Fulton, Mustang Wells Cut Back To Seven Days

The national over-supply of crude oil and petroleum products, which has been causing frettings and mutterings for a year now, and which had resulted in a 15-day producing schedule for Texas in August, hit South Texas with another low blow Tuesday.

The Railroad Commission was preparing a formal order cutting August production to just seven days for several of the bay fields near Corpus Christi and Rockport.

The new order will cut 8,273 barrels daily off the state allowable, lowering it to 2,711,831 barrels daily as of Aug. 1.

Affected will be the Mustang Island Field and Redfish Bay Field in Nueces County, near Port Aransas, and the "Fulton Beach area" of Aransas County, including Lamar, Virginia, Goose Island, West Rockport, Puerto Bay, Salt Lake and Zoller. (Presumably Copano Bay is included, as this was a distress area, although this field was not listed in Associated Press stories received from Austin).

The new order was not unexpected. Indeed, it was preferable to a complete shutdown of all the wells, which some had feared might develop after two companies which have been buying considerable crude in the involved fields had said they would not be able to buy any there after Aug. 1.

At the Railroad Commission statewide hearing 10 days ago, Guy Warren, head of Renwar Oil Corporation at Corpus Christi, told the commission that there had been no advance nominations for production from his company's wells in the Mustang Island and in the Rockport area.

Phillips Petroleum Company had been buying most of the affected oil on spot purchases, for use at its Sweeney refinery in Brazoria County. However, this refinery, along with other Phillips plants, has curtailed crude runs, and Phillips purchasers told the commission their firm would be unable for the time being to take the Mustang-Copano oil.

Hunt Oil Company, another purchaser for the area, also had curtailed its purchase plans for these fields.

The commission asked Atlantic Refining Company and Sunray Oil Corporation, which buy crude and which are the main producers in Mustang Island and Redfish Bay, to attempt to work out a market for part of the distress crude. However, at the statewide hearing, E. J. Henry of Atlantic, which buys about 8,000 barrels daily in Mustang and Redfish, that if forced to choose, he would prefer ratable take rather than shutting in of the big fields.

The seven-day producing schedule will lower the allowable for the sprawling Mustang Island wells to 3,262 barrels daily, which is 3,729 barrels less than under the statewide producing schedule of 15 days, under which the rest of the state will produce.

Redfish Bay wells will take a reduction of 1,737 barrels, dropping to 1,519 barrels daily on the seven-day schedule. The allowable for the fields in the Fulton Beach area will be 5,918 barrels daily, or 3,807 less than would have resulted under the 15-day pattern.

J. S. Kellenberger Commits Suicide

The body of James Sheldon Kellenberger, 31, was found with a bullet wound in the head at his home here about 2 p. m. Tuesday.

Judge C. O. Bailey who conducted the inquest informed The Pilot that the body was found by Kellenberger's wife in the bath room of their home.

He said Kellenberger was in a kneeling position with his head hanging into the commode and a .32 automatic pistol between his knees. He had been dead about 12 hours and he said there was evidence that he had been drinking heavily.

Mrs. Kellenberger spent Monday night with friends and on her way to work at a local cafe Tuesday morning she passed their home but did not see a light or car and decided her husband had already gone to work, so she did not stop. She did not find the body until she returned from work.

Sheriff A. C. Shivers was called and Dr. H. F. Elliot and Charles Marshall examined the body, which had been shot in the head at very close range, the bullet going through and lodging in the wall on the other side of the room. The evidence was given to Judge C. O. Bailey who rendered a verdict of death by suicide.

Mr. Kellenberger was a graduate of the Miami University of Florida, and was employed by the General Geophysical Co. here. He is survived by his wife, Portia, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kellenberger of New Cumberland, Penn.

The body was sent to New Cumberland by the Cage-Marshall Funeral Home.

Dependancy over ill health was believed to be the cause of the suicide.

Plymouth Oil Co. has staked location for a deep wildcat five miles west of Rockport in Copano Bay. The firm's No. 1-124 is 660 feet from the south and west lines of State tract 124 in Copano Bay. C. G. Glasscock has contract to drill the slated 10,000-foot project on a 313-acre lease.

Coming at 9,173 feet was underway Tuesday in A. O. Morgan No. 1 D. W. Grant and Clyde Jennings, proposed 9,500-foot wildcat west-southwest of Rockport. The test is on a 247-acre lease in Chas. Zenn Survey.

Coring below 8,250 feet was underway Tuesday in Heep Oil Corp. No. 2 Zeph Rouquette and others, scheduled 9,300-foot West Rockport Field test 2 1/2 miles west of Rockport.

General American Oil Co. No. 1 May Hoopes and others, test in the East Fulton Beach Field in Block 75, has been plugged and abandoned at 7,212 feet. Recovery was 190 feet of salt water and 30 feet of slightly gas-cut mud on a 15 minute drillstem test through 4-inch choke from 7,165-81 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 J. F. Brundrett, proposed 8,500-foot wildcat 3 1/2 miles west of Rockport in William S. Tatton Survey, was drilling below 8,225 feet.

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State Capitol NEWS

Austin.—The people have spoken! And what a speech they made. So close was the Governor's race that close followers of the political scene here remained up all night Saturday in hopes of finding out whether there would be a runoff.

Judge Ralph Yarborough was still in the lead at midnight. He left home shortly thereafter for his downtown headquarters in the Littlefield building. There the elevator jammed. When Yarborough was freed nearly an hour later, Governor Allan Shivers had taken a small lead which he never relinquished.

J. J. Holmes and Cyelone Davis, the two other contenders for the Governorship, polled just enough votes to make a runoff necessary. It will be the first gubernatorial runoff since the Rainey-Jester campaign of 1946.

A runoff also is in order for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. Contenders are Judge Lloyd Davidson of Austin and District Judge Alan Haley of Wichita Falls.

A third runoff race is that between Alfred M. Scott of Austin, and Justice Few Brewster who seeks re-election to the Supreme Court.

These Breezed Through
Clear winners were Ben Ramsey who defeated C. T. Johnson and George Hinson for lieutenant governor; John Ben Shepperd who defeated Doug Crouch for attorney general, with the biggest majority in any of the races; and Lyndon Johnson who defeated Dudley T. Dougherty for U. S. Senate.

Elected without opposition were Martin Dies, congressman-at-large John C. White, commissioner of agriculture; Bascom Giles, land commissioner; Jesse James, treasurer; Ernest O. Thompson, railroad commissioner; Robert S. Calvert, comptroller; and J. E. Hickman, chief justice of the supreme court.

Duke In Trouble
Something new happened in Duval County. George Parr's candidacies did not win by a landslide.

In fact, some of them didn't win. Duval County votes were impounded after being counted, and locked up in the district clerk's vault, by order of District Judge Maxwell Welch.

Drought Aid
Twenty-three Texas counties, hard hit by one of the state's worst droughts, have been made eligible for relief by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with help to be forthcoming immediately.

All in the Central and Western parts of Texas, the counties were among 54 to be listed for federal aid. The others were in Colorado and Wyoming.

Texas counties to receive benefits were Bastrop, Burnet, Comal, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Comal, Comanche, Coryell, Erath, Hamil-

ton, Hays, Kendall, Lampassas, Lee, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Travis and Williamson.

No details as to the nature of the relief program were made public by the Department of Agriculture.

Canal Suggested

A proposed plan to stop Texas' continuing water problems was explained by Dr. Walter P. Webb of the University of Texas at a conference.

Webb's plan, already widely publicized, calls for a billion dollar canal that would extend from East Texas through the dry areas of South Texas.

Conservation

Federal water conservation policy backed by President Eisenhower will not support state conservation plans that are "piecemeal," the executive board of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers has been told.

J. S. Hudnall, Texas representative at the National Rivers and Harbors Congress in Washington said that the president would "look with disfavor" on water projects that do not fit an overall planned program for entire river systems.

Insurance

Under an amended order issued by District Judge J. Harris Gardner in Austin, the Commercial Security Insurance Company of Houston can keep on doing business.

A previous order by Judge Gardner had closed the company, after Attorney General John Ben Shepperd charged that the firm had violated the state insurance laws.

A hearing is due in the case. Shepperd charged that the company borrowed \$200,000 of its \$250,000 initial capital. The attorney general said that the law requires unencumbered assets.

Natural Gas

Two Texas officials have tabbed the Federal Power Commission order freezing natural gas prices on gas sold to interstate pipelines as "serious" to the state's natural gas industry.

Railroad Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson and Attorney General Shepperd expressed dismay at the mandate, which was considered to be an initial step by the federal government to take over regulation of natural gas traffic.

Shepperd said that the move means "financial ruin for a large segment of the Texas natural gas industry."

Thompson called the ruling a "tragic blow" to the state treasury. Texas levies taxes on natural gas according to market value.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

proposing an Amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit jurors; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'men' is used in reference to grand or petit juries, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment either by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote, on the proposed Amendment, or by placing an "x" in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon.

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Section 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas

be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Section 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature."

"In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Section 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

proposing an amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit jurors; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'men' is used in reference to grand or petit jurors, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment either by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote, or by placing an "x" in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as Compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

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Section 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Section 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Section 6. That Section 3 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature."

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Section 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

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If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes; providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list, then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."

Sec. 2. The Foregoing Constitu-

tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-

ment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

If it appears from the returns of

said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Naturalization Laws Strictly Observed

Most of us accept with little thought our American citizenship and the rights and privileges it bestows. We might do well to reflect upon what it takes to become a citizen of the United States under our present laws. Many of us would probably be unable to pass some of the requirements if called upon to do so.

One of these requirements is that the applicant for citizenship must be able to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the court a knowledge of the Constitution of the United States and the principles which it affirms. In addition, he must show a fairly comprehensive knowledge of the workings and organization of the American government.

But that is only a small part of the process of becoming a naturalized citizen. To begin with, an applicant for citizenship (if he is an ordinary case) must have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence. Then he must be entered on the registry of the Commissioner of Immigration, acquire an alien registration card, and receive a certificate of arrival from the Immigration Department.

Some time later he will receive a letter from the government telling him where he must file a declaration to become a citizen — commonly known as "first papers." He may file this declaration shortly after he arrives in this country but not before he is 18 years of age.

After he has lived in the United States five years, and his first paper is at least two years old, the future citizen may file a petition for naturalization, known as "second papers." He must have lived in the state in which he filed for at least six months.

He will then be called for two hearings — one before the immigration authorities, and the second in federal court. At this time he must be able to speak and understand the English language, and he will be questioned regarding the Constitution, history of the United States and the government organization.

After 30 days the applicant will be notified to appear at the court for a final hearing on his petition. When the court grants a petition for naturalization, the applicant takes the oath of renunciation and allegiance — he renounces allegiance to the foreign state of which he is a subject or citizen, and promises to bear allegiance to the United States.

The court may deny the application. The laws relating to the granting of citizenship are strictly observed. Omissions, oversights, mistakes — all doubts in relation to the application are decided in favor of the government.

Some classes of applicants are exempted from several of the usual naturalization requirements. Certain requirements are waived for aliens married to citizens of the United States; for certain veterans of the armed forces; for former citizens who lost their citizenship by serving in allied armed forces during the two world wars, and others.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by repealing Section 2a of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; providing for submission of the proposed amendment to the qualified electors; providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics.

"Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote; shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax for her husband and receive the receipt therefor.

"Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

ceive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors; and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

"AGAINST the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors; and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

DUCK PARLEYS TO OPEN SOON

Austin, Texas. — Discussions leading up to the Texas waterfowl harvest regulations for 1954 open shortly, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The Central Flyway Council, comprising representatives of the states along the Flyway, meets in Pierre, South Dakota, July 27-29. This conference, like that of the other three flyways, will send two delegates to the National Waterfowl Council meeting in Washington early in August.

Recommendations of the councils will be forwarded to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service which has final authority on establishing regulations for the duck and goose harvest.

The executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, who is a former chairman of the National Waterfowl Council, will attend the Central Flyway meeting along with William Jennings, assistant director of Wildlife Restoration for Texas, and J. R. Singleton, wildlife biologist in charge of waterfowl research in Texas.

The Game and Fish Commission has voted formally to seek a zoning system for Texas to give the northern tier of counties an open simultaneous with that of Oklahoma and to provide a later season for the state at large. No change is expected in the bag limits or shooting hours.

COAST ANGLING BEST IN YEARS

Current favorable fishing reports along the Texas Gulf coast prompted the Director of Marine Fisheries to observe that "this is only the beginning."

He said next year should be even better than this year when record catches have been made at several places.

The Director said the excellent luck of salt water anglers results from a gradual comeback by the fish after the disastrous freeze of 1951 when countless tons of sports fish were killed.

Some of the fish died outright from the cold, which reached record minimums, but most of them perished when stunned by the chill and left helpless to die from sedimentation fouling their breathing processes.

The Director has observed earlier this season that the 1954 fishing would approach normalcy for the first time in several years.

This now has been confirmed by observers such as Andy Anderson, outdoor writer of the Houston Press, who wrote recently: "I have been fishing this coast for a lot of years and I don't know when I've seen as many fish caught over July 4, as I did this year."

Roy Swann, outdoor editor of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times tried Laguna Madre and headed up his report: "Area Fishing Mighty Good." The Houston Chronicle reported by headline: "Freeport Jaycee Fishing Fiesta Is Best in History." and Loraine Basford, fishing editor of the Palacios Beacon wrote: "The casualty

list of reds, trout, drum, panfish and even a few tarpon is so long that it is impossible to name all the catches."

The Director of Marine Fisheries said vegetation conditions along the coast continue to improve, providing better food and habitat, thus presaging a gradual betterment beyond the present favorable fishing conditions.

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Fire Marshal Osborn Reports On Recent Fires

Last week the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department was called to extinguish a trash fire in the rear of a local grocery store. Weeds and paper had collected around old lumber that had been stacked there. In some unknown manner the trash caught fire, endangering the grocery and a nearby residence. If this fire had not been reported immediately, undoubtedly a large fire loss would have resulted.

Two calls were recently made by the fire department to a cafe to extinguish fires. One apparently caused by improper handling of an incinerator and the other as a result of accumulated grease too near a hot range.

As always in the case of an alarm in the business district fire zone, every available man responded. If this, or the previous fire, had gotten out of control, it could have destroyed many business firms, with the attendant financial loss and would have thrown many employees out of work.

Maybe you are not one of these, but if you carry fire insurance on your property in Rockport you would pay the insurance loss, at the rate of about \$5.00 per thousand, increasing each year, until the additional premium covered the loss, or reached a maximum of approximately \$25.00 per thousand until the loss was paid out.

In addition to the time lost by each of your unpaid volunteer firemen, in answering an alarm, the wear and tear of the fire department costs an average of approximately \$35.00 per run.

When you see a fire hazard—report it. Remember, you will pay for it if it is not eliminated.
