Dr. Lathrop borrowed the plane from the Sides Pontiac Company at Carlsbad, and was planning to stop at Enid, Oklahoma, to visit daughter, friends said. The plane left Carlsbad about 6:03 a.m. Tuesday, and struck a sudden storm near Paducah about an hour later. Out of control, it dived headlong into the ground and burst into flames.

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
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Major James T. Hall Stationed In Ryukyus

JUNE DRAFT QUOTA IS ONLY 549

Austin-The state draft quota for June is 549 men for the army, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service officer, said Thursday.

The June quota of 549 compares with a May quota of 544 and an April quota of 432.

There will be no physical-mental examinations of men for military service through the draft boards in June, except in isolated cases. With the exception of volunteers

the June call will be filled only with men who on June 1 are 21 years old and older. The average age of men now being inducted in Texas is above 21. Draft board quotas are being

TUNA IN THE GULF

For years biologists and scientists were dubious when tuna from was no food for them and, even when tuna-like fish were sighted off Port Isabel some 15 or 20 would give you an argument about them, claiming that because yellowfins had never been caught there, there weren't any. Then the Fish and Wildlife Service vessel Oregon began exploring the sult that, last year, yellowfin tuna, blue marlin, sailfish, blackfin tuna, and a number of other species were hung on her great

On top of that, scientists aboard the boat, fishing with dip nets under the ship's lights at night, similar beasts, proving that the 500-fathom curve, were probable breeding grounds for these giant game and food fish.

Small broadbill swordfish, the first ever to be caught in American waters, showed that the Gulf of Mexico acted as a breeding ground for them, just as did the Mediterranean on the other side

of the Atlantic. However, in over three years, one year of which was spent in an extensive search for tuna, only two of the big bluefins were caught, giants of the tuna family, that furnish the basis for a great angling tournament in Nova Scotia each year. These fish, caught by the Oregon were small. Then, early this year, bluefins, big ones, began to be caught, and Stewart Springer, in charge of the work being done by the Oregon, was asked what was happening. He said:

"There was a 468 lb. bluefin marlin caught by the M/V Mike Flechas, on a long line, 120 miles south of Horn Island, Mississippi, in February, and at the same time they caught a marlin of almost exactly the same size, and some yellowfins.

"To continue the bluefin story, the Mike Flechas is just in today (March 9) with five more blue fin not so large, 350-400 pounds. The M/V San Marcos, Captain Tony Rendeiro, brought in a 741 pound (81/2 foot) bluefin early this week off Louisiana. To date (March 9) 12 large bluefin have been taken by the Mike Flechas and the San Marcos. The only ones taken yet by the Oregon were two five-pounders, two years ago. We do not think the bluefins will be of commercial importance in the Gulf, and we expect the large ones to be present in the winter

Beginning the last week in February, the yellowfins disappeared. The Oregon set a line February 28 and got nothing. The same day the Mike Flechas got its last yellowfin. We suggest that the disappearance coincides with the beginning of the spawning season. We hope to find out soon

what the score is." Springer's letter is of extreme interest, showing as it does that there are giant fish in the Gulf for both sportsmen and commercial fishermen, during most of the year. All they need to do is catch

Commercial interests are already laying plans to utilize this newest resuorce. Fishing operators along the eastern part of the Gulf are definitely interested, and a recent dispatch from the U.S.

hands of the legislature. Proponents argue that the game commission can do a better job of conservation and propagation of the various species of wildlife if it has the power to set seasons and bag limits

over the state. Their contention is that immediate action is sometimes needed rather than waiting for the legislature to meet and act on

hundreds of local game bills. As approved by the senate, county commissioners' courts would have the power to veto any regulation made by the state commisions in the individual


