Donts Listed to Avoid Fire at Christmas

Fire Marshall Carl Osborn yesterday asked redoubled precautions against house fires which annually take a heavy damage toll during the Christmas season.

He joined with the National Safety Council in centering his warning on the judicious preparation and disposal of Christmas trees. His "don'ts" included: 1. Don't buy an old tree, or

attempt to "flameproof" the one you get with chemical solutions. 2. Don't set up a tree without first sawing off an inch or so of the base and immersing the freshcut end in water.

3. Don't set it up near heat

4. Don't use candles for decorations and be sure your electric lights are in good repair. 5. Don't leave lights on tree lit

while no one is in attendance. 6. Don't leave tree up after needles have started to fall, and don't attempt to burn it in furnaces stoves or fireplaces because the trees burn with almost explosive

7. Don't set up tree where its accidental fall can block exit from







At last the day came in 1875 when, their horses captured or destroyed, their food gone with the destruction of the buffalo, and their teepees burned, a pitiful remnant of starving tribesmen straggled into the reservation at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and the Great War Trail of the Comanches became a thing of the past.





LOCOMOTIVE VALHALLA—Most steam locomotives considered obsolete go to the scrap foundry, but this Class K4 Kanawha highspeed freight hog has found a final resting place in La Salle Park, Buffalo, N. Y. Donated by the Chesapeake and Ohio as a monument to the age of steam which helped make Buffalo the nation's second largest rail center, it will be on permanent display for the enjoyment of oldsters and the amazement of a generation which is more familiar with the diesel locomotive. Built in 1943, the quarter-million-dollar locomotive is 105 feet long, weighs 425 tons with loaded tender and has pulled as many as 160 loaded coal gondolas at one time during its years of service.

CHANGES IN YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Today, I want to explain the 'drop-out" provision in the 1954 amendments to the Social Security Act. This is something entirely new, and it will work to the advantage of most workers.

Some time ago, a middle-aged man stopped by our office to see how much protection he and his family would have when he became 65 or what the family payments would be in case of his death.

He told me how much he was making, and he believed that he would be earning that amount until his retirement. We computed his future benefit amount from the average of his monthly earnings during the years in which his work had been covered by social security, and from what he expected to earn in future years. He was disappointed, and I knew right away what the trouble was. His monthly wage average had been brought down by including about four years of very low earnings from work covered by social security in the past. Those years in which he didn't earn much served to reduce his future benefits, and this situation occurs quite often. But the new amendments make it possible to drop out those years of ow earnings, which were reducing he amount of his benefit.

Under the new law, anyone who has as much as a year and a half of work on social security jobs after June 30, 1953, may have the advantage of the four year dropout. Since newly covered workers must figure their average monthly earnings beginning with 1951, they will have four years of no earnings under social security. The dropout will be used to exclude those four years. Those who have been working under social security also have the right to the drop-out.

The years which are dropped need not be consecutive, and all four don't have to be dropped. You may have as little as one year dropped out if that would give you the highest benefit.



Hurricanes travel on certain well-defined tracks which vary Arthur and Freeport destroying steadily forward, slowly at first. with the months in which the storm occurs.

During August, September and October, most of them start westward across the Atlantic, swinging more and more to the north and then northeast.

The great Galveston storm be-Santo Domingo, crossed the westward tip of Cuba, and might have gone north along the Atlantic coast had it not bumped into a wall of high barometric pressure before reaching the Florida coast.

This deflected it westward, almost parallel to the coast of the gulf. Picking up power and speed on the way, the hurricane swung inland at the Island City, practically destroying the town.

Some birds, such as the loon and penguin, are almost helpless ashore, but their swimming ability is wonderful. Swifts, practically helpless on land, in the air are swift and sure of wing.

The right kind of experence is always worth the cost.



A wife, depending upon where you are and how bad you want the girl, may cost 100 dog teeth, 2000 feathers, or nothing. Pigs, in most primitive societies, bring about the same amount.

Money takes many forms, but the headaches that accompany it are the same in any language, especially if you haven't got it.

One of the most common currencies is made of shells, generally cowries, that increase in value with the distance of the tribal lands from the coast. Merchants of all lands deal in these primitive coins, their trade extending to China, Japan, the East Indies, and the interior of Africa. On this latter continent, the price of a bride among the Bassaris is 15,000 luxury for any bridegroom.

Among the natives of Melanesia, in the Southwestern Pacific, shells of a sea snail are strung together and then these strings of money are tied together in rings sometimes as large as a wagon wheel. Wrapped in pandanus leaves, and bound with rattan, one such ring may contain 500 fathoms of diwarra, as it is called. These rings are kept in the First National of New Guinea, a leafy hut hidden in the brush and protected by a constant watch. The entire community stores its excess cash in this manner, keeping only a little for the needs of everyday life.

Glass beads are so firmly established as coin in some areas, that the rate of exchange is governed by fashion. Imagine the consternation of a South American Indian who invested his whole fortune in blue beads, only to have the fashion change to red. His primitive security market collapse was just as real as the one that occurred in this country in 1929.

Natives of the Santa Cruz Isands make feather money and use pieces consisting of a woven band

Edible coins are common. Salt has long been a recognized currency. The legions of Rome were paid in salt cakes.

Natives of Nias circulate dried oork, brick tea is used as cash by Chinese and Tibetans, and cocoa beans were used as small change n ancient Mexico. Rice is legal tender in the East Indies, Tibet uses walnuts, the Caroline Islanders pay off in dried banana peels and pieces of curcuma root, Chinese settle debts with opium, and Lapland uses, even today its ancient cheese money.

Tobacco is a medium of exchange in many countries, just as it was in the early history of the United States. Sorghum was once currency in our own state. No one who has read "On a Mexican Mustang Through Texas" will ever forget the tale of the doctor who attempted to sell his horse. The deal was almost consummated for 40 barrels of molasses.

Balls of raw rubber are also used as legal exchange by many

primitive tribes. Metal currencies take as varied

forms as do the natural ones.

Tabora. in East Africa, uses hoes, spears, knives, and guns as money. The Pangwe tribe use spear money as their regular cur-

Gold, as dust, nuggets, bars, or coins, has always been a highly desired currency and this popularity has been shared to some extent by silver. Modern coins can be traced to the symbolic use of primitive tools, raw nuggets, and metal bars or disks, as medium of exchange. Paper money had its inception in bolts or strips of cloth passing as currency, and to the use of mats, hides, and furs as primitive money.

We must not forget the rubber checks that were once issued by South American streetcar companies. Made of gutta purcha, they were used as fares, but also passed as currency among the poorer
