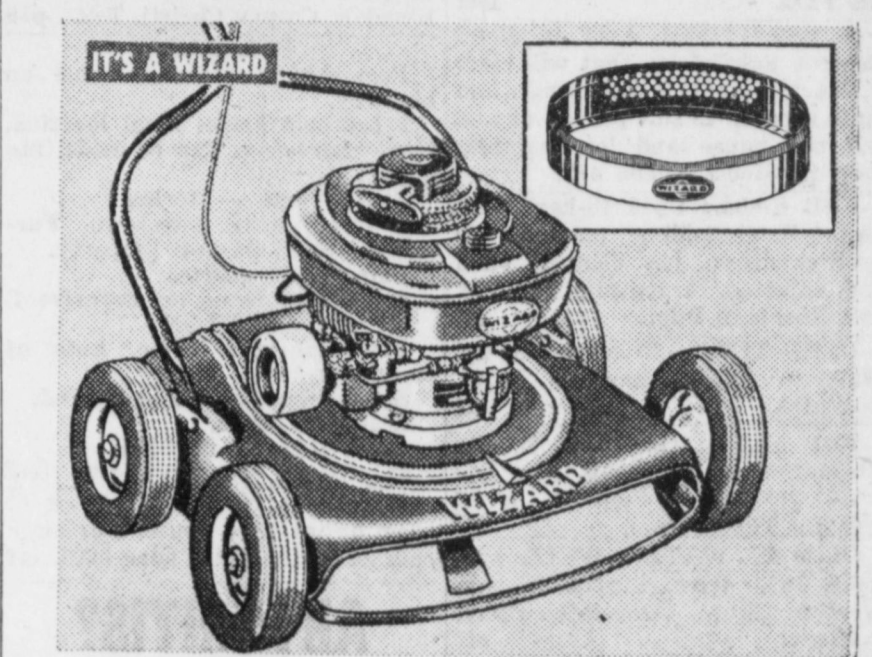

Nervous Indigestion

You might think your nerves bear the brunt when everything goes wrong—but they sometimes pass the buck to the stomach. Then you speak of having "nervous indigestion."

Quite a few people have this complaint. They report getting sick at the stomach or losing their appetites when they experience worry, anger, fear, or other strong emotions. If the period of strain is prolonged, they even reach the point of acute illness.

When they seek a physician's opinion, a thorough examination is in order. The doctor has at his disposal a number of tests which will conclusively reveal or rule out organic disease: gastroscopy, (looking at the inside of the stomach through a tube), analysis of the stomach's contents, x-ray examination, and examination of the stool.

If the doctor decides that emotional troubles are at the root of indigestion, he can outline a course of treatment. First, he perhaps will recommend correction of minor defects, such as bad teeth, tonsils, or infected sinuses which may have some bearing. Next, he will emphasize the importance of a regular schedule for meals, elimination, rest, recreation, and so on; the diet will include only easily digested foods. Pleasant surroundings for meals, regular vacations and holidays, and forgetting upsetting incidents as quickly as possible are other positive measures for helping to get rid of indigestion.

One of the conditions the doctor is careful to differentiate from nervous indigestion is that of peptic ulcer. This condition is estimated to affect about 10 per cent of the general population. The most common location for peptic ulcer is in the stomach or duodenum, the part of the small intestine just beyond the stomach, but it may occur in any part of the food tube which is bathed in gastric juice (the stomach's secretions).

The most characteristic symptom of peptic ulcer is gnawing "hunger pain," which usually is relieved by frequent, small feedings; there also may be nausea with or without vomiting, belching, excessive saliva formation, heartburn, or constipation. Usually treatment with simple measures like diet, rest, and medicine is sufficient, but an operation sometimes is necessary.

Another disease of the gastrointestinal tract (stomach and intestines) which may be serious is cancer of the colon and rectum. Even though it is easy for the doctor to discover and treat this disease early, it is responsible for more deaths than cancer in any other part of the body. Its

symptoms are a change in bowel habit (diarrhea, constipation, or alternating periods of each), bleeding, loss of weight or pain.

The chances for good results from treatment are increased considerably if the patient reports as soon as she notices any of these symptoms or, better still, if he is treated before they appear. A rectal examination will cause very little discomfort and may yield dividends by prolonging life and preventing pain. In the examination the physician will use an instrument which allows him to observe the inside of the rectal canal and lower end of the colon (the sigmoid). X-ray examination also may be needed.

A disease which affects an estimated one-third of the adult population is hemorrhoids. Also called piles, this condition amounts to varicose veins either inside or outside the rectum; sometimes there may be a combination of external and internal hemorrhoids.

Treatment of hemorrhoids may be by conservative methods, such as ice packs followed by hot, wet packs, and sitting in hot water; however, surgery is usually more satisfactory from the standpoint of more lasting results. Usually hemorrhoids are completely removed. Internal hemorrhoids, that is, those occurring in the rectal canal, can be relieved at least temporarily by the injection of an irritating chemical into the tissue surrounding the varicose veins. Scar tissue which forms shrinks these tissues, usually destroying the hemorrhoids.
