

Corporation Income Tax Must Still Be Filed By March 15, Says Collector

Information has been received from T. Coleman Andrews, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., that there may be some misunderstanding with regard to the deadline for filing corporation tax returns. The deadline for this type of return is March 15 and not April 15 as in the case of individual income tax returns.

Because of this misunderstand ing, tentative corporation returns filed by March 28, 1955, and accompanied by 50% of tax liability will be considered timely filed, with interest being due on the 50% from March 15 to March 28, 1955.



-INCOME TAX FACTS No. 6-

Don't Forget Joh Expenses, Home and Car Deductions

(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

What difference does it make whether you take a federal income tax deduction before or after determining your adjusted gross income? Plenty. Certain deductions can be taken before you arrive at your adjusted gross income, from which you can still deduct 10% as a standard deduction instead of itemizing any

other deductions. For example, a business man can deduct his reasonable and necessary expenses for travel that keeps him away from his home city overnight before arriving at his adjusted gross income. So can an employee local sales taxes on purchases of when traveling for his employer. This was true under the old law

and remains in effect. The employee was at a disadvantage, however, when deducting other expenses in connection with his work. These could not be treated the same way-unless they were re imbursed by his employer (in which case, the reimbursement would be counted as income). Otherwise, he could only deduct such expenses among his itemized deductions. If he used the 10% standard deduction he would lose them entirely.

Transportation Expenses

The new law allows the employee to deduct before determining adinclude fares, automobile expenses, and (if in connection with over-

night travel) meals and lodging.
Employee's expenses other than
these can only be deducted if the
standard deduction or tax table is not used. The expense of commuting between home and place of work

is not deductible at all. An "outside salesman" (one who usually works away from his employer's place of business) can deduct all his business expenses before arriving at adjusted gross income, just as if he were in business for himself.

Automobile Deductions

To deduct automobile expenses in connection with business travel you should first add up the total cost of maintaining your car, including depreciation, gasoline, oil, repairs, garage rent, etc. Divide this total by the number of miles you drove in 1954 to find the average cost per mile, then multiply this by the number of miles you drove your car for business travel only. This

deduct for business use of your car.
Even if you don't use your car
for business, there are still some deductions you can take if you don't use the standard deduction or car, auto registration fee, state gasoline tax, and losses from an accident not due to your "willful negligence" and not covered by insurance.

Home Owner Deductions

If you purchased a home during 1954 you probably agreed with the previous owner on a schedule of adjustments for taxes, insurance, water rates, and similar items. Un-der the old law you were not allowed to deduct any of the property tax if it was a lien on the seller at the time of sale.

The new law says: you and the previous owner can deduct this tax in proportion to the number of days justed gross income all his transportation expenses in connection of you held the property—whether with his employer's business. These tax. You are considered to have paid your share of the tax when you bought the home. This applies to any other real estate you may have purchased.

Other deductions for a home owner include: the interest portion of your mortgage payments, real estate tax paid directly or through the bank, interest on FHA home improvement loans and other loans, and damage caused by fire or other casualty.

If you sold your home at a profit in 1954 read the tax instructions carefully to see how you can avoid tax by building or purchasing a home costing no less than the net proceeds of the sale of your former



Shrimp landings for Gulf ports for January were down 7,000 bbls. as compared to January landings for 1954. Texas landings showed the same decrease for January, 1955; i.e., 7,000 bbls., which is indicative of how important the weather factor can be in fishing operations. From all reports along the Coast, shrimp were being caught in most coastal areas when weather conditions permitted trawling operations.

Shrimp production in the Southern Gulf was likewise limited to shrimp caught on hit-and-run trips made between squally weatheir. Production reports from the West Coast of Mexico indicate their season continued poor, with those months already gone, when heavy production can normally be expected.

The national frozen shrimp inventory of January 31st showed frozen raw headless shrimp holdings to be 21,755,000 lbs., and all other types of frozen shrimp 5,-314,000 lbs. It is expected that this inventory will decrease rapidly during March and April.

The Texas Shrimp Association is having printed on cards suitable for use on shrimp boats, minimum operational requirements for marine radios. It is hoped that captains of shrimp boats will follow the regulations as set forth, so that the jammed conditions existing on the assigned frequencies for such operations will be greatly improved. Southeastern Fisheries Association has undertaken similar methods of correcting this situation in their shrimp fleet operating in the Southeastern

> Last year 3.3 million cars entered the state, each carrying an average of 2.6 persons. These visitors stayed an average of 5,5 days and spent an average amount of \$7.80 per person per day, Greer said. As in 1953 California topped all other states by sending 537,112 vehicles and 1,396,491 visitors. It is also interesting to note, Greer pointed out, that approximately 208,000 visitors were from Canada, Mexico, and other countries.

Texas witnessed the greatest influx of motorists during the period from March through October, and it has also been established that Texas enjoys a large repeat business from out-of-staters. Department statistics show that 37 per cent of the visitors in 1954 were in Texas for the first time while the remaining tourists had traveled in Texas in previous years.

Figures used to compile this annual survey are obtained from survey cards distributed to tourists at the seven Highway Travel Information Bureaus located on major highways entering the state, Greer said. Figures from these survey cards supplemented with data from other sources produce a report that is believed to be one of the more accurate of its kind conducted in the United States, he stated. Over 121 thousand inquiries were received through the mail requesting travel information material, and nearly 400 thousand visitors stopped at the travel bureaus for curb service information and descriptive material, Greer stated.

In an effort to assist and stimulate travel in Texas, the Department published and distributed over 500 thousand Official Travel Maps in 1954, and in addition, published a Road Condition Bulletin. Calendar of Vacation Events, and other tourist material.







General Revenue Fund Closer to Solvency

The state's General Revenue Fund is two million dollars closer to solvency than two weeks ago, State Treasurer Jesse James said

In a report on the condition of the General Revenue Fund, James showed the deficit as being slightly over a million dollars. A report two weeks ago pegged the fund as being in the red to the tune of over three million dollars.

The fund went on a non-cash basis this February for the first time in 13 years. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has predicted that it will be in the black by May.
