New Aransas Pool Clyde Townsend **Burned When Boat**

About 11 a.m., Friday, Clyde Townsend was in a speed boat fishing on Baffin Bay, about onehalf mile from where he had anchored his 46-foot diesel launch, the Eddie. Looking toward the launch he saw it was on fire. Townsend raced to it and went gas to one barrel of 51.1 gravity aboard to find that the fire was in the engine room. He went down through perforations at 9,650-54 and as he reached for the fire extinguisher the heavy hatch fell, knocking the flames into his face and eatching his nylon shirt on fire, which burned up completely.

One of the most important basic rights of the individual in this country is the privilege against self-incrimination. The Fifth Amendment of our Federal Constitution provides that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."
